## Information

### *OUT-PATIENTS.*

For the duration of the war the only entrance for patients is 38/40 Marylebone Lane. Out-patient clinics are held daily, Saturdays and Sundays excepted, at 1.30 p.m. New patients should attend punctually at 1.15 p.m. if possible. It is advisable to bring a doctor's letter if possible, but treatment is not refused in any suitable case, provided that the patient is not in a position to pay a specialist's fee. *Children are specially seen during the first hour of each clinic.*

### *IN-PATIENTS.*

Patients are admitted to the Hospital only upon the recommendation of one of the Hospital's Honorary Physicians or Surgeons, after examination in the Out-Patient Department. If, on account of distance or illness, a preliminary visit is not possible, a full report from the patient's doctor is required, for which purpose a form is obtainable from the Secretary, through whose office all arrangements are made for the admission of patients.

Visiting Days : Wednesday at 3 p.m. Sunday at 2 p.m.

### *PRIVATE PATIENTS.*

Six single bed private wards have been made available. Terms £8 8s. 0d. weekly inclusive of professional attendance, maintenance, routine nursing and stock medicines. Special nursing, i.e. wholtime nursing attendance requiring additional staff, is an extra. X-ray or pathological examinations are charged extra at reduced rates. Fees of Surgeon and Anaesthetist, if an operation is necessary, are for previous and separate arrangement by the patient. The patient's General Practitioner may, at the request and expense of the patient and with the consent of the Hospital's Physician or Surgeon, co-operate in the treatment of the patient. Private patients must be admitted under the charge of one of the Hospital's Honorary Medical Staff. All arrangements for admission are made through the Secretary's office.

## 63rd ANNUAL REPORT

---

In presenting its Report for the year 1941, the Committee has first to record with the greatest regret the death of Viscount Stonehaven, Hon. Treasurer since 1938. His services will be greatly missed by the Committee.

The Hospital has been fortunate in securing the services of Mr. K. Miller Jones, M.A., LL.B., as a member of the Committee of Management.

After twenty years service, Mr. J. P. Wetenhall, Secretary and House Governor, resigned from the Hospital in April on his appointment as Secretary of the British Hospitals Association. At the last Annual General Meeting, Lord Cecil Manners expressed the Committee's great regret at the loss sustained by the Hospital and presented Mr. Wetenhall with a cheque from the members of the Committee, Medical, Nursing and other Staff as a testimonial of the valuable services he had rendered during his long association with the Hospital. The Committee wished him every success in his new appointment.

The loss of Mr. Wetenhall's services in this most difficult period has thrown a very heavy additional burden of work and responsibility upon Mr. McIntyre, the Acting Chairman, and the Committee is deeply grateful to him for devoting so much of his valuable time to the interests of the Hospital.

The Committee also wishes to thank Mrs. Hugh Paul for her untiring efforts to procure alternative accommodation for our in-patients, during which some thirty establishments were inspected in and near London, and for her personal representations to the Minister of Health on the Hospital's behalf. In addition to this, Mrs. Paul has rendered great service to the patients and the Hospital in personally conveying patients to and from the Hospital in her luxurious Ambulance.

In addition to his responsibility for the whole of the medical activities of the Hospital, Dr. Worster-Drought as the Acting Medical Director has spared neither time nor effort in the search for premises, and the Hospital owes him a very sincere debt of gratitude for his devotion to the Hospital's welfare.

Mr. V. F. Marshall, who has been on the staff of the Hospital for thirty-five years and held the post of Assistant Secretary for twenty-one years has succeeded Mr. Wetenhall as Secretary of the Hospital.

The year 1941 has seen the Hospital's partial recovery from the effects of the war damage in 1940.

#### OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

The repair of a section of the Out-Patient Department in Marylebone Lane was completed in April, and clinics resumed in the

building. The total cost amounted to £3,190 11s. 5d., and has been recovered from the Ministry of Health under the War Damage Act. The numbers of patients have steadily increased since the re-occupation of the premises. The section of the damaged building overlooking Welbeck Street will not be repaired until after the war.

