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# KING EDWARD'S SCHOOLS.

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## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT, 1867.

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To the Right Worshipful the PRESIDENT,  
the Worshipful the TREASURER, and the  
GOVERNORS of King Edward's Schools.

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to lay before you my Report, on  
the state and progress of your Schools, for the year  
1867, with the Statistical Tables appended.

During that year there were—

Leaving, on the 31st December, 95 boys in the School  
at Witley, and 92 girls at the School in London.

On referring to the Statistical Tables, you will perceive that no children, of either sex, were admitted, who had previously been convicted of crime; nor, so far as I recollect, did any such children apply for admission: cases of this kind are not rigidly excluded by the Regulations of the Charity, but are admissable under exceptional circumstances, and to a limited and specified extent. But I am always glad when I am able to report the absence of this element from the Schools: for the experience I have gained during my twelve years' service as your Chaplain, convinces me that the association of criminal children with those who are simply destitute, exercises a most baneful influence on the latter, and lowers the general tone and character of the Institution. There are now, happily, many schools maintained for the express purpose of reforming juvenile delinquents, and educating neglected children, the managers of which usually obtain by law a small weekly payment from the parents: an admirable arrangement, since it affords some security against parental misconduct. And it appears to me highly desirable that criminal and neglected children should generally be remitted to Certified Reformatories, or Industrial Schools; and should not be allowed to participate in the free advantages of a Charitable Institution, to the exclusion of others who, amidst great temptation, have hitherto maintained a fair character.

I must again remark upon the early age at which the



majority of the children are now admitted. Twenty-three only of the boys, and about the same number of girls, had reached the age of 13 years. As boys cannot now enter the Royal Navy until they are 14 years and 6 months old, and as girls are certainly not fit for domestic service at an earlier period, it is obvious that we cannot now discharge to situations as many as we formerly did. I have had, during the last year, an almost unlimited number of appointments in the Royal Navy, placed at my disposal, of which I have only been able to avail myself to a comparatively small extent, not having a sufficient number of boys, of the necessary age and physical requirements, to meet the demand. In the course of the year, the boys have been removed from London to Witley : the new building having been formally opened by the President and Governor, on the 5th of April. The removal, involving a considerable amount of labour and anxiety upon your Executive, was very successfully accomplished. The Time Tables have been carefully revised : and the intervals of mental instruction and industrial employment more equally distributed. Garden and field labour has been introduced, and the boys have rendered considerable assistance in laying out the ornamental grounds, rooting up stumps of trees, levelling and preparing the soil for future crops. The previous condition of the site—a thick pine wood,—made this a work of no ordinary difficulty, and a much larger amount has been executed than would be visible to a casual observer. When the formation of the ground has been completed, I am

hoping, with the sanction of the Committee, to allot small plots to some of the senior and well-conducted lads, for their own use and amusement: a privilege which, I think, will be very highly valued, and which will afford a means of healthy recreation, and foster and encourage an industrial habit.

I cannot speak too highly of the moral conduct both of the boys and the girls. Speaking more particularly of the boys, I may mention that the gentry resident in a neighbourhood of the School looked forward to our advent with much apprehension. They anticipated that the boys would be constantly straying out of bounds, and that their fruits and flowers would be subject to frequent depredations. I am happy to say that these fears have been completely dissipated. I have not received a single complaint of the kind: and thus, although under certain regulations, the boys are occasionally allowed to go from the premises entirely unattended. On the contrary, I have been congratulated on the orderly and respectful conduct of our lads, and upon the good moral tone that appears to pervade the School. Many of our neighbours are in the habit of joining our congregation on Sunday Evenings in the Temporary Chapel, and have remarked with satisfaction upon the reverent behaviour of the inmates, and the heartiness with which they join in our plain and simple services.

During the Autumn, both Schools were visited by



scarlet fever, happily, of a very mild type. The epidemic, however, speedily vanished, under the skilful treatment and sanitary means suggested by the Medical Officers of Bethlehem Hospital, and has not since re-appeared. All the patients recovered, and the health of both Schools is now in a satisfactory state.

