ANNUAL REPORT,

TO THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH, FOR THE YEAR 1869.

Presented to the Council February 8, and approved February 15, 1870.

The Committee of Visitors, in their Nineteenth Annual Report on the state, government, and sanitary condition of the Asylum, have the satisfaction to record their approval of the management of the various departments thereof, the satisfactory state of the Buildings, and, at the present time, accommodation for the pauper lunatics of the Borough.

The daily number of patients resident in the year was 612; the total number under treatment 810, the greatest number 631, and the lowest number 587.

The number of patients admitted in the year was 196 against 216 in 1868; the discharged and transferred, 146 against 120; and the deaths, 76 against 70 for the same period.

Of the patients now in the Asylum there is a decrease of 10 chargeable to Birmingham and the parishes therein, 20 to outlying Parishes and Unions, and an increase of 2 to private patients, making the number 28 less than at the same period of the preceding year.

During a portion of the year the Asylum was much inconvenienced by overcrowding (when applications for the admission of private patients were refused), but the patients chargeable to the Leicester Union having been removed to the Asylum provided for that Borough, this pressure was relieved, and since that time there have been fewer admissions from the parish of Birmingham than at any period for the last ten years; consequently there is at the present time vacancies for 45 patients, viz., 28 males and 17 females.

The following Table shows the number of patients in the Asylum chargeable to Birmingham from the year 1860, when by the sanction of the Council the Asylum was enlarged:—

The Asylum has 632 beds for patients; the number of pauper patients chargeable to Birmingham is 533. Besides these there are 50 patients not paupers, but belonging to the Borough; this class of persons have special claims for admission into the Asylum, as many of them (or their friends) have been ratepayers for years, their circumstances precluding their admission into the private Asylums of the country.

From the subjoined Table the Council will see the number of patients monthly and annually admitted into the Asylum from January 1860 to January 1869:—

Your Committee, in their Report for Midsummer Quarter of last year, asked permission of the Council to submit plans for further extension of the Asylum, when the Council Resolved,—"That the question be deferred for six months." Without pressing this subject again on the consideration of the Council, the Committee of Visitors being divided in opinion as to the expediency of further enlargement, and the Guardians of the Parish of Birmingham being desirous to erect wards at the Workhouse for epileptic, idiotic, and demented patients, your Committee will defer the further consideration of the question for the present.

From the returns received from the medical officers of the parishes of the Borough, your Committee are informed that there were in the Birmingham Workhouse 185 insane patients, in Aston Workhouse 20, and 84 of the same class were residing with their friends; these, together with those in the Asylum, make the total number of pauper lunatics in the Borough at the end of the year 822 against 803 in 1868.

The charge for pauper patients of the Borough has been the same as in former years, viz., 8s. 6d. per week.

The Commissioners' 23rd Report to the Lord Chancellor for the year 1868 contains the following statement of the cost of maintenance, clothing, medical treatment, and care of lunatics, from which it will be seen that Birmingham contrasts most favourably with the other public Asylums of the country:—

Of the 46 Asylums above recorded, there are but 3 whose cost of maintenance, &c., is at a lower rate than that of Birmingham, and at the same time there is scarcely an Asylum in England giving a more liberal diet than Birmingham; the patients here being generally artizans, are accustomed in their homes and habits to a diet very different to that of the agricultural class in County Asylums.

The Expenditure on Building Account not chargeable to Maintenance Account is £549. 3s. 3d.; this has been paid as heretofore from surplus, instead of applying to the Council for the same. The items of this account will be found at the end of Tables connected with this Report, when published.

At the Farm, during the year, 38 beasts, 164 sheep and lambs, 70 pigs, and 9 calves were slaughtered, and the meat consumed in the House—charged at 7d. per lb.; 1270 bushels of potatoes were grown, as were also the green vegetables required for the establishment.

The Committee of Visitors held 24 meetings in the year, with an aggregate of 162 attendances.

The House Visitors made 16 special visits to the wards at uncertain periods, and on each occasion reported to the Committee favourably of the condition of the various departments and the patients.

There has been a good supply of water from the well throughout the year, and all other sanitary matters continue satisfactory.

The general health of the patients has been good; one death is recorded of a female patient from a blow by a fellow patient. There has been no suicide, or other casualty through the year requiring mention in this Report.

