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REPORT

OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE

COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

SURREY LUNATIC ASYLUM,

FOR THE YEAR 1849,

PRESENTED TO THE

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS,

HELD AT REIGATE, APRIL 9, 1850.

The Committee of Visitors, in presenting to the Court their Eighth Annual Report, beg to state, that the number of patients in the Asylum at the commencement of the year was 400; and during the year 441 additional patients were admitted, making a total of 841: of whom, 39

males and 29 females have been discharged cured; 2 males and 9 females have been discharged uncured, and placed under the care of their friends, or removed to Asylums in other Counties,—and 26 males and 35 females have died; leaving in the Asylum, on the 31st December, 701 patients, of whom 304 were males and 397 females.

The average number of patients attending Chapel has been 278; and an average of 335 has been constantly employed on the farm, or in the garden, or within the walls of the Establishment.

The new buildings for the accomodation of additional patients have been finished, and provided with suitable fittings, furniture, and outfit; and all the airing courts and roads in connexion with them have been completed. The Committee abstain from any observations respecting the circumstances which led to the enlargement of the Asylum, and the expences that have been incurred in the execution of the work, as these have been already submitted to the Court in a Special Report.

The whole Establishment is now open for the

admission of patients; and there is reason to believe that it is capable of containing all the lunatics in the County, for whom admission will be required. The necessity, however, for the great extent of additional buildings that have recently been erected, is rendered obvious, by the fact that not fewer than 441 patients have been brought to the Asylum and admitted during the past year.

The admission of so large a number in so short a time occasioned much anxiety and additional labour to all the Officers of the Establishment, who were required to study the nature of the complaint in each case with a view to its proper classification and treatment; and at the same time were obliged to instruct and train a large number of additional attendants, who, though selected with the greatest care, had only been a short time in the Asylum; it is, however, particularly gratifying to the Committee to be able to state, that these and all the other duties of the Officers have been discharged with an intelligence, a zeal, and a kindness, which cannot be too highly commended; and it is only just to the Attendants, Nurses, and other servants of the Asylum to observe, that their diligence and general good conduct, during this important

year, has been such as to entitle them to favorable consideration.

The opening of the additional buildings having operated as the commencement of a new era in the management of the Asylum, it became necessary on the part of the Committee to revise the duties, and the salaries and wages of all the Officers and Servants of the Establishment. The salaries and wages determined on and now paid, will be found in an annexed table: and in fixing the several amounts the Committee have been desirous of allowing sufficient, and not more than sufficient, to secure the services of persons competent to perform the important duties that would be required of them, and worthy in every respect of being entrusted with the care of a class of our fellow creatures so deeply afflicted as are the inmates of a County Lunatic Asylum.

The Committee have devoted much time and attention to the formation of a series of new Regulations for the management of the Establishment.

The statute, the 8 & 9 Vic. cap. 126, directs that two kinds of Rules shall be provided for the government of every County Asylum.

1st, General Rules,—which are to be approved of by one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, after which they are "to be printed, abided by, and observed."

2nd, Regulations and Orders,—in which, among other matters, are to be set forth the number and description of Officers and Servants, with their duties and salaries. Under the first of these heads, an extensive list of Rules, embracing all the principles now admitted to be indispensable in the government of institutions for the insane, have been prepared, and, having received the approval of the Secretary of State for the Home Department, are now in force in the Asylum.

The Regulations and Orders are still under consideration, and will shortly be completed, immediately after which they will be printed and circulated with the General Rules throughout the County.

The number of patients discharged cured during the year, has been much greater than the usual average, and it has occurred chiefly amongst patients who had recently been received from private asylums.

It is the source of much gratification to the Committee, that they are enabled, without cost to the County or the Parishes, to present a gratuity to every patient requiring assistance on his recovery and restoration to society: the amount of relief thus afforded is small, but it is sufficient, in general, to furnish the means of existence until employment can be obtained; and in some instances it is sufficient to enable the receiver of it to resume the occupation he had followed previous to his affliction. The fund from which these gratuities are taken is derived from the donations and annual subscriptions of benevolent persons, and from the dividends arising from sums of money given and invested for this especial purpose, to which are added the profits of a small portion of the patients' labour. From the same fund also are allowed many indulgences to the uncured patients, which, however desirable in themselves, could not with propriety be charged to the Parishes or the County.

