## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

Broadmoor Criminal Lunatic Asylum,

SIR, 29th January 1875.

I HAVE the honour to lay before you, for the consideration of the Council of Supervision, the following Report showing the general condition of this Asylum during the year 1874, together with the usual statistical information.

The number of patients in the asylum on the 1st of Number January 1874 was 518, of whom 413 were men and 105 ment. were women. During the year, 19 men and 12 women were admitted, making the total number under treatment 549; 3 women were discharged to the care of their friends; 6 men and 1 woman were removed, on their recovery, to various prisons, for the purpose either of being arraigned for trial, or of completing the terms of imprisonment to which they had been sentenced; 15 men were transferred to other asylums, being still insane after the expiration of their terms of imprisonment; and 11 men and 7 women died; thus leaving in the asylum on the 31st of December 506 patients, of whom 400 were men and 106 were women.

The daily average number resident during the year was Average 513, as compared with 508 in 1873; 503 in 1872; 483 in resident. 1871; and 452 in 1870.

The admissions during the year may be thus classified: Admissions. 3 men and 1 woman were certified to be insane whilst awaiting trial; 3 men and 3 women were found to be insane upon 37033. E. & S.—1.—7/75.

arraignment; 12 men and 7 women were tried and acquitted on the ground of insanity; 1 man was respited on the same ground after sentence of death had been passed; and 1 woman was certified to be insane, who, in the first instance, had been sentenced to death, but whose sentence had afterwards been commuted to penal servitude for life. A classification of the offences with which the foregoing persons were charged will be found in the 16th Table of the Appendix to this Report. Of the men, 9 were charged with murder; 5 with attempts to murder or wounding; 2 with arson; 1 with burglary; and 1 with attempting to commit suicide. Of the women, 11 were charged with murder; and 1 with wounding.

Offences committed by those admitted during the year.

Cases of homicide. The total number of persons admitted during the past five years who had committed homicide is shown in the following tabular form:—

Of the 9 men admitted in 1874 who had taken life, 1 had killed a fellow-patient in a county asylum, and 7 had killed persons nearly related to them; the relationship being in 3 cases that of child; in 2 cases that of wife; in 1 that of mother, and in 1 that of sister-in-law. In the remaining case, the patient had, whilst stationed in India, taken the lives of three of his native servants whom he suspected of attempting to poison him.

With respect to the 11 women, the victims were in 10 cases their own children, and in 7 of those cases the mothers were, at the time of committing the act, suffering from

insanity connected with the puerperal state.

Deaths.

The death-rate during the year, calculated upon the basis of the daily average number resident, was, in the male division, 2.70, and in the female division 6.54; giving an average rate for the whole of the asylum of 3.50.

The average annual death-rate for the whole of the period, since the opening of the asylum in the year 1863, has been

2.74, as shown in the 3rd Table in the Appendix. The death-rate in the male division during the past year was, therefore, slightly below the average, whilst in the female division it was considerably in excess. This excess in the female division may be partly accounted for by the fact that in the two preceding years the death-rate in that division was remarkably low, being in 1872 1.07 and in 1873 only '95. There was, in consequence, at the beginning of 1874, an accumulation of feeble cases.

An inquest was held in every case of death, and the Inquests following verdicts were returned:

A post-mortem examination was also made in every case, Post-morand the most noteworthy of the facts observed at those tem examinations. examinations are recorded by Dr. Cassidy, the Deputy Superintendent, in the 30th Table in the Appendix.

In no case was death due either to suicide or to accident.

The asylum has been entirely free from epidemic disease, General and the general health of the inmates has been satisfactory.

The 28th and 29th Tables record the principal diseases which have occurred during the year amongst the inmates, as well as amongst the families of officers and attendants, amounting to a population of rather more than 400 persons, residing upon the asylum estate.

There is nothing calling for special comment in the character of the diseases recorded in those tables, beyond the fact that rheumatic affections in various forms were unusually prevalent in the spring of the year.

The total loss of service in the staff of attendants due to Amount of amongst the sickness of all descriptions, during the year, amounted to sickness attendants. 1.79 per cent.

Freedom from accidents. of escape.

