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THE TWENTY - SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

CAMBRIDGESHIRE, ISLE of ELY and BOROUGH of CAMBRIDGE

PAUPER LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Pursuant to the 62nd Section, of the 16th and 17th Victoria, Chapter 97, the Committee of Visitors of the above Asylum beg to Report to Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Cambridge and Isle of Ely respectively, and to the Town Council of the Borough of Cambridge, as follows:—

Your Committee in their last Annual Report announced that a Special Committee had been appointed to investigate the several matters treated of by the two Commissioners in Lunacy, who inspected the Asylum on the 8th November, 1883, and also to review the Report of the Sub-Committee of the 11th June, 1883, respecting increased accommodation on the Female Side of the Asylum.

This Sub-Committee on the 9th February last made the Report, of which a printed copy accompanies this Report (see p. 13), and their recommendations were considered at the Monthly Meeting, held on the 25th February last, with the result that:-

- Your Committee entered into a further i. Contract with the Visitors of the Northampton County Asylum for the reception (for the term of three years, from the 22nd day of February, 1884, at 14s. per head, per week,) of 16 Female Patients in addition to the 7 Male Patients, who are already boarded out at that Asylum, at the same rate per head per week. It was also ascertained that if required the Visitors of the Berkshire, Reading and Newbury Lunatic Asylum, at Moulsford, could receive 10 Female Patients at 14s. per head, per week.
- from Fire. A partition wall was ordered to be built across the Central Corridor, and the several Articles recommended by the Sub-Committee, for the use of the Fire Brigade, together with a Hose, Reel, and Implement Box, were ordered to be purchased. The Iron Gates round the Airing Courts were also enlarged to admit of the Passage of the Fire Escape round the building. In the following July a Shed was built for the Fire Escape, and the Shed which was up to that time used by the Masons

was set apart for the appliances of the Fire Brigade, a new shed being built in substitution.

- The consideration of the question of the Pumps remains postponed.
- iv. (1) The Drain Pipes outside the Building have been cut and the soil pipes ventilated.
 - (2) A new House has been built in the Grounds for the Head Male Attendant by the Asylum Staff of Artizans, under the superintendence of Mr. Rowe, at a cost of £300. The house is now complete, and the Head Male Attendant will proceed to occupy it as soon as he can vacate his present residence.
 - (3) The Female Dining Hall has been furnished and brought into use.
 - (4) A Belfast Musgrave's Stove, with proper Guard, has been provided for each Infirmary.
 - (5) The Boundary Wall round the Asylum Grounds is now nearly finished.

During the past year your Committee have also made the following alterations and improvements in the Asylum:—

(1) The Single Room in the Female Infirmary has been converted into an Attendant's Bedroom.

- (2) A wrought iron fence has been put up for the protection of the Gas Holders, at a cost, including Gates and Posts, of £31. 10s. 0d. The work was carried out under Contract by Mr. E. Beales, of Cambridge.
- (3) An additional set of W.C's. has been provided for the Female Ward, No. 1.
- (4) The Oven which had become worn out and insufficient in size has been replaced by a Jennison's Patent Smokeless Two Decker Oven, 10-ft. × 8-ft., at a total cost of £252. viz:—£125. for the Oven itself, and £127. for the structural alterations which its erection involved.

In consequence of the large annual increase in the number of Lunatic Patients, viz.:—18 in the year 1882; 27 in the year 1883, and 31 in the year 1884, making a total of 76 in three years, in March last the Clerks to the Guardians of Unions in the County, Isle and Borough were requested to furnish a Return of the Patients then in the Asylum, whose maintenance was partially or wholly repaid by friends, and of the weekly amounts paid in each case.

The following Summary was made from the returns received in compliance with this request:

An enquiry was thereupon directed to be made as to whether any and which of the Patients named in the Returns, the cost of whose maintenance is wholly repaid to the Guardians, were in a position to be called upon to pay a further sum to represent a contribution to the cost of the Asylum itself.

It was found, however, that out of the number of 25 given above, six only had friends who could afford to make additional payments, and in respect of those six 14s. per head per week, is now being paid in lieu of the current rate of maintenance.

