

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



# CHAPLAIN'S REPORT, 1870.

# To the Right Worshipful the PRESIDENT, the Worshipful the TREASURER, and the GOVER-NORS of King Edward's Schools.

My LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to lay before you my Annual Report on the state and progress of your Schools in London and Witley.

Between the 1st January, 1870, and the 31st December of the same year, the admissions and discharges were as follows:—

Admitted.	Discharged.
Boys 57	Boys 45
Girls 47	Girls 37
TOTAL 104	Тотал 82

There were remaining in the Schools, at the end of the year, 119 boys and 120 girls, making a total of 239 inmates.

Two boys and one girl were admitted from the City of London.

You have, as in the previous year, increased the number of inmates by ten in each School. But, notwithstanding this, fewer vacancies have occurred, in consequence of the early age at which most of the children were admitted, which obliges us to retain them in the Schools a longer time before they are old enough for employment. Thus, the admission of boys has fallen from 63 in 1869 to 57 in 1870; and of girls, during the corresponding period, from 56 to 47.

I do not, however, think that this is a circumstance to be altogether regretted, as it affords us increased opportunities of completing their mental and industrial training. It is, nevertheless, one which requires explanation, as a bare comparison of tabulated statements might otherwise lead to the conclusion that employers are not so anxious as formerly to engage our inmates. This is certainly not the case. I could have placed a very much larger number of boys in the Royal Navy last year if the School had contained them of the required age; and for girls, the Matron has always more applications than she can supply.

The Girls' School was examined on Wednesday, July 27th, by the Rev. J. WALLACE, Chaplain of the Magdalen Hospital; the Boys' School on the next day, by the Rev. H. S. Wood, formerly Chaplain and Superintendent of the Royal Patriotic School. I transcribe their Reports.

> "THE MAGDALEN HOSPITAL, "STREATHAM. S.W.

"DEAR MR. TREASURER,

"It is, I believe, my duty to report to the Governors the result of my inspection of King Edward's Girls' School on the 27th July.

"I found the whole interior of the buildings clean, sweet, and in good order. The beds in the Dormitories were, I think, rather crowded, but this will shortly be remedied by occupying the Dormitories vacated by the boys. Every child, however engaged, was clean and tidy. The copy-books were very clean, and I was pleased to notice that the hand-writing, both on paper and slate, shewed considerable character.

"The Reading, with few exceptions, and those at the bottom of each class, was clear, deliberate, and well emphasized; the Spelling remarkably good; the Arithmetic, among the elder girls, in my judgment, amply sufficient. In the examination on Scripture I rarely failed to obtain an answer from some part of the class. What especially pleased me was the bright, open aspect of the girls' faces, and their frank yet respectful manner.

"I think the Governors have much reason to be satisfied with those who have charge of the School.

### "KING EDWARD'S SCHOOLS FOR BOYS, "WITLEY.

"I have this day inspected the above School, and found everything most satisfactory. The Establishment seems conducted in an admirable manner; and the tone of the School, together with the order, cleanliness, healthy and happy looks of the boys, are very noticeable.

"I also examined the boys in Scripture and Church Catechism. History, Geography, Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, and Dictation—in all of which they acquitted themselves in a deserving manner, and, in most subjects, far above my expectations. It would be invidious to particularize any special part, but I cannot forbear alluding to the Mental-Arithmetic, which was responded to in a marvellously rapid manner; so much so that it might have struck those present that the boys were aware of the questions about to be put—but this was not the case.

"The Orthography also was beyond the average. Such a result could not have been produced without much painstaking labour on the part of the Schoolmaster.

"The boys' Singing was very pleasing, and the Band-considering the very short time they have for acquiring any knowledge of music-acquitted themselves very creditably.

"The Drillmaster seems to have the boys in excellent order, and the movements they were put through did both master and boys much credit.

"In concluding my Report, I must be allowed to suggest that it would be highly advisable, if possible, if more time be given for Inspection and Examination; for under the present arrangement the Examination must necessarily be of too cursory a description to do justice either to the Officers of the Establishment or to the boys themselves.

Prizes were awarded by the Governors to seven of the most deserving scholars in each School, to which the Treasurer most kindly added one to each School from himself, and the Chaplain one to each of the Pupil Teachers.

I trust you will think these Reports satisfactory. It was a matter of regret to us that H.M. Inspector, E. C. TUFNELL, Esq., owing to the pressure of official engagements, was unable, as in former years, to accept the invitation of the Governors to undertake these duties. His place was, however, very efficiently supplied by the gentlemen above-named and our thanks are due to them for the painstaking and kind manner in which the Examinations were conducted. I may mention that the suggestion contained in Mr. WALLACE'S Report has been adopted and carried out by the fitting up of an additional Dormitory.