An audited account of this Benevolent Fund is annexed.

The number of deaths during the year has not exceeded the usual average; and the Com-

mittee feel themselves imperatively called on to record their thankfulness to the Almighty for the immunity from cholera with which the Asylum has been favoured, not a case having occurred in the Establishment. Several of the patients suffered from diarrhœa, but the application of remedial means on the first appearance of any premonitory symptom was attended with success in every case.

The Committee have, during the year, been very desirous of reducing the weekly charge for the maintenance of patients, commensurate with the reduction in the price of provisions; but in consequence of a necessary diminution in the number of patients during the progress of the new buildings, and a great disproportion which existed for a considerable time after they were completed, between the number of patients and the increased staff of the Establishment, no reduction could with propriety be made: the state of the Asylum, however, at the close of the year was such as to justify a belief that a diminution might very soon be effected. *

The Committee have been much concerned to find, that since the new buildings have been

opened, the Asylum has by no means been adequately supplied with water. The pumps in use are stated to be of insufficient size, and in consequence of the water in the well not standing at so high a level by ten feet as it did when the Asylum was first erected, the pumps now act on only about fifteen feet of water, which is soon pumped out. The competency of the well itself is also much doubted. Under these circumstances the Committee have determined to have the strength of the spring ascertained by some sufficient test, and to obtain the opinion of some engineer of great experience respecting the pumps, and the best means of obtaining the supply of water that is daily required.

A vacancy, occasioned by the resignation of Mr. Holland, one of the Resident Medical Officers, has been filled up by the appointment of Mr. Hugh Welch Diamond; he was selected from nineteen Candidates, obtained by advertisement in most of the daily and some of the weekly Journals, and his high character and great experience in the treatment of insanity, afford the best assurance of his competency to perform the important duties of his office.

In the Appendix will be found the Reports of the Visiting Physician and the Chaplain, as well as the usual elaborate Tables, to which the Court is referred for the details of the proceedings in the Asylum during the year, respecting receipts and expenditure, treatment of patients, &c., &c.

Of the patients admitted in 1849, some of them being cases of long standing, 34 males and 23 females have been discharged recovered, and 11 males and 19 females have died.

It is very gratifying to your Medical Officers to have it in their power to report that the per centage of the recoveries, on the whole number of patients under their care in 1849, is considerably greater than in any preceding year; having been—

This increase of the relative number of recoveries may, in some measure, be ascribed to the early removal of persons attacked with the disorder, from the causes which have given rise

to, and tend to keep up their erroneous ideas, as well as to medical treatment, directed to restore general health, and judicious moral management, comprising useful occupations, and innocent and instructing amusements, whereby the patients' attention is withdrawn from erroneous or distressing subjects of thought. The religious consolation, zealously and judiciously imparted by our worthy Chaplain, and the instruction imparted by the Matron and her Assistants, in reading classes and otherwise, have also had their full effect in tranquillizing the minds of many, and introducing and maintaining the very striking degree of decorum and harmony which is manifest in the Establishment. Nor can I, although averse to any restraint whatever, when it can be avoided, altogether overlook the striking benefit that in a few cases was the consequence of restraint, both personal and by seclusion, employed for a short period, by which the train of morbid ideas and the unlimited indulgence of morbid propensities appear to have been interrupted, and reflection on surrounding objects induced in the patient's mind, followed by a speedy recovery.

The per centage of deaths during the year

has not exceeded that of the preceding year; viz., about $7\frac{2}{8}$.

The circumstances attending the death of two of the female patients were submitted to the investigation of the Coroner, whose verdict, in one case, was "natural death," the patient having died of disease of the heart and lungs; in the other, "destroyed herself by hanging when insane."

I have availed myself of the privilege granted to me of bringing pupils to the Asylum (gratuitously); in particular, those gentlemen who attended the Lectures instituted last year in Bethlem Hospital, where certain varieties of mental disorders are not admitted, and, consequently, pupils are glad to avail themselves of an opportunity of extending their knowledge of the subject by examining such varieties in this Asylum, where all kinds are admitted.

