Annual Report of the Visiting Committee

To be presented to the County Council at their Meeting to be held on
24th July, 1936.

To the County Council of West Sussex.

THE VISITING COMMITTEE have pleasure in submitting their Report for the past year.

1. The total number of patients admitted since the last annual report, 30th May, 1935, to this date, has been 304, the number of patients discharged 159, and the number of deaths 79. The total number under treatment at the Hospital has been 1325.

2. The number of patients this day on the books of the Hospital is :—

3. These numbers include 121 private patients and 30 Service and ex-Service Patients. The number of voluntary patients admitted during last year represents 36.26 per cent. of the total direct admissions. There have also been 24 temporary patients. The number of patients attending clinics at the Royal West Sussex Hospital, Chichester, and Worthing, shows a slight increase at each Hospital. The Clinics appear to be fulfilling a useful purpose.

4. The Accounts for all patients referred to in the last paragraph show a balance of £5269 3s. 2d. of which £1,507 0s. 4d. being profits on private patients, etc., has been paid to the County Treasurer.

5. The weekly rate of maintenance for patients chargeable to the West Sussex County Council has throughout the year been 23/4.

6. The general health of the patients has been good.

7. The general structural state of the Hospital is also good.

8. The work by D. and J. Tullis, Limited, in connection with the re-equipment of the Laundry has been done to the satisfaction of the Committee and with results which equal their expectations.

9. A new electrically driven turbine pump of 5,000 gallons an hour capacity was installed during the year by the Harland Engineering Co., Ltd. The work was carried out in a way satisfactory to the Committee and shows a saving in the cost of pumping of about £250 a year.

10. The work done by Thomas Collins and Co. in respect of the replacement of the old side flue ovens with an up-to-date Draw-plate oven, has been completed with results that are entirely satisfactory to the Committee.

11. The Committee during the past year have had under consideration the subject of the purchase of Old Place Farm, Westhampnett, adjoining Graylingwell Hospital, containing nearly 179 acres, from the Goodwood Estate Company at the price of £8,500. The Contract for the sale and purchase was duly completed and, as the matter was the subject of a report, dated 29th August, 1935, to the County Council, which was presented to the County Council on the 29th November,

1935, it does not appear necessary to say anything more about the matter, except that when the Contract was submitted for the approval of the Commissioners of the Board of Control they asked to be supplied by the District Valuer with a report upon the property which, has now been received, and recommends the proposed purchase money as reasonable and such as the Board of Control and the County Council may approve.

12. A 30-ton Weighbridge (dial indicator) at a cost of £461, less £12 allowed for the old Weighbridge, has been purchased from W. and T. Avery, Ltd. The old machine had been in use since the erection of the Hospital and had been defaced by the Inspector of Weights and Measures.

13. The Committee have purchased a second-hand Austin 20 h.p. car for £400 in the place of the old car which has done good service and has been taken over in part payment.

14. With respect to the Unemployment Insurance (Agriculture) Act, 1936, the Committee have applied for a certificate of exception in respect of the insurance of agricultural labourers as in the case of other employees on the permanent staff.

15. The Committee have under consideration the question of the erection of cottages on the estate for employees.

16. Farm labourer, Matthew E. Cate, who joined the service on 20th July, 1925, and is 41 years of age and was in Class 1 under the Asylums Officers' Superannuation Act, 1909, and has resigned his appointment on account of permanent incapacity for Mental Hospital duties by illness, medically certified and not attributable to his own misconduct, namely that of Ataxia and duodenal ulcer, has been granted a superannuation allowance of £23 4s. 2d. per annum being one-fiftieth of his average wages and emoluments for each year's service. This pensioner died on 12th November, 1935.

17. The Committee are presenting a separate report to the County Council recommending that, in the case of James Alexander Wallace, deceased, Stoker, who if he had retired at the time of his death would have been entitled to a superannuation allowance, a gratuity of £169 17s. 4d., being the amount of his wages and emoluments for one year, be granted to his Widow under Section 4 of the Superannuation Act, 1909.

18. On 23th September, 1935, two Commissioners of the Board of Control visited the Hospital and made a report, a copy of which is appended to this report.

