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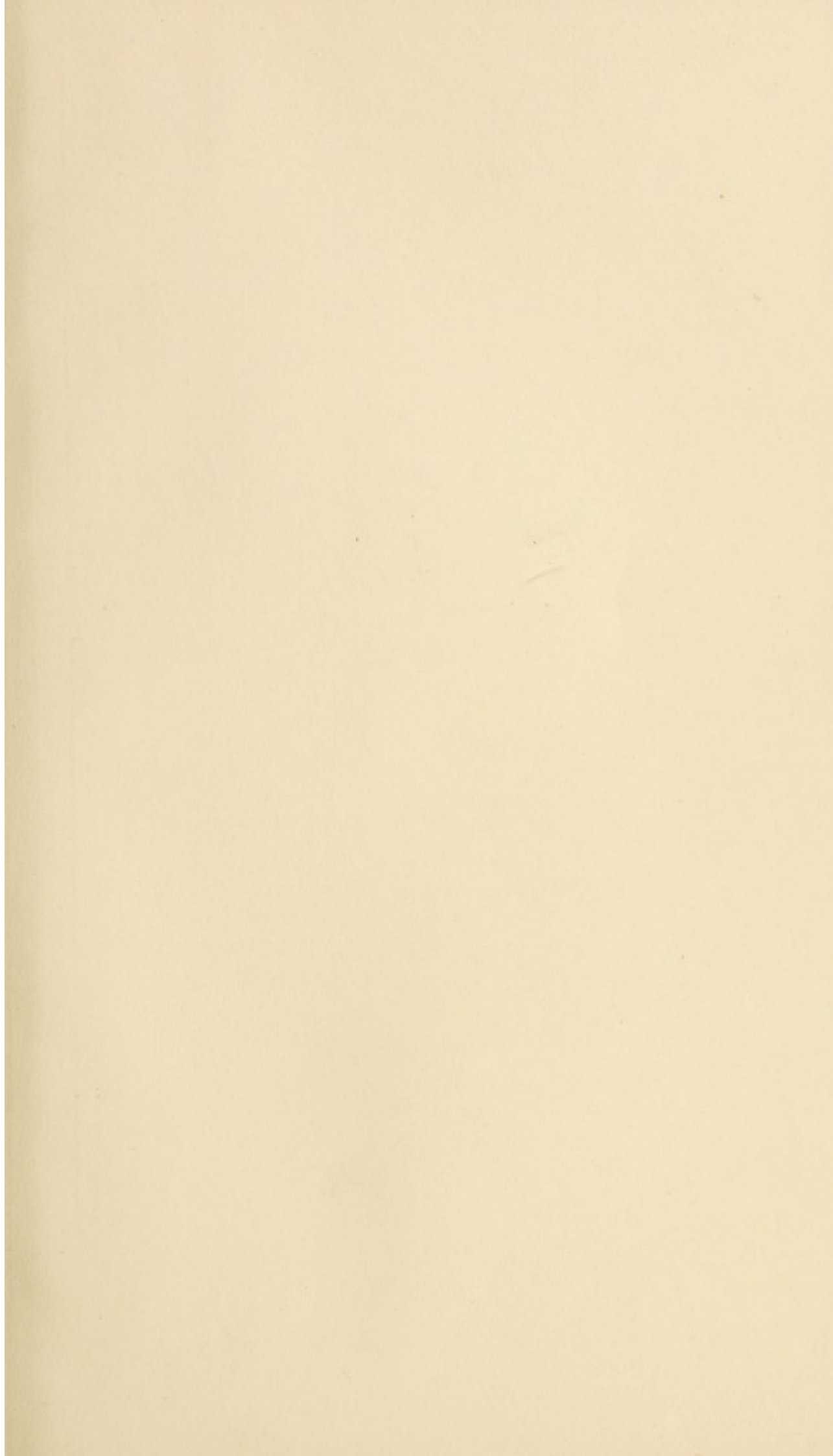
