#### COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE NORFOLK LUNATIC ASYLUM.

GENTLEMEN,

We, the Medical Officers of the County Lunatic Asylum, beg leave to present the subjoined Report of the condition of the inmates during the year ending December 31st, 1855.

The admissions during the year have amounted to 76, namely, 28 male and 48 female patients. The number in the Asylum on December 31st, 1854, was 300, namely, 137 male, and 163 female patients. The whole number under our care during 1855 has been 376, namely, 165 males and 211 females; the average number daily resident has been 296, viz., 135 males and 161 females.

The number of deaths in 1855 has been 32,—12 males and 20 females; and the number of discharges 51,—18 males and 33 females; of these, 34, or 12 males and 22 females, have recovered; 14, or 5 males and 9 females, were relieved; and 3, or 1 male and 2 females, were not improved.

It will be seen by Table 2, that the admissions of this year are rather Admissions, below the average of those ten years during which the present law may be said to have existed, the effect of which has been to crowd the wards, especially on the female side of the house; this, however, has been somewhat Discharge of lessened by the discharge of harmless chronic patients, which has been patients. pressed upon the attention of the Resident Medical Officer by Rule 42, suggested by the Commissioners in Lunacy to the Committee, when the

Rules under revision were referred to the Commissioners by the Secretary of State. Rule 42 directs that

"He shall at all times, and more especially when the asylum is entirely or nearly full, promote the exchange of harmless Chronic Patients for Patients whose case may be recent and supposed to be curable, or who shall be reported as dangerous."

We have thought it our duty, before recommending any such patients for discharge, to inquire into the provision made for their comfort and safety : and we have been deterred from some such recommendations by the consideration of the unfitness of most Union Houses, without special arrangements, for the reception of Lunatics; and from others, by the inadequate means of surveillance and protection which the circumstances and occupations of their relatives would have afforded.

State of some patients on admission.

Several patients were in a very precarious condition when admitted; in the cases of one man and two women, this was due to their mental disorder; and one woman was in a very advanced stage of phthisis, of which she speedily died.

Deaths.

It will be seen on reference to the Obituary Table (No. 7) that during 1855 all the deaths, save two, were due to changes in the nervous centres from the acute or chronic diseases which accompany Insanity in its various forms: this is very worthy of remark as the index of the good general health which has been enjoyed by the inmates, and the freedom from disease arising from epidemic or removeable causes.

Suicidal attempts.

There have been no inquests during the year. Only two patients (male) have made attempts at suicide—one, by strangulation by his cravat, the other, having, through the carelessness of an attendant concealed a dinner knife, inflicted a deep muscular wound in his throat, but no large vessel was injured, and the pharynx and larynx were both unopened. With reference to this carelessness of attendants case, a system of penalties has been adopted on our recommendation, which will, we hope, ensure in future more vigilance on the part of the attendants.

Penalties for carelessness

Recoveries.

In order to a just comparison of the recoveries recorded at this Asylum with those of other similar institutions, it is necessary that we should repeat the observation that here the term has been restricted to the cases of patients whose minds have been completly restored; we have been content to call those relieved in whom the restoration was only partial.

The valuable provisions of the Probationary Clause in the Act of 1853, Probationary have during this year been made use of in nine instances, namely, three males 16 & 17 Vict., and six females, and with the happiest result: in all the cases, save one, the ch. 97, s. 79. patients have been able to remain out of the Asylum.

We have called the attention of the Committee of Visitors to the Medical necessity of obtaining, in all these cases, a medical report of the patients' Reports upon condition, and they have resolved upon the payment of a small fee for such patients. reports; in several instances a small weekly sum has been allowed during the term of probationary absence from the Asylum.

Among so large a number of patients employed in agricultural pursuits, Accidents, it is remarkable how unfrequent have been the accidents, or acts of violence. &c.

In one case, however, one of the attendants, a simple, kind-hearted countryman, who had most certainly incurred no resentment, was violently struck on the head, from behind, by a mattock in the hand of a man suddenly seized with a homicidal impulse. This attendant's life was only saved by another patient who came to the rescue.

One patient, an epileptic, suffered a fracture of the collar-bone in a fall, which was united without the necessity for mechanical restraint.

