

NORTHAMPTON GENERAL LUNATIC ASYLUM.

THE REPORT

OF

THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR 1867.

The Committee of Management are glad to be able again to congratulate the Directors and the public on the continued and increased efficiency and success of the Lunatic Hospital. That success they are bound to attribute to the able and judicious management of Mr. Bayley, the Medical Superintendent, and to the zeal with which all the Officers of the Hospital have performed their several duties.

They would call attention to the large number of county patients—65 out of 180—now regularly working on the Farm, of which the healthful, curative, and profitable results cannot be too highly appreciated. In addition to the number so employed, there are 80 male county patients regularly working at trades and other useful occupations.

The loss of the services of Mr. Hingston, the House Surgeon, it will be difficult to replace: but while the Committee must congratulate him upon his advancement to the higher position of Medical Superintendent of the Isle of Man Asylum, they also feel that a high compliment has been thus paid to this Institution.

The services of the Chapel are so well conducted and highly valued that it becomes difficult to accommodate the increasing numbers of those who attend.

The amusements also offered to the patients by the Band and Concerts, and Theatrical Representations, are heartily entered into by the Officers and Attendants, and afford most valuable varieties to the necessary routine of the daily employments.

A new set of Rules and Regulations for the Officers and Attendants has occupied the attention of the Committee, and after being accepted by a General Court of Directors, has received the sanction of the Secretary of State for the Home Department. Few material changes have been made, but the duties of both Officers and Attendants have been more accurately defined, and every one now has a printed copy of the duties of his department.

The profits of the Hospital have been sufficient to enable us to make many improvements, the most costly of which is a House for the Medical Superintendent. This, it is hoped, will be ready for occupation in the summer, and there will then be at liberty the apartments now occupied by him in the Hospital, which will offer superior, as well as increased, accommodation for first-class private patients.

The other works carried out have been extensive improvements in the apartments occupied by the gentlemen; the erection of a conservatory, a hothouse, a potting shed, and other necessary offices for the kitchen garden; and various minor alterations in

the buildings.

After thirty years' use the whole of the roofs of the various parts of the buildings required careful examination, and they have

now been put into a thorough state of repair.

The total outlay upon the capital account amounts to £1,800. 18s. 9d., of which £1,053 was on account of the new residence. This outlay has been fully met out of the current income.

As regards the prospective outlay upon buildings and improvements, it is considered that, if the numbers do not increase beyond the usual rate, no additional space will be absolutely required during the year 1868.

Various structural improvements are urgently needed on both sides of the House. These were referred to in the Report for 1866, and have only been deferred until the funds of the

Institution would allow of their being carried out.

Some alterations on the male side, to improve the comfort and proper treatment of the worst class of patients, have been already

sanctioned, and will be commenced immediately.

An addition to the laundry has also been sanctioned, the site for which could only be obtained by taking down the carpenter's shop, thus rendering an outlay upon workshops, which has long been under consideration, a subject of pressing importance.

THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

FOR

THE YEAR 1867.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg leave to submit to you the Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent. On January 1st, 1867, there were in the Asylum 209 males and 206 females; total 415. Of these 36 males and 46 females were private, and 173 males and 160 females were county

patients.

During the year 68 males and 76 females, total, 144, have been admitted. Of these 15 males and 16 females were private, and 53 males and 60 females were county patients; 62 have been discharged (of whom 51 had recovered); of these six males and six females were private, and 20 males and 19 females county patients. Nine have been discharged relieved; of these four males and one female were private, and one male and three females county patients; two private patients, one of each sex, were discharged not improved.

Two males and four females private, and 17 male and 22 female

county patients have died.

The number of patients who have been under treatment during the year amounts to 277 males and 282 females; total, 559.

The average number resident has been 433.

There were remaining in the Asylum on January 1st, 1868, 224 males and 225 females, making with one male and two females absent on trial, a total of 452 on the books, being an increase of

37 as compared with the corresponding period of last year.