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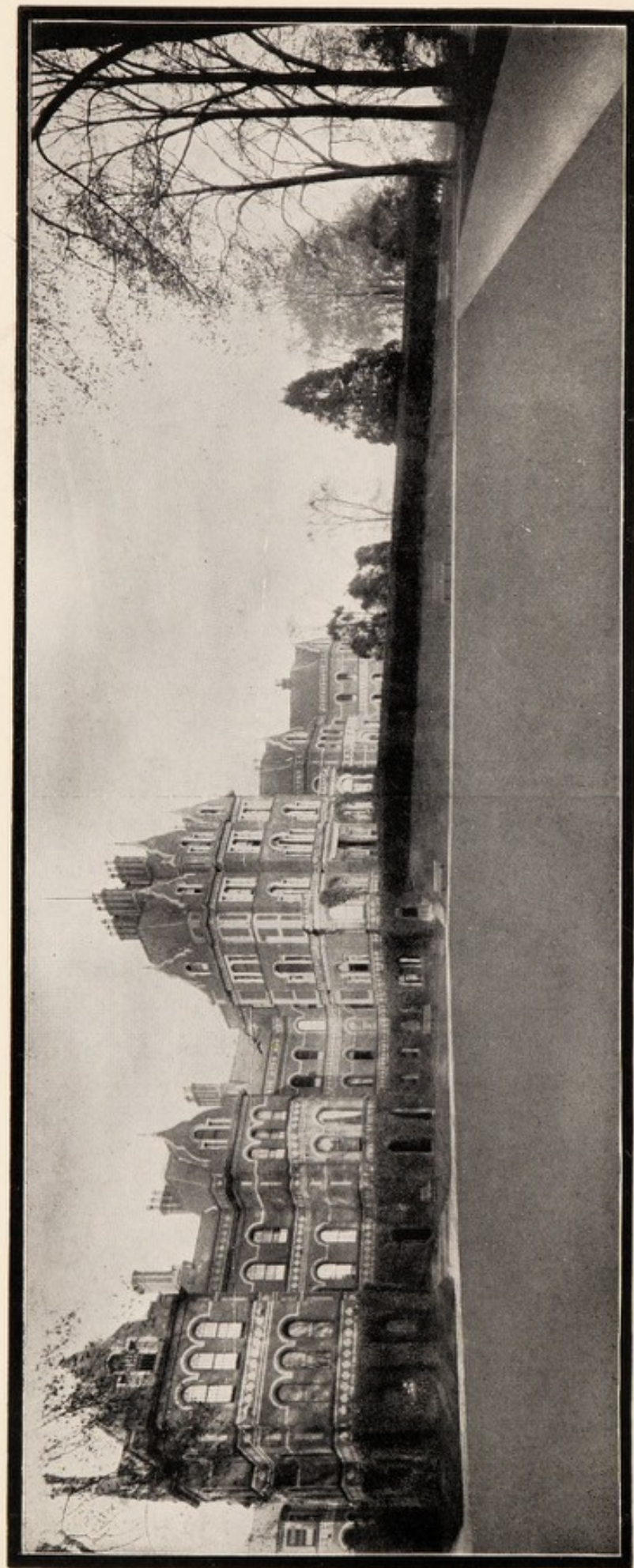

