## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS.

Epiphany Sessions, 1868.

Since the period of our last Annual Report, the condition of the Asylum has been, in all respects, satisfactory. The patients have been entirely free from any epidemic sickness, and the deaths, which have taken place, have been occasioned by natural decay, with the exception of two cases of suicide, in all of which the verdict of the jurors on the Coroner's inquests attributed no blame to any one, or a want of due care and attention. There is, no doubt, that the removal of the Asphalt floors, as recommended by the Commissioners, and the substitution of boards would greatly improve the comfort and ventilation of the wards. It has already been partially adopted, and we shall proceed with the work as soon as possible.

We have the satisfaction to report that £3,000 of the building debt has been paid off, and it is now reduced to £3,000.

In consequence of the price of provisions, we have continued the ordinary weekly charge of 9s. 6d., and that for Borough and out-County patients at 13s.

There are now in the Asylum 687 patients, of whom 267 are males, and 420 are females. The admissions for the past year have been 168, viz., 77 males, and 91 females; 63 have been discharged, and 60 have died.

It will be seen from this statement, that although there are several vacancies on the male side, the number of females is so greatly in excess of that of the males, that



the wards are greatly overcrowded, and that it is necessary that we should at once take measures to relieve the pressure. This might be partially effected by the removal of 20 working male patients to the farm buildings, which are now nearly ready for their reception, and by using the ward now occupied by them for female patients; but, however desirable this immediate arrangement might be, we cannot obtain all the additional accommodation which we require without building new female wards.

This, of course, must depend on our decision as to retaining the Borough patients, as in the case of those belonging to Plymouth, the Secretary of State refuses to sanction a renewal of our contract unless fit and sufficient provision is made for their reception.

It will be in the recollection of the Court that the sum of £2,800 has been granted for the erection of New Buildings, of which £500 only has been expended, leaving £2,300 at our disposal, and that the additional rate of maintenance now paid by the Borough patients, of whom there are nearly 100, will repay that sum in three years. Therefore no further grant will be required.

The Annual Accounts made up to the end of the year will be presented at the next Quarter Sessions. Those of the farm will exhibit a considerable profit in the articles of milk and butter, and that circumstance has enabled us to continue the present rate of maintenance without an increase.

The Committee have to express their great satisfaction with the manner in which Dr. Saunders, the Medical Superintendent, and Mr. Richards, the Medical Assistant, and the other Officers of the establishment have performed their duties, and to remind the Court that it is necessary at these Sessions to appoint the Visitors for the ensuing year.

## TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

The Medical Superintendent has the honor to submit to the Visitors the Twenty-second Annual Report, accompanied by the usual statistical Tables.

During the year 1867, 168 patients have been admitted, of whom 77 were males, and 91 were females.

The discharges during the year have been 63; of whom 31 were men, and 32 were women; of these, 51 were discharged recovered.

The deaths during the year have been 60; males, 33; females, 27.

The total number of patients under treatment during the same period has been 811.

The percentage of recoveries has been 30 on the admissions.

The death rate has been 7·38 per cent. on the total number of patients under treatment during the year, and 9·11 per cent. on the average number resident; 12·79 per cent. on the males; and 6·75 among the females.

The average age at death was 58 years; Males,  $54\frac{29}{33}$ ; Females,  $61\frac{25}{27}$ .

The general health of the patients of both sexes has been good, and the mortality below the average.

The female wards have been excessively crowded, and it has been found necessary to place a number of beds in one of the galleries. It is hoped that the immediate pressure in this respect will be relieved by the works in progress at the South Cottage, and the removal of twenty male patients to the new farm buildings which are now ready for their reception.

An analysis of the Obituary Table, which will be found in the Appendix, gives the following chief causes of deaths:—General paralysis, 14; other nervous diseases, 6; Pulmonary consumption, 12; Inflammation of the lungs, Pleuræ and Bronchi, 6; Heart disease, 4; Abdominal disease, 4; Renal disease, 2; Erysipelas, 2; General debility and old age, 8; Suicide and accidents, 2.

The Criminal Lunatics who had been classed as such for years have, under the provisions of "The Criminal Lunatics Act, 1867," been transferred to the ordinary class of pauper lunatics, as "their sentences had expired before such evidence of their sanity had been given as justified their being discharged."

The average number of patients regularly employed has been 469; males, 185; females, 284.

The amusements are the same as in former years, with the addition of an occasional Concert during the winter. These concerts are organised by the attendants, and are creditable to those who devote considerable time and trouble to the



amusement of the patients. One of these concerts during the Christmas week was attended by more than 300 patients.

In September last the head-attendant, John Bowden, resigned, and was succeeded by Richard Kendall, from the Essex and Cambridge Asylums. He is an active and efficient officer.

The Superintendent has much pleasure in acknowledging the valuable assistance afforded him in his duties by the Assistant Medical Officer, Mr. Richards, and the other officers of the Asylum.

In conclusion, your Superintendent begs respectfully to thank the Visitors for their continued support and confidence.
