# THE COUNTY AND CITY OF WORCESTER LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Presented to the County Council of the County of Worcester and to the Town Council of the City of Worcester, pursuant to the 190th Section of the Lunacy Act, 1890.

<sup>1.—</sup>The Committee of Visitors of the County and City of Worcester Lunatic Asylum submit to the County and City Councils respectively their Annual Report on the affairs of the Asylum for the year ending the 31st December, 1904.

<sup>2.—</sup>No change has, during the past year, taken place in the Medical Staff of the Asylum. The Committee are pleased again to notice the satisfactory manner in which their Medical Superintendent, Mr. Braine-Hartnell, and the several Gentlemen acting under him, continue to discharge the very responsible duties which devolve upon them.

3.—In the House Staff some changes have occurred. Our Chief Female Attendant, Miss Barney, resigned her post in April last, and we selected to fill the vacancy Miss Isabella McKay, who, we are glad to say, since her appointment has discharged her duties to our complete satisfaction. Miss Hester Pittard, who for a period of 38 years had been in the service of the Asylum, and more lately as Assistant Chief Female Attendant, also resigned at the same time; she was, with the sanction of the Councils, granted a retiring Pension of £64 17s. 8d. per anuum, in recognition of her many years faithful service. The vacancy so created was filled up by the promotion of Miss Alice Brown from within the Asylum. A Pension of £24 2s. 8d. per annum was also, with the sanction of the Councils, granted to Mrs. Ann Rose, a night nurse who had been in the service of the Asylum for a period of 20 years and upwards. Mr. F. A. Wheeler, who had held the appointment of Asylum Auditor for 32 years, resigned that office in the course of the year. The Committee appointed in his stead Mr. Hubert A. Leicester, C.A., of Worcester, at the same salary as paid to Mr. Wheeler. Mr. Leicester will no doubt in the next Financial year, act upon the suggestion which it will be seen from his Report, the Local District Auditor proposes to make in the form in which the Asylum Accounts should be in future kept.

4.—The usual Monthly Meetings and one Special Meeting have been held and also the several House Committee Meetings as required by the Lunacy Acts; at these latter meetings the members of the House Committee see all the Patients in the Asylum, who have thus an opportunity not only of personally preferring any complaints which they may have to make, and to which proper consideration is always extended, but of making applications for their discharge. As may be imagined such complaints are numerous, but have, upon investigation, been invariably found to arise from the delusion of mind of the Patients making them; while the applications for discharge were, in most cases, such that the Committee could in no case entertain.

6.—The Boards of Guardians of the several Unions in the County and City having Patients in the Asylum have, from time to time during the year, deputed Members of their Boards to visit the Asylum, when these Deputations have seen the several Patients in the Asylum from their respective Unions. We are glad to observe that the reports which these Deputations make to their Boards, and of which copies are sent to us, in every instance testify to the care and attention which the Patients receive while under treatment in the Asylum, and to its general management and control.

7.—The rate of maintenance for Patients has been maintained at 8s. 5½d. per head per week, though it should be observed that a much higher rate per head per week has to be paid by those Unions from which Patients sent to the Asylum have to be boarded out, a legal obligation thrown upon those Unions which we consider bears hardly

upon them. We venture to think that the extra cost occasioned by the necessity for boarding out Patients should be borne rateably by all the Unions who have Patients in the Asylum, but, as the Councils are no doubt aware, the existing provisions of the Lunacy Acts throw this liability upon the Unions, the Patients from which have to be sent to other Asylums owing to the over-crowded state of our own Asylum. Some legislation on this subject has from time to time been suggested, but not proceeded with. We trust that when the Measure dealing with this matter comes before Parliament it may receive the support of those Members of both Houses who represent the interests of the County and City of Worcester. In any event we hope that if no change in the Law in the above respect is not shortly carried out the completion of the Barnsley Hall Asylum may relieve the pressure arising from over-crowding which is felt at Powick.

