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

THE REPORT OF

The Committee of Management,

FOR THE YEAR 1924.

The Committee are thankful to be able to report most favourably on the condition of the Hospital during the year 1924.

The Hospital and its dependent branches at Moulton Park and at Bryn-y-Neuadd Hall, North Wales, have been fully occupied. Thirty-eight patients have resided at Moulton Park, and 19 at Bryn-y-Neuadd Hall, throughout the year.

One hundred and ninety-eight ladies and gentlemen have visited the seaside branch establishment, Bryn-y-Neuadd Hall, Llanfairfechan, North Wales, for periods of one, two, or three months, during the Spring, Summer, and Autumn.

Sixty-eight patients were admitted during the year 1924. Thirty voluntary boarders also came for treatment.

The average daily number of patients and voluntary boarders resident was 436, as compared with 433 in 1923.

The number of deaths was 25, as compared with 35 in 1923.

The percentage of recoveries to the direct admissions was 66.66 males, 79.31 females, total 74.46.

The percentage of deaths to the total number under treatment was 4·12 males, 5·41 females, total 4·84. The Committee are very pleased to record such a high recovery rate, and such a low death rate.

During the past year the number of patients assisted in their payments was 49, of whom 36 belonged to the County of Northampton. The amount of assistance given to make up the payments to the lowest rate charged, viz.: two guineas a week, was:—

The financial state of the Hospital during the year has been most satisfactory. The receipts from patients and boarders amounted to £118,373 10s. 6d.

The Reserve and Endowment Fund consists of £73,451 18s. 7d., $2\frac{1}{2}$ % Consolidated Stock.

The Emergency Fund amounts to £49,891 1s. 6d.

The result of the working of the Farm at Moulton Park, and the Kitchen Garden at the Hospital, during the past year has been most satisfactory, and there is a favourable balance at the end of the year of £1,396 9s. 7d.

The Farm at Bryn-y-Neuadd, which is let on a yearly tenancy, was reported to be in excellent condition by the Governors who visited it in November last.

36.645 acres of the Weston Favell Estate, which lie between the Main Farm Buildings and the Kettering Road, were purchased by the Hospital for £2,000.

The Foundation Stone of the new and separate Reception Hospital was laid on 27th June, 1924. The erection of this building is progressing.

Dr. G. W. J. Mackay was appointed Second Assistant Medical Officer in November.

The Committee desire to express their high appreciation of the able and zealous manner in which Dr. Rambaut and the other officers of the Hospital have performed their duties during the past year.

FIRST VISIT.

St. Andrew's Hospital, Northampton, 9th May, 1924.

Since my Colleague's visit in October the following changes have taken place amongst the gentlemen and ladies who have been resident in this Hospital:—

The above changes leave on the books the names of 193 gentlemen and 240 ladies as patients, and of 5 gentlemen and 10 ladies as boarders. Twenty gentlemen and 52 ladies are away from the Hospital on leave, 16 of the former and 47 of the latter being at Bryn-y-Neuadd, the remaining 9 patients—4 male and 5 female—being on trial.

I have seen during the course of my visit during yesterday and to-day all the patients in residence. I have satisfied myself as to the propriety of the detention of the recently admitted patients who are now in residence, and of the suitability of the voluntary boarders, with one exception, to remain on that footing.

I found the patients of both sexes receiving proper care, attention, and nursing where necessary. No undue proportion were in bed, and many of them were properly there for rest owing to their mental condition.

To two gentlemen and six ladies I gave private interviews; their grievances were chiefly on the score of detention, and I am satisfied that for the present they are rightly detained.

With one exception the 22 deaths were from natural causes; the excepted case was that of a lady who threw herself in front of an express train whilst waiting with a nurse at Bletchley Station. An Inquest was held in this case, when the nurse was exonerated from any blame. An Inquest was also held in the case of a lady who died from disease of the heart within a short time of her admission. Seven postmortem examinations were held.

There has been no epidemic or zymotic disease during the past winter, and the general health of the Hospital is now good.

There have been 4 serious casualties involving fractures of bones—all in the case of ladies—one slipped on icy ground in the town sustaining a Collis' fracture of the left arm, another fractured her small toe by impulsively jumping out of bed, a third sustained spontaneous fracture of her left femur through malignant disease of the bone, and the remaining case was one of a lady who was pushed down by another patient, and sustained a fracture of the left femur.

