ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUMS,

FOR THE YEAR 1874.

The number of Pauper Patients from the County which, during the years 1872 and 1873, had shown a material reduction, has again largely increased in the course of the past year.

At the commencement of 1874 there were 319 County Pauper Patients in the two Asylums, at the close of the year there were 328. In the course of the year 58 have been admitted, 36 have been discharged, and 13 have died.

The proportion of Deaths in this class has been remarkably small, about 4 per cent. on the number in confinement.

This accounts for the increase in the number at the close of the year, the admissions from the County having been less numerous than in the year preceding, 58 in 1874 against 63 in 1873. The proportion of Patients cured has been about 50 per cent. on the number admitted. This is a satisfactory result and does not include those Patients who have been discharged upon being partially relieved.

Though rather a large number of the Patients have been ailing during the late inclement weather, there has been no serious illness in either of the Asylums at any time in the past year.

The number of Out-County Pauper Patients was 135 at the beginning and 134 at the close of the year. The admissions having been 13; the deaths 9; and the discharges 4.

The number of Non-Paupers 27; the admissions having been 5; equal in number to the discharges and deaths.

The total number in the two Asylums is 489 as against 481 at the beginning of the year.

The management of the two Asylums by the active and experienced Superintendent continues to give the Visitors entire satisfaction.

The duties of Assistant Medical Officers, both at Charminster and Forston, are most efficiently discharged by Mr. Gillespie and Mr. Bland. In recognition of their services the salary of Mr. Gillespie has been raised from £100 to £120 per annum, and on the recent marriage of Mr. Bland some household arrangements have been made, essentially contributing to his convenience.

The Chaplain's Report, laid before the Visitors at the close of the year, shows his undiminished anxiety for the spiritual welfare of those committed to his charged and his readiness to do all in his power for their instruction and reasonable amusement.

The conduct of the subordinate Officers, Servants, and Attendants has, with one or two exceptions, been good.

One Female Attendant was discharged for improper conduct in obtaining as she represented the gift to her of a pair of boots by a Non-Pauper Patient. And an Attendant on the Male side was fined £1 for negligence connected with the escape of a Patient.

Early in the year the Housekeeper at Forston, Mrs. Besant, who in consequence of failing health had gone upon leave for a visit to her relatives, died in Portland. The loss has been much felt in the smaller Asylum, where she had served with much satisfaction to the Visitors for many years. Much difficulty having been experienced in adequately filling her place, it was decided to appoint a Matron to superintend the Household and Female Wards and Attendants at a Salary of £45 per annum. Miss Cartwright, of Linconshire, a Lady of experience in Asylums and Hospitals, has recently been appointed to the office and will enter on her duties in the course of the present month.

Josiah Sharp has retired after 28 years service as Gardener and Bailiff on a Pension of £35 per annum which was confirmed by the Court.

The Mortuary Chapel in the New Burial Ground at Charminster is now finished, at the cost of £497, which will be defrayed from the Out-County Surplus Fund.

Tuesday the 12th of this month has been appointed by the Bishop for Consecration at 2 p.m.

The Maintenance Rate has stood at 1s. 2d. per day throughout the past year.

The Balance on the Non-Pauper and Out-County Surplus Account is £882 5s. 8d.

The sum of £800 has been paid in aid of the County Rate; making a total sum of £5,600 paid from this source for the benefit of the County.

The Balance in the Building and Repair Account is £283 1s. 7d.

Invested in the Savings Bank to the credit of the Charity Account there is the sum of £375 10s. 8d.

On the Loan Account which originally stood a debt of £41,000, borrowed for the purchase of the Land and the Building and finishing the New Asylums, the sum of £14,833 has been paid off from the County Rates and the sum of £5,600 from the Surplus Fund leaving still due the sum of £20,567.

The two Asylums were visited on the 15th and 16th of last May by Mr. Campbell and Mr. Wilkes two of the Commissioners in Lunacy. They remarked with approval the absence of excitement and of Physical restraint, the small number of deaths, and the general good health of the Patients.