Your Committee have now no contract with any outlying County, Union, or Parish, to receive their Lunatics; the last of the patients belonging to Leicester were removed in October. From 1863, the period when the out-Borough patients were admitted, together with patients not paupers, the Asylum funds from this source were benefited by the sum of £7,000, being surplus over the charge made for the lunatic patients of the Borough; the sum granted by the Council for the enlargement of the Asylum (then required) was £10,000; thus the Borough has benefited financially by the enlargement, and the Asylum is now filled with patients belonging thereto.

The original area of land provided for the Asylum (including that on which the Asylum stands) was 22 acres; the present area is 49 acres; the whole, with the exception of about 450 yards on the canal side, is enclosed by a substantial brick wall. The progress in remaking of land last purchased has been satisfactory; and although many thousand tons of earth have been moved, there yet remains much to be done before this land is formed for the application of sewage irrigation, as proposed.

In the past year about ten acres of natural or mowing grass were subjected to sewage application, from which three crops of grass were cut (on some portions as many as five were gathered); the produce was about 20 tons of hay, 48 tons of cut grass for stall feeding, and in the month of September 14 cows and 2 horses were grazing on it, leaving a thick crop when they were again stalled for the winter. The cattle seemed to do well on this grass, and milked far better than in previous years, when out on grass not subjected to sewage irrigation.

This sewage is applied in a fresh state by canals; and the soil so takes up the component parts thereof, that as the water from it escapes into the sewer it is comparatively clear. By this means of application all danger of contagion from injurious gases caused by stagnation and fermentation is obviated, and the applying of it simple and inexpensive. The sewage of the Workhouse, together with that of the Borough Prison and Asylum, passes through the Asylum property, and by a small outlay in lifting the same to the higher level, the whole of the land belonging to the Workhouse and Asylum could be subjected to its application.

The Accounts of the Clerk and Steward of the Asylum, together with those of the Treasurer, for the year 1869, have been audited by Messrs. J. Scott and Son, Accountants, and they have certified to the same being correct and well kept.

Your Committee, in conclusion, beg to inform the Council that they have reduced the charge for maintenance, clothing, medical treatment, and care of lunatics chargeable to Birmingham and the Parishes therein; 6d. per patient per week from January 1st to June 30, 1870, the present charge for the above period, will therefore be 8s. for Birmingham pauper patients, 14s. for out-Borough ditto, and 8s. 9d. to 21s. for private patients.

The Meat is principally slaughtered at the Farm, and consists of Beef, Mutton, Pork, and Veal—sometimes Fish, Poultry, or Game, is given in place of Meat. Rhubarb or Apples also are given in the season, in place of Currants and Raisins. *On Wednesday and Saturday, one-eighth of the patients have each 1 pint of Soup, 6 oz. Bread, and 1 oz. Cheese. Vegetables (as in season) are potatoes, parsnips, turnips, greens, peas, beans, &c., also lettuce, radishes, onions, &c.

Beer for dinner is given to those patients employed only.

TEA at 5.45 P.M.—For each patient, 1 pint of Tea, with Bread and Butter, same as at Breakfast. 4 o'CLOCK.—The Males employed have ½ pint of Beer from Lady-Day to Michaelmas-Day.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit my nineteenth annual report on the state and condition of your Asylum.

At the commencement of the year 1869 there were 615 patients in the House, which number gradually increased until in August it reached as high as 632, at which time the House was very crowded, so much so that for a time three patients had to sleep upon the floor in one of the galleries. Soon after that period the Leicester patients (20 in number) were transferred to their own Asylum, which, with the deaths and other discharges, conjoined with the unusually low rate of admission during the last quarter of the year, brought the number so low that on the last day of the year there were but 587 in the House.

The admissons during the year were 196—25 private, 171 pauper—which, with the 615 left at the end of 1868, made a total of 811 who were under treatment during the year. Only 5 were re-admissions, but, including these, 34 had been in the Asylum at some former period. The daily number, including those absent on trial, averaged 614—284 males, 330 females.

There were 81 recoveries, being 41 per cent. upon the admissions, the females being 10 per cent. higher than the males; and besides these, 35 other patients were discharged relieved or convalescent.

The death rate was nearly a half per cent. above the average of the 19½ years during which the Asylum had been at work. In the mortality table (No. VII.) the deaths are classed thus: cerebral and spinal disease (including 21 from general paralysis), 43; thoracic disease, 19; abdominal disease, 5; all other causes, 9; making a total of 76. Among the last was a death from violence, the circumstances of which were duly and fully reported at the time to the Committee of Visitors, to the Coroner, and to the Commissioners in Lunacy. Their enquiries resulted in the committal of the unfortunate patient who committed the act to Warwick on a charge of murder, for which she is now awaiting her trial.

