### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUMS FOR THE YEAR 1872.

A comparison of the number of Pauper Patients belonging to the County at the close of 1872, with that at the beginning of the year, gives the unusual result of a material reduction.

On the 1st of January there were 350 Pauper Patients for the County, there are now 325; there were 148 Out-County Pauper Patients, and now 140; and 23 Non-Pauper Patients, now 24. The gross total being now 489 as against 501 at the commencement of the past year.

The number of admissions in the year have been 61 for the County, 35 Out-County, and 5 Non Pauper. The discharges— 38 County Patients, 39 Out-County, and 3 Non-Pauper, of whom 19 Males and 19 Females were recovered; 7 Males and 32 Females were relieved; of the 39 Out-County Patients discharged, 28 were removed back to the Asylums in Wales. The number of deaths have been 31, rather over 6 per cent. on the daily average of patients.

No inquest has been necessary in the year, nor has there been any accident of any importance.

Three cases of scarlatina have occurred in the New Asylum in the course of the last two months, one terminating fatally. They appeared in two entirely separate parts of the building, between which it is believed that no communication whatever could have taken place. With this exception, and that of more coughs and colds than usual, the health of the Patients has been good throughout the year.

The Visitors have every reason to be satisfied with the continued good management of the two Asylums by the Chief Medical Officer, with the diligence and attention shown by the Chaplain in his important office, and with the manner in which the attendants and servants now in the Asylum have discharged their duties, especially the two old Head attendants—one on either side—at the Charminster Asylum. Of some who have left they cannot speak so favourably. In the early part of the summer complaints were made by some of the attendants, which after investigation proved to be entirely groundless. Six accordingly left at one time, and the inconvenience thereby occasioned might have been considerable, but fortunately their places were immediately filled up, and the other attendants showed much good feeling in resisting evil influences and continuing as before, diligent and attentive, in their employment.

The two Assistant Medical Officers left shortly after Midsummer. The vacancy in the Charminster Asylum has been filled by the appointment of Mr. William Henry Gillespie, of whom the Medical Superintendent speaks in high terms, and there is every reason to believe that he will prove a valuable officer, he is much liked and respected by both the patients and attendants. A temporary appointment was made at the Forston Asylum and the post is now filled by Mr. Bland, a medical gentleman from London, whose services were obtained a few weeks since on the retirement of Mr. Barker. The latter gentleman had acted as Assistant Medical Officer at Forston since last July.

Two new bath-rooms have been formed out of old sleeping rooms—one on either side—at Forston with two baths in each, of the same kind as those lately made, and found so efficient, at the Charminster Asylum. Other improvements, some of them suggested by the Commissioners, have been made, such as papering more of the day-rooms, and substituting sash windows in some of the bedrooms instead of the old circular openings at Forston.

Representations were made at the Midsummer Quarter Sessions to the Visitors, by the late Incumbent and a Deputation from the Vestry of Charminster, with regard to the state of the Churchyard of that parish and especially that portion of it which was added by the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Sheridan for the burial of the patients from the Asylum. As it appeared upon inquiry that the part so added would, in all probability, be filled up within a twelvemonth, that the churchyard itself is hardly adequate for the ordinary requirements of the parish, and that no suitable land can be obtained by the Visitors for a further addition, they have submitted to the Secretary of State a plan and estimate for a Cemetery and Mortuary Chapel on the lands attached to the Charminster Asylum at a cost of £420. They propose to provide the money from the Non-Pauper and Out-County surplus account, but they ask for the approval of the Court as required by the 38th Section of the Lunatic Asylums' Act, 1853.

The two Asylums were very fully inspected by two of the Commissioners in Lunacy at the end of last October. Their minute contains many recommendations for the improvement of the building at the old Asylum and in regard to the accommodation and the management of the patients. The Visitors are directing their best attention to these suggestions, and many of them they are desirous of carrying out as time and a due regard to expenditure will allow. With the state of the wards and the condition of the patients they express their entire satisfaction; and, as on previous occasions, refer to the able and successful management of the two establishments by the Medical Superintendent.