Annual General Meeting

WAS HELD

On THURSDAY, the 25th day of March, 1926,

AT THE HOSPITAL AT 11-30 A.M.

PRESENT :—The Right Hon. The Earl Manvers (President), in the Chair, Lt.-Col. P. R. Clifton, C.M.G., D.S.O., T. L. K. Edge, Esq., D.L., J.P., H. H. Enfield, Esq., T. A. Hill, Esq., J.P., Captain W. F. Player.

Apologies for inability to attend were received from F. Acton, Esq., Sir Dennis Readett-Bayley, Sir Arthur Blake, Brig.-General Sir E. T. Le Marchant, and L. O. Trivett, Esq.

The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting of Subscribers and Donors, held on 19th March, 1925, were read and confirmed.

REPORTS OF COMMISSIONERS OF BOARD OF CONTROL.—Reports of Commissioners of the Board of Control upon their visits on the 9th May and 13th October, 1925, were read.

RESOLVED on the motion of T. L. K. Edge, Esq., seconded by H. H. Enfield, Esq., "That the Reports be approved and ordered to be printed in the Annual Report."

ANNUAL REPORT OF MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.—The Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent was read.

Resolved on the motion of Lieut.-Col. Clifton, seconded by T. A. Hill, Esq., "That the Report be regarded as satisfactory and ordered to be printed in the Annual Report."

ANNUAL REPORT OF GENERAL COMMITTEE.—The Annual Report of the General Committee was presented by T. L. K. Edge, Esq.

Resolved :—"That the Report be approved and adopted, and ordered to be printed in the Annual Report."

FINANCIAL ACCOUNTS.—The audited Balance Sheets for the year ended 31st December, 1925, were produced. The Income was shewn to be £20,371 7s. 1d., and the Expenditure to be £18,969 3s. 8d., an excess of Income over Expenditure of £1,402 3s. 5d. The excess of Income over Expenditure was accounted for, to some extent, to the practise of small economies under various headings, and not to the fact that the income had increased.

Resolved :—"That the Accounts be approved and ordered to be printed in the Annual Report."

PRESIDENT.—Resolved unanimously on the motion of T. L. K. Edge, Esq., seconded by T. A. Hill, Esq., that the Right Hon. The Earl Manvers be appointed President for the ensuing year.

Earl Manvers, in thanking the Committee, stated he would have pleasure in accepting the office.

