OF THE

VISITING JUSTICES

OF THE

Joint Counties' Lunatic Asylum, Abergavenny,

AND

THE FOURTH REPORT

Under the New Union of the Three Counties,
FOR THE YEAR 1874.

THE Asylum has been conducted to our entire satisfaction during the year, under the skilful superintendence and indefatigable zeal of Dr. M'CULLOUGH, with the able co-operation of Dr. GLENDINNING. No epidemic disease, or noticeable circumstance respecting the health of the patients

has occurred. The first part of the year was characterised by a very diminished mortality; in the latter part of the year the mortality has proportionately increased.

In the last quarter there has been an increase of 5 in the number of female patients: there has been no increase in the males. In the whole year there has been an increase of 15 males and 16 females-together 31; and the numbers now are 243 males, and 244 females—in all, 487. Of these, 446 are in the Asylum at Abergavenny, males and females; 40 males in the Hereford Asylum, and I female at Fisherton House. Four Shillings per patient is now paid by the Imperial Exchequer to the Unions, to which the patients are chargeable. We apprehend, and in some measure have already experienced, that this allowance will cause the Unions to send in lunatics who would otherwise be lodged in the Workhouse, or left under the care of their friends. The consequence will be that all Asylums will have to be enlarged; and an increased charge will thus be thrown upon the County Rates, which will in no wise share in the allowance made to the Unions.

The new buildings, which were authorised by the Quarter Sessions of the several counties, are in satisfactory progress. The purchase, also, of the Rev. D. J. GEORGE'S land and cottages has been completed, and the sewage works, which have been reported to the Sessions as necessary, in consequence of the notice by the Abergavenny Improvement Commissioners not to cause our sewage to run into the river Kenvy, are a successful operation,

having been very skilfully contrived, and admirably constructed, through the scientific knowledge and unremitting superintendence of Dr. M'CULLOUGH.

A further advance of £1,000 is required for the new buildings, making together with the £2,000 already paid, £3,000. The remaining sum—£3,400, making up the total expenditure authorised by the Sessions, namely, £6,400—will probably be called for at the Easter Sessions. Of each of these sums Monmouthshire pays about 75 per cent., or three-fourths, namely, 15/1 in the £; Breconshire, 3/5; and Radnorshire, 1/6 in the £. Another £1,000, rateably in the same proportion, is required for repairs; annuities to superannuated officers, sanctioned by Sessions; maintenance of out-patients; and furniture.

The rate of maintenance charged to the Unions belonging to the United Counties will be reduced from 11/- to 10/6 per head weekly, to take effect from the 1st January, 1875.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

Joint Counties' Asylum, Abergavenny, Sept. 26th, 1874.

AFTER a thorough inspection of this Asylum, in every department, and notice of the patients, collectively and individually, we have much pleasure in reporting that we found everything in a creditable state, giving abundant proof of the satisfactory condition of the Institution, and of the care and attention bestowed upon its inmates. Since last visit the following changes have occurred:—

59 men and 55 women have been admitted—total admissions, 114
32 ,, 27 ,, have been discharged—total discharges, 59
24 ,, 23 ,, have died—total deaths, 47

Nineteen of the patients admitted had been previously inmates of the Asylum, and 38 of the patients discharged, left upon recovery. Of the 59 discharged, 13 patients (all of them males), were transferred under contract to Hereford Asylum. Nine patients appear to have escaped, but all except two men were retaken. The number of patients on the books are now, 200 in the male, and 237 in the female division. No one is absent on leave. There

are no vacant beds for men, and for women 8 only. The death-rate still continues high, having been between 11 and 12 per cent. on the daily number resident. Ten patients died of general paralysis, 9 of other cerebral diseases, 7 of phthisis, and 8 of other diseases of the chest and heart, 3 of abdominal diseases, and 10 of diseases not requiring special notice. One inquest has been held—in the case of a man who died rather suddenly of phthisis. Post-mortem examinations have been 37. Restraint has not been employed, and seclusion is rarely resorted to, and only for short periods. Eleven men are registered as having been secluded on 27, and 16 women on 28 occasions—7 of the former and 11 of the latter, each once only.