19. The Committee have, in accordance with Section 173 of the Lunacy Act, 1890, examined the accounts of the Treasurer and of the Clerk of the Hospital.

20. The reports of the Medical Superintendent, together with the statistical tables for the year 1935 and the financial accounts made up to 31st March, 1936, will be found appended to this report.

21. The Committee are able to report favourably on the management of the Hospital and the care of patients and that the conduct of Officers and Staff has been satisfactory.

22. The Farm is efficiently worked, satisfactorily supplying many wants of the Hospital.

23. In conclusion the Committee desire to express their appreciation of the able services rendered by Dr. C. G. Ainsworth, the Medical Superintendent, in the management of the Hospital.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

West Sussex County Mental Hospital,
Chichester.

September 25th, 1935.

We have to-day paid the Annual visit of inspection to this Hospital on behalf of our Board and are glad to report that it continues to be well administered on modern lines for the welfare and treatment of those admitted here on account of their mental disorders.

During 1934 there were 281 direct admissions, 117 males and 164 females; of these 36 males and 60 females were Voluntary Patients and 4 males and 12 females were temporary patients. Since the 1st January this year there have been 199 direct admissions, 76 males and 123 females, and of these 34 males and 46 females were on a Voluntary basis and 5 males and 10 females were temporary patients. From these figures it will be seen that full advantage continues to be taken of the provisions of the Mental Treatment Act, 1930.

There are to-day on the Statutory books the names of 1,045 patients, 412 males and 633 females; 38 of the former and 41 of the latter are Voluntary patients, and 2 men and 8 women are temporary patients. There are 66 men and 71 women classed as private patients, 30 of the former being "Service" patients. Out-County patients number 26, 6 males and 20 females, chargeable to 11 various authorities.

The weekly maintenance charge is 23/4d. per head, for those of the "Service" Class 27/1d., and for private patients from 35/- to 84/-. The average weekly cost as last ascertained was 21/10d.

The total accommodation in the Hospital as returned to us is for 363 males and 625 females by day and 393 males and 706 females by night. Two men and 5 women are out on trial. Though there are 73 vacant beds on the female side, the male side is more overcrowded than it was at the visit of our colleagues last year. To-day there is an excess of 49 males by day, and 19 by night. We noticed that 10 boys and 4 girls who are mental defectives who should not be occupying beds in a hospital such as this, and hope that provision will soon be made for the accommodation of such cases elsewhere.

We believe we have seen all the patients in residence and given them an opportunity of stating any grievances to us. Apart from some few appeals for discharge, we received no complaints, and the patients were quiet in their behaviour, and contented with their surroundings. The accommodation in the Villas and new Admission Hospital is very good and comfortable. Wards A.1 and A.2 on the female side have been redecorated after the electrical rewiring with pleasing effect. Other wards will be taken in hand as the rewiring is completed. The Recreation Hall has also been redecorated and presents a very bright appearance. New draw-plate ovens have been installed in the bake-house, and the well deepened and a new pump installed.

Parole is granted to 14 men and 10 women to walk beyond the estate, and to 22 men and 25 women within the grounds.

The dress and personal tidiness of the patients were satisfactory, and the dormitories and side rooms with their beds and bedding clean and tidy.

A good number of the patients are usefully employed, and we were glad to notice an extension of the occupational therapy.

The dinner to-day consisted of roast pork with potatoes and spinach followed by rice or blanc mange with stewed apples. We saw the meal being eaten in some of the wards and it appeared to be appreciated.

Since the last visit, which was on the 24th October last year, the general health of the patients has been very good. There have been no cases of influenza or dysentery and only one case of enteric fever amongst the patients, whilst among the female staff there was only one case of scarlet fever.

The patients in bed were few, and the majority were there for mental reasons. All these showed evidence of careful nursing and skilful medical attention.

The tubercular patients 7 (1 male and 6 female) are treated by up to date methods.

The mortality rate for the year ending 31st December, 1934, was 9.6 per cent. which is higher than 6.6 per cent., the average of all mental hospitals in England and Wales, but on examination of the register we note that many of the patients at the time of their death were over 70, and several over 80 years of age.

