The Thirty=first Annual Report

OF

THE VISITING COMMITTEE

OF THE

LUNATIC ASYLUM FOR THE CITY AND COUNTY OF BRISTOL.

Your Committee beg to report that during the past year the condition of the patients has been satisfactory, and the work of the Asylum efficiently carried on.

The number of patients in the Asylum at the present time is 550:—namely, 218 males, and 332 females. The highest number resident at any one time was 558,—namely, 223 males, and 335 females—the average daily number being 537. The number of patients in the Asylum at the date of the last Annual Report was 518.

The administrative and residential block which for the last two years has been in course of erection is now nearly completed, and will it is hoped shortly be ready for occupation.

Your Committee are glad to be again able to state that although these extensive building operations have been in progress and the administrative department carried on under such great disadvantages, no accident has occurred to any of the patients in consequence, and the work of the Asylum has been efficiently maintained.

Two of the Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum on the 9th of February last. A copy of their Report is appended hereto. In accordance with the recommendation of the Commissioners, your Committee have appointed a Second Assistant Medical Officer; viz., Dr. Frederick Edward Rainsford, who entered upon his duties on the 27th of July last.


The Annual Reports of the Medical Superintendent and the Chaplain and the Statement of Accounts are also appended.

VISITING COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

Bristol Lunatic Asylum,

February 9th, 1891.

On the books this day are the names of 532 patients, 316 of these being women. No one was absent on leave, and all were seen by us. Since the last visit, about nine months ago, 46 men and 61 women have been admitted; 99 patients have been discharged, of whom 57 had recovered. There are now 37 vacant beds, 2 only being on the women's side. 13 of the patients belong to the private class. 19 men and 8 women have died. No death occurred from other than ordinary causes, 10 of them being due to general paralysis. Post-mortem examinations were made in 20 instances: the Coroner held no inquest. The patients have been remarkably free from any serious accident, which, when we consider that building operations are everywhere going on, is very satisfactory. The improvements in progress are still a long way from completion; and we regret to find that the workshops are not larger, whilst both within the shops and in the workshop yard no hydrants have been provided. 17 ward and

bedrooms adjoining are dependent upon a single staircase for escape in case of fire. We hope electric clocks, to test the night attendants' vigilance, will be provided. Screens are required in the bath-rooms. At meals drinking-vessels should be provided for every patient, not mugs common to about five or six patients. A second Assistant Medical Officer is required. We must congratulate Dr. Benham upon the condition in which we find the Asylum, considering the state of confusion owing to the works in progress, and that out of a staff of 22 male attendants, including the head attendant, 19 have not yet had a year's experience here. The attendants on both sides struck us favourably, and we had no complaint from any patient on any subject, except alleged undue detention. The staff of attendants is, however, not too strong. We think in the male epileptic ward No. 4, where are 72 patients, 43 being epileptic and 2 in bed, with 5 attendants, and in the female epileptic ward No. 12, with 87 patients, 51 being epileptic, and 5 attendants, and in No. 13, with 75 patients and 3 attendants, additional attendants are needed. Caution cards have been issued to the attendants respecting suicidal cases. We have suggested to Dr. Benham how even greater security might be obtained. Safety gas brackets are in course of erection. 130 men and 163 women are returned to us as usefully employed; 60 men and 66 women were ward cleaners only. The wards were bright, warm, and cheerful; the dress of the patients was good; and the food served in the wards well cooked and sufficient. The health of the patients has been satisfactory: 3 men and 1 woman were seen by us in bed, and under medical treatment last week 27 patients are registered. There are now 120 epileptic patients and 2 men considered actively suicidal; all of these sleep under continuous supervision by night. There are also 19 patients suffering from general paralysis. Restraint has not been found

necessary, and seclusion has only been used in the case of 1 man and 6 women for 17½ hours in all. The Church services are attended by about 260 patients, and a priest visits the 27 Roman Catholic patients. Walking in the grounds is impossible, owing to the building operations, so that the large number of 122 patients are usually confined to the airing-courts for exercise. 215 persons are as many as can be comfortably collected together in the ward which serves as a temporary amusement hall. We must end our Report, as did our colleagues at their last visit, by calling attention to the want of infirmaries.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you the Thirty-first Annual Report, which, together with the Statistical Tables annexed, will give an account of the changes which have taken place in the Asylum during the past year.