The statistical tables which I now give, differ from those which have been usually printed with the annual report of the Medical Superintendent of this Asylum. It has long been felt that a more uniform system of statistical tables should be adopted in Asylums, and the tables, as far as table 10, which I now submit to you, are in use in nearly all the County Asylums, and are recommended by the Commissioners in Lunacy. It has been found impracticable to carry these tables back further than the year 1845, there being no accurate records prior to that date.

The past year has been remarkable for the large number of admissions, no less than 144 having been admitted, as compared with 111 in 1866. This is the largest number of patients that has ever been admitted in one year since the Asylum has been opened, the nearest approach being in the year 1858, when the number was 136. This increase has not been limited to the county patients, 31 private patients having been admitted as compared with 20 during the previous year. The majority of these patients have been charged the higher rates of payment which have recently

been adopted by the Committee of Management.

The death rate for the past year has been low, the principal causes of death being general paralysis, epilepsy, phthisis and old age. In my last report I called your attention to the number of aged persons who were sent here suffering simply from senile imbecility. During the past year 15 of the patients admitted have been between 60 and 70 years of age, seven between 70 and 80, and five between 80 and 90. The admission of such patients tends considerably to increase our death rate, and that rather unfairly, as they are generally in such a feeble state when admitted that there is little, if any, chance of improvement. The majority of them might be, and ought to be, I think, kept at home with their friends, or sent to the workhouse; they are generally too feeble to be dangerous, and all they require is a little extra diet and kind nursing.

I am glad, again, to be able to report that there has been no

death from suicide.

An inquest was held on the body of a male county patient, who was found dead in his bed. The boy had been subject to epileptic fits for several years; and the evidence of the attendant who found him dead, and of other patients who were sleeping in the same dormitory, together with the result of a post mortem examination of the body, left no doubt as to the cause of death, and a verdict of "Death from epilepsy" was returned.

Two accidents have occurred, both on the male side of the house. On the 2nd February, W. G., an epileptic patient, fell down in a fit and fractured his arm; and on the 18th September, J. B., a patient who had for many years been employed in carrying sticks to the cellar, slipped down and fractured his leg. Both cases have

gone on favourably, and are now convalescent.

23 patients have attempted to escape. For the most part they have been re-captured after but a few hours' absence, many before they were clear of the grounds. On the 1st March, H. L., a county patient, escaped, and was not heard of again for nearly a fortnight, when he applied for relief at the Brixworth Union, was recognised, and brought back to the Asylum.

Seclusion has been seldom required, and has been limited almost

entirely to a few cases of violent epileptic mania.

It has been found necessary on three occasions to fasten female patients to their beds, in order that proper surgical appliances might be used. The first case was that of Miss R., a private patient, who was admitted on May 26th, with a cut throat, and suffering from acute mania. She was most violent, constantly attempting to tear the wound open, and she refused her food. She died from exhaustion

on June 3rd. The second case was that of M. A., a county patient, who was admitted in May, suffering from puerperal mania and an abscess in the breast. She refused to allow any remedies to be applied, and it was, therefore, found necessary to tie her hands to the sides of the bed. This was done from May 31st till July 2nd; she rapidly improved, and has been discharged recovered. The third case was that of Miss A., a private patient, who is subject to severe attacks of bleeding from the nose. One of these came on when she was suffering from acute mania, and it was found necessary to plug her nostrils in order to stop the bleeding, and as she persisted in removing the plugs, she was obliged to be restrained for a short time in the same manner as has been described in the other cases.

The general health of the patients has been good, and I am happy to be able to report the absence of any epidemic in the

wards.

Reference to Table 14 will prove that the employment of patients of both sexes in useful occupation is still carried out with great success. Between 70 and 80 men are constantly working on the farm and grounds, which are cultivated and kept in order entirely by the labour of patients, under charge of ward attendants, no paid labourer being employed. About 40 male patients are also employed in the different trades' departments.