Since last visit there have been 69 deaths, and we were pleased to note that in 53 cases post mortem examinations have been held.

The principal causes of death were pneumonia 21, heart disease 20, general paralysis 3, and cancer 5. Of these cases 23 were over 70 years and 12 over 80 years of age, which shows the care and attention they had received.

During the same period, 3 inquests were held and the verdict in each case was that death was due to natural causes, whilst there were 9 cases of serious casualties, 8 being fractures, 4 of the lower limb and 4 of the arm bones and 1 cuts of the forearm; all were accidental in character.

We were pleased to hear that the Committee had sanctioned a new X-Ray plant and we hope that adequate accommodation will be provided for this purpose.

The Out-patients clinics continue to be held at the Worthing Hospital and the Royal West Sussex Hospital at Chichester and several of the admissions have been due to the advice given there. We are glad to hear that the appointment of a social worker is engaging the attention of the Committee.

Dr. Ainsworth has the assistance of Dr. Sidney Nix as deputy Superintendent, of Dr. C. H. Lee, Dr. Simpson and Dr. A. H. Gadsden as Medical Officers, the two latter being on a temporary footing.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

West Sussex County Mental Hospital,
Graylingwell, Chichester.

28th May, 1936.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the Thirty-ninth Annual Report of the Hospital for the year ended 31st December, 1935, together with the usual financial tables.

The number of patients, their classification and the districts whence they came are set out below :—

The number of rate-aided patients increased by 35 and the number of private patients by 13, making with an additional Criminal Lunatic, a total increase of 49.

There were vacancies for 29 female patients at the end of the year but the male side is now overcrowded to the extent of 45 and the question of accommodation for men is becoming acute.

The total number of patients admitted during the year was 277 of whom 104 were Voluntary and 22 were Temporary patients. The percentage of Voluntary patients on the direct admissions rose to 39.3 per cent. Of the admissions, 70 were aged 60 or over.

As might be expected from the decrease in the number of admissions, the death rate fell from 9.6 per cent. to 7.3 per cent. and the recovery rate rose from 38.4 per cent. to 42 per cent. ; in addition 26 patients were discharged as relieved, bringing the total percentage of patients discharged as recovered or relieved to 51.9.

Anomalies continue to arise over the admission of Temporary and Voluntary Patients but, on the whole, the Mental Treatment Act is working more satisfactorily as its provisions become more widely known.

The health of the patients and the staff was very good and no epidemics occurred; two suspected cases of Enteric Fever caused a considerable amount of anxiety in the early part of the year but the pathological findings were ultimately negative. Operations by the Visiting Surgeons were performed on 3 male and 4 female patients.

All the deaths were from natural causes but Inquests were held in the following three cases: L.G., a child of 10 years, who died from Broncho-pneumonia and Marasmus; she jerked herself from a Nurse's arms whilst being attended and sustained an abrasion on the forehead and a bruised and swollen upper lip. J.R.W., a man aged 70. This patient slipped down in a Corridor and sustained a fractured femur; he died nine weeks later from Carcinoma of the Pylorus. F.W., a woman aged 79, who fell during an epileptiform seizure sustaining a fracture of the humerus. She subsequently died from Fatty Degeneration of the Heart.

In each case a verdict in accordance with the Medical evidence was returned and no blame was attached to any member of the Hospital staff.

Six men and three women escaped during the year. With the exception of three men who were away for $6\frac{1}{2}$ days, 30 hours and 44 hours respectively, all were brought back within a few hours of their departure.

The usual entertainments, weekly dances and cinematograph performances, were held during the Winter months, the Cinema being perhaps more appreciated than ever. Our thanks are due to the Portsmouth Roaming Players, the Havant Amateur Dramatic Society and Mrs. Booth and her Company who came over to give entertainments, which gave very great pleasure to the patients.

The usual Seaside picnics were arranged during the Summer, 132 men and 150 women taking advantage of them.

A minor innovation during the Autumn was the formation of a Physical Training class for men which has been very successful.

The Handicraft Department continues to develop and to serve a purpose of the utmost importance.

The Staff have cause for gratification in the number of appreciative letters which have been received from the relatives of patients and I have to thank several others for donations to the Benevolent Fund.