The Annual Concert at Witley took place on Tuesday and Wednesday, February 8th and 9th. So popular have these Entertainments become that we were obliged, in order

to avoid disappointment to the number of our neighbours who desired to be present, to give it on two nights instead of one; and on each occasion the room was quite full. These Concerts are the result of some two months' hard practice by the Masters and boys, which fill up the long Winter evenings in a very agreeable and profitable manner—the ordinary work of the School not being suspended for a single day. We shall hope to continue them in future years.

One hundred and thirty-one rewards have been paid by the Committee during the year to former inmates who brought certificates of good conduct in their places.

Twenty-five boys and 11 girls were rewarded for the first time; 29 boys and 6 girls for the second time; and 41 boys and 19 girls for the third and last time.

The moral conduct of the inmates of both Schools has been satisfactory, and their health remarkably good. An alteration in the clothing of the boys has been introduced; which, at a slightly increased cost to the Governors, has contributed much to their comfort and appearance.

Two of the most intelligent boys in the School have been appointed Pupil Teachers, and now render valuable assistance to the Schoolmaster in the management of the classes. This arrangement enables us to dispense with the service of an Assistant Schoolmaster, and to give a greater amount of supervision to the boys in the play-hours, by the appointment of a School Corporal in his place. These lads will, in all probability, proceed to one of the Training Colleges in the course of a few years, and ultimately become National Schoolmasters.

I am not aware that there is any other subject worthy of the notice of the Governors in the events of the last year.

In concluding my 15th year of office, I reflect with satisfaction that I have been able to place upwards of 1,600 boys and girls in permanent situations from the Schools since my connexion with the Royal Hospitals commenced; and the fact that the Governors have, during the same period, expended more than *two thousand pounds* in rewards to such of them as have attended with good characters from their employers, proves most convincingly the permanent nature of the work effected amongst the most destitute and neglected of the population of the Country.

REPORT.

To the Right Worshipful the PRESIDENT, the Worshipful the TREASURER, and the GOVERNORS of the Royal Hospital of Bethlem.

My LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

In accordance with the regulations of my office I have the honour to lay before you the Annual Report of the Hospital, accompanied by Statistical Tables for the year which has just closed.

During the year 1870, 235 patients were admitted, 211 were discharged, and 32 died.

On the 1st of January of the present year, 253 patients remained in the Hospital, arranged according to the following classification :—

It will be noticed that the deaths of males is far in excess of those of females. This is contrary to the usual experience in the Hospital, and can easily be accounted for by the very feeble condition of many of the patients when brought, and also from the great

increase in the number of cases of general paralysis now admitted. I have noticed from time to time in my yearly Reports that this form of mental disease is decidedly on the increase; and each year's experience at Bethlem strengthens this opinion. The bodily state of many when brought to the Hospital is most deplorable, and, in this respect, an institution like Bethlem has disadvantages over a County Asylum as, in one case, the patient, when decidedly insane, at once comes under the notice of the Relieving Officer, whilst, in the other, the friends, anxious to try every thing before resorting to the one thing needful, lose much valuable time. It is no uncommon occurrence to have patients admitted who have been four or five days without nourishment, or who have exhibited symptoms of insanity for several months. A disease, in the first instance quite amenable to treatment, is thus rendered almost hopeless, through the mistaken kindness of friends.

Three Inquests have been held during the year. One in the case of a Male Patient who unfortunately committed suicide, the circumstances of which were fully investigated at the time by the Committee; and the other two in cases where death had taken place shortly after admission, and some inquiry was deemed necessary by the Coroner.

The present method of holding Inquests in Asylums, at the discretion of the Coroner, upon a report given by the Medical Superintendent, is, in my opinion, unsatisfactory, and it would, I think, be for the benefit of the inmates, as well as of the Institution, if an Inquest were held in every case of

death in a public Lunatic Asylum. I may instance that at the present time we have one criminal patient who has been an inmate of the Hospital for many years, and whenever her death may take place an Inquest will be held, simply owing to the fact that she is a Government patient.

I feel confident that a strict inquiry into the cause of death of every lunatic would only increase the high reputation of most of our public Asylums, and silence the slanders of those, who, picking out isolated cases of bad treatment, overlook the fact of the many thousands of lunatics of a most dangerous and suicidal class who are kept not only in safety so far as themselves and the public are concerned, but are surrounded by every comfort that skill and humanity can suggest.

During the past year steps have been taken by several of the Medical Schools of London towards making a study of Insanity a part of the medical curriculum; and the Governors of St. Thomas's have done me the honour to appoint me Lecturer on Mental Diseases at their Hospital. All Students attending my course of Lectures will be admitted to the practice of Bethlem Hospital, and be enabled to study by actual observation, the phenomena of mental disorders. It is to be hoped that before long ample opportunities will be afforded to students and medical men of studying the pathology and treatment of insanity; and inducements offered, by the pursuit of psychological medicine obtaining its proper recognition in the course of medical education.

The Governors of Bethlem Hospital, in appointing two Resident Medical Students, have offered great facilities to men who, having finished their ordinary hospital career, have time to devote six or twelve months to the special study of psychology. Two or three public Asylums have followed this example, and doubtless some day, by the system of "internes," as in France, each public Asylum will be rendered available for practical instruction.

