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*The SIXTY-FIFTH REPORT of the VISITING  
JUSTICES appointed to Superintend the Manage-  
ment of THE COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM AT  
HANWELL.*

THE short interval which has elapsed since the Visiting Justices presented their Annual Report leaves them but little to say upon the present occasion. Every day proves more clearly that a system founded upon undeviating kindness is the right system to be pursued in the control of the insane; and as the machinery, by being better understood and appreciated, is becoming gradually more easy in its working, little else is left, upon these intermediate occasions, to Report, but a continuance of the same success, a result which may reasonably be expected, so long as the Officers of the Asylum are animated by the same zeal which they have hitherto displayed in the discharge of their respective duties. The credit of the work belongs to them. The continuance of success in this great experiment must be due to the same zeal and good judgment which overcame so many obstacles at its commencement.



The Visiting Justices mentioned in their last Report, that all the works directed at the April and the July Sessions had been completed, with the exception of the Well and the erection of the Gas-House. The latter is now finished, and on Monday, the 2nd instant, the whole Establishment was, for the first time, lighted with Coal Gas, which the Committee expect will be found to give increased light at a diminished expense, and to give a much more cheerful appearance to the Wards than when they were lighted with Oil Gas. The Visiting Justices, however, have to regret that they are disappointed in the expectation expressed by them of being enabled to report the completion of the Well. This work, so essential to the wants of the Asylum, has been impeded by an unforeseen accident, but which difficulty has now in a great measure been overcome, at much additional expense to the Contractor, and the Committee feel no doubt but that they will be in a situation to Report at the next Quarter Session the completion of this Work. They annex hereto a statement of the cost of the several Works executed under the authority of the Court up to the present time.

The reduction in the price of Provisions in the last Contracts led the Committee to hope that they might be able to lower the weekly rate for the maintenance of each Patient. They have now the pleasure of stating to the Court that this hope has been realised, and that they have reduced the rate to be paid from the 1st instant for each Patient chargeable to any Parish or place in this County, from 9s. 0 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. to 8s. 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per week.

The Visiting Justices, at the recommendation of the Resident Physician, who, in his Third Report, expressed his



belief that the substitution of Irish Stew for Soup on one day in the week would be beneficial, and conducive to the health of the Patients, have caused that variation to be made in the Dietary (vide page 13 of the last Annual Report), the additional cost amounting to no more than £1 12s. 0 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per week.

At this season it has been customary to afford some additional amusements to the Patients, and this year it has been accompanied by the same pleasing results. The Entertainment to the Female Patients was given on New Year's Eve, and that to the Male Patients on the 6th instant. On both occasions nothing was seen but cheerfulness and decorum, and at the close of the amusements, which presented a picture of the most touching description, the Patients calmly and cheerfully retired to rest, soothed and gratified by the innocent enjoyments of the evening.

SESSION ASSEMBLED.

*The TWELFTH REPORT of MESSRS. ALLEN,  
GYLBY & ALLEN, of Carlisle Street, Soho-  
Square, Attorneys at Law.*

MESSRS. ALLEN & Co. have to Report, that in consequence of Notices received by them since the County day of the last Quarter Session, they have attended before Magistrates at the Metropolitan Police Courts and in Petty Sessions in 20 cases—that in one case the Lunacy was not established—in 10 others, either the Magistrates refused to make orders on the County Treasurer, or the applications against the County were, after investigation, abandoned, it appearing that settlements might be discovered; and that in the remaining nine cases the Paupers were adjudged County Patients.

Messrs. Allen & Co., have also to Report, that they have discovered and adjudicated the settlement of William London, a Criminal Lunatic, who was admitted into the Asylum on the 11th of October last, under the Warrant of Secretary Sir James Graham.

Messrs. Allen & Co.'s Bill for attending at the Police Courts and Petty Sessions in the 20 cases, and for tracing out evidence in most of them, amounts to the sum of £27



13s. 4d., and their charges for discovering and adjudicating the settlement of the Criminal Lunatic William London—for defending an Appeal, which was ultimately abandoned, by Saint James, Westminster, against an order obtained at the instance of the Overseers of St. Giles in the Fields, adjudicating the settlement of James Lightfoot (a Patient in the Asylum), and for protecting the interests of the County in the cases of John Thomas Whitsun, and Jane Plummer (also Patients in the Asylum), are £18 13s.