In token of the Hospital's gratitude for the services rendered by the Staff of Messrs. Debenhams Ltd., while the Hospital's building was under repair, Sir Frederick Richmond has been elected an Hon. Vice-President and Mr. J. Allan, an Hon. Life Governor.

#### IN-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

The Committee continued to seek accommodation in the country for the In-Patient Department in the early part of the year, but this proved to be unavailable. Negotiations were then opened with the Ministry of Health for the repair of the Regents Park building. The work was commenced in December and, in spite of difficulties arising from abnormal weather conditions and Government restrictions, it is hoped to reopen the premises shortly with a minimum of 46 beds. It has been decided not to reopen the Nurses Home which was severely damaged and accommodation will be provided for the Nursing Staff in the main building.

During the year, the Hospital has continued to occupy 16 beds at the Royal National Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital and, having regard to the number of beds available, the admission of 293 cases in the year for treatment and investigation shows how pressing is the demand for increased accommodation for in-patients.

The Hospital records its gratitude to the Royal National Throat, Nose and Ear Hospital for placing this accommodation at its

disposal, and a special word of thanks is due to the Matron, Secretary-Superintendent and Staff of that Hospital for their kind co-operation.

### FINANCE

On the Balance Sheet it will be noted that the Bank Overdraft (£12,507) and Sundry Creditors (£1,174) amounting to a total of £13,681 compares favourably with the previous year's total of £14,887. The sum of £3,041 is the grant received on account from the Ministry of Health under the War Damage Act for rehabilitating the Out-Patient Department.

The Hospital's endowments have been increased by the gift of 67 National Saving Certificates, amounting to £50 5s. 0d. from the Social Events Committee of the Esher War Weapons Week. The certificates are to be held by the Hospital until the date of maturity.

Owing to the enforced evacuation of our Regent's Park premises and the consequent reduction in the number of beds, the Income and Expenditure Account for the year shows a considerable reduction. The excess of expenditure over income amounted to £660 as compared with £1,487 in 1940.

The amount appearing under Contributions on account of Services to Patients is reduced from £6,193 to £3,354. Voluntary Gifts have been increased by an extra grant of £1,000 from King Edward's Hospital Fund towards the General Fund Deficiency, but it will be noted that Legacies received in 1941 amounted to £175 as compared with £1,325 in the previous year.

An extra item of Expenditure has been increased salaries for

the Nursing Staff as the result of representations made by the British Hospitals Association by arrangement with the Ministry of Health. A proportion of the cost involved has been recovered from the Government under the scheme.

Under the War Damage Act Part II the Hospital's equipment has been insured and premiums amounting to £179 have been paid during the year.

The items under Expenditure have decreased under all headings and special attention is drawn to the reduction under Rent, Rates and Taxes by special arrangement with the Landlords and the Borough Rating Authorities, whilst the premises have been unoccupied. The total expenditure has been decreased from £17,863 to £12,531.

#### GIFTS

The Hospital is most grateful to the organisers of the Bundles for Britain movement, whose representative visited the Hospital and sent a report to the American Branch from whom the Hospital has received a donation of £247 10s. 6d. The sympathy and generosity of the American people has been a great encouragement to the Hospital's Committee.

The Hospital also records its very sincere thanks to the following for their generous and valuable help, particularly to King Edward's Hospital Fund for their extra grant of £1,000 towards the General Fund Deficiency :—

#### TEACHING

Courses in Neurology for M.R.C.P. candidates have been held throughout the year prior to each examination.

The Speech Therapy Training School has continued its work in St. Albans, and is now accommodated at the Sisters Hospital. Clinics have also been held there throughout the year. The numbers attending the clinic at the West End Hospital have steadily increased throughout the year and are now practically normal. This means that with the St. Albans clinic the work of the Speech Department has considerably increased during the year, and the Committee wish to congratulate Miss Pick and the members of her staff on their work.

#### THANKS

The Hospital records its very sincere gratitude to members of the Medical Staff and other doctors associated with its work, and to the Matron and the nurses, and to the whole of the Hospital's staff for their services during the year.