The annual inspection and examination of both Schools took place in the months of July and August. The examination of the Girls' School was conducted by the Rev. S. EARNSHAW, of St. John's College, Cambridge, one of the Chaplains of the Parish Church of Sheffield. That of the Boys' School, by E. C. TUFNELL, Esq., one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools, to whose kindness we have been indebted in former years. I transcribe the Reports of these gentlemen, which I trust will be deemed satisfactory.

*" Girls' School, Tuesday, July 23rd, 1867.*

" The girls passed a good examination in Reading, Writing, Spelling, and the Elementary Rules of Arithmetic. They also answered questions on the Church Catechism, in a way that shewed that they had been well and carefully instructed in Religious Knowledge. They are in a good state of discipline; and the state of the School, generally, reflects much credit on the Mistress. The children have been carefully and intelligently taught.

*" Boys' School, August 2nd, 1867.*

" Examined the School. It seems, throughout, in excellent order, and the boys decidedly passed a better examination than at any former inspection, and do great credit to their Managers and Teachers.

One hundred and thirty boys, and thirty-six girls, former inmates, attended before the Committee with certificates of good conduct from their employers, and received the customary reward of £1 each. 45 boys, and 19 girls were rewarded for the first time ; 43 boys and 11 girls for the second, and 42 boys and 6 girls for the third and last time.

I am not aware that there are any other circumstances to which it is necessary to direct the attention of the Governors.

In concluding this Report, I have to express my satisfaction at the manner in which the various officers and servants under my control have severally discharged their duties. To the Governors I would also offer my best thanks for the kindness and confidence with which they continue to honour me.

## No. 9.

## DAILY OCCUPATION OF THE INMATES.

*Hours of Rising.*

Six o'clock in the summer months, and not later than 7 o'clock in the winter months.

After private prayer in each dormitory, washing, dressing, &c.

*On Week-days.*

*Until 8 o'clock.*—The Trades-boys to be employed at their Trades, and the School-boys in making the beds, and sweeping and cleaning the dormitories and other apartments on the male side. The girls selected for employment in the Laundry and Kitchen, and in Household Work, to be engaged in their particular occupations, and the rest in making beds, and sweeping and cleaning the dormitories and other apartments on the female side.

*From 8 to 9 o'clock.*—Prayers, breakfast, and recreation.



*From 9 to 1 o'clock (except Saturdays).—*Trades-boys at their trades from 9 to 12, and in School from 12 to 1, except three boys employed as bakers, who shall attend School two hours every afternoon.

School-boys in school from 9 to  $\frac{1}{4}$  before 12 o'clock, and in occupation from 12 to 1 under the Arts-masters, as the Superintendent shall direct.

Girls selected for particular employments to be at their respective occupations from 9 to 1 o'clock, as the Matron shall direct; and on alternate days at school during the same hours.

*From 1 to 2 o'clock—*Dinner and recreation.

*From 2 to 6 o'clock (except Saturdays).—*Trades boys at their trades. School-boys at school from 2 till 5 o'clock, and from 5 till 6 o'clock in occupation, as the Superintendent shall direct.

Girls selected for particular employments to be at their respective occupations, and the rest at needlework, from half-past 2 till 5 o'clock, and in occupation from 5 till 6 o'clock, as the Matron shall direct.

*From 6 to 7 $\frac{3}{4}$  o'clock—*Supper and recreation.

*From 7 $\frac{3}{4}$  to 8 o'clock—*Prayer.

*8 o'clock—*Bed-time.

#### *On Saturdays.*

No school to be kept, either in the morning or afternoon, and no trades-boys to be required to work at their trades after 12 o'clock. The inmates on this day to be engaged in cleaning the establishment, assorting and distributing clean linen, using the bath, and in such other occupations as the Superintendent and Matron shall respectively direct. The recreation of the inmates to be, when the weather will permit, in the airing grounds, and at other times in the day-rooms, which are to be provided with suitable books for amusement and instruction.