There has been no use of mechanical restraint, but one gentleman and 4 ladies have been secluded on 3 and 20 occasions respectively.

The fabric of the Hospital and its dependencies is well maintained, the day-rooms, single rooms, and dormitories are well kept, and present a comfortable and homely appearance. Some re-decoration has been carried out, and some is still in progress, for instance in one of the ladies' villas. The gardens and grounds are looking very tidy and bright with the spring flowers and foliage.

The plans for the new Admission Hospital have been approved by my Board, and the work of excavation for the foundations have been begun. I have visited the site and seen the work in progress. I understand that the formal laying of the foundation stone will be undertaken by the Lord Lieutenant of the County on the 27th of next month.

Divine Service in the Chapel on Sundays is usually attended by 33 gentlemen and 76 ladies, and the associated entertainments by 67 gentlemen and 132 ladies. Ten of the gentlemen and 14 of the ladies have their parole to go outside the grounds alone.

The nursing staff consists of 86 males and 79 female nurses for day duty and of 10 male and 11 female nurses for night duty. Fifty-two of the men and 17 of the women can reckon over 5 years' service.

The average cost of maintenance per head per week last year was £4 9s. 7d. The percentage of patients gratuitously received was ·23, of those paying up to and including 21/-, 6·47; of those paying above 21/- and up to and including 2 guineas, 9·24; of those above 2 guineas and up to and including cost of maintenance, 52·19, and the percentage of patients paying over the cost of maintenance was 31·87.

Dr. Rambaut, whose company I have had the advantage of during my visit, continues to administer the Hospital with ability. He has the assistance of three medical colleagues here, one on a temporary footing, and one, also temporary, at Bryn-y-Neuadd.

SECOND VISIT.

St. Andrew's Hospital, Northampton, November 11th, 1924.

Since the visit paid by my Colleague in May last, the foundation stone of the new Reception Hospital has been laid, the foundations generally have been completed, and a commencement has been made with the building itself. So far as the old part of the premises is concerned a very large amount of redecoration has been carried out during the same period, both inside and outside the building, with the result that many wards and dormitories now look very pleasing in their new colours and tasteful treatment. A new Staff Dining Room has been built, and, amongst improvements in progress, are continued redecoration, the provision of a new weighbridge, and the erection of a new iron fence in front of the gardens on the male side of the institution.

I round the institution well maintained, the dayrooms, bedrooms, and sick-rooms in good order and comfortable throughout, and the kitchens and other administrative departments well conducted. The kitchen especially impressed me as being well equipped with means for the preparation and cooking of food, and staffed with capable persons.

The only part of the premises that appeared to me capable of improvement is the mortuary, and the arrangements there provided for the viewing by relatives of the bodies of deceased patients. Many County and Borough Mental Hospitals have found it possible to convert one of their two rooms into something of the nature of a chapel which is reserved solely for viewing purposes, a course which has given satisfaction to relatives, and which I think might be adopted here with advantage.

The admissions, discharges, and deaths that have occurred since May 9th last, left on the books (when I commenced my inspection yesterday) the names of 443 persons of whom 21 are voluntary boarders, and 422 certified patients. Of the last mentioned number, 28 are absent on leave or trial, making the numbers actually in residence 394 patients and 21 boarders, all of whom I have seen.

Patients generally seemed to be comfortable and contented. Although several expressed a wish to return to their homes, a request made in all cases by persons for the moment unfit, there was an almost complete freedom from complaints as to treatment, diet or surroundings. The few complaints as regards these matters actually received by me were obviously due to mental disorder. I paid special attention to the newly admitted patients and to the voluntary boarders; satisfying myself that the former were in all respects properly under control, and the latter might reasonably be permitted to remain as such.

Twelve patients were in bed in the female and 10 in the male division, 11 of the total being under special nursing care for mental and the remainder for physical reasons. There were no cases of acute sickness amongst the latter, and all cases in bed appeared to be receiving all necessary nursing care and attention.

Only 4 patients have needed seclusion; as usual there has been no use made of mechanical restraint.

Although, owing to the presence of a partly united fracture in a patient who died from diabetes, one inquest was held, all the 9 deaths that occurred were due to natural causes. Serious casualties were represented by three accidents resulting in fractures of bones, all injuries from which patients have recovered or are recovering.