The maintenance rate which had stood at the uniform sum of 1s. per day through the first three Quarters of the year, has been raised to 1s. 2d. for the Quarter ending at Christmas. The additional expenditure for coals and other fuel accounts for nearly the whole increase, having been in the last Quarter  $\pounds 433$  15s. 2d. as against  $\pounds 196$  19s. 3d. for the corresponding Quarter of last year. The further sum of  $\pounds 800$  was ordered at the last Michaelmas Sessions, to be paid from the surplus fund in relief of the County Rate, making a total of  $\pounds 4,800$ , so paid over for the benefit of the County.

The two Asylums have been visited by the Committee of Visitors at their monthly meetings and at other times, and have been found on all occasions in a satisfactory condition. The supply of meat has been provided by purchases made almost exclusively at the Dorchester Auction Sales, 67 beasts and 48 sheep have been bought, weighing altogether in the carcase 54,149lbs. and costing £1,712 10s. 0d., or a very little more than  $7\frac{1}{2}d$ . per lb. From this there is a further reduction to be made for what is called the fifth quarter, and for cash received for skins and bones. The weight of the meat in carcase this year is 659lbs. more and the actual cost is £21 less.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

To the Chairman and Visitors of the Dorset County Asylums.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg respectfully to lay before you a short Report of the past year with the various Statistical Tables appended.

On the 1st of January, 1872, there were in the two Asylums 478 Pauper Patients—218 Males and 260 Females—and 23 Non-Pauper—14 Males and 9 Females.

The Admissions during the year have been from *our own County*, 24 Males and 37 Females: from Southampton and Portsmouth, 11 Males and 24 Females (all with four exceptions, chronic incurables); the gross total admitted being 96, namely 35 Males and 61 Females.

Many of those admitted were, as has been often remarked in former Reports, in such a weak and wretchedly miserable condition that it was too evident life would be but short, indeed, two only lived a few days and five survived but a few weeks.

The Discharges were 27 Males and 51 Females, of whom 19 Males and 19 Females were recovered, and 7 Males and 22 Females relieved, and 1 Male and 10 Females not improved. In the above numbers are included 28 Females removed to their respective Asylums at Abergavenny and Hereford.

The Deaths were 31—18 Males and 13 Females—all from ordinary causes, except one case of scarlet fever which proved fatal within a few days—this disease appeared in the month of September, and, after every enquiry had been made, no satisfactory explanation could be afforded as to the Asylum been visited with what might have proved so troublesome, and oftimes fatal, a malady. Three cases appeared—fatal only in the above instance.

The amusements and occupations remain as of old. The regular and constant supply of periodicals and papers continue to afford much recreation and enjoyment, and in some instances information of a very amusing and useful character. All the *gratuitous* supply of papers have been sent as before with the exception of the *Record*, which was discontinued about a year since. The proprietors of the *Graphic* sent us a large number of their issue for Christmas distribution. Mr. Middleton has again most kindly considered our wants and presented us with a good and handsome semi-grand Pianoforte for the Record number.

Great and sudden changes have taken place amongst the Officers and Servants. Both my Assistant Medical Officers left in July last and within a few days, six Attendants and two Female Servants. Their places were all easily and satisfactory filled. To Mr. Gillespie, as my Assistant at Charminster, for his ready and cheerful help at all times ;—and Mr. Bland, at Forston, for his care and kind treatment of those over whom he is placed, I am deeply indebted ;—to my two old and valued Head Attendants I owe as much as ever ;—to all those Attendants and Nurses who withstood much evil influence and remain in the service of the County ;—and to those who now fill the situations then so hastily vacated, I offer, one and all, my best thanks.

Few persons unaccustomed to Asylum life can imagine how much painful anxiety and additional trouble was thrown upon me by all the changes, but I am most thankful to the Great Disposer of all events that I am enabled to add, that through the great attention and kind efforts of those newly appointed to assist me, perfectly unacquainted too as they were with their new life and work here, my anxiety was materially lessened and my labors eased. Again do I desire most heartily to offer you my best thanks and gratitude for your continued kindness and advice in all my various duties, earnestly hoping at the close of every year I may still continue to deserve your approving confidence and support.

## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT,

DECEMBER 24th 1872.

To the Committee of Visitors of the Dorset County Asylums.

