Foul Cattle Ships.

The Inspector reports that 19 Cattle Ships arrived in the Port direct with cattle, and 10 after having landed cattle elsewhere. They were cleansed under his supervision.

Regulations.

Copies of Regulations issued have, as usual, been posted on all gangways, and delivered on board of vessels in the port.

Cholera, Yellow Fever, and Plague.

No cases occurred in the Tyne Port during the Year 1900.

Plague Precautions.

In November, an arrangement was made with the various Local Authorities on Tyneside, to reserve the Floating Hospital of the Port Sanitary Authority, for the sole reception of any cases of Plague that might occur either affoat or from the shore. At the Floating Hospital, Bacteriological apparatus was also supplied by the Port Sanitary Authority in order to promptly investigate suspected cases of Plague. All arrivals from Plague infected Ports continue to be medically examined, and precautions are taken to thoroughly funigate such vessels, with the object of destroying rats and other vermin on board.