About 29% of the patients attend Divine Service on Sundays, 50% usually attend associated entertainments, and about 39% are usefully employed. Twenty-nine patients are at liberty to take walks alone beyond the grounds, and 196 go out attended, either walking or driving, when occasion permits.

The nursing staff consists of 89 attendants and 86 nurses for day, and 10 of the former and 12 of the latter for night duty. Of the total staff of both sexes, 72 have to their credit over 5 years service.

The average cost of maintenance per head per week last year was £4 9s. 7d. Of all patients in the institution 68·48% made payments below the average cost of maintenance, and 31·52 above that figure.

Although I had the pleasure of seeing Dr. Rambaut before he left he was absent during most of my visit, at Bryn-y-Neuadd. Dr. Phillips, however, accompanied me throughout, exhibited a thorough knowledge of each patient, and gave me all the information I required.

Bryn-y-Neuadd, 11th December, 1924.

I visited Bryn-y-Neuadd to-day, and found everything in excellent order. A considerable amount of redecoration has lately been done, and the Annexe where the 19 patients now in residence are housed, looks exceedingly cheerful and comfortable.

I was just in time to see most of the gentlemen in residence before they started for their walk. I spoke to all but four and received no complaints of any sort. Of the four whom I did not see, one was out bicycling, one had outside parole, one was gardening and one had ground parole. One gentleman was recovering from an inflamed ankle, the result of a mosquito bite and another was recovering from a fracture of the heel.

Everything possible seems to be done for the amusement of the patients, including parties to football matches, football games, concerts and theatricals, charabanc drives, excursions, bathing and fishing parties, cricket, tennis, golf, and bowls, etc. Of these I am told the most popular are the charabanc drives.

I notice from the last report of the Committee that amongst other improvements contemplated is the making of a hard lawn tennis court. There are no voluntary boarders in residence.

There has been no seclusion or mechanical restraint, and no death since the last visit of a member of our Board.

The Medical Superintendent, FOR THE YEAR 1924.

St. Andrew's Hospital,
Northampton.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you my report for the year 1924.

On January 1st, 1924, there were 427 patients in the Hospital, of these 191 were males and 236 females. There were also 7 male and 10 female Voluntary Boarders.

During the year 68 patients have been admitted—27 males and 41 females. Nine males and 10 females of this number were transferred from other institutions or single care. Thirty boarders—16 males and 14 females—have also been admitted.

Fifty-four patients have been discharged—21 males and 33 females.

Twenty-four deaths have occurred—9 males and 15 females. One male Voluntary Boarder has also died.

The total number of patients under treatment during the year was 495, of these 218 were males and 277 females. The total number of Boarders during the year was 47—23 males and 24 females.

The average daily number of certified patients resident has been 415—188 males and 227 females, and the average number of boarders has been 21—8 males and 13 females, total 436.

The numbers remaining on the books of the Hospital on 31st December, 1924, were 187 males and 230 females, total 417. Ten male and 15 female Voluntary Boarders were also then on the books.

The Statistical Tables will be found at the end of this report.

One male and 6 females admitted during the year had been previously under treatment in the Hospital.

The number discharged—54—includes 36 recovered, 12 males and 24 females.

The proportion per cent. of recoveries to the direct admissions has been 66.66 males, 82.75 females, total 76.59.

The proportion per cent. of recoveries to the total number of admissions during the year has been 44.44 males, 58.53 females, total 52.95.

The proportion per cent. of deaths to the total number under treatment has been 4.12 males, 5.14 females, total 4.84.

The number of admissions during the past year was less by 19 than in 1923.


There is a decrease of 9 in the number of deaths; the average age at death being 62 years. No deaths were due to general paralysis of the insane. Six of the deaths occurred in senile cases of 70 years of age and upwards.

The average daily number resident has been greater by 3 than in 1923.

The total number of patients under treatment has been less by 4 than in the year 923.

All the deaths were due to natural causes. Three inquests were held; in one case it was found that death was accelerated by an accidental fall when the patient was walking in the grounds.

During the year there has been no mechanical restraint.



MOULTON PARK HOUSE (2 MILES FROM ST. ANDREW'S HOSPITAL).

The health of the patients has been very good during the year. It is most satisfactory that there has been a low death rate and a remarkably high recovery rate.

One hundred and ninety-eight patients visited Bryn-y-Neuadd Hall between April and October. In the Annexe of Bryn-y-Neuadd 19 male patients resided during the whole year.