#### GENTLEMEN,

I have again the honour of laying before you my Annual Report to inform you that my duties as Chaplain to these Institutions have been regularly performed during the past year.

Divine Service has been held by me twice on each Sunday and twice during the week besides the usual daily Morning Prayer at Forston. Morning Prayer has been daily read at the Charminster Asylum by the Medical Superintendent. The conduct of the Patients during Divine Service has been (without exception) remarkably good—their attention to the sermons, &c. has also been most satisfactory.

The comparatively small number of patients attending Chapel at Charminster has for some time been a source of anxiety to me, but I am now glad to be able to report an average increase of 17 males and 13 females on Sundays, and of 15 males and 12 females on Week days. In mentioning this I have to express my thanks to Mr. Symes for his consent and assistance.

At Forston Chapel the average number of patients attending Divine Service has been 29 males and 28 females on Sundays, 27 males and 25 females on Week days.

I have held sacred singing classes at each Asylum weeklythe singing, on the whole, has been good.

The Holy Sacrament has been administered once a month, the attendance has been very fair although I anticipate an improvement. I have visited the patients (as far as possible) once a week and read to them, they seem to appreciate the readings very much and have reason to believe that my visits are, in a great measure, successful.

Daily London and local papers have been distributed amongst the patients regularly by the Medical Superintendent and monthly periodicals, and books by myself.

The liberal supply of books you have kindly granted, has been a great source of amusement to most of them, for which I beg to thank you.

In concluding my Report, I have sincerely to express my gratitude for your kindness to me during the past year, and to say that I should be glad at any time to receive any hints from you that would assist me in enhancing the welfare of these Institutions.

#### REPORT

OF THE

## COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY,

#### 28TH OCTOBER, 1872.

We have this day brought to a conclusion our inspection of the Asylums at Charminster and Forston which we began on the 26th instant.

The Patients are 12 less in number, than they were at the date of our colleagues' visit in August of last year; they are now  $490-i.\ e.,\ 222$  men and 268 women-of these, 15 males and 9 females belong to the private class.

Two men and 4 women are absent on leave, and 2 men recently made their escape and have not yet been re-taken.

The Patients upon the books are distributed thus—at Charminster 164 men and 186 women, total 350: at Forston 58 men and 82 women, total 140.

At Charminster every bed in the female division is occupied, but there are 7 vacant beds on the male side.

At Forston it is stated that accommodation could be found for 22 additional patients, but we doubt whether this is possible without over crowding.

The weekly charges are—for Dorsetshire 7s., for the Boroughs 11s. 6d. and 12s. 6d., and for Private Patients 10s. and 12s.

The contract with the Borough of Portsmouth will expire in September, 1873. The Southampton and Poole contracts have been the subject of recent correspondence with our office.

There has been no Coroner's inquest upon the death of any patient.

Post mortem examinations have been made of 6 patients only.

Although small-pox prevailed in this neighbourhood, no patient or servant in the Asylum was attacked. The possibility of a recurrence of that or some other contagious and epidemic disease, suggests the expediency of some arrangement, whereby patients affected might, in separate buildings, be isolated. We understand that every precaution as regards vaccination was taken by the Superintendent.

The general health of the Asylum inmates is good; 13 men and 17 women are registered as taking medicine.

We visited all the wards, offices, and workshops, and examined every patient in residence.

At Charminster the patients were, with one or two exceptions, quiet and orderly, generally clean in person, and very suitably dressed. The dinner here on Saturday last and to-day, consisted of hashed beef with vegetables of two kinds; the food was of excellent quality, and appeared to give satisfaction to the patients.

The only complaint made to us on the score of diet, was on the women's side, where objection was expressed to the gruel with bread only, given for breakfast. We suggest for consideration by the Visitors the substitution of tea with bread and butter at that meal.

At Charminster the number of Patients in bed in various wards was 5 men and 3 women. There is no infirmary here. We think it important for the comfort and proper nursing of the infirm and sick, that special wards should be set apart for this purpose. No. 2 Ward in each division would be convenient and suitable for infirmaries.

