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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

County Lunatic Asylum at Prestmich,

TO THE

ADJOURNED ANNUAL SESSION HELD DECEMBER 29TH, 1859.

County Lunatic Asylum, Prestwich, 29th December, 1859.

In accordance with the provisions of the Act 16 & 17 Vic. cap. 97, the Committee of Visitors of the County Lunatic Asylum at Prestwich, present their report for the past year to the Court of Annual General Session of the Peace.

The buildings and grounds are in their usual satisfactory condition. A new dining-room, with scullery and a range of closets, have been added to the female department, and new closets have been erected in the male airing-courts. Under the directions of the Superintendent, the attendants and patients contributed a large portion of the labor in connection with the new buildings, and executed all the ordinary repairs throughout the Asylum.

The health of the patients has been very good; and the Superintendent's report, it is anticipated, will show a marked decrease in the number of deaths.

During the year, 72 males and 94 females were admitted into the Asylum ; 51 males and 60 females were discharged, of whom 38 males and 48 females were cured, and 24 males and 24 females died.

On the 28th instant, 242 males and 257 females remained on the books of the Establishment.

The patients have been maintained at an uniform weekly charge of 7s. 7d. each.

No change has taken place among the superior officers, who have been indefatigable in the discharge of their various duties, and whose conduct has been in all respects most satisfactory.

Ever since January 1854, successive Committees of Visitors have represented to the Court the great difficulties experienced by them in their endeavours to retain accommodation for such urgent cases as appeared to be specially dependant on immediate treatment for their hope of ultimate recovery, and have recommended an enlargement of the Asylum to meet the requirements of a very rapidly increasing population; but up to the present time nothing has been done to meet those representations. On this subject your Committee would reiterate with increased earnestness, the observations and suggestions of former Committees. In the year 1858 105, and during the past year 79, patients were refused admission from want of room. These numbers, large as they are, by no means represent the entire number of patients who, year by year suffer, it may be permanently, from want of immediate care. It is generally known that the Asylum is full, and that the most urgent cases only can be admitted. Hence applications that would otherwise be made are withheld, and, if a patient be refused admission one week, it seems hopeless to renew the application for another patient the week following.

It was believed that the increased accommodation provided for Lunatics in many of the Union Workhouses would so far relieve the Asylum, as to ensure for every hopeful case the earliest application of a curative process; but such has not been the result, notwithstanding, the attention of your Committee has been steadily directed to the removal from the Asylum of all patients, who without much disadvantage to themselves or risk to others, might be maintained elsewhere at a less cost.

The enlargement of the County Lunatic Asylum at Rainhill, now in progress, by which it is expected about 260 additional patients may be accommodated, will not afford any relief as regards the Salford Hundred: indeed it will scarcely be sufficient to meet the exigencies of Liverpool and the neighbourhood.

On the 31st of December, 1858, according to the last official returns, there were 156 pauper patients confined in the private and other non-County Asylums, at an annual cost to the Unions and

County of £5627, or about 14s. per week for each patient, and 1322 under the care of parish officers. At the present time it is believed there are 181 pauper Lunatics at Haydock Lodge, and that no more patients can be received into that Establishment.

Every effort has been made by successive Committees, by trifling additions, by enlargements, and by the adaptation of rooms to other purposes than those for which they were originally intended, to procure the utmost accommodation that the present buildings are capable of supplying; so that it would appear to be impossible for any future Committee, without the direct aid of the Court, in the slightest degree to mitigate the evils complained of.

The time has certainly arrived when the interests of humanity and every motive of economy (for each case of Lunacy either protracted or confirmed in consequence of treatment delayed, inflicts a corresponding pecuniary loss) demand that the question of enlarged accommodation for the insane poor should be deferred no longer, but that some decisive steps should at once be taken towards the accomplishment of so necessary an object.

Your Committee venture to suggest that in connection with this Asylum, there be erected "detached buildings of a simple and inexpensive character" in accordance with the economical views recently promulgated by the Commissioners in Lunacy.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

County of Lancaster Asylum, Prestwich, February 17th, 1860.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to lay before you the usual statistical report of the state of the Asylum during the past year.

On the 1st of January, 1859, there remained in the Asylum 492 patients, viz :--245 men, and 247 women. The number admitted during the year amounted to 170, (75 men and 95 women,) making a total of 662 under care and treatment during that period.

leaving 502 in the establishment on the 1st January, 1860.

The recoveries (50.58 per cent. on the admissions) are in about the same proportion as those of the preceeding five years. The mortality has been less, the per centage of deaths having been 7.40 upon the total number under treatment.

The chief causes of death have been, as heretofore, diseases of the brain (combined, in most cases, with general paralysis) and pulmonary consumption.

The general health of the patients has been good throughout the year.

The only interruption to the well-doing of the establishment during the year was a suicide. It happened in the case of a young woman who from the time she was admitted made constant and various attempts to destroy herself. She ultimately succeeded by hanging herself in one of the bedrooms.

With respect to the management of the Asylum I have only to report that the officers and servants have not relaxed in their endeavours to promote the happiness and comfort of the patients, and to maintain the Institution in its usual state of efficiency and good order.

The great increase in the numbers of Lunatics in this county (from whatever causes it may arise) and the inadequate accommodation for those unhappy creatures, are so well known to you that it might be considered out of place on my part to allude at any length to the circumstance; but I will take leave respectfully to express a hope, that the subject which you are now so seriously considering, may not be allowed to drop, until you have made ample provision for those who are constantly excluded from the benefits which County Asylums so fully afford, and I may add, all things being taken into consideration, at so moderate a cost.

The Commissioners in Lunacy at their last visit left the following report—

> "Prestwich County Asylum, "October 5th, 1859.

"Since the last visit of the Commissioners, on the 24th July, 1858, 189 patients have been admitted; 135 (including one escaped) have been discharged; and 63 have died, the deaths arising chiefly from general paralysis on the part of the men, and consumption on the part of the women. One death from suicide.

"There are now 500 patients (248 males, and 252 females) in the Asylum, of whom 20 are under medical treatment. The seclusion appears by the register to have been for the most part confined to a few patients.

"We have to-day seen all the patients and inspected their wards, which are generally clean, and free from offensive odours. The patients, with the exception of some females who were noisy and excited, were tranquil at the time of our visit.

"In reference to the points adverted to in our last entry, we find-

"1.—That it has still been necessary to refuse patients admission, owing to the want of accommodation in the Asylum. The expediency of enlarging the establishment, however, by means of a separate building on the present land, is under consideration. The additions contemplated are, we are glad to learn, of a cheap character, adapted to patients who require less attention than those of a curable, suicidal, or violent character.

"2.—Access has been made to the grounds of the Asylum from the refractory wards, by means of doors near to the wards, instead of from the airing grounds.

"3, 4.—The reservoir is not covered over; nor have basins and jugs been introduced into the dormitories. The lavatories, however, are about to be increased. At present they appear to us insufficient.

"On enquiry we learn that the number of persons employed in various ways amounts to 340, of whom 160 are men, and 180 are women. About 70 males are employed generally in the grounds, and about 45 in various trades. About 300 patients attend religious exercises.

" There is a night-watch on each side of the Asylum, the effect

of which is reported to be very beneficial in keeping down the number of wet and dirty patients. Owing to the recent introduction of some bad cases, the number of wet or dirty patients last night was 35.

"The establishment continues under the care of Mr. Holland, whose care and anxiety for its improvement has been adverted to on former visits.






