THE Special Claims for Public Support

- I. It is the first of its kind. It started in 1905, being the first Hospital in the United Kingdom for poor people suffering from all forms of early nervous breakdown.

- II. **ALL PATIENTS PAY WHAT THEY CAN AFFORD.** No one is refused because of inability to pay, the destitute and friendless being admitted; but those who can help are asked to do so, so as to save the whole cost from falling on the charitable public.

- III. **NO ONE IS ADMITTED WHO CAN AFFORD A NURSING HOME.** Therefore there is no competition between a charity aided institution and private enterprise.

- IV. **NO LETTERS ARE NEEDED FOR ADMISSION.** Patients are admitted in order of application (unless under very exceptional circumstances) regardless of the amount they can pay, or that can be paid for them. This avoids weary journeys hunting for a letter during illness—and also prevents preference being given to patients possibly unsuitable, and often little known to subscribers.

- V. **IT IS PREVENTIVE WORK.**

There is no terror to any sane human being greater than that of becoming insane.

This Hospital saves many patients from insanity and incurable nervous breakdowns, and teaches them, as far as possible, how to avoid them in the future.

There is no menace to a nation like nervous instability, therefore provision should be made for its early treatment, and the teaching of mental hygiene is good for the race.

VI. IT IS ECONOMICAL.

Not only is this Hospital run on very moderate funds, but by treating patients in the early prodromal time, when treatment is most useful, it saves many from becoming a life-long burden on the rates, and restores them as workers for the nation.

VII. THE PRINCIPLE OF EARLY TREATMENT IS WARMLY SUPPORTED BY ALL THE LEADING ALIENISTS AND NEUROLOGISTS.

Many patients are sent directly by these from the large London Hospitals.

VIII. MEMBERS OF EVERY SOCIAL CLASS AND OCCUPATION ARE ADMITTED.

Amongst those attended have been :—Hospital nurses and every type of professional and domestic worker, married or single.

IX. There are Admissions from ALL PARTS OF THE KINGDOM—Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Cornwall, Kent, London, Sussex, The Midlands, Somerset, Devon, and particularly from Towns such as Liverpool, Sheffield, Leeds, Cambridge, Newcastle, St. Leonards, Petersfield, Sutton, Middlesbrough, Oxford, Bristol, Llandrindod Wells, etc. Cases have been received from New York, Belgium, Russia and Egypt.

X. The evidence of the value of the Hospital is found in the length of the waiting list ; often the cases waiting have been treble the number of beds.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1928.

CIRCUMSTANCES over which the Committee have had no control have seriously affected the position of the Hospital during the past year.

It will be recalled that in the previous year the Hospital had been considerably enlarged by the addition of a new Wing which provided 14 additional beds, a fine Recreation Room, greatly enlarged Kitchen, and new back Kitchen. £5,000 towards the cost of this extension was provided by a grant from the Estate of the late Sir John Howard, but the total expenditure incurred amounted to £7,900, leaving a balance of £2,900 to secure. The Committee had no hesitation in proceeding with the work although all the money was not in hand, as during the past few years they had by means of the Annual Autumn Fayre and Tombola raised sufficient sums to clear off the Mortgage previously existing on the Hospital, and the large overdraft at the Bank. Suddenly, without warning, the Hospital became the victim of the action of the Home Secretary, who placed a ban upon all Tombolas for Charities. Upon this action there have been many comments in Parliament and the Press. Its result upon the finances of this Hospital has been disastrous, and the Committee find themselves unexpectedly deprived of a source of revenue upon which they had relied, and on the strength of its continuance they had incurred a heavy capital outlay, as well as increased annual expenditure entailed by the additional beds. The result being that there was

An Overdraft of £2,246 3s. 3d.

at the end of the year.

Drastic steps had to be taken to reduce expenditure, and the very useful Convalescent Home, Briar Cottage, Walton-on-Thames, has had to be closed (temporarily we hope), and it may

be that further curtailment of beds at the Hospital will also have to be made unless the debt is met by the generosity of friends of the Hospital. The Committee hesitate and would deeply deplore having to take such a step as reducing beds, as the demands on the accommodation are far greater than can be met even by the present 53 beds. 176 In-Patients were admitted last year, an increase of 42 on the previous twelve months, and there are nearly 50 applicants for treatment on the waiting list.

In any comparisons that may be made with other Hospitals, it must be remembered that nervous cases demand long treatment. The average stay of In-Patients last year was 106 days, at General Hospitals the average is about 21 days. This length of stay results in the daily average of the beds occupied at the Lady Chichester Hospital being extraordinarily high, no less than 51 beds being occupied daily last year. The Out-Patients' attendances were 1,377.

