the year 1866.

Two of the boys admitted had been convicted of crime, and 4 destitute cases were admitted from the City of London on the recommendation of the Aldermen.

There were remaining in the Institution on the 31st of December last, 74 boys and 100 girls, making a total of 174 children.

On the 13th of June, the Schools were examined by Her Majesty's Inspector, in the presence of several Governors. The following is the Official Report:—

“ Examined the Schools. Considering the age at which

the children enter these Schools, mostly quite uninstructed, I think they pass a very creditable examination.

178 boys and 42 girls, former inmates of the Schools, attended before the Committee with certificates of good conduct from their employers, and received the customary reward of £1 each. 66 boys and 25 girls were rewarded for the first time ; 53 boys and 12 girls for the second, and 59 boys and 5 girls for the third and last time.

The health of the inmates has been remarkably good, and their personal conduct as satisfactory as I could desire.

In my last Report, I alluded to the approaching removal of the boys to the new School at Witley, and I anticipated that it would have taken place at a much earlier period than has been found practicable. The necessary preparations for it, and the partial removal of furniture, diminishing the sleeping accommodation for the boys' side of the present building, has obliged the Committee to suspend fresh admissions for the last three months, except in very urgent cases. This circumstance will account for the comparatively small number of boys received during the past year. It is probable that the boys will be settled in their new home in the course of a very few weeks from the present date.

The near prospect of this event, and the many and unusual engagements in which it has involved me, will, I trust, be my excuse for the brevity of this Report.

DAILY OCCUPATION OF THE INMATES.

Hours of Rising.

Six o'clock in the summer months, and not later than 7 o'clock in the winter months.

After private prayer in each dormitory, washing, dressing, &c.

On Week-days.

Until 8 o'clock.—The Trades-boys to be employed at their Trades, and the School-boys in making the beds, and sweeping and cleaning the dormitories and other apartments on the male side. The girls selected for employment in the Laundry and Kitchen, and in Household Work, to be engaged in their particular occupations, and the rest in making beds, and sweeping and cleaning the dormitories and other apartments on the female side.

From 8 to 9 o'clock.—Prayers, breakfast, and recreation.

From 9 to 1 o'clock (except Saturdays)—Trades-boys at their trades from 9 to 12, and in School from 12 to 1, except three boys employed as bakers, who shall attend School two hours every afternoon.

School-boys in school from 9 to $\frac{1}{4}$ before 12 o'clock, and in occupation from 12 to 1 under the Arts-masters, as the Superintendent shall direct.

Girls selected for particular employments to be at their respective occupations from 9 to 1 o'clock, as the Matron shall direct; and on alternate days at school during the same hours.

From 1 to 2 o'clock—Dinner and recreation.

From 2 to 6 o'clock (except Saturdays)—Trades boys at their trades. School-boys at school from 2 till 5 o'clock, and from 5 till 6 o'clock in occupation, as the Superintendent shall direct.

Girls selected for particular employments to be at their respective occupations, and the rest at needlework, from half-past 2 till 5 o'clock, and in occupation from 5 till 6 o'clock, as the Matron shall direct.

From 6 to $7\frac{3}{4}$ o'clock—Supper and recreation.

From $7\frac{3}{4}$ to 8 o'clock—Prayer.

8 o'clock—Bed-time.

On Saturdays.

No school to be kept, either in the morning or afternoon, and no trades-boys to be required to work at their trades after 12 o'clock. The inmates on this day to be engaged in cleaning the establishment, assorting and distributing clean linen, using the bath, and in such other occupations as the Superintendent and Matron shall respectively direct. The recreation of the inmates to be, when the weather will permit, in the airing grounds, and at other times in the day-rooms, which are to be provided with suitable books for amusement and instruction.

On Sundays.

Until 8 o'clock—The inmates to be occupied in *making beds, changing linen, and delivering up all that is dirty*, and preparing for the proper spending of the day.

From 8 to 10 o'clock—Breakfast, and walking in the airing-grounds, when the weather will permit.

From 10 to 11 o'clock—In school-rooms, reading the Lessons for the day, repeating Catechism, and answering questions on scriptural subjects.

From 11 to 1 o'clock—In Chapel for Morning Service and Sermon.

1 o'clock—Dinner.