In my last report I adverted to the large proportion of epileptics in the Asylum,—to the want of proper accommodation for that class, and to their consequent intermixture with recent and curable cases, an association which operates very injuriously to the latter. When the Asylum was erected in 1850, and again upon its enlargement seven years ago, it was not thought that the number of epileptics sent to the Asylum would be anything like so large, consequently no adequate provision has been made for them. Many of these patients are scarcely fit subjects for a Lunatic Asylum; and certainly, if placed there, they ought to be kept separate from the other cases.

The general health of the establishment has been very satisfactory throughout the year, and its perfect freedom from epidemic and endemic disease, together with the small number of phthisical cases, may fairly be cited in proof of the completeness and efficiency of its sanitary arrangements.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE BOROUGH LUNATIC ASYLUM, BIRMINGHAM.

GENTLEMEN,

In presenting my twelfth annual report of my duties as Chaplain of the Borough Asylum, I have to remark that while nothing of a special character has presented itself demanding notice, I have pleasure in reporting that the usual duties of your Chaplain have during the year been of their ordinary interesting nature, the particulars of which are daily recorded by me in the Chaplain's Register, which I have now the honour of submitting to your inspection. I must therefore content myself by simply taking the opportunity of assuring the Committee of Visitors that in the discharge of my onerous and responsible duties as Chaplain it has been my earnest and constant desire to advance the happiness and promote the moral and spiritual welfare of my most interesting ministerial charge, consisting of upwards of six hundred persons of both sexes, presenting almost every grade of mental power under disturbing influences, many of whom from lack of early education, mental or moral culture, not to refer to spiritual training, are in a deplorable state of almost hopeless ignorance; others there are of fair education, and brought up under moral and religious influences, who are ordinarily accessible and willing to receive instruction, and afford the most satisfactory evidence of the value they place upon my pastoral visitations week after week in the Galleries, and derive pleasure from, and enter heartily into, the more public and devotional exercises of the services in the Chapel of the Institution.

It will at once be obvious to the Committee that in dealing with so large a number of persons, all of whom are in a greater or less degree under mental disturbance, it requires on the part of the Chaplain constant study of character and close observation of the individual features of each case, in order to adapt, with a fair probability of success, the instruction given, so as to be not only of a consolatory nature, but calculated to exercise a directly beneficial and soothing influence, which can hardly fail to be of service in contributing to the restoration of the mental equilibrium of those who become inmates of the Asylum. In a large number of cases of persons where there is but very slender hope of ultimate restoration—and of this class there is a large proportion—yet even these exhibit at intervals (often of considerable duration) evidence that they not only are capable of instruction, but that they heartily enjoy the religious services provided for their benefit.

The religious services in the Chapel are in the same order and at the same time as those of former years, viz.: On Sunday Divine worship commences at eleven a.m., and consists of the ordinary morning prayers of the Church service, the singing of a hymn, and an appropriate sermon.

On Wednesday morning, at half-past eight, the service commences, and consists of the Litany, the singing of a hymn, and a sermon.

On all other mornings of the week I read prayers in the Chapel at half-past eight.

On Thursday morning in each week I go the round of the Galleries to visit the sick, and afford them religious instruction and consolation, and generally to afford to the other patients who are capable of receiving instruction such ministerial help as I hope may be of benefit to them.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been regularly administered every quarter during the past year to such of the officers and inmates as were desirous of participating its benefits.

I have the pleasure to report that the Library of the Institution continues to be of great value both to the attendant officers and to the inmates; indeed, its advantages can hardly be over-estimated as a source of amusement and instruction. The Library is extensive and well selected, having a large number of books in almost every department of literature; but, in addition to this, there is a liberal supply of newspapers and serials, which are eagerly sought and diligently perused, and are most highly appreciated by the afflicted

inmates. There is, in my judgment, no item among the benevolent provisions made for the benefit of the patients that ranks higher than the provision made for the supplying occupation to the minds of the poor inmates during their long and otherwise melancholy confinement within the walls of the Asylum.

In conclusion of this my twelfth annual report, I beg to assure the Committee of Visitors of the deep interest I have ever felt, and continue to take, in the happiness and welfare of those committed to my ministerial care, and that no means have been left unemployed that I thought might be expected to conduce to the moral and spiritual benefit of the inmates.