I would wish to draw your attention to the very scanty information we receive respecting the patients sent to us from the different parishes; this will appear manifest by comparing the returns from the parishes with the points on which information is sought for, and obtained in other quarters: an improvement in the form of admission therefore is much wanted, more especially, the particular circumstances in the patient's case on which the Surgeon considers himself justified in signing a certificate of insanity ought to be stated.

CHAPLAIN

SURREY LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Summers Town Parsonage, Wandsworth, Feb. 1850.

GENTLEMEN,

At the beginning of another year I can state with great pleasure, that I have had much satisfaction in the discharge of my professional duties during the last year, as Chaplain to your Asylum for Lunatic Paupers.

The Services in the Chapel have been marked by the same quiet and decorum which surprised me on officiating for the first time. Great numbers of the patients heartily and pleasingly join in the psalmody, and in the responses also; and much attention is apparent during the sermon or lecture on Sundays and Wednesdays.

Many of the patients refer, with expressions of pleasure, to what they have heard, as affording them consolation—which it is, of course, my great aim, with all simplicity to accomplish. And it is no small gratification to succeed, by God's blessing, even for the time, in consoling those poor afflicted in mind or body, for whom we must feel tender compassion. I rejoice to say that, with very few exceptions, the inmates of the Asylum, notwithstanding their disordered intellects, welcome my visits among them as those of a friend; and, I trust, are often soothed by them. I have had many encouraging assurances to that effect from them at the time, as well as from those recovered and discharged. These last, in almost every case, are very desirous, on receiving their discharge, that I should return thanks in their names, in the chapel of the Asylum, for the benefits they received in the Institution.

I am led to hope that arrangements will be made for resuming the school on the male side of the Establishment, which has been suspended in consequence of the illness of the Master. The school in the female ward has had very valuable aid from the co-operation of the esteemed Matron's daughter, who has taught several to

write, for which they, as well as myself, are most grateful. I am ready to acknowledge that the number benefiting by the instruction is not so large as might be expected, as those who are most capable are generally engaged in some manual and remunerating occupations; but still I believe the schools, upon the whole, are of much importance in the system adopted for the amelioration and recovery of the insane in your Asylum.

My time is, no doubt, much more occupied by the very enlarged number of the patients, in respect of my visits throughout the wards; but I am bound gratefully to acknowledge, that you have considered this, and increased the salary assigned to my office. I can truly say, following humbly your own example, Gentlemen, that I am far from regretting time spent in alleviating, as far as in me lies, the visitation under which the pauper lunatics suffer.



The following observations will explain the medical terms used in *Tables Nos.* 12 & 13.

The phenomena of insanity may be comprehended under three heads, those of Unreasonable Conduct, Incoherent Discourse, and Erroneous Ideas or Delusions. These have been again divided into two classes, one including the symptoms of a deranged, the other those of a weak mind, constituting the Lunacy and Idiocy of legal writers.

Derangement of mind may be either general, affecting the different manifestations of mind, including attention, memory, imagination, judgment, and the affections and propensities; or it may be partial, affecting only some of them. The term Mania is applied to general insanity, and that of Monomania to partial insanity.

Weakness of mind may, in like manner, be general, or it may be partial; it may also be congenital, that is from infancy. It is, when general, termed Idiocy, and the term Imbecility has been applied to slighter degrees of weakness of mind when congenital.

Weakness of mind, however, is not always from birth; it frequently occurs after the full possession of the mental faculties, and then the term Dementia or Fatuity is employed to distinguish this state, which is analagous to Idiocy; and the term Incipient Dementia is used to mark the lesser degrees of weak mind analagous to Imbecility, and modified by the previous circumstances of the patient. This last-mentioned stage in its various stages is very common in Asylums, where we often find the original character of the mental disorder more or less blended with weakness of memory, and incoherence of ideas. It also usually accompanies palsy and epilepsy, and is frequently the state of mind in old age.

In most cases of Mania the ideas are erroneous. Occasionally the unreasonable conduct of the insane person is not attended with this feature, but appears to be the effect of strong propensities overcoming the power of reason and of will. The term Mania, without Delirium, has been applied to this variety, which is not of frequent occurrence.