They made some suggestions in regard to the dress of the Females, and the advantage of frequent walks beyond the premises, which have been somewhat interfered with by objections raised by some residents in the neighbourhood. They also express a strong desire that the improvements at the Forston Asylum should be continued by the substitution of wooden for the tile floors and sash windows in lieu of the circular openings. The attention of the Visitors will be directed to these matters, and the structural improvements will be proceeded with, having only being delayed by the Builder's attention being entirely occupied upon the Mortuary Chapel. The Minute concludes with reference to the satisfactory management of the two Asylums and the indication it affords of the kind and judicious attention on the part of Mr. Symes.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

GENTLEMEN,

In laying before you my Fourth Annual Report I beg to state that during the past year the Chapel Services have been regularly performed at Charminster and Forston Asylums.

In addition to the usual Morning and Evening Services on Sundays I have given Religious Readings and Expositions in the afternoons for the benefit of those Patients who are prevented by the nature of their affliction from attending Chapel, and I am glad to say that those Meetings have met with very satisfactory success. And here I must express my heartful gratitude for the kind and indefatigable co-operation of a Lady who not only holds similar Meetings in the Female side of the Institution while I am engaged in the Male Wards, but is most attentive to and sympathizing with the sick and dying.

The two week day Services have also been regularly performed.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been administered on the First Sunday in each month.

I have periodically visited the Patients in their Wards and during my visits have read and conversed with them as far as circumstances have rendered it expedient, and from the reception I generally meet with I believe my endeavours have been productive of some good.

Sacred Singing Classes have been held twice a week throughout the year, and during the winter months a night class and a Secular Singing Class weekly in each Asylum. The Patients have been adequately supplied with London and Local Papers, and instructive, interesting, and amusing Books, which many of them seem thoroughly to enjoy.

Mr. Symes has furnished me with the necessary Books for the use of the Chapels and Wards and, when occasion required, he has always been glad to assist me in anything which would be likely to prove a benefit to those under my spiritual charge.

In concluding this report I beg again to offer you my most sincere thanks for the kindness you have shown me.

REPORT

OF THE

COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY,

15TH AND 16TH MAY, 1874.

We have officially inspected both the Asylums for this County, and examined every Patient now resident, making all statutory enquiries as to their care and treatment. Altogether there are 490 Names on the Books, viz.,—318 Pauper and 22 Private Patients at Charminster, and 146 Pauper and 4 Private Patients at Forston. Amongst the Paupers are 56 Men and 78 Women coming from the following places, viz.:—

The charge to Portsmouth is 14s. per week; Southampton and Poole paying 12s. 6d; the Private Patients pay from 10s. to 12s.; and the weekly charge for Dorset Patients has been 8s. 2d.

Of the discharged Patients 19 were recovered.

The Deaths were all from ordinary causes, and need no special observation. There have been no sudden deaths or fatal accidents, and no Coroner's inquests have been held.

The general routine of the two houses and the arrangement made for the treatment of the Patients appear to be the same as described in the last report of the 14th of October. The registers of employment give about the same average result, and there has been very little variation in the numbers assembled together at the weekly entertainments. As regards Attendance at the Chapel Services, a slight increase is reported, and we learn that many more might be taken there, were it not thought desirable to exercise great precaution in admitting any who might be liable to cause disturbance. This is no doubt a wise regulation, but such precautions may be carried too far, whilst there can be no question as to the beneficial effect which the insane derive from attendance at Divine Worship and the exercise of self control thereby engendered.

The Chaplain reports that Divine Service has been held four times a-week at Charminster and Forston, besides the daily morning prayers read by himself at the latter establishment. At Charminster the daily prayers are read by Mr. Symes. The Patients are visited three times a-week in their Wards, on which occasions reading classes are frequently held—a most praise-worthy custom which cannot fail to be beneficial. We notice also, with pleasure, that evening classes for the Attendants have been established, and are held three times a-week, when about 24 of both sexes attend.