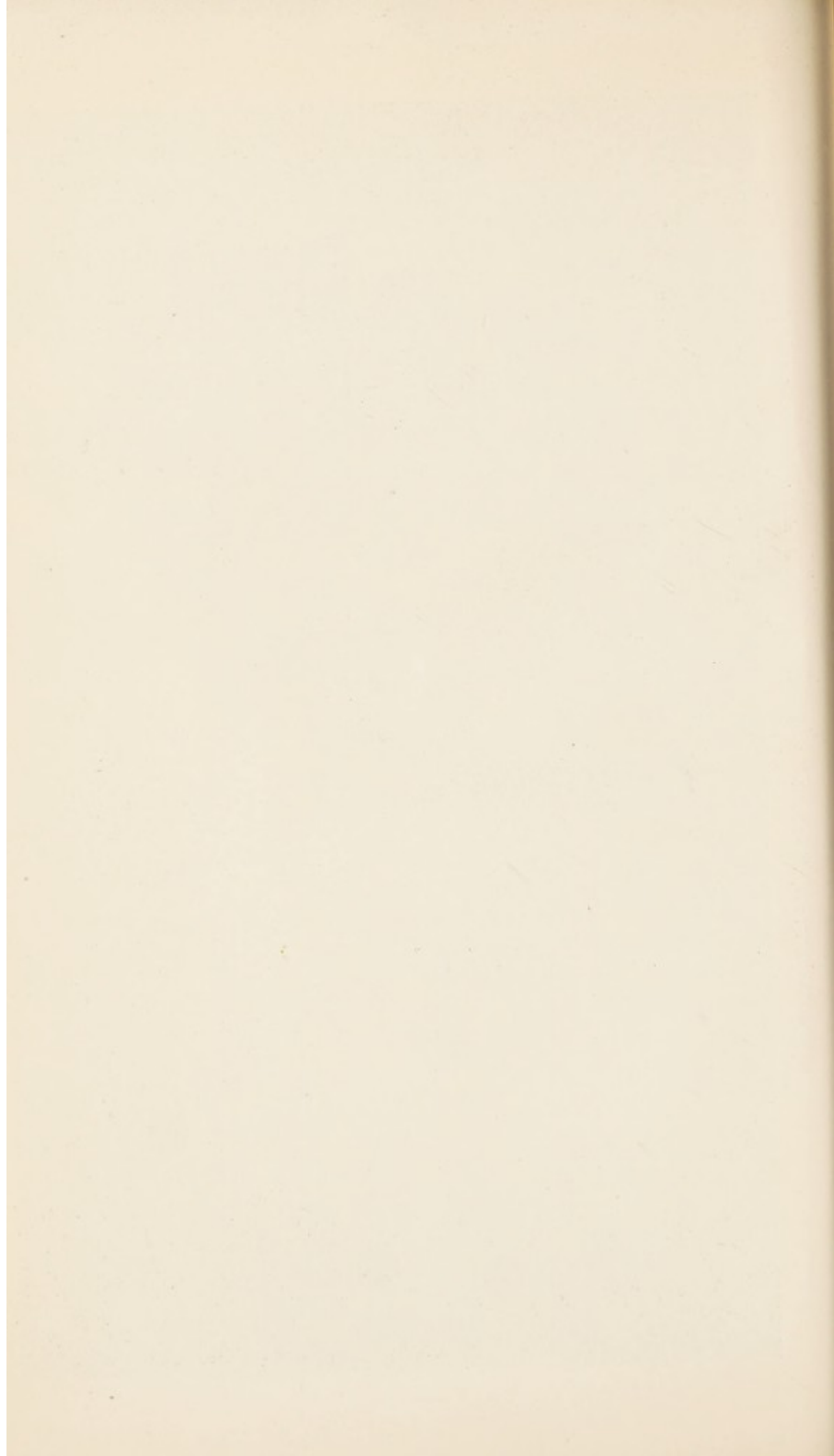

**REPORT OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE
TO THE SUBSCRIBERS AND DONORS.**

YEAR 1925.

In presenting their Report of the work of the Hospital during the year 1925, the Committee are pleased to notice that the special feature they had made of admitting Voluntary Boarders appears to be appreciated and has encouraged early treatment.

The average daily number of patients resident was 88, which is one patient less than the previous year, and five patients less than in 1923 and 1922. Having regard to the enquiries received, it may be that fewer persons have been able to contribute to their own maintenance and have therefore been admitted to rate-aided institutions.

The Committee have fully considered every application received for a reduction of the weekly charge for maintenance; there are at the present moment thirty-three patients being maintained at a lower rate than the standard weekly charge.

DAILY LIFE OF PATIENTS.—Besides the usual occupations, recreations, etc., provided for the patients, Dr. Hunter has installed two sets of wireless receiving apparatus which are in almost continual use during the day and evening ; we are pleased to report that they are greatly appreciated, particularly by the ladies at their afternoon sewing and other parties.

CONDITION OF THE HOSPITAL.—The Hospital is in good order throughout, the standard of interior decoration has been well maintained, also the interior of the building generally. During the year the condition of the roof has received attention and several of the chimneys partly rebuilt. During a spell of exceptionally dry weather the six soft water cisterns under the Laundry were emptied, cleaned and walls cemented where necessary. The steam plant and the laundry machinery has been overhauled, repaired and adjusted, and are in good order.

FIRE EXTINGUISHING ARRANGEMENTS.—The Committee have under consideration, at the request of the Board of Control, a report upon the fire extinguishing arrangements of the Hospital.

MORTON HALL, LOWESTOFT.—Several parties of Ladies and Gentlemen have resided at Morton Hall during the summer.

The whole of the exterior wood and iron work of the Hall has been painted and varnished, and some internal decoration carried out.

The drains of the Hall have been connected with the main sewer of the Lowestoft Corporation.

FINANCIAL.—The Balance Sheet of the Hospital shows an Income of £20,371 7s. 1d., and an Expenditure of £18,969 3s. 8d., resulting in an excess of Income over Expenditure of £1,402 3s. 5d.

This result compares favourably with the previous year, when the Expenditure exceeded the Income by the sum of £702 8s. 7d.

The improved financial result is not due to increased Income but to comparatively small reductions in Expenditure under various headings.

STAFF.—The Housekeeper, Miss M. Savage, resigned during the year, and Miss A. R. Nutter was appointed to the vacancy, commencing duty on the 25th November last.

The Chaplain of the Hospital, Rev. M. J. G. King, resigned his appointment upon accepting the living of Arley, Coventry; the succeeding Vicar of St. Ann's Church, the Rev. W. Leonard B. Caley, M.A., was appointed Chaplain.

The conduct of the Staff generally has been very satisfactory. Some of the nurses have been in the service of the Hospital a very considerable period. To Dr. Hunter the Committee express their thanks and appreciation of the keen interest he takes in modern research and methods of curative treatment.