Two of the Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Hospital in August, and left the following Report :----

> "BETHLEM HOSPITAL, "13th August, 1870.

"Upon our visit to-day we have inspected all the wards of the Hospital, and, with the exception of 2 of the male and 21 of the female sex, absent on leave, have seen all the patients.

"We have to report the following as the changes in the patients, since the visit of our Colleagues, 16th December last, and their present numbers :—

"One of the male patients above referred to as absent on leave, must be considered as discharged by operation of law, not having returned to the Hospital within the period last limited for his absence.

"Of the females absent, six are on what is termed "short leave."

"The result is that the patients seen by us were 267 in number, viz.: 117 males, and 150 females.

"The patients last registered as under medical treatment were 7 in the male, and 10 in the female division.

"There has not, since the last visit, been in the Hospital any disorder of an epidemic character.

"According to the Medical Journal, since our last visit 6 male and 9 female patients have been secluded, on account of their violent excitement; the former altogether on 8, and the latter on 74 occasions.

"About 75 male and 37 female patients attend Divine Service in the Chapel on Sundays.

"The means of amusement consist chiefly of billiards, bagatelle, chess, cards, and music; and the female patients much enjoy the game of croquet, for which the ground is well kept.

"An ample number of entertaining books and periodicals are circulated through all the wards, in the best of which there are libraries immediately accessible to the patients.

"During the winter months there are weekly evening entertainments.

"We have to report most favourably of the cleanliness and good order of the several corridors and rooms, wherein much has been recently done, and is proposed, with a view to enliven them and give them an aspect of comfort.

"We trust that, in these respects, the wards still incomplete will shortly be assimilated to the others. We refer, inter alia, to the blinds and valances in the sleeping rooms.

"The ventilation of some of the padded rooms is imperfect, in consequence of the want of circulation therein of pure external air.

"The arrangements for bathing have been improved since the last visit; two patients no longer, in any case, being bathed in the same water.

"The patients of both sexes and all classes, at the time of our visit, were, with scarcely an exception, orderly in demeanour, and their personal condition generally was satisfactory.

"We repeat the recommendation contained in the last Report, that some of the patients of the least favourable class, now confined to the basement, should, from time to time, be admitted to participate in the advantages of those of a more cheerful character.

"The Convalescent Branch Establishment at Witley, is expected to be opened within a month from this time.

"In the absence for a few days of Dr. WILLIAMS, we were conducted over the Institution by Dr. RAYNER, who has very recently succeeded, as Assistant Medical Officer, Dr. KEMPTHORNE, who died lately.

"From Dr. RAYNER we received every assistance and information relative to the several cases.

# "R. W. S. LUTWIDGE, Commissioners in "ROBERT NAIRNE, Lunacy.

The Convalescent Establishment at Witley was completed during the year, and about 50 patients enjoyed a few weeks' country holiday. The grounds are not yet properly laid out, but great progress has been made, and, owing to the exertions of Mr. HAYDON, the interior of the building is most comfortably fitted up in every respect.

By the death of Dr. KEMPTHORNE, the Assistant Medical Officer, the Hospital lost a most talented man, who, apparently, had a brilliant career before him; and I wish to

place on record my sincere regret at the loss of a brother officer, who, by his kind and genial manner had endeared himself to the patients, and was ever foremost in aiding in any plan that might be brought forward for their welfare or amusement.

Dr. RAYNER was appointed as Dr. KEMPTHORNE's successor, and I find him a zealous and agreeable colleague.

It is also my painful duty to record the death, in January last, of Sir CHARLES HOOD, who had been so intimately connected with this Hospital, for many years as Resident Physician, and latterly as Treasurer.

During the past year there has been very little alteration in the ordinary daily routine of the Hospital, and the occupations and amusements of the patients have been the same as in former years.

Some new remedies have been brought prominently before the public, which apparently promised much, as regards the alleviation of acute symptoms. One of these, hydrate of chloral, I have employed very extensively, and at times in large doses. I know that many very eminent men have spoken highly in its praise, and after so short a trial I do not feel disposed to deny its value, but, at present, in my hands, this drug has not fulfilled the expectations I had formed from reading the Reports of other Superintendents of Asylums. These remarks refer entirely to cases of insanity, as in several instances in ordinary practice I have found most beneficial results from its use.

It is satisfactory to be able to state that the conduct of the Attendants, on the whole, has been most exemplary, no case of dismissal, on any account, having occurred during the year. When so much depends on their care and watchfulness, it is gratifying to find a hearty co-operation in all endeavours to promote the interests of the patients.

I cannot conclude this Report without expressing my cordial thanks to all the Officers for the continued assistance rendered me in my daily duties, whereby my labours have been so much lightened, and my anxieties diminished. I am also deeply sensible of the kind consideration and courtesy I have received from the President, Treasurer, and every Governor, and trust for many years to merit a continuance of their confidence.