8.-Two of the Commissioners in Lunacy made their annual visit to the Asylum in the month of November last. A copy of their report is annexed, and it will be found in the Appendix (Schedule III). The Councils will be glad to notice that the report is generally of a satisfactory nature. The Commissioners again refer to the over-crowded state of the Asylum, although we have at present no less than 30 Female Patients boarded out at other Asylums. There were 1,194 Patients on our Books at the close of the year, while in the opinion of the Commissioners in Lunacy our accommodation should be limited to 1,168. We hope, with the Commissioners' approval, to make arrangements which, pending the completion of the Barnsley Hall Asylum, will enable us to provide for any excess over that number. There is, however, some difficulty in obtaining accommodation for out-Patients in other Asylums where only Patients of the best class will be received. The subject of the Disease called 'Colitis,' upon the extent of which in the Asylum, the Commissioners observe, is engaging our serious attention, and we hope to be able to provide some remedy to check its progress. Other points to which the Commissioners refer will receive our best attention.

- 9.—The District Auditor of the Local Government Board (Mr. W. D. Easterby), concluded his examination of the Accounts of the Asylum for the year ending the 31st March, 1904, in the month of November last, and his Report thereupon will be found in the Appendix (Schedule IV.).

#### CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

THE VISITING COMMITTEE OF THE WORCESTER COUNTY AND
CITY LUNATIC ASYLUM.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in presenting the Second Annual Report of my Chaplaincy.

I am glad to say that my work, in spite of the difference from ordinary parochial duties, continues to be full of interest and possibilities, and I hope it is beneficial to those amongst whom I minister; indeed, the expressions of gratitude of convalescent Patients alone encourage the conclusion that the seed sown is not without result; and when almost every discharged Patient—and there have been 94 within the twelve months—is commended to the kind help and interest of their Parish-Clergyman, and as has often been the case with very happy results, the Chaplain's work may even be considered practical.

Descending to details, I am able to report that the Church Services have been regularly held at the usual hours, and very well attended throughout the year—On Sundays at 10 a.m., 11 a.m. (in Infirmaries), and 3 p.m.; on Wednesdays at 10.30 a.m.; and on all other days at 8 a.m.

The Holy Communion has been celebrated on the second Sunday of every month for the Patients, and on the fourth Sunday for the Staff, as well as on the Great Festivals.

Our Harvest Thanksgiving Services were held on October 16th, when the Reverend Canon Carr, of St. John's, Worcester, preached an eloquent and much appreciated Sermon.

The Chapel was most beautifully decorated for the occasion, great care and taste having been shown. This event of a special preacher, along with the appropriate decorations and special music, help our people to feel that they are in no way isolated from their fellow Christians even in such detailed matters, but on the contrary possessed of every religious privilege they would enjoy in the outer world.

Miss Meyrick, of Ramsbury, another good friend, has presented us with an exceedingly handsome white Communion Table Frontal, of exquisite design and elaborate work, all of which has been done by her own hands. She has our warmest thanks.

We hope, since the language of sign largely enters into our life, and lies nearer to our thoughts than words, that this gift will further help to lead our thoughts to those events which are commemorated on our Great Festivals, when the frontal is used. The frontal was dedicated and used for the first time on Easter Sunday.

The behaviour of the Patients at the Services continues to be for the most part devout and reverent, and they manifest an earnest interest.

Our Choir is maintaining a high proficiency in the musical part of the services, thanks to the indefatigable attention and musical gifts of Dr. Bubb, Deputy Superintendent, and the co-operation of each individual; whilst the replenishing of the Communion Table Vases with flowers regularly every week has invariably produced another pleasing effect.

I have attended daily for the purpose of pastoral visitation, having special regard for the sick and infirm; and as I have to minister to all denominations I make no distinction of christian creeds, but avoid anything likely to offend religious prejudice.

Through the kindness of the Superintendent, I was, early in the year, enabled to deliver special addresses on Holy Communion to the Staff. One of the Visiting Rooms, where the meetings were held, was full each time.

I have also had the pleasure of preparing and presenting, out of the Staff, seven candidates for confirmation, which rite was performed by Bishop Gore, at the Parish Church, Powick. Other unusual events have been the baptisms of an infant and an adult, which have been duly recorded in the Parish Register Book.