On the female side of the house, in the kitchen and laundry, between 50 and 60 patients are constantly employed, and upwards of 100 in needlework, ward-cleaning, and other domestic occu-

pations.

The improvements and alterations which have been effected in the wards on the male side of the house have added much to the comfort of the patients, and the new billiard and smoking-room is much used and appreciated by them. The front galleries on this side of the house are now in a very satisfactory state, and I hope 'ere long to be able to report the same of all the other wards, in most of which improvements have been sanctioned, and are being gradually carried out.

Amusements and entertainments of various kinds have continued to form an important part of the treatment. In addition to the Asylum Amateur Dramatic Company, which I mentioned in my last report, a Glee Class has been formed, consisting, also, entirely of attendants, servants, and patients, under the direction of the

chief attendant.

It affords me pleasure to be able to state that the conduct of the attendants and servants has been, on the whole, satisfactory. The changes have not been numerous, and many of those who have left have taken better situations or married.

The valuable assistance and cordial co-operation of the officers have tended much to relieve me in the performance of my own

duties.

THE REPORT

OF

THE CHAPLAIN

FOR

THE YEAR 1867.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

It is perhaps well that I should year after year have to report that nothing very startling has happened in my department, because it proves that no hindrances have been placed in my way, and no dissatisfaction exists.

From time to time I have laid the wants of my people before your Committee, and have been well supplied with Bibles, Prayerbooks, Hymn-books, Tracts for sick people, and other necessaries for Church and School.

At the present moment we are greatly in need of an addition to our Library, which I have no doubt would have been also provided, if I had been able to comply with a request "that I would furnish the Committee with a list of the books required;" but this I could not do, because I should hesitate to recommend any book without a very careful examination of its contents; and even if I had in this town facilities for such an examination, which I have not, a long list of new books would cost more money than I am prepared to ask for the purpose. The only plan which recommends itself to my judgment is to examine the stocks of good second-hand booksellers, and to select from them.

Our Church services, both on Sundays, Saints' Days, and week days have been regularly performed. It has always been our custom to have two full services and two sermons on Sundays, with a selection from the prayers on week days, but during the past year forty-three extra full services have been performed, and twenty-five sermons preached on Saints' Days, in accordance with a resolution of the Committee to that effect.

Of the nurses and attendants who have assisted me in the choir at these services I feel bound to report that they have enabled me to provide a service which has given the greatest satisfaction to all the inmates of this Institution. Whatever may be said of musical services elsewhere, there can be no reasonable doubt that here they are of the greatest possible advantage. If but one canticle is read, or one hymn omitted, I hear complaints on all sides. If any should think that it matters little what service is provided, or what sermon is preached to people of unsound mind, I can assure them that they are greatly in error, that no congregation can be more attentive, nor any sermons more sharply criticised.

To one great success I think I am entitled to lay claim, viz.,

the school on the female side.

Together with this Report I lay before you specimens of copybooks belonging to patients whom we have taught to read and write. These are but a tithe of the whole work done at school, because many of our scholars have left us, taking their books with them, and others have passed through many steps to the advanced

stage at which they have now arrived.

It gives me great pleasure to be able to make this announcement, because, when this school was tried three years ago, it was a failure. I attribute its success to two causes: first, the careful selection made by Mr. Bayley of suitable patients, thereby avoiding the rock on which we split before, viz., the mixing up of all sorts and all ages; and the second, the devotion to her work of Harriet Holt, the nurse wisely selected by Mr. Bayley to assist me. To this young woman more than to myself is to be attributed the success which these copy books attest. If I speak to patients, however gently, they are very apt to become excited, and if I repeated my advice, it would probably lead to no good result; they are nervous with those who are not accustomed to direct them, so I just give my opinion and pass on. Harriet Holt then takes them in hand, echoes my words, and, being used to her voice and manner, they readily comprehend and obey.

