THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE  
OF VISITING JUSTICES OF THE COUNTY LUNATIC  
ASYLUM, STAFFORD,  
PRESENTED TO THE COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS,  
30TH DECEMBER, 1878.

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During the year, 279 Lunatics have been admitted, of whom 174 were males (this includes 39 removed from the Worcester Asylum) and 105 females; 117 have been discharged recovered, of whom 51 were males and 66 females: 12 males and 12 females have been discharged to the custody of their friends, 1 child has been transferred to the Burntwood Asylum, 1 male transferred to another Asylum, 3 females transferred to Workhouses, 49 males and 19 females have died, 3 males and 1 female were discharged, no signs of insanity being detected by the Medical Officers, leaving in the Asylum 595—viz., 319 males and 276 females.

The average of the recoveries on admissions has been at the rate of 41 per cent., and the average of the deaths on the total numbers under treatment at 8 per cent. The recoveries show an increase of 11 per cent., and the deaths a decrease of 7 per cent. on the previous year.

There are 1116 Lunatics belonging to the County in the Asylums—viz., 593 at Stafford and 523 at Burntwood—showing an increase of 25 during the year.



There are vacancies at the Stafford Asylum for 40 males, but the female side is full. At the Burntwood Asylum the male side is full, but there are vacancies for 6 females.

In November the Sanitary Wards were opened, and the patients belonging to the County were removed from the Worcester Asylum. These Wards, when not used for infectious cases, will accommodate about 80 males, and thus, for the present, relieve the wants of the County on the male side.

The gas mains have been altered, the steamers in the cooking kitchen put into the best working order, a new gas stove has been erected, and the alterations in the gallery floors still continue under the direction of your Committee.

The County Surveyor reports the main portion of the building to be in a good and substantial condition; but the slates on the three-storey buildings will have to be replaced, as they are perishing and becoming porous.

The charge for patients has been at the rate of 9s. 9d. per head per week, but in consequence of the cheapness of bread and other provisions your Committee have lowered the rate to 9s. 4d. for the past quarter.

Your Committee have much pleasure in again recording its sense of the able management of the Superintendent and the good conduct of the officers and servants.

## REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

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County Asylum, Stafford,  
3rd June, 1878.

Since the Commissioners in Lunacy last visited this Asylum, several grants of money have been made at Sessions for important improvements in several directions, some of them at least in accordance with recommendations made by Members of our Board, but these works have been properly suspended, except in regard to alterations in gas supply and the purchase of certain furniture and fittings, until the Committee shall have fully considered the possibility of acquiring and the propriety of purchasing certain land contiguous to the Asylum estate.

Works executed, which we deem it right to notice, are the completion of the general Bathroom on the female side, and the admission of more light into the basement ward occupied by the more turbulent women, the flooring of which has been altered from flags of stone to pitch-pine. This ward has also been made more cheerful by paint and linoleum, and it is better warmed than was formerly the case.

The detached block is not finished, but the greater part of the building is roofed in, and we understand that it will be ready for occupation next winter. Workmen are engaged in taking up the flooring of No. 3 female gallery in the main building, and replacing the mortar with planks; it was the last mortar floor which existed in the Asylum. This proceeding in No. 3 has necessitated the removal of its occupants to other wards temporarily,



consequently there is much over-crowding in the female division, more so than on the men's side.

The women are only two in excess of the men. The total number of patients on the books is 538, no one of whom was absent on leave at the time of our inspection: we therefore saw all, and as usual we spoke to very many. The women were in their wards and airing courts. The bulk of the male patients—viz., 194—we saw at dinner in the hall; the meat-pie and beer served to them we tasted; both were good and the rations were liberal in quantity. Of the patients' behaviour in our presence we can report favourably; the men were especially quiet and orderly in conduct. The dress of both sexes was suitable for the season of the year, clean, and tidy.

We learnt from the Assistant Medical Officer (in the absence for a few days of the Superintendent) that our colleagues' suggestion, as to a better supply of warm dresses for the women, had been carried out, and we heard no complaint uttered about clothing this year by any female.

The epileptics are 45 men and 51 women. There are 30 male and 6 female patients the subjects of general paralysis; and 67 men and 64 women are reported to be suicidally disposed. The worst cases of the first and last class are provided with sleeping accommodation in the attics of the Asylum, and each sex has a special night-watch, who sits up amongst them, but structural difficulties prevent proper continuous supervision: these difficulties are greater in the male than in the female dormitories. The day attendants are 21 men and 21 women; of the former 6, of the latter 9, have served less than twelve months.

Making enquiry into the arrangements for Divine Service, we ascertained that the Chapel Services attract about 130 of the patients of each sex on Sundays, and that there are 39 Roman Catholics to whom a priest has



ready access ; but these last have not, as we think they should have, opportunity of assembling regularly for worship.

There is, we are glad to report, still a School attendance of as many as 53 patients ; and the associated entertainments bring together about 160 men and rather more women.