The Committee wish again to put on record their appreciation of the services of their Clerk—Mr. J. F. Gell—to whom the economical, but at the same time, the efficient working of the Hospital is to a large extent due.

RESIGNATION OF MEMBER.—The Committee regret to report the resignation of the Rev. Robert Holden, a member of the General Committee since 1914.

DEATHS OF GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.—They further regret the death of a Vice-President, Sir Charles H. Seely, Bart. and of the Treasurer, E. Kyrle Smith, Esq.

In concluding their report the Committee desire to state that notwithstanding the improved financial results a considerable amount of work in connection with the replacement of steam heating and hot and cold water supply pipes has been taken in hand by the Hospital staff ; this work carried out gradually during the summer months will, in the course of time, renew the whole system which, after seventy years of use is becoming faulty.

The Committee propose to continue the work in this manner rather than incur a heavy expenditure in one particular year.

REPORTS OF COMMISSIONER OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL.

COPY OF ENTRY IN VISITORS' BOOK.

THE COPPICE, NOTTINGHAM,

May 9th, 1925.

The changes that have taken place amongst the patients since the Hospital was last visited, leave on the books, as patients, the names of 40 gentlemen and 47 ladies, and there are also in residence one gentlemen and two ladies on the footing of voluntary boarders.

Six of the lady patients and two of the gentlemen were away on trial, and one gentlemen was on leave at Morton Hall, but I was able to see all the others this morning.

I found them to be generally very contented, and a number spoke with gratitude of the kind treatment they had received from the doctors and nurses.

The patients admitted since the last visit, and who are still in residence, are properly detained, and the voluntary boarders may properly remain on that footing.

As a rule, some 20 patients attend Divine Service on Sundays, and some 17 the associated entertainments which are held weekly, and about 30 of each sex—all who are really capable—are occupied in some way.

Parole outside the grounds is allowed to 5 gentlemen and 3 ladies, and some 25, 10 gentlemen, and 15 ladies, are taken for drives in the hospital motor cars.

A wireless receiving set is about to be installed and will be available for the patients use, both in the recreation hall and in the patients rooms—I am sure this will be much appreciated by them.

There has been no use of seclusion or mechanical restraint.

The two deaths were both due to natural causes. The average maintenance cost per week last year was approximately £4 4s. 0d. The percentage of patients paying less than 21/- a week was 3·3% ; from 21/- to £2 2s. 0d. 5·5% ; from £2 2s. 0d. up and including the maintenance cost 64·4% ; and 24·4% paid a sum over the cost.

The staff now consists of 13 male and 20 female nurses for day, and of 3 male and 4 female nurses for night duty.

The general health of the Hospital has been good, and I was very satisfied that the patients are receiving all proper care and kindly attention.

I was sorry to hear that Dr. Gane is still away on sick leave. In his absence Dr. Hunter has the assistance of Dr. Barker as locum tenens.

COPY OF ENTRY IN VISITORS' BOOK.

THE COPPICE, NOTTINGHAM.

October 13th, 1925.

Since my last visit 4 ladies and one gentlemen have been admitted as patients ; 6 lady and 4 gentleman patients have been discharged, 3 ladies and one gentlemen having recovered ; and 1 lady and 2 gentlemen patients have died from natural causes.

These changes leave on the books the names of 44 lady and 35 gentlemen patients, and all were in residence to-day, except 4 ladies and 1 gentleman, who were away on trial.

I saw all those in residence, except 1 gentleman, whom I had met previously in the town, and satisfied myself that they are being well cared for and properly detained.

In addition to the patients, there are also in residence 2 ladies and 3 gentlemen on the footing of voluntary boarders. These may properly remain as such, but one lady might have to be removed, should her mental condition seriously deteriorate.

The patients general health has been very good through the summer.

The patients quarters were comfortable and kept in excellent order.

I was glad to hear that Dr. Gane has now been able to return to duty.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT, For the Year 1925.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you the Seventieth Annual Report for the year ending December 31st, 1925, together with the Statistical Tables.