In some of the wards on the female side at Charminster the proportion of patients to attendants is very large, and particularly at certain periods; the staff on that side appears to us as insufficient. In No. 4 Ward there are 52 patients, and in No. 5 there are 42, several of them epileptic, and in each of those wards there are only 2 attendants. On Sundays in two wards, together containing 68 patients, it seems that with the present staff 2 attendants only are available for charge of all these.

The Wards at *Charminster* were at our visit in excellent order.

The corridors as well as the day rooms have been greatly improved by painting and papering in bright and well-chosen colors, more furniture of a suitable description has been introduced, and additional means of washing have been provided, though in some of the female dormitories, some further provision of this sort appears desirable. The beds and bedding were throughout in good order. We, however, recommend the supply of a limited number of low padded bedsteads for the use of epileptic patients, some of whom now sleep in beds placed upon the floor. The associated bath-rooms (referred to in the last entry of our colleagues) as then in course of construction, are now completed. Each room contains 4 baths and separate compartments for dressing; the arrangement for rapidly filling and emptying the baths is very perfect; each patient is now bathed here in clean water. The gas brackets, in the waterclosets, which were unsafe, as affording facility for suicide, have been removed, but some secure mode of lighting these closets is now much needed.

At *Forston*, where, as heretofore, chronic patients only are placed, we found the wards throughout very clean, and the patients personally as regards dress and appearance, in a satisfactory condition, notwithstanding many are of faulty habits. We were glad to observe that an important improvement has been effected there since the last visit by Members of our Board. We allude to the conversion of two dormitories into separate bathrooms, each containing 2 baths of superior construction and arrangement. The circular lights in these rooms and in 2 dormitories have been replaced by ordinary sash windows. These appear to be the only structural changes here since last visit. As there can be no doubt that it is the intention of the Committee to retain Forston as part of the permanent asylum accommodation for the county, we trust that the necessary structural alterations, already recommended by the Commissioners in the last and previous entries, will now be energetically pushed forward. We understand that the lavatories will be enlarged by the additions of the old bath-rooms, and that sash windows will there also be introduced.

Pending this improvement the water supply to the shower baths should be placed beyond the control of attendants.

At this branch Asylum we have again to press for the appointment of a night watch, and to urge upon the consideration of the Visitors the advantage of lighting the wards with gas; the present lighting arrangement is, we think, inconvenient and unsafe.

No one was under restraint or in seclusion during our visit at either Charminster or Forston.

Since the 8th Aug., 1871, according to the Medical Journal, 1 woman has been restrained for surgical reasons for 7 hours, and 6 men and 2 women only have been secluded—the former upon 14 and the latter upon 10 occasions altogether.

The attendance at Divine service at Charminster is still very small, especially among the women, the average number present on the Sunday being 72 men and 42 women, and at daily morning prayers 33 men and 25 women.

The records of employment show that at both Asylums, besides those engaged as ward cleaners, about 90 men and 104 women are usefully occupied.

There are out-door games in summer and associated entertainments are occasionally given in the excellent Recreation Hall, but we wish that they were more frequent, and that larger numbers of patients were submitted to their influence, than the 50 to 70 of each sex usually present. We have examined and signed the various books and registers.

The entries in the Forston Case Book are much in arrear, having been neglected by the late Assistant Medical Officer, Mr. Stewart, who has since, at the suggestion of Mr. Symes, resigned; his post is temporarily filled by Mr. Barker.

Dr. Pearce, late Assistant Medical Officer at Charminster, has also resigned, by desire of the Committee, and has been succeeded by Mr. Gillespie.

We have, as on former occasions, pleasure in recording our opinion that the Asylum continues to be ably and successfully conducted.

Tobacco and Snuff distributed as directed.

Attendants and Nurses are all allowed 7lbs. bread. <u>4</u>lb. butter, 2 ozs. tea, and 8ozs. sugar—in addition they dine in the Servants' Hall, without restriction as to quantity of meat, vegetables, &c.; and for supper bread and cheese *ad libitum*. Males—2 pints ale. Females—1 pint daily.

N B .- " All meat is weighed after being cooked, and free from bone."

The Milk Gruel is made with best oatmeal and milk. Meat Pie contains Sozs of meat without bone. Soup is made from lequor of boiled meat, thickened with Pearl Barley, Rice, Pea Meal, to which are added Vegetables, Herbs, &c.


