

TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

Broadmoor Criminal Lunatic Asylum, Crowthorne, Berks,

SIR,

24th September 1891. I HAVE the honour to submit, for the information of the Council of Supervision, the following report upon this asylum for the year 1890; together with the usual statistical tables for the same period.

The financial tables in the Appendix have reference to the

twelve months ending on the 31st of March 1891.

On the 1st of January 1890, the asylum contained 620 inmates,

there being 468 men and 152 women.

During the year, 46 men and 14 women were admitted, 4 men and 4 women were discharged out of custody, 2 men were sent back to prison, and 9 men and 9 women were transferred to other asylums.

On the 31st of December 1890 the inmates numbered 624, of

whom 474 were men and 150 were women.

In the course of the year, 680 persons in all were under detention in the asylum, namely, 514 men and 166 women. The average number resident was 624, namely 474 men and 150 women.

The following is the numerical distribution of the two classes

Table 28 details the crimes of the 624 patients who were inmates of the asylum on the 31st of December 1890, and their classification according to the various official stages at which insanity was recognised. It will be seen that the asylum population included 322 who had committed homicide (302 cases of murder and 20 of manslaughter). Of these, 200 were men and 122 were women.

The proportion of cases of homicide was, for the whole population, 52 per cent., for the male inmates alone 42 per cent., and for female inmates alone 81 per cent.

As many as 169 inmates (153 men and 16 women) were under

detention for "attempt to murder, maim, &c."

Admissions.

Of the 60 admissions during the year (46 men and 14 women) 37 (26 men and 11 women) were "Queen's pleasure" patients, i.e., insane persons (being criminal offenders) not sentenced to any term of imprisonment, but ordered to be detained during Her Majesty's pleasure. The remaining 23 (20 men and 3 women) consisted of insane convicts, i.e., of persons certified to be insane whilst undergoing various terms of penal servitude, including one man who was certified in the course of a term of ordinary imprisonment.

Re-admissions.

The admissions include one man who had previously been an inmate of Broadmoor and who had been conditionally discharged to the care of relatives. In consequence of his having relapsed into a state of insanity, he was brought back to Broadmoor, in accordance with the terms of release.

The particulars of all the re-admissions into Broadmoor are

given in Table 22.

Deaths.

The deaths were 28 in number, namely, 25 men and 3 women. The per-centage of deaths, reckoned upon the average number resident during the year, was, for the men 5.28; for the women 1.98; for both sexes 4.48. The yearly average per-centage of deaths for both sexes since the opening of the asylum is 3.12.

Of the deaths, 11 were referable to diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4 were due to consumption, and 4 to heart

disease.

The somewhat higher proportion of deaths during the past year was due partly to the influenza epidemic which proved fatal in three instances: but it was more especially brought about by the death of as many as six of the chronic cases received from Woking prison in October 1888, when the new wing was opened. Many of the 58 male convicts who were then admitted were, at the time, in an advanced stage of disease; and up to the end of 1890, 12 of them have died, giving a death-rate of upwards of 9 per cent. per annum.

There was one case of suicide, but beyond this there was no death except from ordinary causes. The male inmate who committed suicide was a comparatively recent admission. Whilst at exercise in the airing court, he had put himself in possession of a

sharpened piece of tin. Upon entering the block he went to the water-closet, and before the attendant, who was on the alert and followed him, could prevent him, he inflicted such severe injuries upon his throat that he died on the fifth day. Three months previously he had murdered his wife and brother-in-law by shooting, and attempted suicide by drowning. He was under observation in the hospital ward, and no blame could be attached to the attendant. The sufficiency of the care and supervision and the vigilance of the staff in cases of this sort is attested by the fact that since 1875 only one suicide (a female in 1884) has occurred in the asylum.

In accordance with regulation, the coroner held an inquest in every case of death. A post-mortem examination was made in each

case, and the notes are recorded in Table 37.

The average age at death was 53 years.

In Table 35 are recorded the principal diseases which occurred General health.

among the inmates during the year.

The general standard of health was quite up to the average, apart from the prevalence of the influenza, which was the only The influenza disease of an epidemic sort which visited the inmates of the epidemic. asylum.