Your Committee have during the past year made orders on the Treasurers of the County, Isle, and Borough respectively, under the 38th Section of "The Lunatic Asylums Act, 1853," for the ordinary repairs of the Asylum on the basis of the Population of 1881, as follows:

The charge of Maintenance of Patients in the Asylum during the past year was on the 25th of February, 1884, fixed by your Committee at $10s.\ 9\frac{1}{2}d$. per head per week upon the basis of the actual cost per head during the year 1883, as stated below, against $10s.\ 11\frac{1}{4}d$. per head per week charged during the year 1883.

With the exception of John Large, who in January last injured Edward Brasher, one of the Asylum Artizans, by kicking him on the leg and so rendering him unfit for work for a time, the only Patient whose refractory conduct during the past year has been brought to the notice of your Committee is James Mison, who on the 5th April, whilst out with a walking party of other Patients in charge of three attendants, set fire to two stacks of straw belonging to a neighbouring farm in the occupation of Mr. Esau Stalley. On the 1st May last Mison was committed for trial on the charge of Arson, and on the 3rd of that month a true bill was found against him by the Grand Jury at the Cambridgeshire Assizes, but on the question of his fitness to plead to the charge being gone into, the Petty Jury returned a verdict that he was not capable of pleading, and he was thereupon ordered to be detained during Her Majesty's pleasure. Shortly after the trial Mison was returned from the County Gaol to the Asylum, and on the 27th July he was removed to the Broadmoor Criminal Lunatic Asylum under Warrant from Her Majesty's Secretary of State.

The introduction into the dietary, suggested by the Medical Superintendent, of a dinner of American Tinned Meat and a Fish dinner, alternately one day in each week, has resulted in satisfaction to the Patients and a considerable saving in expenditure.

On the 13th of November last Mr. Charles Palmer Phillips and Mr. Reginald Southey, two of the Commissioners in Lunacy, made their annual inspection of the Asylum, and in the Appendix hereto will be found a Copy of their Report, which at the Monthly Meeting of your Committee, held on the 24th of November last, was ordered to be printed and circulated previous to the

Annual Meeting to be held in January, 1885, when it will be fully considered.

Report of the Speqial Sub-Committee

referred to in the Visitors' 27th

Annual Report.



TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

The Special Sub-Committee appointed on the 26th November, 1883, to consider:

- (I.) The Report dated the 11th June, 1883, of the Sub-Committee appointed on the 30th April, 1883, as to the advisability of providing increased accommodation on the Female Side of the Asylum;
- (II.) The Letters from the Commissioners in Lunacy, dated the 10th of October, and the 10th of November, 1883, and the printed suggestions which accompanied them as to the protection of the Asylum from Fire;
- (III.) The Special Remarks of the Medical Superintendent of the 24th of September last, and of the Visiting Sub-Committee of the 15th October last, as to the enlargement of the Asylum Pumps;

- (IV.) The Report of the Commissioners in Lunacy on their inspection of the Asylum on the 8th of November, 1883; beg to Report as follows:
- (1). As to providing increased accommodation on the Female Side.

There exists in the Asylum on the female side day space for 195 patients, and night space for 214, and there were in the Asylum on the 9th instant 215 females. Your Committee have ascertained that the Committee of Visitors of the Northampton County Asylum at Berrywood are prepared to receive 16 female patients, at the rate of 14s. per head per week, for a period of 3 years, determinable by notice from the Secretary of State. At our suggestion the Clerk to the Visitors has been empowered to sign a Contract with the Clerk to the Visitors of the Northampton County Asylum for the reception there of 16 female patients accordingly.

Your Committee are of opinion that sufficient relief will have been thereby afforded, and that it will not be necessary at present at all events to contemplate any enlargement of the Asylum. Should it be desired to board out any more female patients we understand that an offer has been made to the Clerk to the Visitors for the reception of 20 at the Berkshire, Reading and Newbury Asylum.

Nos. II. and III. As to the protection of the Asylum from Fire and the capacity of the Asylum Pumps.

These two questions are interdependent to such an extent that in the opinion of your Committee it will be proper to consider them together, and this part of the report will also comprise some of the points touched upon by the Visiting Commissioners, in the observations made by them on their annual inspection of the Asylum.