There are 14 Male and 12 Female Attendants at Charminster, and five Attendants and seven Nurses at Forston, with a night Attendant on each side at both. The wages for Men commence at £20 and rise to £32. The Women getting £11 at first and rising to £18 and £21. It appears that the visits of the Attendants to the Wards at night are only made once in two hours as a rule; which, in our opinion, is insufficient.

In both Asylums the Patients were very free from excitement, and no one was restrained. Indeed no case of restraint is reported since the last visit. There were yesterday two Patients—one of each sex secluded in single rooms—and it appears that in the above interval seven men and three women have been so treated, and registered under the head of seclusion. The total duration in the case of the former being 60 and the latter 18 days. We are assured however that in a great many of these cases the Patients although kept in bed from one to seven days are not locked in, this being frequently the case with Patients suffering from epileptic paroxysms.

The personal condition of the inmates was satisfactory; we thought a greater variety in the dresses of the Women would be an improvement, but they were clean and it is said that all have better suits for Sunday. We recommended that the Men's shirts should be changed twice a-week, and also that they should be shaved more frequently.

The Mortality has been low, and the present bodily health of the Patients (although many are old and feeble) is satisfactory, altogether seven men and five women were in bed; and entered as under Medical Treatment are 22 Males and 23 Females. There are in the two Asylums 37 Males and 31 Females who are epileptics.

The walks beyond the premises, continue to be allowed, but it is to be feared that the numbers are restricted owing to objections made by a portion of the neighbouring residents. We cannot however learn that any charge of violence or misbehaviour has been brought against the Patients who have enjoyed this privilege, and we see no reason why a practice so universally carried out, and so beneficial to the Patients, should be given up-

There have been very few structural alterations of late, but a bailiff's house, with a dormitory for four working Patients has been built, and it is now proposed at once to proceed with the building of the Mortuary Chapel, a matter of much importance, as without it it would have been impossible to have performed the burials in a decent and ordinary manner.

No further steps have been taken to substitute wood for the objectionable tile floors in the galleries and single rooms at Forston, but we trust no further delay will occur in making this change or in the completion of the square windows in lieu of the round apertures. The exterior of this Building is greatly in need of colour and paint. The sunshades also require painting and repair. Inside we recommend that the women's ward should be rendered more cheerful by painting and colouring as already done on the men's side, we hope also that the trough bedsteads will gradually be replaced by others of a better construction; both here and at Charminster the Wards were clean and well ventilated and the bedding was good and well attended to. But Charminster continues to be much superior as regards furniture and matters of decoration. We saw dinner served and tasted the food which was good and sufficient. No alteration has been made in the breakfasts as suggested at the last visit, but we had very few complaints regarding the diet.

It will be seen from the above report that the management of these Asylums continues to be very satisfactory and we saw every indication of kind and judicious attention to the Patients on the part of Mr. Symes.



Women working in laundry have tea and bread and butter twice a day extra on three washing day, and once a day on three ironing days; also bread and cheese and ½ pint of ale for lunch.

Women scrubbing in wards have bread and cheese daily for lunch, with pint of ale. Men the same.

Men working in the shops or on the farm have 1-pint ale extra at eleven and four o'clock.

Sick Diet as considered necessary by the Medical Superintendent.

Tobacco and Snuff distributed as directed.

Attendants and Nurses are all allowed 7lbs. bread, ½lb. butter, 2 ozs. tea, and 8ozs. sugar—in addition they dine in the Servants' Hall, without restriction as to quantity of meat, vegetables, &c.; and for supper bread and cheese addibitum. Males—2 pints ale. Females—1 pint daily.

N.B.—" All meat is weighed after being cooked, and free from bone."

The Milk Gruel is made with best oatmeal and milk. Meat Pie contains 3ozs, of meat without bone. Soup is made from liquor of boiled meat, thickened with Pearl Barley, Rice, Pea Meal, to which are added Vegetables, Herbs, &c.

Fish for Dinner once a-fortnight.