100 Patients have died within the 12 months, 50 of whom were buried in our Cemetery, all with the exception of two according to the rites of the Church of England. The rest were removed for burial elsewhere.

Our Library continues to be much used, considerably over 1,000 Books having been issued since last January, inclusive of those periodically placed in the Book Cases of the several Wards. This number does not represent the whole of the reading done, as a Book is often passed from one Patient to another before being returned. When one has observed the soothing effect a book has oftentimes produced upon many unruly Patients, and how some Patients spend hours every day in constant reading, and what power a book which stimulates and feeds might have upon characters that require strengthening, one realises that a Library is a great factor in an Asylum.

New Hymn Books and Psalters have been supplied to the Choir, and 70 Hymn Books, 113 Prayer Books, and 33 Bibles, have been added to complete the stock of the different Wards.

Cricket:—We played 14 matches last season, mostly with Worcester teams, and won all but two, scoring a total of 1,033 runs against our opponents' 700. The Patients, when the weather was propitious, witnessed these closely contested matches, and appeared to be much interested.

I desire to record my sincere thanks to the Superintendent, Medical Officers, Choir, Church Decorators, and Staff generally, for their kind help and manifest interest in my work.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you my Report for the past year.

There has been a Service on all Sunday mornings throughout the year for the benefit of the Catholic Patients in the Asylum. As a rule about 30 are present. They behave well and are attentive to the instructions given to them.

A Mass has been said each month, and nearly always on a Sunday, at 8 o'clock. Occasionally as many as are fit are allowed to go to Holy Communion, and these have been carefully prepared the day before.

Each week, with hardly an exception, I have visited the male and female Patients alternately, and helped them with advice suitable to their needs.

On receiving due notice, I have at all times attended the sick, and, if necessary, prepared them for death.

I beg to offer to the Medical Superintendent, the Assistant Medical Officers, and other officials, my sincere thanks for the willing help they have given me to discharge my duties.

#### [SCHEDULE III.]

# REPORT OF COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

Worcester County and City Asylum,

18th November, 1904.

This Asylum, all parts of which we inspected yesterday, continues to be maintained in proper order, and we can report that we found the Wards warm and comfortable, the Dormitories and Single Rooms clean and free from unpleasant odour, and the Bedding in a satisfactory condition. We noticed, however, that many of the walls are still unplastered, and we hope that, when opportunity offers, the necessity for this work will not be overlooked by the Committee. We desire also to call attention once more to the need of improvement of the W.C. accommodation on both sides of the original building, more especially in M. and F. Wards 5—there being in the former Ward only two Seats for 42 Patients.

The Asylum is at present seriously overcrowded, more particularly in the acute Wards on Male side Nos. 3 and 5, which contrast unfavourably as regards numbers with the corresponding Wards on the Female side.

In view of this condition, and having regard to the fact that a considerable time must elapse before the new Asylum for the County, now in course of construction, can be completed, we think that the Visiting Committee will be acting wisely to board out some of the Patients now in this Asylum in other Institutions, so as to afford some relief to the existing overcrowding.

Since our Colleagues were here, Fire-Alarm Bells, communicating with the Porters' Room, have been fixed in the Wards and large Dormitories; emergency handles have been fitted to all Single Room and Dormitory doors, and the external iron Staircases, which were nearly finished at our Colleagues visit, have been completed. In connection with the measures adopted to ensure the safety of the Patients in case of fire, it is satisfactory to be able to report that we gave a fire alarm yesterday, and that within 3½ minutes after the alarm all the Patients had been removed from the Ward in which the fire was supposed to have arisen, and a good volume of water was playing on the building from two outside hydrants.

There are at the present time 1,184 Patients whose names are on the books, in the proportion of 535 males and 649 females, of these 10 are absent on trial; 36 are Private Patients; and one is chargeable to an out-County Union. In addition there are 30 women who are boarded out at Leicester Boro' Asylum.

We have seen all the Patients in residence, numbering 1,174, and can report that they were tidy and neat in their dress, for the most part quiet and orderly, and free from complaint calling for comment.