The protection of the Asylum from fire had been engaging the attention of the Committee of Visitors for some time past, and we find that in August, 1882, a Fire Brigade had been organised among the Attendants, and that special Instructions had been given in the use of a hand-fire-engine, then purchased from Messrs. Merryweather and Co., and also in the use of other appliances for the extinction of fire.

A Code of Rules was drawn up shortly afterwards, but its issue was delayed by the death of Dr. Bacon and by other causes. Your Sub-Committee have approved and now present the accompanying Rules in case of Fire, for the guidance not only of the attendants constituting the Fire Brigade, but also of the entire staff.

The Commissioners in the suggestions which accompanied their letter of the 10th Nov, 1883, called particular attention to the means of securing the safety of patients in the event of an outbreak

of fire, and the Visiting Commissioners in their observations considered that additional egress should be provided from the top storey on either side.

Your Committee recommend that a central partition should be placed across the central corridor, and that the door therein should be directed to be master-locked by the female head attendant immediately before retiring to sleep, her bedroom being on the female side of the partition, and close at hand. An additional staircase from the dormitories would then be available on each side. If this is done your subcommittee consider that sufficient means of exit will have been provided; and they may add that in their opinion no further improvements can be made short of constructing staircases outside the building.

We further recommend the purchase for the use of the Fire Brigade of the following Articles:

1 dozen Belts and Axes.

1 dozen Helmets and 1 dozen Pairs of Special Boots.

2 large Felling Axes.

A set of Scaling Ladders.

A London Fire Brigade Fire Escape,

and the enlargement of the Iron Gates to the Airing Courts in order to admit of the passage round the building of the Fire Escape.

The Visiting Commissioners suggested that the fire buckets were too high to be readily reached. Their position can be lowered without difficulty.

Your Sub-Committee took into special consideration the observations of the Visiting Commissioners to the effect that the engine was unable to throw water on the highest roof unless worked at a speed abnormal and dangerous. Your Sub-Committee are unable to suggest how the Commissioners can have arrived at this conclusion, but they have satisfied themselves by actual test that it is an erroneous one, and that the new engine and the present pumps are perfectly competent, as far as capacity is concerned, to do all the work that could reasonably be required.

Your Sub-Committee did not however feel the same confidence with regard to the safety of the pumps, to which the Medical Superintendent had called attention on the 29th Oct. last, and they thought it advisable therefore to seek the opinion on that point of Mr. James Lyon, who, as Professor Stuart's demonstrator, had given assistance and advice in the purchase of the engine.

Mr. Lyon made the following Report:

"The present pumps have been tested this morning, and have been proved capable of throwing water on the highest roofs (not the tower), through two hydrants simultaneously, the engine running at a speed about 150 revolutions per minute. I consider, however, that the *small set* of pumps are working under dangerous conditions when doing this, and that the up-take pipes in the *well* are not safe at the required pressure in case of fire.

The small set of pumps are much worn in the barrels, and there is consequently a considerable amount of waste in their working; the metal in the barrels is under one-eighth of an inch thick in places, and they cannot therefore be bored out again.

There is a slight increase in the liability to break when two hydrants are working simultaneously, but since the pressure on the pumps remains practically the same this increase is not great.

A majority of your Sub-Committee feel that this Report leaves them no alternative but to recommend the Visitors to procure at once a new set of Pumps of requisite power, in place of the small pumps referred to.

IV. The Report of the Visiting Commissioners of the 8th Nov., 1883.

Your Sub-Committee are now able to pass to the consideration of this Report, in which, however, several of the more important observations have been dealt with above.

Your Sub-Committee recommend that

1. To prevent all possibility of the existence within the building of sewer-gas, that all drain pipes should be cut outside, and the water conveyed thereby made to deliver over open gratings according to the improved modern method, and that the soil pipes should be ventilated in the manner indicated by the Commissioners.

2. The building of a house in the Asylum grounds for the head attendant.

N.B.— The Commissioners wrote on the 27th Nov., 1883, especially to urge this. No definite estimate can be given of the probable expense, but the outlay cannot be expected to fall short of £300.

