SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT,

To the Council of the Borough, for the Year 1867.

On the 1st of January, 1867, the number of Patients in the
Asylum was 581

Being an increase in the year of 3 to the Parish of Birmingham ; 2 to the Borough Fund ; 11 to the Aston Union ; and 2 to King's Norton Union ; and a decrease of 10 to outlying Unions. The number of Private Patients remains the same.

The daily average number of Patients resident through the year was 602, being an increase over 1866 of 6 patients.

The Asylum was closed to the admission of out-Borough female pauper patients in April last, and for males in August.

Of the 234 patients admitted, 140 were from Birmingham Parish, 10 from Birmingham Borough, 33 from Aston Union, 2 from King's Norton Union, 22 were from outlying Unions, and 27 were Private patients.

48 of the Patients admitted in the year had been previously in this Asylum.

During the year 4 patients absconded, 5 were removed to other Asylums, 1 removed to Ireland, 1 returned to prison, 1 private patient was removed to the Workhouse, 2 were taken home by their friends, and 2 were transferred to the Pauper list.

The present accommodation is for 330 Females and 298 Males, being two beds less than the number reported last year ; this is on account of an increase in the number of Male Attendants.

This latter amount has not been charged to Capital Account, but is paid from surplus derived from Maintenance Account; principally from out-Borough and private patients.

The weekly charge for maintenance, clothing, medical treatment, and care of the patients throughout the year has been, for in-Borough patients 8s. 6d.; out-Borough 14s.; and Private Patients from 8s. 9d. to 21s.

The average number of Patients resident during the year, chargeable to Parishes in, and Borough of Birmingham, was 500, against 483 in 1866, 459 in 1865, 433 in 1864, 401 in 1863, 366 in 1862, 324 in 1861, and 303 in 1860; being an increase of $26\frac{2}{3}$ patients per annum since January 1st, 1860.

Of the out-Borough patients, the number in the Asylum at the commencement of the year was 40, and at the end of the year this number was reduced to 30; 18 of which were males and 12 females.

At one period of the year there were but 3 vacancies for patients in the Female department of the Asylum, and at the end of the year but 10. Under these circumstances, your Committee have at several of their meetings considered the question of further enlarging the Asylum; and finding from the returns made to them to 31st December last, that the number of Pauper lunatics chargeable to the the Borough of Birmingham and to the Parishes within the Borough, was 751, your Committee instructed the Architect, and he having submitted to them plans giving further accommodation for 100 patients of each sex, which plans have been approved by your Committee; but they do not at this time apply for powers to carry out the said plans, thinking it probable that some further legislation on the subject of Pauper lunatics will shortly take place.

The water required for the Establishment has been chiefly obtained from the well at the Asylum, there being 751,000 gallons supplied by the Birmingham Waterworks Company: this supply has been required when some repairs were being done to the engine, boilers, or other works in this department during the year. Two

large water cisterns have been erected, and separate main pipes laid down to them; also a new gas main has been laid round the entire building, and a suitable gas meter provided; these were found requisite to equalize the supply of gas and water to all parts of the Institution. At the Farm buildings your Committee have had one of the covered piggeries converted into a cow-house, there not being sufficient room for the number of cows required to supply the Asylum and Borough Prison with milk. Some of the lavatories and bath-rooms have been refitted, and other works done by order and to the satisfaction of your Committee: the cost of these works is included in the sum of £893. 3s. 10d. before mentioned.

The warming, ventilation, drainage, and other matters connected with the sanitary state of the Asylum continue to work well, and the buildings are all in good repair.

The general health of the patients through the year has been good.

Two male attendants were summarily dismissed for ill-treating a patient; and two other male, and two female attendants, were discharged for acting contrary to the rules of the Asylum.

The Accounts of the Treasurer, with those of the Clerk, have been audited by a professional auditor, found correct, and well kept.

*On *Wednesday* and *Saturday*, one-fourth of the patients have each 1 pint of Soup, 6 oz. Bread, 1 oz. Cheese, and $\frac{1}{2}$ pint Beer.

The Meat is principally slaughtered at the Farm, and consists of Beef, Mutton, Pork, and Veal—sometimes Fish, Poultry, or Game, is given in place of Meat. Rhubarb or Apples also are given in the season, in place of Currants and Raisins. The Vegetables (as in season) are potatoes, parsnips, turnips, greens, peas, beans, &c., also lettuce, radishes, onions, &c.

4 O'CLOCK—The Males employed have $\frac{1}{2}$ pint of Beer, from Lady-day to Michaelmas-day.

TEA AT 5.45 P.M.—For each patient, 1 pint of Tea, with Bread and Butter, same as at Breakfast.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to submit my seventeenth annual statement on the medical department of your Asylum. The Statistical Tables appended are constructed according to the recommendations of the Commissioners in Lunacy, and they show, as far as figures can do, the practical working of the Establishment, and the results which have been obtained, in the seventeen and a half years during which the Asylum has been in operation.