Despite these discouragements, the Committee have received extraordinary assistance from many generous helpers, to whom they record their cordial thanks and gratitude.

The British Broadcasting Corporation kindly afforded an opportunity to the President, Lady Chichester, to make a Wireless Appeal, which resulted in gifts amounting to £141 17s. 8d. being received. Grants were received of £100 from the Bernhard Baron Charitable Trust, £55 from Alexandra Day, £50 from the Proceeds of the Boxing Tournament arranged by Mr. Harry Preston. Donations of £100 from Miss H. G. Klassen; £50 each from Annie Viscountess Cowdray, Three friends of Lady Chichester, Miss Violet Suter, Mrs. Warren Pearl, and The National Securities Corporation, Ltd., per Miss Gordon Holmes; £35 10s. from Dame Henrietta Barnet, and £20 each from a friend per Lady Chichester, Lord Woolavington, and Miss M. G. Walton.

It was with keen regret the Committee accepted Mrs. Warren Pearl's resignation as a Member of the Board, but her removal from Hove left no alternative.

It was a satisfaction that she agreed to allow her name to be added to the Vice-Presidents of the Hospital, a fitting tribute to the very generous and energetic help she had rendered.

During the year the Honorary Medical Staff have carried out their numerous duties with unremitting attention and skill, and it is due to their services that the reputation of the Hospital stands so high among the Medical Charities. There have been the usual changes in the post of House Physician. Dr. Horton was succeeded by Dr. Bodkin, and she in turn was followed by Dr. D. E. Bunbury, who at present occupies the Senior post, while Dr. Beryl Senneck is Junior House Physician.

Mrs. Blumberg, the Matron, resigned in April, and Miss Bessie Blyth was appointed as her successor. Unfortunately, after only a few months, she was seized with a very serious illness, which necessitated her relinquishing the post, to the great regret of the Committee. Miss R. E. Appleyard has been elected Matron, and is rendering efficient and capable service in that responsible post.

In conclusion, the Committee trust that now that their peculiar difficulties are known, that the many friends of the Hospital will rally to its support, and, with new friends added, will provide the necessary funds to enable this unique Hospital to continue its splendid work and provide the helpful curative treatment for a peculiarly painful class of disease, with the great benefit that has attended its ministrations in the past.

No other Voluntary Hospital in England provides such treatment and conditions for Nervous Cases as is supplied at the Lady Chichester Hospital, to those who are destitute or unable to pay high fees.

IN-PATIENT TREATMENT.

The methods of treatment adopted are essentially catholic. In dealing with nervous and mental disorders generally the fundamental principle is to consider each case individually, and preserve an open mind in regard to it. Red-tape or routine methods are absolutely to be deprecated, and only by a long and sympathetic study of each patient's individual characteristics and preferences, as well as the physical constitution, it is possible to adopt any line of treatment from which satisfactory results can be obtained.

Forms of Treatment.—"General." **Rest, fresh air and "feeding up."**—Nervous patients often suffer from restlessness and insomnia, and frequently have had an insufficiency of fresh air from lack of the energy and initiative required to make them go out, while their appetite and digestion are commonly impaired and their weight below the normal.

Rest.—As a rule, new patients are kept in bed from three days to a week to ensure a thorough preliminary rest. Almost every patient rests for two hours in the afternoon, and many who sleep badly at night find that they get their most refreshing sleep during this daily rest time. It also aids digestion after the principal meal. In addition, some have to undergo rest-cures lasting for weeks.

Fresh Air.—Whenever the weather permits, the patients spend their days out-of-doors, taking their meals and resting in the garden. The two large huts on the lawns and the raised stretcher-beds and long chairs are in constant use for nine months of the year. Those who are well enough go for walks and 'bus rides, accompanied by members of the nursing staff as required, with other patients, or even by themselves. Frequent picnics, char-a-banc rides and bathing parties are arranged in the summer months, and the Hospital tennis and croquet lawns are seldom unoccupied. The garden is divided by hedges, so as to enable those who need quiet to obtain it.

Dietary.—This is carried out on a very generous scale, most patients gaining weight rapidly, and includes plenty of milk, cream and butter, eggs, green vegetables and fruit. At the mid-day meal, which is the principal meal of the day, there is always fish and freshly cooked meat, and at least two vegetables, followed by puddings and stewed fresh fruit whenever this is obtainable. The importance of good nourishing food in the treatment of nervous cases cannot be over-emphasised.