There were no instances, during the year, of the commission of premeditated acts of serious violence, and no One instance accident endangering life occurred. Indeed, the sole untoward event of any moment was the escape, on the 6th of December, of a male patient of the convict class, from his sleeping room. The patient was, however, quickly recaptured, and was brought back to the asylum in the He had been admitted from course of the forenoon. Millbank in the year 1872, having been certified to be insane, whilst undergoing a sentence of seven years' penal servitude for larceny, after several previous convictions. His escape was effected by making an aperture through the wall of his room, at a spot where it was weakened by the presence of an air-flue of faulty construction. The attention of the Office of Works was at once called to the matter, and steps have been taken for examining all the external walls, and for strengthening, as far as possible, those parts which most need it.

Offences committed by those remaining in the asylum on December 31st.

The offences committed by the patients who remained in the asylum on the 31st December are classified in Table 21. It will be seen by that table that at the end of the year there were 290 men and 83 men under orders of detention during Her Majesty's pleasure; and that there were 110 men and 23 women who had been transferred from prisons whilst undergoing sentences of penal servitude.

Diminution of number of men under sentences of penal servitude.

At the beginning of the year the number of men under sentences of penal servitude amounted to 135, but as no fresh cases belonging to this class were admitted into the male division of the asylum during the year, the number had, by reason of removals, recoveries, and deaths, diminished

during the year to the extent here indicated.

The comparative freedom from acts of insubordination and disorder during the past year may fairly be ascribed in part to this diminution in the number of men of the convict class, and in part to the plan which was during the year carried out, as far as the construction of the asylum would permit, of restricting the convict class to a certain number of wards set apart for them, instead of allowing them to intermingle with the other class as formerly.

In previous reports the opinion has been often expressed that the class consisting of persons who are sent to this asylum whilst undergoing sentences of penal servitude differs so widely from the class consisting of those admitted under orders of detention during Her Majesty's pleasure as to render it extremely desirable on every ground that the two

classes should cease to be intermingled.

Those who belong to the class detained during Her Majesty's pleasure are to a great extent persons who, in their various callings, have acquitted themselves honestly of their duties up to the period when they have become afflicted with insanity, and who then, under the influence of some delusion, and perhaps not watched by those around them, commit a crime. The important point to be observed is the sequence of events, first insanity, then crime, the crime being traceable

to insanity as effect to cause.

Those who have become insane whilst undergoing sentences of penal servitude are widely different. They are for the most part habitual criminals, whose whole lives have been antagonistic to the laws which govern and restrain the rest of mankind, and whose crimes have been in full conformity with their every-day habits. It is, indeed, impossible not to feel the injustice of compelling persons belonging to the former class to submit to lifelong association with those belonging to the latter. The objections which are urged against continuing to intermingle the two classes are, however, founded not only upon the injustice of the practice, but also upon its great inexpediency, because both classes can be treated far more satisfactorily and efficiently when hey are apart.

In the treatment of men who were criminals before they were insane, and who, at the time of being certified to be insane, are actually undergoing imprisonment for crimes which they committed when they were sane, and who, in the event of their recovery from insanity, are liable to return to prison to complete the terms of penal servitude

to which they have been sentenced, not only is a stricter system of discipline necessary, but a stricter system than that ordinarily employed in the treatment of other classes of the insane may legitimately be used.

The diminution which took place in the number of the convict class during the past year rendered it possible to make some partial advance towards effecting a separation between the two classes, although the construction of the asylum does not at present permit of that separation being made complete; and in those wards to which some of the convicts were restricted a system of treatment such as here adverted to was, as far as possible, established.

The result was that the wards from which the convicts were withdrawn quickly showed a much improved condition, and at the same time the chief sources of trouble formerly experienced in dealing with the convicts themselves were

removed.

On the other hand, to allow persons of the convict class to have the free range of a large establishment, organised, in all material respects, like a modern county asylum, is to place in their hands facilities for doing mischief of all kinds which cannot be effectually counteracted by even a very

large staff of attendants.