1½ to 3½ o'clock—In the day-rooms and airing-courts.

3½ o'clock—Afternoon Service in Chapel, and Sermon.

7 o'clock—Supper.

8 o'clock—Bed-time.

Three quarters of a pound of butter, one pound of cheese, eight pounds of bread per week (if required). Two pounds of flour once in three weeks (Artsmasters). Two ounces of tea, one pound of raw sugar per week.

The Female Monitors to dine together, apart from the other children, and at a different time, their dinner being cooked separately, when practicable, by the monitors themselves in rotation, for the purpose of increasing their experience in cooking as practised in private families, but being in accordance with the diet allowed, except on Saturdays, when it shall be Meat-pie.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to place before you a Report of the proceedings in Bethlem Hospital during the year 1866, accompanied by the usual Statistical Tables.

During the past year one hundred and eighty-seven patients were admitted into the curable establishment, one hundred and ninety-seven were discharged, and nine-

teen died, which, compared with the Tables for the year 1865, shows a decrease of eight in the admissions, an increase of fifty in the discharges, and a diminution of three in the deaths.

On the first day of January, 1867, two hundred and forty-eight patients remained on the books of the Hospital, classed in the following order:—

The extension of the rules regarding the admission of patients has been fully acted up to during the past year, and no application has been refused where the disease had not lasted for more than twelve months. This may, perhaps, account for the great number of inmates suffering from General Paralysis now in the Hospital, but it can hardly be denied that this form of disease appears to be on the increase. In several instances the symptoms, at first obscure, have become fully developed since admission, but in every case the benefits of the Institution are given for at least twelve months, and the Sub-Committee have frequently, on my recommendation, extended the time of residence in the Hospital to a much longer period.

During the past year a large proportion of the patients were in feeble health at the time of their admission. Three were in such an exhausted condition that they were never able to leave their beds, and were only kept alive by most unremitting care. Two sank within a few days, and the third on the sixteenth day after admission.

The urgent necessity of early treatment cannot be insisted upon too often. Through the mistaken kindness of friends, the removal of the patient is frequently postponed, until when brought to the Hospital all reasonable hope of recovery has passed away.

Since November 1, 1865, there have been two Resident Students in the Hospital. There can be no doubt but that these Studentships will prove a great boon to younger members of the profession, especially those who intend to devote themselves to the study of psychological medicine.

In the first instance there were only three candidates. In November, 1866, nine qualified men, several of them having taken honours at the London University, sought the appointments.

In June last a letter was received from Dr. Carpenter, Registrar of the University of London, stating that the University would receive certificates from the medical staff of this Hospital for the purposes of gradua-

tion in medicine. When this becomes more widely known it is to be expected that many will avail themselves of the privilege of studying under favourable circumstances the diagnosis, treatment, and pathology of this most important branch of medicine.

The alterations in the Lower Galleries, suggested by your late respected Resident Physician, on the removal of the criminal buildings, are now completed. The additions of a Workroom on the female side, and a Reading Room on the male side, are great improvements, and tend much to increase the comfort and well-being of the patients in these wards.

The daily routine of the Hospital has continued much the same as in former years. Frequent dances, meetings for lectures, music or singing, have served to pass the winter evenings in a most agreeable manner. In the summer we have had outdoor games—cricket, bowls, croquet,—and very frequent excursions beyond the walls of the Hospital.

I may here call especial notice to the Excursions to the Sea-side, the benefits of which have this year, through the liberality of the Committee, been extended to nearly forty patients. It is impossible to estimate too highly the beneficial effects they have produced, more especially on many who, though on the Incurable List, and unable to be entirely freed from the moral discipline of the Hospital, are yet, in their lucid intervals keenly alive to the kindness that allows them to

anticipate so agreeable a change in their usual daily life and occupations.

It is a great cause of thankfulness that another year has passed without suicide or serious accident of any kind, and I must here express my gratitude to my medical colleague, and the other officers of the Hospital, who, by their cordial and ready co-operation have assisted so much in lightening the duties of my office.

In conclusion, I beg sincerely to thank the President, Treasurer, and other members of the Committee for their kindness and consideration during the past twelve months.

My best endeavours shall be given to secure their confidence, and to maintain the high reputation of the Hospitals.