With regard to this epidemic as it showed itself at Broadmoor, I give the following extract from an account sent by Dr. Noott, the senior assistant medical officer, to the "Lancet," of June 7th, 1890. "The first case was observed on January 8th, the last " case on May 3rd, the epidemic reaching its height about "February 14th. During this time 206 individuals were " attacked, of whom 176 were over 18 years of age, and 30 " under; of these latter, 24 were under 12 years of age; and of "the 176 adults, 141 were males and 35 females. Of 476 male " patients, 74 were affected, or 15.5 per cent.; of 151 female " patients, 20 were affected, or 13.2 per cent.; of 84 male " attendants, 46 were affected, or 54.7 per cent.; of 34 female " attendants, 11 were affected, or 32.3 per cent. This accounts " for 151 out of the total number, 206; the remaining 55 " occurred in the families of members of the staff, and among " members of the staff who are not attendants. The average " time during which the 46 male attendants were absent from "duty was 11.2 days; the longest absence being 21 days, and "the shortest 6 days. The average time during which the " 11 female attendants were absent from duty was 12.2 days, "the longest absence being 21 days, and the shortest 7. "The cases were on the whole simple in their character, and " free from complication."

During the height of the epidemic the disciplinary resources of the asylum were taxed to their very utmost, as many as 25 out of the 84 male attendants having been off duty at one time. All annual and daily leave had to be stopped, as well as the outside working Some amount of extra anxiety was felt under the parties.

circumstances, but, happily, all passed off without any untoward occurrence, the staff doing their extra duty with good will.

No serious casualty.

The only noticeable casualty during the year was the case of a violent inmate who assaulted, without notice, an attendant, and who in the struggle fell under the attendant and received a fracture of his arm. He made a good recovery.

No escape. No mechanical There was no successful attempt at escape, and it was not found necessary to have recourse to mechanical restraint in any form during the year.

Industrial occupation.

From the Return given in Table 34 it will be seen that 233 men and 117 women were usefully employed at remunerative work. The value of their labour amounted to 4,100*l*.

New works and alterations. The following works have been carried out during the year ending 31st March 1891:—

A piece of wall 900 ft. in length by 16 ft. in height has been built, forming part of the new boundary wall of the garden.

Two new steam boilers, 16 ft. long by 5 ft. diameter, have been fixed at the laundry.

A pair of cottages for farm labourers have been built.

A new sewage drain has been laid to eight cottages, Nos. 49

The painting in the new wing of No. 6 Block is being steadily carried out by the "painter's party" of inmates.

Visit of Commissioners in Lunacy.

Two members of the Board of Commissioners in Lunacy visited the asylum on the 27th and 28th of June; and a copy of their report will be found at page 9.

Expenditure.

The Parliamentary grant for the year ending 31st March 1891 (inclusive of new buildings and alterations) was 32,033l., the total expenditure amounted to 31,068l. 4s. 8d.; the unexpended surplus of 964l. 15s. 4d. was surrendered to the Exchequer.

Average cost per patient. The average cost per patient for the year, as shown in Table 41, column 10, was 43l. 4s. 2d., as compared with 44l. 8s. 0d. for the previous year. The details of the expenditure under the various sub-heads of the vote are given in Table 38.

The staff.

I am glad to be again able to speak very favourably of the conduct of the staff generally. The immunity from escapes and from serious casualties, where such a large proportion of restless and turbulent beings have to be managed, speaks well for the vigilance and tact of the attendants as a body.

Dr. Isaac, the Deputy Superintendent, continues to give me his much appreciated assistance and support in the general administration; and to him and to my other medical colleagues, as well as to the officers of the asylum generally, my best thanks are due for their efficient and ever-ready help in the working of the various departments.

During the current year Sir Edmund Henderson resigned his place as a member of the Council of Supervision, and the Secretary of State was pleased to appoint Dr. W. Orange, C.B., to the vacancy thus caused, giving us all an opportunity of welcoming my predecessor back to official relations with the asylum.

I have again to record my most grateful appreciation of the undeviating support which I have at all times received from the

Council of Supervision in the discharge of my duties.

THE CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

SIR, Broadmoor Asylum, 21st April 1891.