On January 1st, 1925, there were on the books of the Hospital the names of 93 patients (41 gentlemen and 52 ladies). During the year 24 cases were admitted (11 gentlemen and 13 ladies); 25 patients were discharged and 5 died, leaving a total of 87 (41 gentlemen and 46 ladies) on our books on January 1st, 1926.

The average daily number was 88.

THE ADMISSIONS.—Of the 24 admissions 18 were certified and 6 received as voluntary boarders, making 25% admitted without certificates. This is the highest percentage of voluntary patients that the Hospital has received in a year, and points to the growing dislike for the formalities of certification.

Of the certified admissions, 4 were transfers from other Hospitals, and 3 other ladies had been previously certified at least once.

The new cases suffered from the following forms of mental disorder :—Mania in 4 cases ; Melancholia in 6 ; Primary Dementia in 3 ; Delusional Psychosis in 2 ; and General Paralysis in one.

Fifty per cent. of the certified cases admitted were of such a character that complete recovery was practically hopeless, and only one of the cases was admitted within a month from the beginning of the mental attack. In the others the illness had already lasted for periods varying from 3 months to 3 years.

The ages on admission varied 26 to 70, the average being 43.

THE DISCHARGES.—Twenty certified cases were discharged of whom 6 had made good recoveries, and 5 more were relieved sufficiently to return to the care of their relatives. The percentage of recoveries on the direct admissions was for ladies 55, and for gentlemen 20. The duration of the attack in the recovered cases were rather higher than usual, varying from 10 months to 4 years.

THE DEATHS.—Among the certified patients 2 gentlemen and 2 ladies died from natural causes, which call for no special remark. One voluntary boarder, who was in very feeble health on admission, died after a residence of 5 months.

The general health of the Hospital was quite satisfactory during the year. We were again free from epidemic disease and serious accidents.

TREATMENT.—It was not found necessary to employ mechanical restraint in any case.

In my Report for the year 1923, I mentioned the introduction of a method of treatment for the hitherto incurable and fatal disease known as General Paralysis, by the inoculation of the sufferer with malaria. Since that date the method has been generally adopted throughout the country, and the results have been so favourable that it must now be regarded as a justifiable routine treatment. It appears to be most successful when applied in the early stages of the disease.

Another addition to the facilities for treatment is an installation for applying the ultra-violet rays, which should prove helpful in improving the general health and condition, often reduced in mental cases.

During the summer the usual recreations and amusements were provided, such as motor drives, garden parties, tennis, and croquet. In the winter months, dances, card parties, concerts, and cinematograph entertainments were much enjoyed. The installation of wireless has proved a source of entertainment much appreciated. Some of the patients attended entertainments in the town at the theatres and picture houses.

Four parties of patients went to Morton Hall, Oulton Broad, during the summer months for change of air.

The Rev. M. J. G. King, M.A., resigned his chaplaincy on leaving the district, and left behind him many friends amongst both patients and staff. The Rev. W. Leonard B. Caley, M.A., the new Vicar of St. Ann's, was appointed Chaplain in his stead. The usual services have been held in the Hospital, and regular visits paid to the wards. Several patients also attended the Sunday services at St. Jude's Church.

VISITORS.—Dr. A. Rotherham, a Commissioner of the Board of Control, visited the Hospital on May 9th, and again on October 13th. His reports are appended.

Sir Robert Armstrong-Jones and Lord Sandhurst, the Lord Chancellor's Visitors, visited the Chancery patients.

STAFF.—I have again to report that the conduct and work of the staff generally have been excellent. In the male division 93% of the nurses with more than 3 years' service hold the Medal and Certificate of the Royal Medico-Psychological Association, and are State Registered, and the general standard of nursing is high. The usual courses of lectures and demonstrations to the nursing staff have been given.

Miss A. R. Nutter was appointed Housekeeper on the resignation of Miss Savage, and has already proved herself a most zealous and efficient officer.

Miss Anyan and Mr. Ward, the Head Attendants, continue to give untiring and devoted service in promoting the welfare and comfort of the patients.

I have again to thank Mr. Gell, the Clerk to the Governors, for much valuable assistance in the management of the Hospital.

