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# REPORT

### OF THE

# COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

### For 1868.

THE Committee in publishing their 20th Annual Report, have pleasure in notifying the continued efficiency of the Institution.

In obedience to the 16th and 17th Vict. Chap. 97., Sec. 62, they have to certify that the House is in thorough repair, very clean, and comfortably furnished.

The unprecedented drought of the past summer materially affected the supply of Water, the Reservoir failing to afford any from the beginning of July until the middle of November. During these months the excavations within the Reservoir were diligently carried on. It is confidently . hoped, should the weather prove favourable, that the whole of the excavation will be completed within the next fortnight, and the Reservoir filled. Its capacity has been increased from about 500,000 gallons to about 1,250,000; which will afford 20 gallons per head per day for 430 persons during a drought of 145 days. To the large store of water thus secured be added also the streams flowing from the springs during This will furnish a supply equal, in all, to the conthe same period. sumption of 25 weeks. The cost of the whole of these works, from the commencement up to the present date, has not exceeded  $\pounds 250$ . Although the work might be completed during the present winter, it has been judged advisable that the made earth of the slopes should have sufficient time to settle down before the stone pitching is laid on. The whole of the excavations, &c., have been wrought out by the patients and their attendants, under the effective superintendence of Mr. Robinson, the Clerk.

At the last Annual Meeting the Plans and Specifications, for a Brewery and Bakery establishment, were submitted to the Committee, and approved of, the estimated cost being £600. It was then Resolved,—

> "That they be submitted to a Professional Engineer or Builder for examination and approval."

It was further Resolved,-

"That an order be made on the several Counties in Union, for the sum of £400, in aid of the above purpose, and that the House Committee be empowered to carry out the works to completion."

The Committee consulted Mr. John Jennison, jun., of Belle Vue, Manchester. Mr. Jennison having duly examined the plans and estimates, suggested one modification, viz.,—that the ovens should be constructed of iron instead of brick; and, at the Committee's request, he superintended their erection.

The Committee are gratified in further reporting, that the Brewery and Bakery have been completed, and to their entire satisfaction; and that the expenses thereof have not exceeded the estimates.

It is right to add, that the beneficial results anticipated by the Clerk, as set forth in his Report to the House Committee, of the 15th November, 1867, have been fully realized. Taking the average contract price of flour and bread supplied to this Institution for the past twenty years, it is calculated that the making and baking of the bread in the Asylum during the first quarter, ending 30th September last, showed a saving of  $\mathbf{f42}$ ; and the brewing also, compared with the contract price previously paid for beer, shows a saving equal to  $\pounds 52$  per quarter.

These results have been carefully examined, and verified by the Honorary Auditors, the Rev. W. Hicks Owen and the Rev. Edward Smart.

Mr. J. C. Morris, Assistant Medical Officer, resigned on the 11th August; and Mr. D. E. Morris was appointed to succeed him, and commenced his duties on the 22nd of the same month.

Owing to the over-crowded state of the male department, the Visitors gave notice to the authorities of the Abergavenny Asylum to remove ten of their patients at the expiration of the current quarter.

The Committee, in conclusion, have to record their warm appreciation of the watchful and humane manner in which the Medical Superintendents, the Chaplain, the Matron, the Clerk, and the other Officials have fulfilled their weighty duties.

# MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg respectfully to present my Twentieth Annual Report on the condition of the North Wales Asylum.

The admissions, discharges, and deaths have been as follows :-- on the books 1st January, 1868, there were 10 male and 9 female private patients, 186 male and 173 female pauper patients.

The discharges—33 females, 36 females recovered; 11 males and 4 females not recovered: 26 males, 29 females have died. On the books, 1st January, 1869, 7 male, 13 female private patients, 187 male and 171 female pauper patients—total, 378.

Daily average number, 208 male and 184 female-total, 392.

Seven of the male patients discharged not recovered were returned to the Abergavenny Asylum, and there now remain sixteen, one above the contract number; but as in all probability a death is imminent, one over the number was retained to prevent the necessity and expense of sending another to fill up the vacancy.

The other out-county cases now in the Asylum are, 15 males and 11 females, all belonging to the city of Chester.

There was a slight decrease of the admissions of patients upon the previous year, so it is reasonable to hope that the accommodation now provided will be fully adequate for some years to come.

All cases of death have been regularly reported to the Coroner. Two inquests have been held, and verdicts of natural causes were returned.

It is gratifying to state that no accident of any moment occurred during the year.