The following works have been carried out during 1924:-

AT THE HOSPITAL :-

A separate messroom for the Charge Sisters has been built.

A new bathroom for the Male Staff has been provided.

A new weighbridge for weighing up to 15 tons has been installed.

A new retaining wall at the lawn tennis courts has been made.

The suite of billiards rooms has been completely renovated, panelled in oak, and redecorated.

Male 1 Ward, Male 4 Ward, and Male 4 Dormitories, have been repapered and redecorated.

A large number of bedrooms, passages, dormitories, and dining-rooms have been repapered and repainted.

External painting has been carried out at the Laundry, Sanatorium, Greenhouses, etc.

The Bakehouse has been renovated.

A new Bathroom has been provided for Male 4 Dormitory.

AT MOULTON PARK :-

The sitting rooms and bedrooms of the Farm House have been repapered and redecorated.

AT BRYN-Y-NEUADD :-

The Cottage at the Annexe has been completely renovated.

A large part of the Annexe has been repapered and redecorated.

New iron gates have been erected at the Station Entrance.

OCCUPATION OF PATIENTS :-

Many patients have continued to work on the Farm and in the Gardens, on the Cricket Ground, on the Golf Course, and in the Workshops.

Several patients have their own allotment gardens in the grounds of the Hospital, where they work without the aid of the gardening staff. This system works most satisfactorily, and several patients sell their garden produce.

GAMES :-

OUTDOOR :-

Cricket, Hockey, Football, Lawn Tennis, Golf, Croquet, and Bowls have been played regularly in their seasons. Tournaments of various kinds and matches against visiting teams have been arranged.

The En Tout Cas Hard Lawn Tennis Court has been much appreciated.

Charabanc Drives have been most popular, and at Bryn-y-Neuadd sea-bathing, trout-fishing, and hill-climbing have provided healthy recreation.

INDOOR :-

There has been a succession of dramatic entertainments, dances, concerts, bridge and whist drives, cinematograph entertainments, chess matches, and billiard tournaments, throughout the year.

I append a list of all entertainments, with the results of our contests against visiting teams.

RECEPTION HOSPITAL :-

The ceremony of laying the foundation stone of the new Reception Hospital was performed by Mr. Christopher Smyth, Chairman, on the 27th June, 1924.

Considerable progress has been made with the work, but a nine weeks' builders' strike caused some delay during the Summer months.

SUPERANNUATION SCHEME :-

The Superannuation Scheme adopted by the Committee of Management came into force on 1st January, 1924.

NURSING STAFF :-

I desire to thank Drs. Norman Phillips, Hillier, Mackay, and Roberts, for the long courses of lectures and demonstrations in Mental Nursing which they have given throughout the past year.

The Hospital and its branches at Moulton Park and Bryn-y-Neuadd, North Wales, have been visited by the Commissioners of the Board of Control and by the Lord Chancellor's Visitors during the year.

The work of the whole staff has reached a high standard.

I wish especially to thank the heads of departments for their industry, marked efficiency, and their constant loyalty to the Hospital and to me. In conclusion, I hope the Chairman, the Committee of Management, and the Governors of the Hospital will accept my grateful thanks for their constant kindness and their invariable confidence and support.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you my report for the year 1924.

The Chapel Services have been held regularly at the Hospital and Moulton Park on Sundays, and a Daily Service in the Hospital Chapel. I have also celebrated the Holy Communion every Sunday and at least once during the week. Private Communion has been administered as occasion arose.

The average attendance at Sunday Services has been 58 females and 47 males, and 9 females and 7 males during the Week-days.

My visits to the wards have been paid daily and to the villas and Moulton Park weekly.

One Organ Recital has been given and one Recital of Music in the Hall.

Many additions to the Library have been made which more than made up for the heavy wastage of books which is inevitable. The latest publications are supplied in adequate numbers from a Town Circulating Library.

The supplies of Newspapers and Periodicals is ample.

During my absence in September, my duties were undertaken by the Rev. R. G. Randolph, of Duston, and the Rev. W. L. Tudor, Rector of Weston Favell. I have also to thank the Rev. E. Johnston Walker, Rector of Boughton, and the Rev. R. A. Edwards, of St. Edmund's, for kind assistance on other occasions.

I have again to thank the Medical Superintendent and Officials and Staff for ready and sympathetic help.