Patients' Activities and Amusements.—These form an important line of treatment, the more valuable because, from the

patients' point of view, it is largely unconscious. It is a great advance when a patient who has been hitherto indifferent to every outside interest and entirely pre-occupied with her own symptoms develops a special capacity for, say, hand-loom weaving, spinning, basket making, or gardening, and it is an extraordinarily instructive and interesting sight to see patients, who, in the morning, were too depressed and exhausted even to wish to leave their beds, thoroughly entering into the fun, and dancing indefatigably at a fancy dress dance the same evening.

The opportunity thus afforded of mingling with the patients unofficially, and observing them when off their guard, is of the greatest possible help to the medical and nursing staff.

Especially during the winter months handicrafts, such as leather and raffia work, basket and mat making, and latterly, spinning and weaving have been very popular, while knitting of every kind always has its devotees. Two former patients, who were taught here, have bought the one a hand-loom and the other a spinning wheel, and hope to make them a financial proposition.

Gardening, under the very efficient lady gardener, always appeals to a certain number of the patients, and they derive great benefit from it.

Concert, cinema and theatre parties are arranged when possible and in the evenings informal dances, whist drives, and home-made concerts are very popular. Every month there is a fancy dress dance to which friends and relatives are invited, and every fortnight there is a whist drive held for "outsiders," the proceeds of which go to form a "treat" fund for the patients. The possession of a three-valve wireless set, with a loud speaker which can be moved from ward to ward as required, has also helped to lighten the long winter evenings.

The patients take a great interest in the Hospital's public "money-making" schemes, and the stocking of the Hospital stalls for the summer garden fête, and the annual bazaar, gives them occupation for many weeks beforehand.

There is a Hospital Library from which patients can obtain books daily, and we are also fairly well supplied with magazines and periodicals by friends of the Hospital.

Special Treatment.—In many nervous cases there is a toxic element, the focus frequently being situated in the intestinal tract and the teeth, or less commonly in the tonsils, the naso pharynx, ears, or elsewhere.

Habitual constipation, dyspepsia, and dental sepsis (pyorrhea, etc.), are present in a large number, together with a dry skin and a dry unhealthy tongue, and it is a question as to how far they are the cause and how far the effect of the nervous condition.

Every patient is thoroughly examined on admission, and treatment directed towards eliminating any toxic focus.

A Course of Massage—Is prescribed in many cases. It is exceedingly valuable, as it improves the circulation and nutrition of the body.

Hydro-Therapy. Steam Baths.—Promoting elimination by the skin.

Hot Mustard Packs.

Prolonged Warm Baths.—In cases of restlessness. **Hot and Cold Spinal Douches** for their stimulant action and **Plombières Treatment** are all of the greatest benefit in certain cases.

Electrical Treatment.—Faradism, Labile, Galvanism and Radiant Heat, High Frequency, Vibro-Massage and the Bristowe Coil are employed in cases likely to benefit by their use, and have given some very good results.

Remedial Exercises and Physical Drill.—Directed especially towards producing relaxation and improving the circulation are practised extensively.

Radiograms.—These are taken when indicated.

Surgical Treatments.—Patients suffering from conditions needing special surgical treatment are transferred to the appropriate Hospital on the advice of the Honorary Consultants.

Drugs.—These are sparingly used.

Organo-Therapy.—Glandular extracts, especially Thyroid, Pituitary and Ovarian and Mixed Glands, such as "Polyglandin" and "Hormotone" have been used for suitable cases.

On the Mental Side, Psycho-Therapeutic Treatment naturally plays a prominent part. It is absolutely indispensable to obtain the confidence and co-operation of the patient before any form of psycho-therapy can be attempted. Once a sympathetic "rapport" has been established, the course pursued must depend upon the individual requirements of the case. Psychological talks at intervals, simple suggestion, persuasion, and mental analysis employed to a modified extent are the methods chiefly used. In every case a really constructive effort is made to help the patient to "sublimate," that is to direct her mental energies into a suitable channel, to the end that she may ultimately be enabled to lead a happy and useful existence. The patient is also led to adapt satisfactorily, if possible, to such conditions as are irremediable.

THE OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

This has been steadily increasing, a fact which proves its value, and the existence of the need which it aims at fulfilling. While it cannot in any way compete with the therapeutic advantages afforded by In-Patient Treatment, in certain cases it performs a most important public service by affording advice and help to patients in the early stages of nervous disorders, often just at the moment when the trouble can be completely arrested by suitable treatment. Massage and electricity, as well as medicinal and psycho-therapeutic treatment is available for out-patients, and the results obtained have been very encouraging.

Daily Out-Patients.—A special feature of the Hospital is the system of "Daily Out-Patients." These are patients who, while sleeping out—either in nurses' houses, ordinary rooms, or even their own homes—spend the whole or the greater part of the day at the Hospital, taking their meals there and entering into its activities and amusements.