In respect to the important matter of dinner, we can report that we saw an excellent meal served to the Patients yesterday. It consisted of meat and potato pie, vegetable, and bread, and it was evidently relished by the Patients so far as we could see, without exception.

For the 58 Patients who profess the Roman Catholic Faith, a weekly Service is provided by a Priest who receives remuneration for that duty.

Since the Asylum was last visited by two members of our Board, 303 Patients have been admitted; 168 discharged, 142 on recovery, and 132 have died.

Mechanical restraint has been employed in the case of a female Patient, on one occasion for eight hours, and 48 Patients have been secluded, on 163 occasions, for 839½ hours in all.

The 132 deaths were, in the very satisfactory proportion of nearly 92%, followed by postmortem examination.

General Paralysis accounted for 9.3 % of the deaths; Phthisis for fully 21 %; and Colitis for the very large proportion of over 13%. Of the last disease there have been as many as 101 cases. There have also been three cases of Enteric Fever amongst the men—all terminating fatally, three of Erysipelas, and one of Scarlet Fever.

We are glad to report that to-day the health of the Institution is satisfactory, for of the 19 men and 10 women whom we found in bed, only three were suffering from Colitis, but we feel that the large number of cases of Phthisis and Colitis that have occurred, emphasizes the need of immediate reduction of the overcrowding in the manner suggested above.

Two Coroner's Inquests have been held, but in neither case was blame attached to any Attendant.

The list of casualties is rather a long one—17 Patients having sustained fractured bones. One woman fractured her skull by falling on the Asphalte Court in an Epileptic Fit, and another her sternum, which casualty was occasioned by a Nurse accidentally falling on her from a ladder.

The staff is maintained at adequate strength, and we were glad to see that they were evidently competent, and included many Attendants and Nurses of many years service.

The Case Books and other Medical Records are kept in a thoroughly satisfactory manner.

In the temporary absence of Mr. Braine-Hartnell, we were accompanied, during our inspection, by Mr. Bubb, who, having a good knowledge of the Patients, afforded us every information.

In conclusion, we can add that the Airing Courts were in good order at our visit; that there was a liberal supply of flowering plants; and that 84 additional acres of land have been taken into occupation—the Farm now comprising 517 acres, and affording excellent means of occupation and recreation to patients of both sexes.

## REPORT BY LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD DISTRICT AUDITOR.

23, Francis Road, Edgbaston, Birmingham, 8th Dec., 1904.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to state that I concluded my audit of the Accounts of the Worcester County and City Lunatic Asylum, for the year ended the 31st March, on the 26th ultimo. The total amount received on the Maintenance Account was £28,467 10s. 0d.; this included £25,691 7s. 6d. from the Guardians of Unions and Parishes within the County and City, at 8s. 5½d. per head per week, and also amongst other items a sum of £432 8s. 0d. received from the County and City, under section 269 (9) of the Lunacy Act, 1890. In respect of Private Patients, a sum of £1,261 12s. 8d. was received. The expenditure on Maintenance Account during the year, amounted to £27,458 8s. 1d.

Farm and Garden Expenses, included in the above expenditure, were £3,733 3s. 8d. From this Maintenance Account was also transferred a sum of £556 1s. 11d. to the Building and Repairs Account, which was the total excess of weekly charge on "Out-County," "Private," and Criminal Patients.

The balance in hand on Maintenance Account at the end of the year was £1,630 4s. 2d.

The Receipts on Building and Repairs Account were £3,097 3s. 11d., and the Expenditure £2,530 1s. 5d. The overdrawn Balance at the end of the year was £1,646 3s. 11d. The County and City Treasurers contributed on precept £2,150 12s. 6d., and £268 16s. 7d. respectively to this Account.

The value of the Farm Stock, at the end of the year, stood at £4,251 5s. 6d.

It appeared to me that the time had now arrived when a more modern and scientific system of Accounting in connection with the Stock and Stores of the Asylum might, with advantage, be adopted. I have had some conversation with Mr. H. A. Leicester, who has been appointed by you to succeed Mr. Wheeler, and whose duty it will be to examine these Accounts, and take the Stock at frequent intervals. In conjunction with him I propose to submit some proposals and new forms of Account, which, if adopted, might come into use at the commencement of the next financial year, and which, I trust, may be of great advantage to the Committee.

