TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

GENTLEMEN,

The number of Patients received into this Asylum in the year 1861 (Males 75 Females 73, Total 148,) is in excess of the usual number. The average number of admissions, in five years, has been 141 in each year. The number of persons re-admitted within 12 months of their discharge (nine) is not large in comparison with previous years; and the number of those who had been in the Asylum in former years is about as usual, (fourteen) The

number of Patients removed from other Asylums in consequence of chargeability in these Counties, (10 Patients,) is large.

The County of Warwick had allowed Patients, who belonged to Parishes in the County of Oxford, to remain in the Asylum at Hatton in consequence of this Asylum being so short of accommodation. The Warwickshire Asylum is now so restricted of room that it became requisite to have all the out County Patients removed. A Patient was sent from the Asylum for the County of Sussex under similar circumstances.

At the opening of the year 1861—the number of Patients in this Asylum had been reduced by the removal at different periods, of Patients of the adjacent district to the Asylum for the County of Buckingham. Enquiry was made of the Visitors of this Asylum, whether they desired to hire an additional number of Beds. They accepted the offer and sent six more Male Patients;—forming a Total of 18 Males, and 12 Females; 30 Persons. Although there had been pressure for the want of

space in the Female Wards of this Asylum, the number of Patients was, at the date of the Committee Meeting, reduced. Twenty beds were then vacant, and it was improbable that inconvenience would be felt previously to the close of the year. It happened that in the month of September the number of beds allowed for the reception of Female Patients were occupied. The Asylum at Stone was then not able to receive any addition to the number of Female Patients which the Visitors of this Asylum had sent there.

On the last day of the year 1861 this Asylum contained two Male Patients less, and fourteen Female Patients more than on the first day of January, (subsequently the Commissioners in Lunacy have visited Union Houses in the County of Berks and ordered the removal of two Male and three Female Patients to this Asylum.)

At the close of the year 1861, the Visitors had under their charge 18 Patients more than at its commencement. (viz. 4 Males and 14 Females. Increase at Stone 6.)

The condition of Patients sent to the Asylum in the year was lower ; as regards their state of health and liability to recover, than in previous years. The Patient whose progressive failure is manifest at the time of reception is likely to come from home rather than from the Union House. It may be that the period following a bad harvest will account for a generally depressed condition of health among the poor ; but I have, on former occasions, had need to notice the increasing number of such Patients who have been sent to the Asylum. I believe that increase to denote the progress of Charity in the use of what it finds to be a practically economical exercise of its functions. Yet the greater evidence of efficient Charity ; the number of persons who have been discharged on their recovery is proportionally diminishing.

The Deaths in the Asylum have become, numerically, more important than the discharges.

Forty-seven Patients were discharged on recovery ; (viz. Twenty-five Males, and Twenty two Females ;) and six being sufficiently relieved, to be taken care of at their own homes

or at the Union Houses; one of whom has been sent back to the Asylum.

Seventy Patients, have died within the year; (viz. Thirty-six Males and Thirty-four Females,) of whom one Male Patient died in the Asylum at Stone. Being at the rate of 10 per cent.

Of the incidents affecting the mortality it may be noticed that as regards age; four persons were 75 years of age, five between 75 and 80 and four were 80 years of age or upwards. That Twenty-five persons died within six months of their admission to the Asylum. That of 153 Patients, subject to Epilepsy, 24 died. Of whom one Male and one Female died by Asphyxia, by the Epileptic convulsion. The Coroner held an Inquest on both these cases.

A man in his 76th year fell in a fit of Epilepsy—to which he was subject, and fractured his thigh. At his age, his power of repairing the injury was impaired; he suffered from confinement to his bed; the recurrence of his fits shook him, and he died between five and six weeks after the accident. He was in the

earlier part of his illness quite sensible, and was throughout it frequently visited by his relations.

No other more serious accident than the fracture of the Collar Bone happened during the year to any other Patient by falling in a fit in the Asylum.

E. D. who had been some time in the Asylum, had previously received a burn, by falling into the fire in a Fit. The wound of the fore-arm had never healed; the Bones had become diseased, and in the night fractured. Amputation was the only remedy.

E.B. an Epileptic Idiot, had Scrofulous disease of the Elbow Joint, which would not admit of satisfactory treatment, or hope of cure. She needed to undergo a similar operation. In both cases the assistance of Mr. Hester the Consulting Surgeon of the Asylum was asked for. He attended and performed the operations. Both cases did well; the recurrence of Fits caused some anxiety in both cases. E. D. especially gave much trouble by the dislocation of her lower jaw while in the convulsion of Epilepsy. The accident occurred twice

while the wound of the amputation was unhealed. As the recurrence of Fits produced a condition of Chronic Spasm of the Muscles, the reduction of the dislocation was difficult.

A Female Patient complained to me of injury received from her Attendant. It appeared that the Attendant in order to master the fancies and impulse of the Patient, gave her a warm bath and intended to pour cold water over her head. The Patient knowing that the course of treatment was not in the orderly routine of the Asylum, resisted. The Attendant called others to her assistance, and gave the Bath. It appeared on examination that the Patient had received a dislocation of the shoulder which she attributed to direct violence from her Attendant. The latter had been five years in the Asylum Service, and had always, previously, maintained a character for great kindness to her Patients. She had in this case incurred the charge of ill treatment, and was responsible for what had occurred. She was immediately suspended from her duties, and she gave up her situation. The dislocation was easily reduced and the Patient has suffered no other ill consequence.

Violence was also committed by two Male Attendants on a Patient, by which he was bruised and had much reason of complaint. The Visitors meeting, on the day following, investigated the transaction, and summarily dismissed the two Attendants.

The occupation of Patients has been as in former years. The number of Patients who have intelligence enough to be trusted in Horticulture has been less. The benefit to be derived from such occupation is rather to the Patient who has strength to recover, than to one whose progress is in the reverse direction.