In conclusion, I wish to acknowledge most gratefully the kindness and consideration shown to me on all occasions by the Committee.

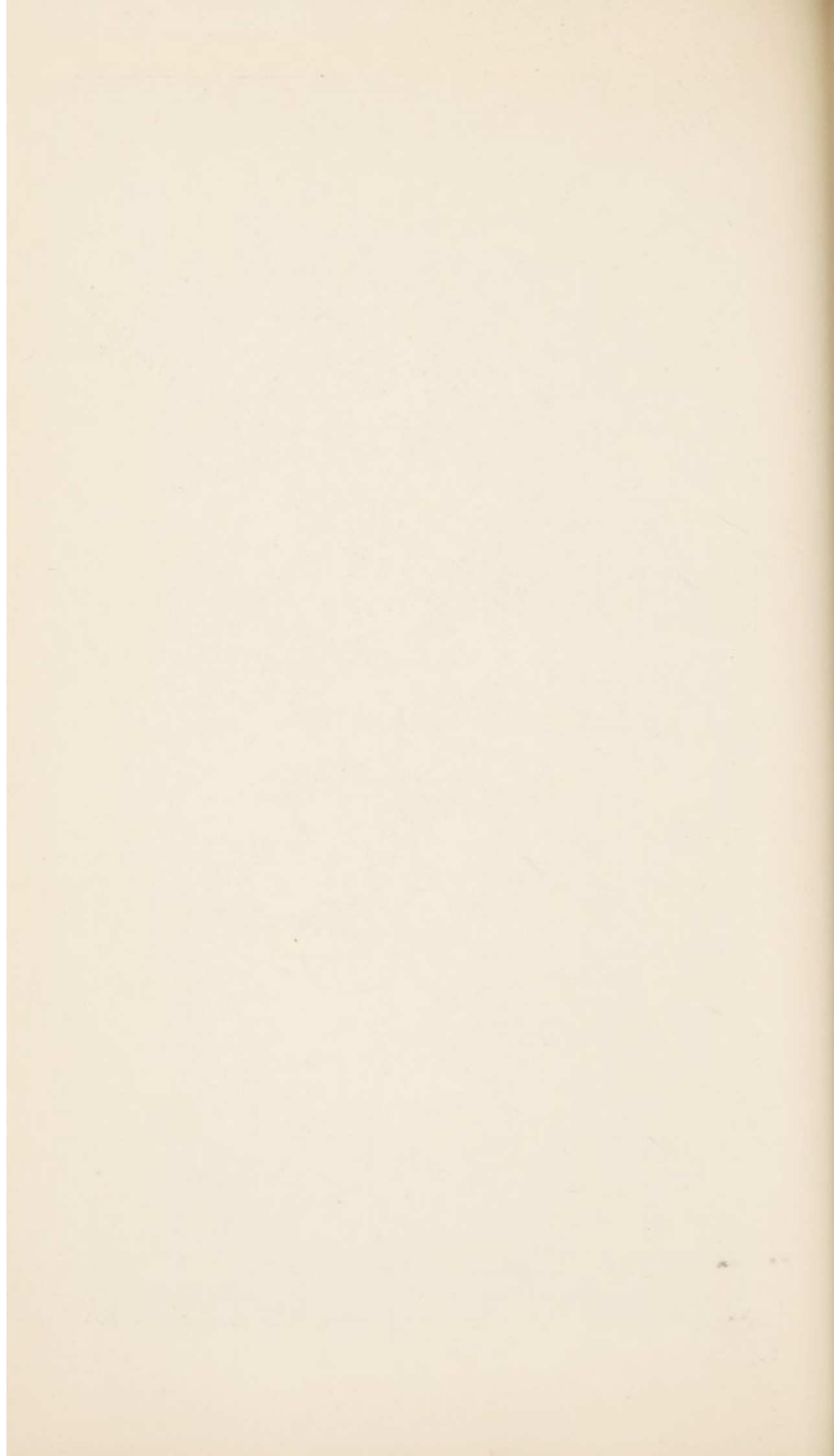

INSTRUCTIONS TO PERSONS APPLYING FOR THE ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

This Institution, for the reception of PRIVATE PATIENTS OF THE MIDDLE AND UPPER CLASSES ONLY, offers special advantages to ladies and gentlemen suffering from the various forms of mental disorder, as it affords, at a moderate charge, the accommodation and comforts suitable to their former social and present mental condition; whilst those whose means are limited are received on terms modified to meet their available income. No publicity whatever is implied as to individual patients by the term "Hospital."