The convict prisons contain an average population of more than 8,000 men, besides women, and amongst this population there must necessarily be a considerable number in whom insanity sooner or later developes itself. It is, on the one hand, very necessary to take care lest the recognition of such insanity should be obscured by allowing the attention to be attracted solely to the co-existent criminal habits, but, on the other hand, it is not less necessary, when the existence of insanity has been undoubtedly recognised, that the subjects of it should be provided for and treated with suitable regard to their antecedents, and in such a mode as to limit as much as possible the spread of the moral contagion with which they are tainted.

With reference to this subject the Commissioners in Lunacy in their last Report upon the asylum express themselves as follows:——"After much consideration of the subject, "we are clearly of opinion that the separation of the classes advocated by the Broadmoor authorities should take place. The forced association of honest and well-conducted persons who, solely owing to mental disease, have broken the law with convicts whose criminal acts had probably been the cause of their mental disorder is evidently unjust, and there is every reason to believe that the successful manage-

" ment and treatment of both classes could be more safely " and efficiently conducted in separate institutions, with "different rules and modes of treatment, and wherein the " structural arrangements can be specially adapted to the " varying requirements of each."

The new laundry which was mentioned in the last report New works. as being in progress has been completed and opened. It is worked by a staff of laundry-maids assisted by female patients. A stoker attends to the boilers and machinery, but no male patients are employed there. The foul laundry has been closed, and now, no matter what may be the condition of articles when sent to the laundry, everything is returned to the wards thoroughly cleansed. The foulest portion of the linen is first subjected to the action of frequently renewed cold water in a dash-wheel, after leaving which it passes through the ordinary processes.

The most important of the other works was the construction of a new filter, which has much improved the condition

of the water.

In January the Rev. John McKenna succeeded the Rev. Changes in Louis Hall as visiting Roman Catholic chaplain, and this was the only change which occurred amongst the principal officers during the year. For several years preceding 1874 the changes in the medical staff had been frequent, owing to various causes, amongst which failing health and death played, unhappily, a very large part. The effect of the absence of change during the past year is very perceptible in the present orderly condition of the wards, and much credit is due to my colleagues, Dr. Cassidy and Dr. Davies, for the skill and energy with which they have performed their multifarious and onerous duties.

To the other officers of the asylum I desire to offer my sincere thanks for the assistance rendered by them in their

several departments.

The changes in the ranks of the attendants have not been numerous. Attendant Albert Blake was invalided in the early part of the year, and a gratuity of 33l. 15s. 3d. was awarded to him after five years' service. He lived only a short time after his retirement.

Of the 79 male and 21 female attendants whose names were on the books on the 1st of January, 70 of the former and 18 of the latter were still in the service of the asylum at the close of the year. .

Benjamin Yule, one of the stokers, who had been employed in that capacity from the opening of the asylum in 1863, died in the month of June from consumption. He was an efficient and trustworthy servant.

In conclusion, I desire most gratefully to acknowledge the constant support which I have received from the Council

of Supervision in the discharge of my duties.

### CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

SIR,

Broadmoor Asylum, 29th Jan. 1875.

No change was made during the year 1874 in the arrangement of the Sunday services in the chapel, which was described by me in my last report. Under that arrangement the only deviation from the appointed order of the Church is that the Litany is said at 6 P.M. The order of morning prayer is thus shortened from regard to the infirmities of some of the patients, and an additional service is provided both for patients and some officers who are precluded by their duties from attending either in the morning or in the afternoon.

On Ash Wednesday, on Good Friday, and on Christmas Day the order of the Church was fully observed. On all other days of the week morning prayer was said at 8:30 A.M., and every evening a special form of prayer has been used, as heretofore, in each separate block.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been administered monthly, on the three principal festivals of the Church, and

privately for the communion of sick patients.

The average number of patients attending Divine service on Sunday has been 92; on other days it has ranged from 22 to 42.

On Christmas Day the number was 115.

The number of patients admitted to Holy Communion has been 19.

I continue to observe the exceptional importance of the library of this asylum. The aggregate of intelligence in proportion to the number of patients being considerably greater than in other asylums, while the retention or recovery of mental power does not bring with it here as elsewhere the same hope of liberty, the position of many of the patients is distressing in the extreme; and it would be unsupportable if their minds were not directed from it by reading as well as by work. There are other patients in whom the criminal propensity will remain a constant source of danger while the mind retains considerable power; and with patients of this class it is of importance to the peace and to the safety of the asylum that they should be encouraged as much as may be to occupy themselves with books which either instruct or amuse them. I have the satisfaction to report that the provision made by the Council of Supervision for replenishing the library has, with care in the selection of the books, been

adequate to the requirements of the asylum.