With the exception of a woman, an inmate of No. 5 Ward, the patients were in both divisions orderly, and the dress of both sexes was satisfactory. Nine male patients occupy the farm-house, in charge of the bailiff and his wife and a ploughman; 15 women are with two nurses, in one of the villas, very comfortably housed; and at another detached villa are 23 men, with two male attendants. One cottage is not at present occupied. In the laundry, 52 women are accommodated; the 5 laundry maids act as attendants on them. In the infirmary we found, on the male side, 5 patients in bed; and in other wards, as many. On the female side, 6 women only were in bed. According to the last entry in

the Medical Journal, 18 men and 27 women were then taking medicine. The number of epileptics of each sex is 24, or thereabouts. We trust that arrangements will presently be made for placing these patients under the charge of special night attendants having no other duties. The patients usefully employed are 115 men and 134 women-16 of the former at trades, 34 in the garden and about the farm; 26 of the latter assist in the laundry, and 24 do needlework. The average attendance at the Chapel Services on Sundays is low, the returns giving 158 as the total number of patients present, in nearly equal proportion from the male and female divisions. On weekdays the average number seem to be 36 men, 29 women. The arrangements for out-door exercise are as they heretofore have been. Generally the recommendations made at last visit have received attention. The dietary is unchanged We were present in a ward when dinner was served: it consisted of boiled beef, mutton, and pork, with vegetables and beer. The associated amusements are such as were noticed in the last entry of our colleagues. Of the order and cleanliness of the wards and rooms throughout we can speak very highly; the state of the beds and bedding was very creditable to the attendants: the supply generally of books, papers, and means of in-door amusement was good. The airing courts (to which the patients

have free access), are well planted, and kept in excellent order.

The additional building, for 64 male patients, has been commenced, but the work will not be completed in less than a year. Until this building has been erected, it will be difficult to carry out the construction of the general bath-room and block of closets, lavatories, sculleries, &c., on the male side. At present there is no scheme for enlargement of the female division; though this will, no doubt, soon be required. The provision, however, in each of the women's wards of additional water closets, lavatories, &c., is so much needed, that we think that these matters should not be postponed.

It is obvious that the present Chapel, which was intended to accommodate 120 patients only, will be quite inadequate for an Asylum originally built for 200, and presently holding 500 patients. Whether by enlargement, or erection of a detached Church, we think that the work should be no longer delayed. We hope that the Visitors will also consider favourably the suggestion made at former visits, as to building a general recreation and dining hall.

REPORT

OF THE

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

FOR THE YEAR 1874.

THE Medical Superintendent has the honour of submitting to the Committee of Visitors his Report for the year 1874, together with the usual Statistical Tables.

On the First of January last there remained under treatment in this Asylum 427 patients—200 males and 227 females. In addition to these, 28 males and 1 female were boarded in other Asylums, so that the number of patients chargeable to the Counties which form the present Union were, at the commencement of the year, 456; the number of males and females being exactly equal. During the year there have been admitted 139, viz., 71 males and 68 females. The total number under treatment during the year was 566, and the average number resident was 431, being 3 more than in the previous year. The highest number resident at one time was 447, in December, and the lowest 416, in May. The number discharged, recovered,

was 44, viz., 17 males and 27 females, being in the proportion of 31'6 per cent. of the admissions. During the year, 57 deaths have occurred, 36 of males and 21 of females; being in the proportion of 13'2 per cent. of the average number resident. This is more than 2 per cent. above the average. The excess arose chiefly from the dropping off of patients who had long been labouring under hopeless disease. It is probable also that the increasing tendency to send in patients labouring under serious bodily disease, when their mental state affords any plea for using the Asylum as a hospital, will prove a permanent source of increased mortality. Five patients admitted during the year died within eight days of admission, and in three of these, grave and urgent bodily disease preceded, and probably produced the delirium which was the cause of admission. Diseases of the brain caused death in 26 cases, 15 of these being paralysis of the insane. There was no contagious disease, and no serious epidemic during the year.

At the beginning of the year, 28 male patients were boarded in the Hereford Asylum, under contract. During the year 13 more were sent there, and one was discharged; so that 40 now remain. During the year there has been an increase in the numbers chargeable to the three counties, of 30; viz., 13 males, and 17 females. The total number chargeable is now 486, viz., 241 males, and 245 females. At

the end of the year there remained in this Asylum 201 males, and 244 females—total 445. The males are 8 in excess of the sleeping accommodation, while there is room for only one more female.

The high rate of admissions and the large addition to our numbers during the past year makes it necessary to enquire, what are the causes of the increase, and are they likely to be permanent? That more patients are sent in now than formerly there can be no doubt. During the ten years previous to the separation from Herefordshire the average annual number of patients admitted for the first time was 123, and as about one-third of these came from Herefordshire, the proportion of the Counties now in Union would be 82. During the three years which have elapsed since the separation, the average number admitted, for the first time, has been 102, or an increase of 20 per annum.

