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

of the Worksop Rural District Council.

Sir, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit for your consideration the Annual Health Report for 1972 together with the vital statistics relative to the period.

The population figure of 21,420 represents an increase of 230 over the corresponding figure for last year.

The birth rate is 16.6 per thousand of the population. The figure for England and Wales is 14.8.

The death rate at 11.2 per thousand of the population is below that for England and Wales (12.1).

The infant mortality rate at 39.4 per thousand live births is above that for England and Wales (17.0) and further details are included in the text.

The report includes information on the Health Services provided in the area by the Nottinghamshire County Council, and for this information I am indebted to the County Medical Officer.

I should like to take this opportunity to express my thanks to the Staff of the Department for their loyal and generous assistance, to the Officers of other Departments for their help and co-operation, and to the Council for support and encouragement.

For most years it is possible to note the biennial epidemic character of measles. It is now possible to vaccinate children successfully against measles, and, therefore, in future years the pattern displayed in these figures may alter a great deal. It is to be hoped indeed that this disease will in the future be relegated to the position of poliomyelitis and diphtheria.

During the year 276 children were vaccinated against measles.

During the year 101 children were vaccinated against rubella.

#### Scarlet Fever

One case of scarlet fever was notified during the year.

#### Whooping Cough

No cases of whooping cough were notified during the year. The number of children immunised against the disease was 362.

#### Food Poisoning, Enteric Fever

No cases of food poisoning were notified during the year.

#### Dysentery

There were no cases of dysentery notified during the year.

#### Infective Jaundice

There were ten cases of infective jaundice notified during the year.

#### **Tuberculosis**

There was one case of pulmonary tuberculosis notified during the year 1972.

#### Diphtheria

There were no cases of diphtheria notified during the year.

In order to keep the disease from re-appearing, it is necessary to try to protect at least 75% of the children under 15 years.

#### Poliomyelitis

There were no cases of poliomyelitis notified during the year.

#### Poliomyelitis Vaccination

The number of children who received three doses of oral vaccine was 360.

#### Infant Mortality

There were fourteen deaths under one year giving an infant mortality rate of 39.4.

The causes of death are analysed in Table II.

Of the fourteen deaths notified, five were due to prematurity and one to pneumonia of the newborn.

Prematurity is a problem in itself and until we know much more about its cause, there is little we can do about it.

#### ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH Medical Examination of Staff

For superannuation and other purposes twenty-six members of the Council's staff were medically examined by me during the year.

#### HOME HELP SERVICE

The demand for Home Help in the Worksop Rural District increases as the amenities of the service become more widely known.

Home Helps are available for households where domestic help is needed owing to the presence of anyone who is sick, lying-in, an expectant mother, mentally defective, aged or a child not over compulsory school age.

The work undertaken by these women does not include nursing or midwifery duties, and they are not used as "sitters-in," but they do the ordinary domestic work usually undertaken by the mother of a family, which may include cleaning, cooking, washing, care of children, mending and shopping.

The charge for the service is 55p per hour except where the patient is unable to afford that amount, when the County Council's Scale of Assistance is applied. Home Helps are paid by the County Council and necessary travelling expenses are reimbursed.

Cases needing help should be reported to the Home Help Service, 114 Bridge Street, Worksop (telephone Worksop 2884), where the service is administered by the District Organiser and an Assistant. The Home Help Service is under the auspices of the Area Director of Social Services.

#### AMBULANCE SERVICE

Ambulance services are provided by the Nottinghamshire County Council, and are controlled from the County Ambulance Control in County Hall, West Bridgford, Nottingham.

Worksop station is self-contained and controls its own vehicles in co-operation with the rest of the County.

The station is manned by one superintendent, 23 men and a control assistant.

Vehicles comprise three ambulances, one large dual purpose ambulance to carry 10 people, and two small dual purpose ambulances to carry 7 people. One reserve ambulance is kept at the station in case of break-down or to replace an ambulance undergoing repairs.