DURING the year 1890 Divine Service was performed, as appointed, in the chapel of this asylum, on all Sundays, and on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, and Christmas Day. Daily prayers were also said in the chapel, with an intermission of 14 days in February, when I was ill with influenza. Since the discharge, in July, of an inmate who, for some years, had volunteered to play the harmonium at the week day service, the singing of a hymn has been given up, and the attendance has, in consequence, fallen off. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was celebrated on the first Sunday in each month (that in April being Easter Day) and on Christmas Day. The number of communicants was 34; viz., 13 men and 21 women. Evening prayers were said by me on Sundays in the infirmary of the female wing, and the short form of evening prayer continued to be used daily throughout the asylum. The usual addition was made to the library, and was found sufficient.

Owing to an epidemic of measles the school was closed for a period of 15 weeks, from September 22nd to January 5th, 1891. Under these circumstances the Education Department was pleased to excuse it from inspection, and a grant was made of 81l. 9s. 4d.; that for 1889 having been 81l. 9s. 8d. Miss Kelson, the school-mistress, having resigned (to be married) after an invaluable service of 15 years, Miss Amy Reid, with very high testimonials from Whitelands Training College, was appointed in her place.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

To the RIGHT HONOURABE HENRY MATTHEWS, one of HER MAJESTY'S PRINCIPAL SECRETARIES OF STATE.

The report of the Commissioners in Lunacy, made under the Act 23 & 24 Vict. c. 75., intituled "An Act to make better provision for the custody and care of Criminal Lunatics," for the year ending December 31st, 1890.

The Commissioners in Lunacy have the honour to report that in the year 1890 the asylum for criminal lunatics at Broadmoor (being the only asylum appointed under the Act above mentioned) was visited by two of the Commissioners, namely, C. S. Bagot, Esq., Barrister-at-Law, and T. Clifford Allbutt, Esq., Doctor of Medicine, on the 27th and 28th of June 1890.

MEMORANDUM OF INSPECTION.

Broadmoor Criminal Lunatic Asylum, 2nd December 1890.

On June 27th and 28th we paid to this asylum the annual visit of inspection for the year 1890. As on former visits, we found the asylum in excellent order in all its departments, and fully maintaining the high character it has so deservedly gained.

It is, however, becoming very full, and there were at our visit only vacancies for eight patients, all in the male division. It is

probable therefore that some addition to the accommodation, especially on the female side, may soon be necessary, though possibly some room may be found by discharge of patients. We found in the asylum 622 patients, 472 being males and 150 females. The males were 9 more and the females 1 fewer than at the visit of the Commissioners on November 29th, 1889. The admissions since then had been of 32 males and 9 females: the discharges and removals of 8 males and 7 females, and the deaths of 15 males and 3 females.

Of the deaths, each of which was, as usual, followed by autopsy, and a coroner's inquest, three were due to the effects of influenza, which was epidemic during the first four months of this year, and attacked in all 206 individuals being patients or members of the staff or of the families of the latter. Another death was due to internal hæmorrhage caused by swallowing a bone, and one to diarrhæa, the result of swallowing stones. The causes of the remaining deaths were natural and ordinary.

The only serious casualty reported to us as having occurred since the last visit was the fracture of the left humerus of a male patient from a fall in a struggle with an attendant whom he had assailed. At the time of our visit the health of the asylum was good, and had been so in the interval since the previous visit.

We had no serious complaint from any of the patients, all of whom we saw. Many are very intelligent and manifest no insanity in casual conversation; and there are some who, if they were not criminals, would probably be considered fit for discharge. No violence was displayed during our visit, and the patients, both male and female, were well conducted, suitably dressed, and neat in person.

We are informed that no form of mechanical restraint had been employed since the last visit. The seclusion is, as customary, divided into three classes, and, excluding the cases of patients under medical treatment in bed, in single rooms, and of patients voluntarily occupying single rooms in the daytime with the doors locked, we learn that 15 patients, 12 males and three females, since the last visit had been involuntarily secluded, and that on 1,654 occasions and for a total duration of 9,855 hours.