For your further information as to Accounts, I beg to refer you to the Statutory Financial Statement as signed by me.

#### THE FIFTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

### MEDICAL OFFICER & SUPERINTENDENT.

To the Committee of Visitors of the Worcester County and City Asylum.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to lay before you the Fifty-Second Annual Report, being that for the year ending December 31st, 1904. The usual Statistical Tables are attached. The Financial Statement for the year ending March 31st, 1905, prepared by Mr. J. G. Hadley, the Asylum Clerk, is also appended.

The changes that occurred among the patients were as follows:--

These figures show a net increase of 30 Patients. The men have increased by 6, and the women by 24. The average number resident was 532 males and 644 females; total 1,176. The total number under treatment was 647 males, 768 females; total 1,415.

ADMISSIONS.—Two hundred and fifty-two patients were admitted during the year: the highest number but one since the opening of the Asylum. Twenty-nine men and 31 women had had previous attacks, or at the rate of 24.7

per cent. for males and 22.9 for females: total 23.8 per cent. Heredity and family predisposition was a cause in 12.6 per cent. and 17.8 per cent. respectively. Intemperance in drink was a cause in 8.3 per cent., as against 15.3 per cent. in 1903. This in some way bears out the saying that "a wave of sobriety is flowing over the country." The admission of melancholic patients and those with delusions of persecution and suicidal tendencies seem to be on the increase. One man is so suicidally inclined that for about the space of one year he has needed a special attendant night and day.

The following table shows the condition of bodily health of those admitted:—

Thirty-two of those admitted have been discharged "recovered." Twenty-three have died.

DISCHARGES.—Forty-eight males and 54 females, total 102, have been discharged "recovered," being at the rate of 42·34 per cent. for males and 47·36 per cent. for females; total 44·88 per cent. on the number admitted, excluding transfers from other asylums. This compares favourably with the rate for England and Wales in the last Blue Book, which was 36·6 per cent.

Deaths.—Fifty-three males and 48 females, total 101, died during the year, being at the rate of 8.58 per cent. on the daily average number resident. This is 5 per cent higher than last year. Phthisis is responsible for 17.8 per cent., Colitis for 15.8 per cent., and General Paralysis for 10.8 per cent., while old age only accounted for 7.9 per cent., as against a percentage of 21.3 last year.

The following is a short summary of the causes of death. Full details will be found in Table V.

Post Mortem examinations were made in 93 out of the 101 deaths, or 92.07 per cent.

PRIVATE PATIENTS.—Seven, including four criminals, were admitted, four discharged, and one was transferred from pauper to private class. The private patients have thus increased four during the year. Owing to the overcrowding of the Asylum private patients have had, in nearly all cases, to be refused. As criminal cases are classed in the private class, I may here raise the strongest objection to the County Asylum being used for the reception of these cases. Their influence is bad in every way, and the more sensible among the patients strongly object to be associated with them.

INQUESTS.—Two inquests were held. In one case the patient had a fractured thigh. In each case the jury brought in a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence, and exonerated the Staff from any blame.

Accidents.—None were fatal. They were as follows:—One of fractured skull, three of fractured ribs—one done by coughing,—one dislocation of the shoulder, two of fractured hip, one of the ulna, one of a finger, one of the acromion. All these were accidental or caused by the violence of fellow patients. One man sustained a fracture of his fibula in a struggle with an Attendant, whom he had viciously attacked. One female patient came by a fractured sternum through the slipping of a ladder on which a nurse was standing; nurse and ladder falling on the patient.

Escapes.—Three patients managed to escape. They were all recaptured in a few hours.

Births.—Two married women who were admitted in a pregnant condition were confined. One has left the Asylum recovered.

Health.—There have been two cases of Erysipelas and three of Typhoid, the latter all fatal. One was of the type known as Ambulatory Typhoid. The source of infection could not be traced. Colitis has been prevalent; owing to the overcrowded state of the wards it is quite impossible to isolate cases, but strict precautions as to disinfection are carried out.