- 3. The furnishing of the female dining-hall in order that it may be at once brought into use.
- 4. The purchase for each Infirmary of a Belfast Musgrave's stove (for giving additional warmth) with proper guard; and,
- The construction or completion of the boundary walk round the Asylum property.

But your Sub-Committee are of opinion—

- (a) That no necessity exists for the building of a detached hospital.
- (b) That the expense of providing a uniform suit for the male attendants, and a dress and cap for the females, would be out of all proportion to any advantage which could result therefrom.
- (c) That it is not desirable to apply artificial heat to the Corridors; and—

(d) That the position of the cricket ground is such that it cannot be conveniently enlarged, while the Medical Superintendent considers that it is already adequate in size.

Your Sub-Committee recommend that the question of painting and decorating the walls of the recreation hall be referred to the Visiting Sub-Committee, with power to carry out whatever they may advise, and that the question of the supply of amusements in the Wards be referred to the same Sub-Committee, with instructions to confer with the Medical Superintendent on the subject.

Your Sub-Committee made enquiries of the Medical Superintendent as to the texture of the women's gowns, which the Commissioners observed were too thin for winter wear, and they were informed that cotton gowns were used only where the habits of the patients made it advisable for them to have garments which could be readily washed, and that additional underclothing was worn in those cases.

Between the visit of the Commissioners on the 8th November, and the Meeting of the Committee on the 26th of that month, two female attendants had left. Your Sub-Committee have been unable to discover against those remaining any grounds for the complaints of ill-treatment made before the Commissioners. Your Committee have already appointed an additional female attendant, and also an additional night attendant on each side of the Asylum.

Report of the Commissioners in Junacy.

Cambridgeshire, Cambridge and Isle of Ely Asylum, Fulbourn, 13th November, 1884.

Three-hundred and ninety-four patients are today on the books of this Asylum, of whom 5 are absent on trial. The males here are 177, the females number 212. The cases which should be accommodated in this Asylum, but for whom there is no room, are 7 men and 15 women, now temporarily cared for in the Northampton Asylum. The necessity for early provision for the increase of Lunacy, (to which reference was made in our Colleagues entry in 1883), has not yet led to any steps, it seems in that direction by the Committee. We hope that action will not be long delayed. Nearly all the recent recommendations of the Commissioners at their visits have received attention, we are glad to Additional exits from the dormitories, in the event of an outbreak of fire have been provided, the fire buckets are now within easy reach of the Attendants, and the engine power seems to be fairly sufficient to extinguish flames in the roof, though we should be more satisfied if the smaller pump were replaced by a larger. The cesspools in the centre of the building have been abolished and considerable progress has been made in ventilating soil pipes, and cutting off all waste pipes from the sewers.

On looking at the Asylum drainage plans we observe that several drains pass under wards and corridors, these should be iron pipes properly jointed and laid in concrete, we trust that they are such. The female dining hall will we hear probably be opened for use at Christmas. Matters which still are under consideration include the Decoration of the Recreation Hall, the enclosing of the Laundry drying ground, and the supply of uniform to the Attendants and Nurses. We must not omit to mention that a cottage close to the Asylum has been built for the Head Male Attendant, and will soon be occupied by him. The staff of nurses has been increased by adding a sixth for day duty in No. 2, and there are now 3 Attendants and 3 nurses on duty at night, so that the Infirmaries and Observation dormitories are under continuous supervision during that period. We recommend the visits at the Station to be recorded hourly instead of every 2 hours, and each night attendant to have his own clock. No electric or telephonic communication has yet been provided between the wards and medical officers' quarters, as it should be, though there are about the Asylum speaking tubes. The wards on each side are kept clean and comfortable,

and only in one of them, No. 2, in the Female Division, did we notice any closeness in the atmosphere, though the windows are not well constructed for the admission of fresh air. Several new W.C's. have been constructed, they were much wanted. In the wards some addition has been made to the means of amusement, in the shape of more newspapers. We saw some of the women at dinner, the fare was meat pie. Fish is now given once a week. Complaints were made by some patients as to the quality and quantity of the meat, and the lack of melted butter with the fish. In every Asylum there are patients whom nothing will satisfy. We think however, that butter should be provided with the fish, and that it would be well to keep scales in the dining halls to weigh any ration complained of as to quantity. Such of the stores as we tasted were satisfactory. In both divisions there was quiet and order during our inspection, but we doubt the sufficiency in number of male Attendants having regard to leaves out. The minor casualities appear to us to be numerous, after perusal of the medical records, and the fact that so many bruises have happened from "causes unknown," points to rough treatment or to neglect by the Attendants, if they be sufficiently numerous. One complaint against a male attendant in the Infirmary we investigated, but it was not substantiated, and we believe that it was groundless. The epileptics are 16 men and 27 women; the actively suicidal are reported as 15.