This has been found to be of very great therapeutic value in a considerable number of cases.

The daily out-patients are drawn from the Out-Patient Department, from former in-patients who still require help and supervision, and special cases recommended by the honorary staff.

After Care and Social Service Work.—The question of "after care" in nervous cases is a very important one. We endeavour to keep in close touch with all local patients, and every effort is made to procure suitable work for those who desire it. All former patients are welcome whenever they care to come to see us, and Saturday is a special Club night, when dances and other entertainments are given, to which old patients are cordially invited.

At the end of six months after discharge every patient is written to and asked to let us know how she is going on. We are hoping to increase the facilities for "after care and social service work."

The fact that both the public and medical profession are waking to a realisation of the great value of suitable and specialised treatment of early nervous disorders and borderland mental cases, and the pressing necessity for increased facilities all over the country is shown by the numerous letters which we receive from doctors who recommend patients saying what a tremendous need there is for more hospitals of this type, and how much they appreciate the excellent work that is being done by The Lady Chichester Hospital.

SPECIMEN CASES.

CASE 1.—The following is an instance of the way in which this Hospital is often able to assist Public Authorities.

Some time ago the Probation Officer approached us about a woman who had undergone a week's imprisonment for attempted suicide. She lived in a back street, with a crippled and blind husband, and seldom left the house. Her only son, to whom she was devoted, was about to marry and leave home. She could not face the consequent loneliness.

We saw her in the Out-Patient Department and decided that it was not a question of a diseased mind, but of the need of adjustment of home conditions. This our Home Visitor was able to carry out, by keeping in constant friendly touch and procuring fresh work and interest for her. The patient is now well and happy, and there is no likelihood of any recurrence of her trouble.

CASE 2.—A young girl of 18, a Post Office employee, suffering from a bad nervous breakdown. She was dismissed from her post, as it was thought to be a case of *Dementia Præcox*, and that she would never be fit for her job again.

She was sent by the Post Office doctor to see Dr. Boyle, who thought her symptoms were due to the after effects of *encephalitis lethargica*, and advised treatment at the Lady Chichester Hospital.

She made a complete recovery, and was reinstated after a period of probation and has been able to carry on her work without any difficulty since.

CASE 3.—A woman, aged 30, the much loved and only child of her parents, delicate from birth. In bed on and off for the past ten years, one year of which was spent in total darkness, tended by her devoted parents. Suffered from attacks of depression for the past two years. For last six months had been quite unmanageable and at times noisy and violent, refusing food and with constant fear of "doing something" to herself or her mother.

On admission emaciated and anæmic, teeth carious, no appetite, but anxious to get well.

This patient was slow at first owing to the unhealthy condition of her mouth, but with change of environment, massage, physical exercises and new dentures, she has gained two stone in weight, has learnt to dance and to play tennis, and is now looking forward to earning her own living for the first time.

CASE 4.—A woman who had done much enthusiastic voluntary work for a London Hospital, in addition to her own full-time post. This involved very late hours and a good deal of nervous strain and anxiety as to the success of various schemes launched by her.

On admission to Hospital the patient was unable to walk at all, or to stand without support. She could not swallow anything but liquids, and was subject to hysterical attacks which had made a normal life quite impossible for her.

In a few days she was able to eat ordinary food, and in ten days, though still unable to walk across the room, she took part in several dances in one evening, and from that moment she gained confidence enough to try to walk alone. This she very soon accomplished, and along with this improvement the attacks began to disappear.

The patient is now well again and able to take up life, and the assistance of the Hospital to which she was devoted.

CASE 5.—A child aged 10, sent to us with a history of repeated indecent behaviour. Her school reported that she was lazy, mischievous and disobedient. The local Vicar's wife said the child was a public danger, and ought to be sent to a reformatory. There was talk of certifying her as a moral imbecile under the Mental Defectives Act.

She remained at the Lady Chichester Hospital for six months. We found her affectionate, normally obedient, and extremely bright and intelligent. There was never any evidence of moral turpitude. She told us that she and several brothers and sisters slept in one room, and that her father used to come home drunk and beat her, "To thrash the wickedness out of her." She herself seemed to have no idea of what crimes she was supposed to be guilty. Investigation showed that these were not supported by any very definite evidence, and that she was rather the victim than the offender.

When she left the Hospital she was rosy and happy. Arrangements were made with the Guardianship Society for her to go to a cottage in the country for a further six months, and her parents and others interested in her were informed of our opinion of the case.

There is every hope that she will be given a chance to make a fresh start and do well.