#### *On Sundays.*

MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN,

In accordance with the rules of my office, I beg to lay  
before you the Annual Report of the Hospital, accom-  
panied with the usual statistical tables.

During the year, 204 patients were admitted, 187 were  
discharged, and 29 died.

On the 1st January, 1868, there were remaining in the  
Hospital 236 patients classified thus :—

The first thing that may be noticed in the preceding figures is an increase in the number of deaths that have taken place during the year. Several circumstances have, however, combined to produce this result. The first and most important one is perhaps the relaxation of the Rules of the Hospital in regard to the admission of patients who are suffering from any form of paralysis. A glance at Table No. 19 will shew, that out of the 29 deaths 11 are attributed to general Paralysis. In most of the cases this disease had made considerable progress when the patients were brought to the Hospital, but they were admitted on the ground that the symptoms had not existed 12 months.



This must have a marked effect on the statistics; but at the same time the usefulness of the Institution is greatly increased, and its charity extended to a class most requiring the care and comforts of a hospital.

In 11 cases death took place within a month of admission, all when brought to the Hospital being in very feeble health, and far advanced in physical disease.

The rule regarding the admission of patients whose condition threatens the speedy dissolution of life, can hardly ever be acted upon, as in most cases it would be unsafe to risk a return journey home, and even the possible chance of recovery would thus be destroyed. In many instances the patients were carried to bed, never to leave it again, only being kept alive for a short time through unremitting care and attention.

I have this year to report the death of a female patient who committed suicide by setting herself on fire. The case was fully reported to the Committee. An Inquest was held, and a verdict returned in accordance with the facts.

A reference to Table No. 15, will shew that at the present time there are 167 patients in the Hospital, who have manifested a suicidal tendency.

Some of these cases are most determined in their efforts to attempt self-destruction, and are only prevented from



effecting their object by constant watchfulness on the part of the Attendants.

There is this year an increase of 17 in the number of admissions over last year, and it is gratifying to be able to state that the per centage of cures remains at about the same as in previous years.

I have appended to my report an obituary drawn up after a plan adopted by Dr. BOYD, of the Somerset Asylum, shewing the post mortem appearances in those cases where an examination of the body was made.

We have had two Theatrical representations, viz: in March and November—and I am glad to state that these our first attempts at amusements of this character proved a great success. The portable Theatre was constructed on the premises by our own workmen, and many kind friends assisted in painting the scenery, and preparing the necessary dresses. We hope from time to time to repeat these performances.

Permission to send those patients to Brighton who were likely to be benefited by change of air and scene, was again granted this year, with very satisfactory results. I was enabled to send 30 females, and 20 males, for periods, varying from a fortnight to three weeks. In addition to the great good done to the patients, these visits are of marked service to the Attendants, being an agreeable, and in some cases necessary change from their

ordinary daily routine work. Only those living in an Asylum for the insane, can appreciate the care and anxiety necessary on the part of the Attendants to ensure the well-being and safety of the patients.

The sheds adjoining the painter's shop have been converted into shops for the tailor and shoemaker; the removal of the Boys from King Edward's School in London, to Witley in Surrey, rendering such an arrangement necessary.

The new airing grounds on the site of the old criminal buildings are now finished, with the valuable additions of a Racquet Court and Bowling Green on the male side, and a Croquet Lawn on the female side.

A garden Attendant was engaged in the summer, especially to look after the pleasure grounds. The advantage of this is already apparent in their improved condition, and also in the increased number of patients who are induced to employ themselves.

The Commissioners in Lunacy paid an official visit on the 25th and 26th of April and left the following record, "The condition in which we found the patients was very satisfactory. The greatest order and tranquillity prevailed throughout, and their persons and clothing were in a very creditable state."

In concluding this Report, I must take the opportunity



of thanking my Medical Colleague, and the other Officers and Servants of the Hospital, for their continued assistance, at all times cheerfully given me.

My thanks are also especially due to the President, Treasurer, and other Members of the Committee, for their kindness and consideration. I can only express a hope that I may merit a continuance of their confidence, and that Bethlem Hospital may always hold its high position amongst the Curative Establishments for the Insane.