It is beautifully situated a short distance from Nottingham, two miles from the Railway Stations, commands an extensive view of the surrounding country, and from its singularly healthy position affords every facility for the relief and cure of those mentally afflicted. Only a limited number of patients being received, constant supervision can be exercised, and that personal acquaintance with the conditions of each case obtained which is so essential for their treatment and comfort. The utmost attention and care are given in the classification of the Patients according to their habits and different degrees of mental aberration.

Every effort is made to render the Hospital as home-like and comfortable as possible, and to promote the recovery and happiness of the Patients, ample means of occupation and amusement being provided, and concerts, theatricals, lectures, etc., given frequently during the winter season in the entertainment room. There is an excellent Billiard Room, and the Library is well supplied with instructive and amusing books, as well as periodicals and newspapers.

The rooms are large, cheerful, and most comfortably furnished, and the arrangements are, as far as possible, those of an ordinary private house.

It is not a private speculation, but was established many years ago for benevolent objects and not pecuniary gain, and any income accruing in excess of the current expenditure is applied to improvements, and in the reduction of some of the Patients' payments.

Its records furnish gratifying evidence of its past success and usefulness, and it was found necessary to enlarge the building in order to meet the demand for accommodation.

It is managed gratuitously and regularly visited by a Committee of gentlemen of the county and city, who have no pecuniary interest in it, whose sole object is the comfort and welfare of the Patients.

The Medical staff consists of two experienced physicians, both resident. The hospital possesses an efficient staff of attendants and nurses; and is conducted with strict regard to privacy for the Patients. The officers are paid fixed salaries, and there are no fees.

Morning Prayers are said daily, and Divine Service is performed in the Institution every Sunday by the Chaplain, who also visits weekly. A Church is in close proximity, where ample accommodation is provided for the Patients.

There are pleasant walks within the grounds, and the Patients who are sufficiently well take walking exercise and drives in the neighbourhood (a motor car being kept for their use), and the utmost liberty consistent with safety is permitted. During the summer excursions are made to places of interest.

Experience has clearly shown that with a view to their recovery no time should be lost in placing persons mentally afflicted in institutions specially adapted for their treatment.

Applications for the admission of Patients or for information regarding the rates of payment at which Patients are received, etc., must be addressed to Dr. Hunter, the Resident Medical

Superintendent, from whom may be obtained printed forms of the papers necessary to be completed and signed before the Patient can be admitted into the Hospital, and all other information required.

The papers above mentioned are :—

- 1.—**A Petition**, with a **Statement of Particulars** relating to the case, signed, if possible, by a near relative, who has seen the Patient within **fourteen** days before admission, together with two medical certificates, must be presented to a Justice of the Peace, specially appointed, or a Stipendiary Magistrate, or a Judge of County Court. If not presented by a relative, the reason must be stated, and also the connection of the Petitioner with the Patient, and the circumstances under which he presents the Petition.
- 2.—**Two Medical Certificates** on separate sheets of paper, that the Patient is of unsound mind, signed by two Medical Practitioners (**one** of whom must, if practicable, be the usual Medical attendant, if any, of the Patient), who shall have **separately** visited and personally examined the Patient, within **seven** days previous to the presentation of the Petition. If for any reason it is not practicable to obtain a certificate from the usual Medical attendant, the fact must be stated in writing by the Petitioner to the Justice to whom the Petition is presented, such statement to form part of the Petition.
- 3.—**An order for the reception of the Patient** into the Hospital, signed by a Justice of the Peace, specially appointed, or by a County Court Judge, or Magistrate having respectively jurisdiction in the place where the Patient is, who should, if possible, personally see the Patient previous to signing the order. The Patient can only be received **within seven days from** the date of the order.