The admissions, re-admissions, discharges and deaths have been as follows:—

On comparing the foregoing Table with the similar one Comparison of Numbers. contained in the Thirtieth Annual Report, it will be seen that there has been an increase of 42 in the total number under treatment, of 14 in the average number resident, and of 32 in the number remaining at the end of the year.

On referring to Table III., it will be observed that a much larger number of admissions occurred during the past year than in any year since the Asylum was opened in 1861. An important feature in this connection is the large preponderance of female cases remaining in the Asylum at the end of the year. There were on the 31st December, 1883, 200 males and 233 females resident here, a difference in number of 33 only; whilst on the 31st December, 1891, there were 215 males and 332 females, a difference of 117. The men having only increased 15, whilst the women increased 99 between those two periods. It is of course well known that there are in this country a larger number of female than male lunatics, the number for the whole of England, as shown by the last Report of the Lunacy Commissioners, being 39,162 males and 47,633 females respectively, or a proportion of 100 males to 1211 females. Our proportion in 1883 was at the rate of 100 to 1161; but it has now risen to 100 males to 152 females. This increase, which could not have been foreseen, and in part due to the very low death-rate prevailing amongst the women during the past four years (the percentages on the average number resident for that period being, males 57.8, females 25.5), may render the provision of some additional accommodation necessary on the female side, the Asylum having originally been erected with equal accommodation for both sexes.

The number of patients, 550, remaining includes all for Patients remaining. whom you have to make provision. It includes also 11 private cases, who are maintained at the expense of their relatives or friends. No case is at present chargeable to the Prison Commissioners.

Recoveries.

The percentage of recoveries on the admissions is lower than last year, being 38.7; it is, however, higher than either of the two preceding years, that of 1889 being 34.3, and in 1888 it was 36.9. As has been the case for some years past, the women shew the highest average, being 39.4, whilst that of the men was 32.9. The recovery rate must be regarded as satisfactory, when we consider that we started the year with so few favourable cases, and that the character of the admissions generally has been increasingly disappointing, and the curable cases therefore correspondingly less.

Other Discharges. Besides the 65 patients who were discharged recovered, 33 others left the Asylum, including transfers to other Asylums and those who were handed over to the care of friends.

which, except one which is alluded to below, were due to natural causes. The percentage on the average number resident is 8.6, a much larger number occurring amongst the males than the females: 27 were due to cerebral or spinal diseases, of which 10 were from general paralysis of the insane, 16 from disease of the heart or lungs. Abdominal disease carried off 1, and 2 died from old age. The percentage of deaths in the Asylums throughout the country generally was 10.33.

Inquest. The Coroner held an inquest on a male patient who died three days after admission, whose skull at the necropsy was found to be extensively fractured. It was shown in evidence that the injury resulted from a fall from the top of an omnibus three days before his admission here, and a verdict of "accidental death" was returned by the coroner's jury.

Post-mortem Examinations.

Post-mortem examinations have been held in every case where the friends' consent could be obtained. There were 40 in all, being 87 per cent. on the death-rate for the year.

Birth. A woman admitted last July, gave birth three months afterwards to a stillborn male child. The mother has since been discharged to the care of her friends.

A male patient ran away whilst working in the grounds: he Escape. was re-captured in a few hours, and has since been discharged recovered.

In the return just sent to the Commissioners in Lunacy, it Annual Return to Commisis shown that 7 men and 10 women present a reasonable prospect sioners. of recovery: the outlook, therefore, is not so good as it was last year, when the numbers were 10 men and 17 women respectively. 19 cases of general paralysis are still here, 16 being men and 3 women; and we have 124 epileptics-58 men and 66 women.

The epileptics have increased 12 during the current year viz., 8 men and 4 women, -and this, doubtless, is one reason for the low return of curable cases recently made. We are unfortunate enough to possess a larger percentage of this dangerous and almost incurable class than any Asylum with which I am acquainted.