There are 4 subjects of general paralysis in the male and in the female wards. We found 2 men and 1 woman in bed: stoves have recently been placed in the infirmaries to raise the Temperature. Five men and 15 women are registered as being under medical treatment. There has been no epidemic; the erection of a detached hospital has not yet been undertaken. For daily exercise of the patients a boundry walk has been all but finished, and Dr. Rogers will, so soon as it is completed, organise such daily exercise. We went over the shops and some of the offices. The Laundry would be improved by more machinery which should be steamdriven. A new bakehouse is being built, also a shed for the fire escape. Employment appears to be found for 120 men and 137 women, of the former 32 work on the land, 49 in the shops and offices, of the latter 52 do needlework, 24 help in the laundry, and 5 in the kitchen. Last Sunday 101 men and 89 women attended divine service in the Chapel. There is still but one Sunday Service. The Associated Entertainments, are, as a rule, weekly. The last Entertainment drew together 109 men and 114 women. Twice a week 53 females and 25 males walk beyond the estate. There has been no change in the medical staff. There has been no seclusion and there has been no instance of restraint except that of a man by gloves to prevent his biting his own fingers. There is no padded room in the Asylum. We consider this to be a grave defect, as apart from the treatment of violent cases, the restless feeble should be considered. We hope that when walking exercise is further developed, the airing courts may not be much used by many. From the statutory books we learn that 38 men and 55 women have been admitted, 16 males and 39 females have been discharged.

Eighteen deaths in the Mens' division and 12 in the women's have also been recorded. The only fatal casuality has been the death of an epileptic man: through swallowing yew leaves, according to the verdict of the Coroner's Jury. There has been no other Inquest, and no death but that mentioned, which was due to other than a natural cause. There has been no epidemic of any kind. The case books are well kept, and the knowledge of the patients manifested both by Dr. Rogers and Dr. Crallan is very satisfactory.

Report of the Medical Superintendent

FOR THE YEAR 1884.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

Fulbourn Asylum,

January, 1885.

GENTLEMEN,

At the close of the year 1884 there were resident in the Asylum 179 male, and 218 female patients, and 7 men and 15 women were maintained at Northampton, making the total number chargeable to the County, Isle, and Borough 419, and shewing an increase of 25 in the twelve months, 9 males and 16 females.

During the year 29 patients, 8 males and 21 females, were discharged, recovered; a per centage of 31.8 on the admissions.

The deaths were 30 in number, 17 occurring on the male side, and 13 on the female. They were all due to natural causes, and in no case was an inquest held. The rate, calculated upon the average number resident, was 7.7 per cent.

On March 24th 15 female patients were removed under contract to Berry Wood Asylum, Northampton.

The appointment of an infirmary nightattendant on each side has proved a most useful addition to the staff, and provides for the continuous supervision of the sick, and of other patients who require special care and quiet.

The infirmaries are now warmed by Musgrave stoves, of the efficiency and economy of which there can be no question, and by their aid a sufficient and equable temperature is easily maintained.

Weekly entertainments for the patients have, as usual, been held during the winter months, and are much appreciated. Their success is in great part due to the exertions of Dr. Crallan, whom, in this, and in the performance of all his duties, I have to thank for his unflagging energy, and to Mr. Thorne, who, besides acting very successfully as bandmaster, has taken a prominent part as a vocalist.

Individual members of the band and others of the staff have deservedly become popular favourites.

In October last it was my painful duty to report to you the death of William Phillips, one of the oldest servants of the Asylum. He has been employed here as tailor for more than 20 years.

In conclusion, I beg to thank the Committee for the continuance of their kind consideration and support.
