Infectious Disease in the Port.—Patients admitted into the Floating Hospital.

Water-Boats and Water Supply to Ships in Port.

The water-boats, 28 in number, have been examined as usual, and

the tanks found in good condition.

In 61 cases the *drinking water* of ships, which came from Ports infected, or suspected to be infected, with Cholera, has been changed, and the purification of the tanks has been seen to by the Inspector, acting under the direction of the Medical Officer of Health.

Advices as to Sickness

on shipboard, and other matters, continue to be received from and forwarded to the Health Departments of other British Port Sanitary Authorities.

Clothing and Bedding.

14 vessels and several lots of clothing or bedding have been disinfected. 633 beds have been burnt, and 13 lots of filthy clothing have been destroyed, on account of infection.

Passenger Steamers.

The Passenger Steamers arriving continue to be regularly visited and examined.

Fishing Boats.

The total arrival of fishing vessels at the Quay, North Shields, steam and sailing, is 13,231* (6,531 Trawlers and 6,700 Herring Boats), as compared with a total of 13,460 in the previous year. 483 of these, in foul condition, were cleansed and deodorized on notice from the Inspector. The rest were in good order.

Dead Dogs.

110 Dead Dogs have been removed from Dunston Foreshore. After disinfection, they were taken out to sea in R.T.C. Hoppers. Since dredging operations were commenced inside the staiths, this nuisance has abated considerably.

Foul Cattle Ships.

The Inspector reports that 31 Cattle Ships arrived in the Port direct with cattle, and 36 after having landed cattle elsewhere. They were cleansed under his supervision. The number reported in the previous year was 30.

Regulations.

Copies of Regulations issued have, as usual, been posted on all gangways, and delivered on board of vessels in the port.

Cholera, Yellow Fever, and Plague.

No cases occurred on board vessels arriving in this port during 1898.

Smallpox Epidemic at Middlesbrough.

During the prevalence of Smallpox at the ports of Middlesbrough and Bilbao, all arrivals in the Tyne were medically inspected. Dr. Clay was appointed to take night duty, and extra launch hands were engaged for night work.

This work commenced on February 19th, and was discontinued on May 21st. During this period 182 vessels were boarded, and 2,282

men medically examined.

Legal Proceedings.-Prosecution of a Ships' Master.

On June 22nd, proceedings were taken under the Public Health Act (Secs. 125 and 126), against the master of the Bg. "Brodrene Clausen," for non-notification and unlawfully exposing one of his crew suffering from Smallpox. Mr. Holmes conducted the case for the Authority, and the defendant was fined 40s. and costs on both charges.

Floating Hospital.—New Administrative Block.

On June 8th, a deputation, consisting of the Chairman, Ald. Hindmarsh, the Clerk, and Medical Officer, proceeded to London to interview the Local Government Board with the view of gaining their sanction to a loan for a new administrative block on a separate pontoon for the Floating Hospital.

The deputation was received by Sir Richard Thorne Thorne, Medical

Officer to the Board, and Mr. Munro, Assistant Secretary.

Sir Richard Thorne-Thorne stated that the Local Government Board would not sanction Smallpox being treated simultaneously with other diseases in the same hospital since the issue of their memorandum on the subject. Your Medical Officer urged that as it was a rare occurrence for Smallpox to be admitted and treated with other cases in the Floating Hospital also, that when it did occur the precaution of promptly vaccinating the other patients had, in every instance, proved successful, an exception in the case of a Floating Hospital might be made.

The Local Government Board. in withholding their sanction, uphold their principles on the treatment of Smallpox in insolation hospitals. In order to meet their views, the question of constructing a separate Smallpox Hospital is raised, and our position must be

considered de novo.