#### Chiropody for Old Age Pensioners and Handicapped People

Chiropody may be obtained for the elderly (persons over pensionable age) by application to the Centre for the Elderly and Physically Handicapped, Eastgate, Worksop (Telephone No. 4144) on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2.30 to 7.30 p.m. by appointment.

The physically handicapped may attend on Friday p.m. once a month but a medical certificate is required.

The chiropodist also attends at Carlton, Langold and Bircotes Clinics where treatments are carried out by appointment.

#### 1. INFECTIOUS DISEASE

The home conditions and possible sources of infection of all cases of infectious disease are investigated. Where necessary the rooms occupied by the patient are fumigated and the householders given instructions on the cleansing of the houses and effects, and on the precautions to be taken to prevent the spread of infection; disinfectant fluid is supplied by the Council, free of charge, for this purpose.

48 visits were made in connection with one case of scarlet fever, ten cases of infective jaundice and cases of suspected food poisoning, dysentery, contacts, etc.

## 3. DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The following extensions of foul and surface water sewers were carried out during the year:—

#### Harworth Industrial Estate

Provision was made for the drainage of the proposed Harworth Industrial Estate during the year.

A pumping station and 433 yeards of 8-in. diameter rising main in P.V.C. pipes were constructed to deal with foul water drainage from this site.

313 yards of 30-in. and 112 yards of 15-in. surface water sewer in concrete pipes were also laid to serve the site.

The following sewer extensions were also made during the year:—

- 100 yards of 6-in. foul water sewer in earthenware pipes were constructed to serve houses in course of erection by private enterprise on a site off Rotherham Baulk, Carltonin-Lindrick. 100 yards of surface water sewer in 9-in. pipes were also laid on this site.
- 80 yards of 6-in. foul water sewer in earthenware pipes and 76 yards of 6-in. surface water sewer in earthenware pipes were constructed to serve houses in course of erection by private enterprise on a site off Spitalfields, Blyth.
- 3. 103 yards of 6-in. foul water sewer in earthenware pipes and 98 yards of 6-in. surface water sewer in earthenware pipes were constructed to serve houses in course of erection by private enterprise on a site off Bawtry Road, Harworth.

#### Harworth Sewage Treatment Works.

The provision of an additional humus tank and a recirculating pumping station and associated works was completed at Harworth Sewage Treatment Works during the year.

## 4. CLOSET CONVERSIONS— PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 1936—SECTION 47.

The Council continued to make grants available to owners of dwellinghouses of 50% of the cost, but not exceeding £15 per dwellinghouse, towards the cost of converting sanitary conveniences of the conservancy type into water closets, in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

No applications were received during the year.

#### 5. PUBLIC CLEANSING

The refuse collection service was carried out by direct labour throughout the district.

The bonus scheme referred to in previous reports continued to operate satisfactorily.

The service consists of the weekly emptying of dustbins and pail closets and the cleansing of privy middens and ashpits every two weeks.

Routine treatments of the refuse tip were carried out during the year to prevent nuisance from rodents.

The Council operated three Shelvoke & Drewry vehicles of 16/18, 25 and 35 cubic yards capacity respectively, with one old 18 cubic yards capacity vehicle in reserve.

16 men were employed on refuse collection and disposal.

#### 6. INFESTATION

#### (a) Bed Bugs

Only one case of infestation of bed bugs came to the notice of the Department during the year. This was in a Council house and was successfully dealt with by fumigation and spraying.

#### (b) Rodent Control.

The refuse tip, sewage disposal works and other land and premises owned and occupied by the Council were inspected regularly to detect any infestation of rats and treatment carried out where necessary.

129 infestations of rats were dealt with in connection with dwellinghouses and 4 infestations of rats at other premises.

Infestations at dwellinghouses were dealt with free of charge but 77p per hour (including materials) is charged in respect of the treatment of premises other than dwellinghouses.

A part-time rodent operator is employed on rodent control.

#### 7. MEAT AND OTHER FOOD

There are no licensed slaughterhouses in the district, the butchers obtaining their meat wholesale or by using licensed slaughterhouses in adjoining districts.

Licences to slaughter or stun animals outside the Council's district were renewed in respect of three slaughtermen.