An analysis of the Tables exhibits the following results :

The admissions during the year were 234,—29 less than the previous year, the falling off being in the females alone : 138 were males, 96 females, and of those 15 males and 12 females were private patients. With the 581 left at the end of 1866, there were 815 cases under treatment during the year. There were 11 re-admissions, and, including these, 48 had been in the Asylum more than once. The average daily number, including those absent on trial, was 605, which is 15 more than the daily average of the previous year. The lowest number was 581, the highest 625.

One hundred and sixteen patients were discharged recovered, which is 49·5 per cent. upon the admissions ; and, in addition to these, 21 patients—9 per cent.—were discharged improved.

The deaths, 78 in number, show a per centage of 12·8 upon the average number resident,—being one per cent. less than the previous year.

In 50 of the 78 cases the mortality arose from general paralysis and other forms of brain disease. Fifteen were due to phthisis, and eight to other pulmonary affections. One death was caused by suffocation from the patient turning upon his face in bed during an epileptic fit, and this was the only serious casualty which occurred during the year. In this case an inquest was held, and a verdict returned of “accidental suffocation.” Inquests were also held in six other cases; in one of which there was the following special verdict, that the patient died from “concussion of the brain by a fall down stairs, being very weak, and labouring under softening of the brain.” In the five other cases the finding in each was “died by the visitation of God.”

I have again omitted any table showing the causes of mental disorder,—finding that such a table, with the imperfect materials at my command, would be valueless. Thus, of the 234 cases admitted, no cause whatever was assigned, or could be ascertained, in so many as 154; and the information given in the other cases, on that point, was often not to be relied upon.

Medical Superintendents of Asylums, whenever they make any reference in their annual reports to the curability of Insanity, always insist upon the necessity for its early treatment,—which is especially needful in its initiatory or incubating stage, at which period, by judicious management, it may often be arrested in its course, and the necessity for Asylum treatment altogether prevented. This is a matter still so lightly regarded by the majority of medical men, as well as by the public generally, and yet of so much importance, that it cannot be too frequently adverted to. An apt illustration of this position may be found in the records of the year just past. On reference to Table XI. it will be seen that of the 234 cases admitted in the year, 182 are stated to have been of less than six months' duration at the time of their admission. Now, of that number,

seventy-two, or 39·5 per cent., were discharged recovered before the expiration of the year, and 35 others were progressing favourably: while of the 52, of duration exceeding six months, only 2 were discharged recovered. A more striking example of the efficiency of early treatment and the non-efficiency of late treatment—40 per cent. from the one class against 4 per cent. from the other—could not well be found.

The sanitary condition of the Establishment was well maintained throughout the year, and its inmates were free from any disorder of epidemic or endemic character.

The recent appointment of Dr. James Rutherford as Assistant Medical Officer,—an able and distinguished man, and of high character,—augurs well for the future interests of the Institution.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE BOROUGH
LUNATIC ASYLUM, BIRMINGHAM.

GENTLEMEN,

In presenting the tenth annual report of my duties as your Chaplain, it is my pleasing duty to state that although nothing beyond the ordinary course of events has transpired during the year to call for special notice, I have the happiness to state, that so far as my ministerial duties are concerned all have progressed in a most satisfactory manner.

In the discharge of my duties as Chaplain to your Asylum, it has been my constant endeavour to promote the moral and spiritual welfare of all entrusted to my ministerial care, and it is my pleasing duty to report that while discharging my duties I have derived much comfort and encouragement from the attention paid to my instructions in the ministration of public worship, as also in my more private intercourse with the inmates in my visitations in the galleries, I have continued to receive the warmest manifestations of affection and grateful appreciation of the efforts put forth for their benefit. I here take the opportunity to make a remark upon a conviction which was forced upon my mind shortly after I entered upon the duties of my office, and which has continued to increase in force during the whole of the *ten years* I have been engaged as Chaplain, viz., that uniform kindness and gentleness of manner, when united to firmness of discipline, constitutes the only safe and successful mode of treatment that can be employed with the view to the mental and moral improvement of the inmates of your Asylum ; and indeed

of all institutions of a similar character to the one under your care and management.

I have no alteration to report as to the order of the Religious Services in the Chapel ; the plan which is now pursued is the same as in former years, and I am happy to state that the patients for the greater part manifest interest in public worship, and unite with great reverence and devotion in the various acts of Divine worship.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been regularly administered in the Chapel once in each quarter, during the past year, to such of the officers and inmates as were desirous of partaking of the ordinance.

I made allusion in my last report to an important alteration in my duties, made at the request of the Committee of Visitors, that the Chaplain should in future visit the Institution *every day*, instead of three times a week, which up to that time had been the rule of the Asylum from the foundation. This has greatly added to the labour of my office, but I am happy to report that the extra duties performed are gratefully appreciated by the inmates, and affords me an enlarged opportunity of doing good in the ordinary daily discharge of duty.

In concluding this *tenth annual* report, I have great satisfaction in stating that I have on all occasions continued to work harmoniously with the whole of the superior officers and attendants, and have received that cordial support and co-operation which has tended to the happy and pleasant discharge of my ministerial functions ; and I can, without hesitation, assure the Committee of Visitors that no means have been left unemployed by me that would be likely to contribute to the happiness and welfare of those placed under my care and pastoral oversight.