In superintending the library I have continued to be assisted by Mr. Thomas, the schoolmaster. The training of the patients who act as a choir and the music in the services of the chapel are also under his direction. The training of the asylum band and the management of entertainments for the patients are also undertaken by him. These duties, in addition to the teaching of patients willing to be instructed by him in elementary knowledge, have been discharged by Mr. Thomas with great regularity.

I regret that I am not able to report a return to collective school teaching for patients. Peculiarities of character are found to render patients at this asylum averse to learning in classes, while a few of them are willing to avail themselves

of instruction given individually.

The school for the children of servants was examined on the 11th of November last. The average attendance during the school year had been 115. The number present on the day of examination was 102, of whom 46 were infants. The number qualified for examination in Standards was 63, of whom 56 were presented; and of these all passed in reading, all in writing, and 46 passed in arithmetic. Twelve were examined and all passed in history. The grant to which the school was entitled by these results was 86l. 18s., but the expenditure for the year had not exceeded 158l. 12s. 4d., and the grant was reduced to 79l. 6s. 2d.

I beg to submit, for the information of the Council of Supervision, the following extract from the summary of the Report of Her Majesty's Inspector transmitted to the

managers by the Education Department:--

"The whole of the school work does great credit to the "mistress and teachers. It is intelligent, thorough, and "careful. The infants' first class is well taught and orderly; "and the other infants' classes are very fairly taught also, but

" not quite steady enough in application."

In consequence of circumstances over which the managers had no control, Miss Wood, the mistress of the school, resigned her office at Christmas. The preceding Report of Her Majesty's Inspector makes it unnecessary that I should state the high opinion entertained by the managers of Miss Wood's qualification as a teacher.

I beg your permission, Sir, to propose, for the consideration of the Council of Supervision, one measure which appears to me to hold out hope of effecting some amelioration in the moral condition of this asylum and of asylums generally.

The mental condition of insane persons precluding sustained reasoning and lasting impressions, moral influence can only be brought to bear upon them extensively by a frequent succession of slight influences for good. Some compensation, however, for the evanescent character of good impressions may be found in that yielding to the force of habit and of sustained control, provided it is brought to bear so as not to arouse resistance, which characterizes the insane in a remarkable manner. In dealing therefore with insane persons, it is of paramount importance to induce, so far as practicable, by such continued influence, a habit of religious reverence and of virtuous demeanour. For sustaining such influence in all parts of an asylum, and at all times, the services of a chaplain are obviously inadequate. But I desire to submit for consideration whether such influences might not be brought to bear to a greatly increased extent by the introduction of a class of attendants specially trained for the work.

The increased power of influence over large numbers of children in schools which is acquired by the previous training of schoolmasters and schoolmistresses is exceedingly great. Similarly the employment of trained and educated nurses for the sick has been found to result in an improved moral influence over them, as well as in their increased physical comfort. Even for the medical officer of a lunatic asylum special training is held to be desirable. For attendants upon the insane the training required is in part

physical, in part moral, and in both parts special.

The expediency of employing a class of trained attendants occupied my attention many years ago, when I had the privilege of being associated with Dr. Conolly at Hanwell Asylum. At that time one obstacle which presented itself to the introduction of such a measure was that it would have entailed a trifling cost upon one county, while the benefit of it would have accrued to the country at large. In discharging the duties of my present office the importance of such a measure has again forced itself upon my observation, while the establishment of this national asylum under the control of Her Majesty's Government removes the difficulty to which I have referred and affords facilities for the measure. The expense would be inconsiderable, and would in the end be counterbalanced by increased efficiency of

management. If such a system were found to succeed here, two or three other asylums might with advantage be selected for additional training schools, and be subsidized under an arrangement not unlike that by which training colleges for schoolmasters and schoolmistresses are aided by the State.

I have received from the medical superintendent and from the other officers of the asylum uniform and cordial support

in the discharge of my duties.