We were glad to learn that it has been found possible to engage a fair proportion of the patients (having regard to their characters and antecedents) in industrial occupations. Of the males 172, and of the females 95, are usefully employed, being 36.5 and 63 per cent., respectively, of the totals of the two sexes.

The patients who attended Divine Service on the Sunday morning preceding our visit were 74 males and 35 females, and these numbers doubtless represent the average attendance.

The amusement of the patients and their exercise beyond the airing courts, within the necessary limits imposed by the character and object of the asylum, continue to be adequately considered. Some structural improvements have been carried out or begun since the last visit of Commissioners, and they include the

enclosure of additional garden ground $8\frac{1}{2}$ acres in extent by a wall 16 feet high, which will probably lead to an increase in the

number of male patients working on the land.

Some amount of new painting has also been done. We suggest an improvement of the ground floor corridors of male Blocks 3 and 4, by throwing out large bays to increase the day space, which is now rather limited.

This, we think, could be done at no great expense, and without

injury to the external appearance of the building.

We think that in the laundry the bands for driving the

machinery require more protection.

The staff of attendants is a strong one and necessarily so. For the male division there are, we learn, a chief attendant, six principal attendants, 37 ordinary and 38 assistant attendants, and for the female division, a chief attendant, two principal, and 27 ordinary attendants.

The duration of service is very satisfactory, as over 75 per cent. of the male, and over 43 per cent. of the female staff, had

been in the service of the asylum for more than five years.

The medical staff continues as at the date of the last report. We were glad to find the superintendent, Dr. Nicolson, quite recovered from the attack made upon him by a patient, and able to resume his important duties.

Cabbage, 12 ozs.; French beans, $\frac{3}{4}$ pint; broad beans, shelled, $\frac{3}{4}$ pint; green peas, shelled, $\frac{1}{2}$ pint; vegetable marrows, 1 lb.; carrots, 12 ozs.; parsnips, 12 ozs.; onions, 8 ozs.

Every day - Males and Females Tea with bread and butter.

Seed bread is given twice weekly in lieu of bread and butter to those of the patients who like it.

Oatmeal gruel at bed time is supplied to those who wish for it.

The sick are dieted at the discretion of the superintendent.

Working patients are allowed 4 ozs. bread and 1 oz. of cheese for lunch, with oatmeal and water.

Every patient is allowed $1\frac{1}{2}$ ozs. tea, 7 ozs. sugar, 7 ozs. butter, and $1\frac{3}{4}$ pts. milk weekly. Bread is unlimited; the quantity consumed daily averages 17 ozs. for males, and 14 ozs. for females.

The soup consists of the liquor from the boiling of the meat with the addition of $12\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. of peas and barley, and 10 lbs. of vegetables, for 100 patients.

Currant pudding consists of flour, $37\frac{1}{2}$ lbs., currants, $12\frac{1}{2}$ lbs., and suet or dripping, $12\frac{1}{2}$ lbs., to make 100 lbs. when cooked.

Fruit pies consist of flour 3 ozs., fruit 8 ozs., sugar 1 oz., and dripping 1 oz., to make 12 ozs. when cooked.

Seed bread is made from dough, with the addition of 10 lbs. dripping, 9 lbs. sugar, and 1\frac{1}{4} lbs. carraway seeds to 100 lbs. dough.

Meat pies consist of 4 ozs. meat without bone, 7 ozs. mixed dough, and 8 ozs. vegetables, for males; $3\frac{1}{2}$ ozs. meat without bone, 6 ozs. mixed dough, and 8 ozs. vegetables, for females.

Suet pudding consists of flour 50 lbs. and suet $12\frac{1}{2}$ lbs., to make 100 lbs. when cooked.

One of the chief reasons why fewer changes occur amongst the men thau amongst the women is that the men are retained in the service after their marriage, provided they obtain leave to marry, whilst marriage usually, although not always, leads to the retirement of women from the service. It will be seen by the foregoing figures, that over 71 per cent. of the male attendants have been in the service more than five years, whilst 45 per cent. have been in the service for periods above ten years. Of the female attendants 38 per cent. count above five years' service, whilst over 20 per cent. count above ten years.

Leave of absence for the day is granted every ninth day; and, in addition, every

attendant has a holiday of ten days annually.