It at first sight might appear that the amount of deaths is large, but in the treatment of the bodily diseases of the insane many difficulties have to be contended against.—First, the disease may have been going on for a length of time without any complaint having been made or any symptoms manifesting themselves; Second, the incurability of many diseases peculiar to the insane, such as general paralysis, consumption, epilepsy, &c.; Third, many being admitted in the last stage of debility, to which most of the causes have been assigned, as appear in Table VII. The number of patients in the house on the 1st January, 1868, were 378, and the same number on 1st January, 1869. At the last Annual Meeting I stated that out of the whole number at that time in the Asylum I considered that not more than twelve males and ten females were likely to recover. My anticipations have been nearly realized, nine males and ten females having been discharged. At the present time, I estimate ten males and eleven females are curable.

The estimates of Mr. Robinson submitted to the last Annual Meeting upon the probability of a saving by the erection of a Brewery and Bakehouse, have been fully realized. This will be shown by the accounts of the last quarter. The whole of these improvements did not exceed the estimates. The bread and beer are of a superior quality, and much appreciated by the patients.

The cost per head per week for the last year has rather exceeded the preceding one, being 8s.  $11\frac{1}{2}$ d. against 8s. 9d., which arises from the following causes—First, with only two hundred patients, sufficient potatoes and other vegetables were produced upon our own land, but owing to the great increase to nearly four hundred and no increase of land, we were and shall be compelled (until more be obtained) to go into the market and purchase at a high figure; Second, by charging the fittings and repairs to the Establishment, which were heretofore placed against Counties.

Amusements and gentle recreations greatly tend to tranquillize and soothe the insane; consequently, the winter amusements have been assiduously kept up; the Thursday evening dance has been regularly attended, and the services of the Volunteer Band have contributed much to its success. We have had a great loss the last two summers in the Bowling Green, which was required for the male airing-ground. It is hoped that the Green now in formation will soon be completed.

I have again to tender my grateful thanks to the Chairman and Committee of Visitors for their continued kindness, and also to the Officers and others connected with the Establishment.

# REPORT

OF THE

# COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

North Wales Asylum, 29th May, 1868.

SINCE this Asylum was visited on the 6th of May in last year, 171 patients have been admitted, 71 have been discharged, and 61 have died; there having been under the first head 6 males and 7 females of the private class, and 81 males and 77 females of the pauper class; under the second head, 2 male private patients, and 24 males and 45 females belonging to the pauper class, all but 1 male and 3 females of the latter class having recovered; and under the third head, 1 male private patient, 26 male pauper patients, and 35 females of the pauper class.

All the deaths were from ordinary causes, though in two cases of sudden death, one from disease of the heart, and the other from epilepsy, inquests were held and verdicts returned accordingly. Of the rest of the deaths, the principal causes were general palsy and epilepsy, phthisis, and senile, or other decay. The health appears reasonably good at present, 17 being entered as taking medicine, and 14 observed as in bed as we passed through the wards; the latter number being not many more than a third of those seen in bed at the last visit.

The numbers in the Asylum to-day are of the private class 22, 9 males and 13 females; and of the pauper class 377, 203 males and 174 females, altogether 399 patients. This would leave, according to the estimated space of the accommodation existing, only one vacant bed; and the necessity will now present itself of terminating existing contracts as occasions arise. There are at present 61 patients here not belonging to the County.

We found all the patients very quiet to-day. There was no excitement in either division. Considering also the unfavourable character of very many, their personal condition as to cleanliness and tidiness of dress was not unsatisfactory. This was more observable in the female than in the male division; but on the other hand, in the latter there is a good proportion of men always at work with their clothes necessarily in a not very nice state. Seventy-eight are regularly employed on the grounds, in the garden, or airing courts; the shops are fairly supplied, and altogether 152 men have constant occupation. Of the women there are 102 who have also daily employment, 39 in the needle-room and 24 in the laundry and kitchen.

Since our colleagues were here all the upper part of the old building in the female division has been cleaned and painted, with a cheerful and pleasing effect; and we saw to-day the corresponding parts of the male division undergoing the same process, it being proposed to carry through every part of the old building this kind of renovation, rendered, if possible, more necessary by the satisfactory character of the new accommodation. To this it seems to us most desirable that the old should, as far as practicable, be assimilated by the introduction everywhere of bedside carpets, of curtains, and those other little conveniences of domestic furniture, small tables, chairs, &c., which have given to the new rooms such a look of comfort and home.

In connection with the recent additions, considerable progress has been made since the last visit in laying out and preparing the two greatly enlarged airing courts; that for the women is indeed nearly completed, and we trust that seats and sun-shades will be supplied ultimately to both. They will be a very great improvement on the old courts. A further addition more recently made is also now to be described, whereby a Brew-house and a Bake-house will be provided. It being the intention, from and after June next, that the Asylum should brew and bake for itself, instead of, as heretofore, contracting bills for bread and beer. No plans for these have been submitted to Whitehall.