No infectious disorder has occurred during the year, with the exception that in the spring a laundry-maid caught the scarlet fever whilst visiting outside. Proper measures of isolation and disinfection were adopted, and the disease did not spread further. More recently there have been some mild cases of influenza, principally confined to the staff, but not to an extent to occasion any anxiety.

The new staff of male attendants continue to perform their Staff. duty in a satisfactory manner. On the female side the changes have been as usual very few. The average length of service amongst the charge nurses is at present eight years.

Further experience of the working of the new Lunacy Act, New Lunacy which came into operation in May, 1890, has strengthened the opinion that it is in many respects imperfect, and compliance with its provisions causes a large amount of unnecessary and indeed bewildering clerical work to the Asylum Clerk, whilst the responsibilities of the Superintendent have been largely added to ..

Decoration of Wards.

The decoration of the new wards has been steadily proceeded with, and that of the smaller female block completed. The new dining and amusement hall, together with other parts of the administrative department, are now finished, and their occupation will afford a much needed relief to the congestion at present experienced.

Additional Medical Officer.

In July last you appointed Dr. F. E Rainsford to the post of Second Assistant Medical Officer to this Asylum, and he has proved himself to be an efficient addition to the medical staff; to him, and to his senior colleague, Dr. Aveline, as well as to the other officers, and also to the attendants and servants, my thanks are due for loyal and faithful assistance.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Committee of Visitors of the Bristol Lunatic Asylum.

December 31st, 1891.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour of submitting to you the Report of the Chaplain for the year 1891.

Services have been held regularly in the Chapel (with the exceptions noticed below) on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Ascension Day; the average number of patients present being: Males, 112; Females, 151; Total, 263; or, a trifle more than 50 per cent. of all on the books. Prayers have been said in No. 5 (M.) Ward, on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays; and in No. 13 (F.) Ward, on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. The Holy Communion has been publicly administered six times; and the Wards visited each day.

There can be no doubt that one great disadvantage in the Chapel being so far from the main building is, that, with very few exceptions, it can only be used on Sundays; but the past year has shown conclusively that this is by no means the only objection. In my last Report I mentioned that between August 14th, 1881, when the Chapel was opened, and December 31st, 1890, there had been only eight occasions on which, owing to the weather, it could not be used. I regret to say that the past year has increased that number to sixteen; the After-

noon Service on March 15th and May 24th, the Morning Service on July 5th and August 9th, and both Services on March 22nd and December 13th having been held in one of the wards. This may naturally be expected to occur again from time to time, but the inconvenience caused by snow or rain will be considerably lessened when the new dining hall is ready for use, and a much larger number enabled to be present than is possible in any ward.

I have much pleasure in recording a generous gift of thirty volumes (Punch, Temple Bar, English Illustrated Magazine, and Harper's Magazine), presented by a lady in Bristol, who has on several occasions previously sent books, magazines, Christmas annuals, &c., for the patients' use. The number of volumes in the Library, including the above, is now not more than 500, and of these 180 volumes are distributed through the wards each month. This obviously necessitates the same books being re-issued at comparatively short intervals, and thus renders the oft-made complaint of "crambe repetita," as regards the books, not altogether an unreasonable one. I venture, therefore, to hope that when the new Library is completed, the Committee will take into consideration that, whereas the number of patients has increased by at least 150 since 1880, the number of books remains the same, and will then make such a grant for the purchase of more books as the growing needs of the Institution require.

Are allowed daily 8 oz. Meat (cooked and free from bone), 12 oz. Vegetables, 1 lb. Bread, and ½ pint Milk. Weekly, 4 oz. Tea, 1 lb Raw Sugar, 6 oz. Fresh Butter, 12 oz. Cheese, and 8 oz. Bacon. On Sundays Pastry is provided.

The Male Night Attendant is not boarded, but is allowed 1 lb. Bread and 1 pint Milk each night.

FEMALE ATTENDANTS AND SERVANTS

Are allowed daily 6 oz. Meat (cooked and free from bone), 12 oz. Vegetables, 1 lb. Bread, and ½ pint Milk. Weekly, 4 oz. Tea, 1 lb. Raw Sugar, ½ lb. Fresh Butter, ½ lb. Bacon. On Sundays Pastry is provided.