We visited the laundry, kitchen, and workshops, as usual ; but in these directions we noticed nothing special for mention, beyond a recent alteration of the foul-linen wash-house for the men's clothing. Thirty-eight females are employed in the laundry, besides the paid washer-women.

There has been a slight decrease since last visit, it seems, in the number of male patients usefully employed on the grounds, in trades, and as ward cleaners ; but returns in regard to females employed are about the same as they were in 1877. There are no private patients here. Besides the patients cared for in this and the other Asylum for the County, there are 40 Staffordshire pauper cases at Worcester. The admissions into this establishment since our colleagues were here have been 305—viz., 167 of men, 138 of women. 208 cases have been discharged ; the female division furnished 108 of them. 72 men and 30 women have died.

Only 28 post-mortem examinations have taken place. This is a matter of regret ; but while the mortuary remains in its present state there is much excuse for the medical staff. We hope that when the room set apart for dissection in the detached block shall have become available, different figures will represent the post-mortem examinations at this Asylum.

The general health of the patients is good. Two only of each sex were in bed. There has been no treatment in the shape of restraint in the female division ; but one man was once dealt with for surgical reasons,



two on single occasions to prevent self-mutilation, and one male patient seven times to check his homicidal and suicidal efforts. For maniacal excitement, 13 men on 88 occasions, and for surgical purposes, 2 men on 4 occasions have been secluded ; and on the female side the seclusions recorded are 63 of 36 patients for excitement, 15 cases of epileptic furor included, besides 25 voluntary seclusions of three women.

The causes of deaths in the medical records, since the date of the Commissioners' visit in 1877, include 32 from general paralysis and one suffocation in an epileptic fit, which was the subject of correspondence with our Board ; the rest were ordinary. One of the men in bed, while we were in the wards, was suffering from erysipelas in the face ; but there have been no other instances of that disorder.

During our examination of the Asylum we could observe no want of proper ventilation ; but some of the water-closets are ill-constructed for the admission of fresh and exit of foul air, and we were glad to hear that Mr. Pater proposes, while adding to their number, to arrange for better ventilation in some wards.

The general state of the interior of the Asylum is very good ; but we trust that the re-papering and re-painting, which are observable in the Male Infirmary and No. 1 Female Ward, will be extended soon to other galleries and rooms.

The bedding which we inspected was everywhere clean and satisfactory.

## REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

---

During the year 1878, 279 patients were admitted. Of these, 80 had been inmates of the Asylum at some previous time, including 39 returned from the Worcester Asylum on the completion of the new buildings.

Of the people admitted, 91 were of suicidal tendencies, 192 were described as dangerous to others, 30 were between the ages of 60 and 80, and 36 were epileptics. Sixty-six of the two latter classes, with many others in advanced stages of disease, were brought with but little prospect of any permanent relief and no hope of cure. Had they been kept in the Workhouses they would have required trained and paid attendance and had they been left in their homes they could not have been properly dealt with, in many instances would have been dangerous both to themselves and to the public. None of them could, in my opinion, and in the absence of any means of treating them elsewhere, have been safely or humanely cared for out of an Asylum.

The per-centage of cures is above the Asylum average. The death-rate has diminished. This latter is due to the large decrease in the fatality from general palsy, there having been only 17 deaths from this cause, as against 29 in 1877; to the numbers on which the per-centage is



calculated having been increased by those returned from Worcester; and to the fact that no chronic cases have been removed to other Asylums to make way for acute cases subject to a higher degree of mortality.

The apparent causes of insanity in the admissions of last year have been ascertained in 204 instances. The principal factors were hereditary tendency and drink. Fourteen attacks were the effects of drink alone, nine of drink combined with hereditary predisposition; 42 resulted from hereditary predisposition alone, and 11 from other causes associated with that tendency; 30 were the result of old age and decay of brain power, and in the 36 epileptics, the insanity was mostly congenital.

The house has been generally healthy, and the deaths have all been from ordinary disease except one—a case of strangulated hernia in a man aged 77, which ended fatally after the strangulation had been relieved by operation. No grave accidents have occurred during the year, and none which could have been foreseen or prevented. The Coroner has considered it necessary to hold only one inquest.

In a household composed largely of those suffering from a propensity to self-injury, and of those liable to the severer forms of epileptic fits, highly dangerous and subject to no moral control (there are 155 of the former and of the latter 118), it is a matter of congratulation that so few accidents have occurred. That such has been the case has been due to the unceasing watchfulness of the officers and attendants.

No. 3 female ward gallery and bedrooms have been papered and painted, and the stucco floor, which was in a bad state of repair, replaced by wood. No. 5 female ward gallery and bedrooms have been papered and painted. The male infirmary gallery, day rooms, and bedrooms have been painted.

A new associated bath-room, containing five baths,

has been opened on the male side. The bathing is now done with much more facility than formerly, and the head attendant can efficiently supervise it.

The new detached wards are occupied by 45 men.

The conduct of the attendants, nurses, and servants has been, with rare exceptions, satisfactory, and but few changes have taken place among them.

To my colleague, Mr. Turner, and to the other officers, my best thanks are due for the valuable assistance they have afforded me in the discharge of my duties.