The only change in the diet scale, which has been found necessary, and Diet. this more from hygienic than economic motives, has been the substitution, for the supper of the men on three days in the week, of a pint of good meat broth thickened with oatmeal, for the allowance of cheese and beer. This alteration awaits the sanction of the Commissioners in Lunacy.

During part of this year, the habit long since established of bathing all Baths. the females once in every week, has been interrupted by the defect of the baths and cisterns: these are being now efficiently repaired.

During the past year, it is only as an indispensable part of surgical Restraint. treatment, that restraint has been employed, in the case of two patients only; in one, the suicidal patient above mentioned, for five days and ten nights, to prevent the re-opening of the wound; in the other, a female patient, for four days and two nights, to keep the dressings on a sloughing ulcer of the face.

Seclusion.

Restraint, by seclusion, has been very rare; in only eleven weeks out of fifty-two has it been used; never for more than two patients at one time—for the most part for one only.

Medical Treatment With regard to the medical treatment of the inmates of this Asylum, we have little to add to the common stock of professional experience on the subject; but we are compelled to regard them in the light of patients, so few may be considered free from physical disease: this fact indicates care even in the application of amusement, much more of labour. The practice here has convinced us that the insane need all the aids of liberal diet, of stimulants, and of medicine, to support and restore their exhausted nervous energies; and, at the same time, the utmost vigilance is required to detect their diseases.

GENTLEMEN,

I had the honour, at the commencement of 1855, of submitting to you a Report of such matters as came more immediately under my cognizance as Superintendent of this Institution; and I now beg leave to bring under your notice some points relating to its condition and management during the past year.

The present numbers of the Patients are 136 Males and 157 Females; the numbers of Patients in the Asylum at the corresponding period of last year were 137 Males and 163 Females.

Strict attention continues to be paid to the Diet of the Patients, which is good in quality and sufficient in quantity.

The Clothing of the Patients, as remarked in my former report, has been undergoing change, from uniformity in colour and form, to the variety in both these respects which ordinarily prevails among the labouring class in this County. Care is, however, used in seeing to the warmth, comfort, and cleanliness of the clothing. The same remark applies to the Bedding of the Patients.

The beneficial effects of suitable employment on the health and spirits of the Patients, while the value of their labour has been considerable, has induced me most cheerfully to carry out the views of the Resident Medical Officer, in bringing every Patient at all fit for work, to be engaged in some industrial occupation.

The average number of Patients daily employed is 184; viz. 66 Males and 118 Females. This gives a per centage of 62.2 on the total number of Patients, or a per centage of 48.9 on the Males, and 73.3 on the Females. Table (B.) in the Appendix shows the daily average in each month of Patients

The operations connected with the Garden and Farm, afford healthful occupation for 51.5 of the total number of Males employed.

The Appendix (p. 23) contains a list of articles made and repaired on the premises by the Shoemakers and Tailors. It will be seen that 230 articles were made during the year, and 3023 repaired. By reference to p. 25 of the Appendix, it will be observed that the articles of every description made on the Female side of the Asylum number 3024.

Instruction and Amusement have received during the year the attention

which their importance claims for them: various publications have been in constant circulation amongst the Patients, many of whom derive pleasure from reading. Illustrated Publications are in special demand. Several excursions, which the Patients greatly enjoyed, were undertaken during the summer, to places of interest in the neighbourhood. The Cricket Ground was also a favourite resort to many while the weather permitted. The winter evenings have been enlivened by gatherings of the Patients, Male and Female, for dancing, singing, and recitations; and I am happy to add, that these exercises have uniformly been conducted with propriety and decorum.

I have much satisfaction in bearing testimony to the care and attention which the attendants generally manifest in the performance of their duties. On this must greatly depend, not only the comfort of the Patients, but the chance of their ultimate recovery; and I am very sure, that were such care and attention not rendered willingly and from a sense of duty, they could be but imperfectly enforced by the most vigilant superintendence on my part.

During the year much progress has been made in improving the interior appearance of the Wards: fixed seats and tables have been removed and replaced by neat and substantial furniture. The walls of the Day-rooms and Corridors have been papered and ornamented with a goodly variety of prints and landscapes.