To the Medical Superintendent, Matron, House Surgeon, and Secretary, I have to offer my thanks for their cordial assistance, and to the members of the Managing Committee for their kind

attention to all our wants.

Tea—1 oz. of tea, 3 oz. sugar, and ½ pint new milk. Coffee—3 oz. of coffee, 5 oz. sugar, and ¾ pint of new milk.

Per pound.

Meat pie-2 oz. uncooked meat, 12 oz. uncooked potatoes, 5 oz. flour, with dripping.

Irish Stew—2 oz. meat, 10 oz. potatoes, seasoned with pepper, salt, and onions. The liquor of the previous day's boiled meat is added to the Irish stew.

EXTRAS FOR INDUSTRIOUS PATIENTS.

Female Patients employment in the Laundry, the workers on the Farm, Artizans, Ward and Household Helpers, have four ounces of bread, one ounce of cheese, and a pint of beer extra, daily.

Tobacco and Snuff are also allowed to Industrious Patients.

Wine, Porter, and Extra Diet are allowed to the sick at the diseretion of the Superintendent.

PRIVATE PATIENTS.

Weekly allowance per Patient.

- Males.—6 lbs. uncooked meat, 7 lbs. uncooked vegetables, 7 lbs. bread, 12 oz. cheese, 10½ pints of beer, 8 oz. butter, 2 oz. tea, 8 oz. sugar, 1½ pint new milk, pudding four times a week, fish, poultry, and fruit when in season; besides extra diet if required.
- ATTENDANTS.—Same allowance, except fish and poultry, with the addition of 3½ pints of beer,
- FEMALES.—4½ lbs. uncooked meat, 7 lbs. uncooked vegetables, 5¼ lbs. bread, 12 oz. cheese, 7 pints of beer, 8 oz. butter, 2 oz. tea (or 1 oz. tea and 4 oz. coffee), 8 oz. sugar, 1½ pint new milk; pudding four times a week, fish, poultry, and fruit when in season; besides extra diet if required.

NURSES .- Same allowance, except fish and poultry.

TERMS OF ADMISSION

FOR

PRIVATE PATIENTS.

This Institution is pleasantly situated in a healthy locality, within a short distance of the town of Northampton, being one mile from the railway station, and affords good accommodation for the reception of Private Patients.

The rooms are cheerful, airy, and spacious, and the grounds, which are extensive, are well planted, and command most pleasing

prospects, looking over the Valley of the Nene.

The management, being presided over by a Committee of Noblemen and Gentlemen, and conducted by experienced Officers, who have no interest but the welfare of the Patients and the usefulness of the Institution, the security and protection of a public establishment, under vigilant supervision, are combined with the comforts and advantages of a home.

The Chaplain is in daily attendance, to administer consolation

and instruction, in addition to the ordinary religious services.

Ample means of amusement and occupation are provided, and every method resorted to for the amelioration of the condition of the afflicted inmates. The utmost liberty, consistent with safety, is permitted, and carriage exercise provided for those requiring it.

The Friends of Patients are invited to satisfy themselves of the condition of their relatives, and the treatment they receive, by

making frequent visits to the Institution.

Patients not connected with the county of Northampton are received at £1. 11s. 6d. per week, but where the Friends of Patients cannot afford to pay this rate, the Committee have authority to reduce the same, according to the circumstances of the case.

Patients resident in the county of Northampton are received at One Guinea a week, where more cannot be afforded, and the Committee have power to reduce this rate, according to the circumstances of each case.

The terms include board, lodging, washing, medical advice, medicines, and all other necessaries; clothing, and wines and spirits only excepted. Terms to include the latter items may be proposed.

The above-named rates secure good accommodation in all respects, but there are superior apartments, for which higher

payments are necessary.

One quarter's payment is made at the time of admission, and

the payments are afterwards made quarterly, and in advance.

Any further information can be had on applying, either personally or by letter, to the Medical Superintendent, at the Asylum, who will also furnish the necessary Forms required by the Acts of Parliament.