Adverting to matters that were the subject of remark or suggestion at the last visit, we find that the so-called female recreation-room remains, yet unimproved, though the amendment of it (very much required) is still contemplated; that the tiled corridors are as yet uncovered, though we learn to-day that cocoa-nut matting, of which there is a sufficiency for the purpose already in the Asylum, will now be used ; that the number of straw beds has been further and considerably reduced; that the area walls darkening the kitchen and offices have been lowered one-half; and that the partitions recommended in the general bath-rooms have been introduced with excellent effect in both, where invariably also fresh water is used for every patient. It was further very satisfactory to us to observe to-day, three nurses in place of two in both No. 4 and No. 6 female wards; and to learn, that for the soup dinners objected to at the last visit, one of hash or lob-scouse is now substituted, which is much more popular with the patients. We omitted to mention, in speaking of the late structural additions, that a new mortuary or dead house, quite detached from the Asylum, has been very recently erected in the grounds.

The amusements and provision for walks beyond the Asylum continue to be fairly sufficient; assurance being given us also, that some suggestions made by us to-day for using, with increased advantage in respect of suitable out-door games, both the enlarged airing courts will have attention. The subject is the more important from the many female patients here unable to employ themselves otherwise; and from the fact that the instances of seclusion recorded appear rather to increase than diminish. Since the last visit there have been 93 instances applied to 21 patients; and in proportion to the number of those with troublesome habits, should be the extent and variety of provision in the way of means for entertaining, amusing, or interesting them in some way. The return of last night's wet and dirty beds, showing six among the men and four among the women, is evidence of careful night-watching, and of the advantage of disusing straw beds. Ample opportunity has been afforded us at this visit of seeing with what active zeal and efficiency Mr. Jones labours to promote in every way the interests of the Asylum and the welfare of its inmates. His present assisting officer, Mr. Morris, having resigned his appointment, a successor will shortly have to be chosen; and considering the increased responsibility which necessarily attaches to the medical officer residing in an Asylum, in all cases where the principal medical officer lives out of it (however near), we have very grave doubts whether, for the salary of  $\pounds 60$ a-year which is offered, the services of a gentleman with the medical and other qualifications, as well as personal character, essential to the adequate discharge of such duties, can possibly be obtained.

# THE CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

# TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE NORTH WALES COUNTIES LUNATIC ASYLUM,

### GENTLEMEN,

At the close of another official year it becomes once more my duty, as Chaplain, to furnish you with a Report of the moral and spiritual state of those committed to my ministerial care.

During the past twelve months the usual Chapel Services have been performed without any interruption.

On Sundays there has been an English and a Welsh Service, with a Sermon after each, and Prayers on Wednesdays and Fridays.

I have again the satisfaction of stating that the behaviour of the patients in Chapel has been, without exception, attentive and devout; they seem deeply impressed with the solemnity of the work in which they are engaged, and there is reason to believe that they derive from it comfort and consolation.

No special circumstances having occurred in the course of the past year, I find that I have no new observations, to make, and have only to repeat what has been stated on former similar occasions, that the better class of patients, with very few exceptions, are eager to receive instruction, and most anxious to attend the Chapel Services on Sundays and week days. In the course of my visits to the wards and airing-courts, I continue to find it to be a source of comfort to the patients that they are allowed to have free access to their Minister.

To persons distressed in mind, and in need of advice—whether their troubles be real or imaginary—it is often an inexpressible relief to find a friend who will quietly sit by them, and listen patiently to all they have to say : sometimes the simple telling of their sad tale gives them temporary relief; on such occasions kind words of sympathy and encouragement are gratefully received, and seldom fail to produce a tranquilizing effect.

Many of the patients, who recovered and were discharged during the past year, expressed themselves as truly grateful for the mercy which had been vouchsafed to them, and for the kindness and attention they had received during their residence at the Asylum.

While looking back with satisfaction upon the patience and submission exhibited by these poor inmates under their heavy affliction, and the readiness with which they invariably listen to the Gospel message, I cannot but express a hope that a brighter and a happier future may be in store for them hereafter.

My grateful thanks are due to Mrs. Turner Jones and Mr. O. Robinson for conducting the musical portion of the Chapel Services.

Mr. O. Robinson has now left the neighbourhood, and the loss of his valuable aid is already much felt: it is to be hoped that other arrangements may soon be made for supplying his place.

It gives me pleasure also to acknowledge the assistance which I have invariably received from Dr. Turner Jones and the other officers of the Institution.