The Hospital was inspected by Lt.-Col. B. T. Hodgson and Surgeon Rear-Admiral J. Falconer Hall, Commissioners of the Board of Control, on the 25th September, and their report is appended.

The Service Patients were visited by Dr. E. L. Forward of the Ministry of Pensions on the 22nd March.

Some difficulty was experienced in obtaining suitable Probationer Nurses but, in spite of this, I have to thank the staff for much good work and for their loyal support and assistance during the year.

The examination results were again very good; 7 Attendants and 9 Nurses passed the Final Examination of the Royal Medico-Psychological Association (2 Attendants and 3 Nurses with distinction) while 4 Attendants and 14 Nurses were successful in the Preliminary Examination. Two Nurses passed the Final State Examination.

Dr. David Shaw who had been Third Assistant Medical Officer since the 17th October, 1932, left on the 28th April, 1935, to take up a new appointment as Assistant Medical Officer at Claybury Mental Hospital. He was succeeded by Dr. Kenneth Hazell who took up his duties on the 11th November.

Miss Ellen Cross, the Second Assistant Matron was appointed Assistant Matron at the Retreat, York, and left on the 8th May. Miss M. L. Renton was appointed in her place and joined the service on the 29th May.

Farm Labourer Matthew E. Cates retired on pension, owing to ill-health, on the 1st September, and I regret to report that he died on the 12th November. He had been in the service of the Hospital for 10 1/12 years.

The fabric of the Hospital continues to be well maintained and the electrical rewiring has been continued.

The new electrical centrifugal Borehole Pump was installed and a considerable saving in the cost of pumping has been effected, although the yield of water has not been increased to any marked extent. When the new pump came into operation, the working costs, after allowing for interest on the capital expenditure and depreciation on the plant, were 2.86d. per 1,000 gallons. 26,200,000 gallons of water were purchased from the Town at a cost of 8 1/4d. per 1,000 gallons. The cost of softening the water was 2.9d. per 1,000 gallons.

There was some contamination of the well due to stagnation and work in boring and on the new pump, but it is now quite clear and the water analysis perfectly satisfactory.

242,350 B.O.T. units were generated at a cost of 1.39d. per unit, as compared with 1.41d. last year.

Two double-decked draw-plate steam ovens were installed in the Bakehouse during the year.

The Farm has again been worked most successfully, though the fruit crops, in common with the rest of the Country, were a failure, and the new gardens are settling down very well.

I have once again to express my thanks to all the Officers of the Hospital for their help in their various departments throughout the year.

In conclusion, I would thank you, Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen for your unfailing support and for your keen interest in the work of the Hospital.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in making my annual report as Chaplain to this Hospital.

During the past year all the wards have been visited regularly each week and the Holy Communion has been administered in Q.A.1 and K.A.1 to those patients unable to come to Chapel. I have also conducted a service every Friday afternoon in Q.A.1.

The services have been conducted regularly each Sunday and Communion has been available for the Staff and patients each month and on the High Festivals. The attendance at these services has been very gratifying.

The Chapel has been very beautifully decorated at the Chief Festivals of the Church and I should like to express my gratitude to Mr. Peacock and his staff for a work which was much appreciated by all.

On Good Friday an augmented choir accompanied by organ, piano and stringed instruments rendered "The Crucifixion," by Stainer, with Mr. Wroe and Mr. Targett as soloists. It was a very fine performance fully appreciated by the patients and friends from outside.

The library still continues to be a centre of attraction on Thursday mornings and the books are receiving much more careful attention than in the past. In this respect I have to thank the Nurses and Attendants for looking after the books in their respective wards. I should however be glad if the Committee could see their way to make a further grant for new books, I would not ask for this did I not feel that the books were of great benefit to the patients.

I have conducted 27 funerals at the cemetery during the course of the year.

My relations with the staff and patients is a very happy one, and the former do all they can to help me in my work for which I am extremely grateful, and in this respect I cannot forget the kindness and help always given to me by the Medical Superintendent.

I have now been Chaplain for four years and I have no desire to give up the work and therefore I beg to offer my services to you as Chaplain for the ensuing year.