In my Report for the year 1858, I went pretty fully into the question of the alleged increase of insanity, and endeavoured to show that there was no reason to think any actual increase had taken place, and that the apparent increase arose from legislation, and the changes in opinion and practice which led to numbers of cases being sent to Asylums for which such provision did not previously exist, or was not considered necessary. That in fact the insanity of 1858, which included the slighter forms of congenital deficiency, the impair-

ment of intellect accompanying old age and paralysis, and many slight transient attacks, was a different thing from the insanity of twenty years before, when Asylum accommodation was scanty, and was only considered necessary for severe cases. Since that time the changes have been all in the same direction, and it is not too much to say that the insanity of 1875, as measured by the standard of fitness for admission into an Asylum, is different from that of 1858. Legislation has favoured this. The change from Parochial to Union chargeability, no doubt tended to increase the admissions. The recent provision for repaying part of the cost of the maintenance of patients in Asylums from the Imperial Exchequer, will probably have a still more powerful effect. It is too soon to speak positively of the effects of a measure which has been so short a time in operation, but I think an increased tendency to send in cases which have been hitherto in workhouses may already be noticed. The anxiety of Boards of Guardians to remove the more harmless patients from the Asylum to the Workhouses appears also to be decidedly lessened, so that the number discharged relieved, during the year was only 6, being much below the average.

Whether for good, or ill, therefore the tendency to the accumulation of patients in Asylums, which has been increasing for many years, has in all probability received a fresh impetus. The female side of the house is full, and though considerable additions are in progress on the male side, yet when the patients now at Hereford are brought back, but a small margin will remain. The question of further provision therefore must soon be considered.

I cannot conclude this report without referring to the retirement, owing to impaired health, of a most valuable officer, Mr. George Gooding, who had held the responsible office of Chief Male Attendant since the opening of the Asylum in 1851.

I beg again to thank the Committee of Visitors, and the various Officers of the Institution for their kind aid and co-operation.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Joint Counties' Asylum, Abergavenny, January 14th, 1875.

Mr. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,-

I beg to lay before you my Annual Report for the year 1874.

The Daily and Sunday Services have been performed as in former years. There is great crowding of a Sunday, especially among the female patients; and the arrangements generally are far from what they ought to be in a properly constructed Chapel, more especially when the Holy Communion has to be administered.

Out of fifty-seven deaths, the number of burials in the Asylum Cemetery is, for the year, thirty-five; which happens to be the same as the preceding year. All the available space in the Cemetery is being used up, preparatory, I presume, to covering the whole of the surface with the earth obtained by the excavation rendered necessary for laying the foundation of the new building.

The stock of Bibles and Prayer Books is adequate for some months to come. I have to thank the Committee for an allowance of £5 for

the purchase of books for the Library. These books have been in considerable demand; and those who make a practice of reading have perused most of them. Another allowance of £5 for the present year would be very acceptable.

Three dramatic performances, and two concerts have been given during the year, together with readings and other amusements. The females who cannot, like the men, be induced to find amusement in bagatelle, take great delight in playing on the croquet table.

The Band is making satisfactory progress, and has played several pieces in public, some Christmas pieces with considerable skill. It comprises seven performers, one of them a patient; and if they contrive to keep together they will no doubt soon form an effective band. By instructing some of the fresh hands as supernumeraries, the band can be kept from being broken up by the leaving of the older members.

The Singing Class meets for practice twice a week, as in former years; Miss Bishop, and Miss Francis, the Female Head Attendant, give it their active support, and thanks are due to the members generally.

The additional allowance to Working Patients is thus divided:-Bread and Cheese, with half a pint of Beer or Cider in the morning, and

half a pint of Beer or Gider in the afternoon.

On Tuesdays the Meat and Vegetables are made into an Irish Stew, and occasionally Rhubarb, Suet, or Meat Puddings are substituted, On Tuesdays the Meat is made into Peas Soup.

The Female Patients in the Refractory Wards and those resident in the Laundry Building, are each allowed half a pound of Bread weekly extra. The Female Patients in the Refractory Ward in Bulk, and are there divided by the Attendant among the Patients resident, according to their respective requirements; by this practice, very little, (if any) waste occurs.

The Tea and Coffee is made by the Attendant in each Ward—each Female Patient being allowed 14oz. Tea, 41b. Sugar, and 1pt. Milk weekly.

The Tea and Coffee is made by the Attendant in each Ward—each Female Patient being allowed 2oz. Goffee, 3oz. Tea, 41b. Sugar, and 1pt. Milk weekly.

Five days in the week the Patients have two kinds of Vegetables—Potatos always; the second vegetable consisting of whatever may be in

season, such as Cabbage, Brocoli, Beans, Peas, Turnips, Carrots, Parsnips, &c. An equivalent in Cheese is often given in lieu of Butter for Supper.