Staff.—The changes have been numerous. Miss Barney, the Head Female Attendent, resigned to be married. Miss Pittard, Deputy Head Female Attendant, who had been in the service of your Committee for upwards of 38 years, resigned. She was granted a well-earned pension of £64 17s. 8d., which was sanctioned by the respective Councils. Mrs. Rose, Night Nurse for upwards of 20 years, resigned, and was granted a pension of £24 2s. 8d. Mr. F. A. Wheeler, who had been your Auditor, resigned after holding office for 32 years. He was granted a gratuity by your Committee, and the same received the necessary sanction. I regret to say that he has since died.

Miss I. McKay was appointed to the post of Head Female Attendant. She has thrown herself into the work with zeal. Miss A. Brown was promoted to fill the vacancy created by Miss Pittard's resignation. Many of the nurses and attendants resigned "for a change," and some to marry. One man was discharged for boxing a patient's ears. My Medical Colleagues and the other Officers remain the same. I am indebted to them for their continued care and attention to the details of their respective departments.

COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.—Mr. H. F. Giffard and Dr. E. M. Cooke, two Members of the Board of the Commissioners in Lunacy, visited the Asylum on November 17th, 1904. Their report will be found in Schedule III.

GENERAL MATTERS.—The charge per patient per week was 8s. 5½d. during the year.

The average cost per week per patient for the year ending March 31st, 1905, was 7s. 10\frac{7}{8}d.

From April 1st your Committee has decided to charge 8s. 2d. per week per patient.

A new cow shed was erected at the Home Farm, by our own labour, capable of tying up 12 cows. This has necessitated the engagement of an extra cowman.

The electrical communication from the Wards to the Porters' Room has been completed.

The following Boards of Guardians have visited the Asylum:—Droitwich, Dudley, Kidderminster, King's Norton, Martley, Solihull, Stourbridge, Upton-on-Severn, West Bromwich, Worcester.

The Farm shows a profit of £427 12s. 7d. on the year.

In conclusion, I beg to thank your Committee for the help and encouragement they have always afforded me.

### Conditions under which Private Patients are admitted into the Asylum.

- I. The charge for Patients coming from, or having a settlement in, some Union in the County or City of Worcester is 15s. a week, payable quarterly in advance.
- II. The charge for maintenance covers all ordinary expenses, but in cases of prolonged bodily disease an additional weekly charge may be made to cover the cost of special medicines and stimulants.
- III. In the event of the death or discharge of any Private Patient before the maintenance moneys, paid in advance, have been exhausted by effluxion of time, the balance wil! be refunded to the person who made the last payment in respect of such Patient.
- IV. The Patients may wear their own clothes, but will have the same accommodation in all respects as the other Patients.
- V. Application for the admission of a Patient on the private class must be made in the first instance to the Medical Officer at the Asylum, who will supply all the various blank forms for the order and medical certificates.
- VI. The excess charge made for Private Patients beyond the ordinary pauper weekly rate of maintenance is carried to the credit of the Repairs Account.

BREAKFAST.—To make one gallon of coffee—§ oz. coffee, § oz. chicory, 4 oz. sugar, 12 oz. milk.

DINNER—Potatoes are weighed when peeled and uncooked. Some patients are allowed half-pint of beer with their dinner.

On Wednesday the suet pudding is served with treacle or sugar, rhubarb or fresh fruits being added when in season.

Salad is given largely when in season. Pickled cabbage occasionally.

TEA.—To make one gallon of tea—1 oz. tea, 4 oz. sugar, 12 oz. milk.

Any of the weakly or aged patients where quire it, are allowed 2 oz. bread and § pint broth at 9.30 a.m.; the broth being composed of—for the pint—1 pint meat liquor, 2 oz. barley, § oz. oatmeal, herbs.

The Diet of the Patients resident in the Wards of the Annexe is varied in the following particulars:—Bread and milk is largely given for Breakfast, and some cheese for Dinner. The amount of meat and bread is somewhat smaller.
