THE REPORT

**OF THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS ELECTED AT THE EPIPHANY
SESSION, 1866, FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE LUNATIC
ASYLUM AT STONE, FOR THE PAUPER LUNATICS OF THE
COUNTY, UNDER THE STATUTE 16TH AND 17TH VICTORIA,
CAP. 97, ss. 22 and 62.**

SHEWETH,—That your Committee Report, in the terms of the Statute, that the “State and Condition” of the Asylum have been satisfactory throughout the year, and that the Accommodation is at present sufficient and proper for the number of Patients; but, if the Female Patients should continue to increase in number, the question of a further enlargement of this Wing of the Building will again become a matter for consideration.

The conduct and efficiency of the several Officers and Servants continues to be satisfactory, and no change has taken place amongst the Officers during the past year.

The number of Patients admitted since the commencement of the year has been 86, namely, 36 Males and 50 Females.

The full number of Patients on 20th December, the day of the last meeting of your Committee, was 325, namely, Males 134, Females 191.

The amount per head per week charged to the Unions in this County having Patients during the four quarters has been respectively 9s. 4d., 9s. 4d., 8s. 9d., and 9s. 4d., being a small increase in the charge upon the Unions as compared with the charge made upon them for the year 1865, amounting to 5½d. per head per week.

Two of the Commissioners in Lunacy (R. W. S. Lutwidge, Esq., and Robert Nairne, Esq., M.D.) visited the Asylum on the 6th of June last, and the following is a copy of their Report on this occasion:—

The present weekly charge for Pauper Patients is 9s. 4d.

We have satisfaction in reporting most favourably, as on previous visits, of the quiet and orderly demeanour of the Patients of both sexes and all classes, and their clean and neat personal condition.

We found one Female Patient in seclusion after an attack of Epileptic mania.

According to the weekly journal, since the last visit 8 Male and 13 Female Patients have been secluded during periods of violent excitement, the former altogether on 14 and the latter on 45 occasions.

The Sanitary state of the Asylum appears to be good, the Patients last registered as under medical treatment, for mental or bodily ailments, having been 17 in number, viz.: 6 in the Male Division and 11 in the Female.

The Ward Returns applicable to the day before our visit showed that 79 Male Patients and 97 Females were usefully employed.

The Chapel attendance on Sunday, the 3rd inst., was 77 on the Male side and 90 on the Female.

The several Corridors and Dayrooms, Dormitories, and single Sleeping Rooms, Beds and Bedding, all of which we inspected, were clean and in the best order, and, being well furnished and suitably decorated, had a comfortable and cheerful aspect.

The Asylum throughout was in a very creditable state, and the garden and airing grounds appeared to be well and carefully kept.

In reference to the last Report we have to state that the improvements therein mentioned as in progress have for the most part been completely carried out, and that the new Female Building has for some months past been occupied.

The Sculleries objected to have not as yet been done away with altogether, but an additional Scullery has been provided in the Female Division by the conversion for that purpose of a passage leading from the Gallery to the Kitchen.

No steps have yet been taken towards enlarging, as recommended, No. 6 Airing Court.

The Ironing and Folding Room is about to be considerably extended (which was much needed) by adding thereto the adjoining portion of the Drying Ground, not required for that purpose. At the same time an additional Drying Closet will be formed.

A Room is also about to be provided for Cleansing and Drying Mattresses in the Female Division, there being at present only one room of that kind for both Divisions.

Some of the Dormitories are still overcrowded, but Dormitories are no longer used as Dayrooms.

ENLARGEMENT OF THE LAUNDRY.

In consequence of the increased number of Patients, it has been found necessary during the past year to enlarge the Laundry. The cost of these works has been £324 : 7 : 6.

During the past year your Committee have made certain alterations in the Kitchen Department, and instead of obtaining the supply of Bread by contract, they now contract for the supply of Flour and furnish the establishment with home-made Bread; by these alterations a great saving in the expenditure during the latter six months of the year has been effected, as will appear by the following statement:—

**OFFER OF LAND BY THE TRUSTEES OF THE LATE
DR. LEE.**

The Trustees of the late Dr. Lee have offered to sell to the Committee of Visitors a small piece of ground containing 16 poles, lying between the northern boundary of the Asylum and the turnpike road, together with the trees standing thereon, for the sum of £30. This piece of ground will be a desirable acquisition for the County, and your Committee have provisionally accepted the offer, subject to the approval of the Court of Quarter Sessions.

In the Appendix No. 1 will be found an Abstract of the County Treasurer's Accounts, as to the payment of Instalments of the principal monies and of the Interest thereof.

In the Appendix No. 2 is shown the amount expended in Repairs, Additions, Alterations, and Improvements, under sec. 38 of the statute; it also contains a Statement of the "Building and Repairs" Account.

In the Appendix No. 3 will be found a General Statement and Balance Sheet of the Maintenance Account.

It is now the province of the Court of Quarter Sessions to appoint a Committee of Visitors for the ensuing year, pursuant to the 22nd sec. of the Statute.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE PAUPER LUNATIC ASYLUM
FOR THE COUNTY OF BUCKINGHAM.

GENTLEMEN,

In compliance with the general rules for the government of the Asylum, I beg to lay before you the Fourteenth Annual Report of this Institution.

The Statistical Tables for the year 1866 are now issued in a form recommended for general use by the Medico-Psychological Association. There were in the Asylum at the commencement of the year 301 patients—137 Men and 164 Women. 36 Men and 50 Women have been admitted, of whom 6 Men and 4 Women were re-admissions. The total number under treatment was 387, and the daily average number resident 310, viz., 131 Men and 179 Women, being an excess of 26 over the previous year. This large increase is entirely on the Women's side, their numbers having risen from 150 in December, 1864, to 191 in December, 1866. All the beds in the Female Wards are now full.

The condition of the Patients on their admission was much the same as in former years, 59 per cent. being registered as in feeble bodily health, while owing to advanced age or the duration of their disease 37 per cent. were precluded from any hope of recovery.

Of the Patients discharged, 29 were recovered,—16 Males and 13 Females,—bearing to the admissions the proportion of 34 per cent. 4 Men and 2 Women were discharged relieved, and 2 Men and 2 Women were removed to other Asylums. 24 of the Patients discharged recovered were under treatment in the Asylum less than six months. The greater number of these persons passed a period of probation with their friends prior to their discharge. This practise has been in operation in this Asylum for several years; it has some advantages, one of the principal ones being that it empowers the Visitors to grant the Patients requiring it a weekly pecuniary allowance.

During the year 25 deaths have occurred, which is at the rate of 9 per cent. to the average number resident, or of 6.34 per cent. to the total number under treatment. The mortality among the Men has been much in excess of that among the Women, being in the proportion of 4 to 1. None of the deaths arose from unusual causes or require special remark. The average age at death was—Males 49, Females 51.

No inquest has been held. The only accident worthy of mention was that of a man who sustained a fracture of the radius, from a door being suddenly pushed open upon him.

In the early part of the year some of the Male Patients exhibited a strong tendency to suicide, and we had to guard against several attempts at self-destruction by strangulation.

The general health of the Patients has been good, no epidemic having at any time during the year prevailed in the Institution. In the autumn two slight cases of scarlet fever occurred in one of the Women's Wards, but separation being immediately enforced no other attacks ensued.

The general management of the Asylum has varied but little from that recorded in former reports, and the daily number employed continues in about the usual proportion. The amusements provided for the Patients are, however, carried on with some little difficulty, there being no special recreation room.

The inmates are allowed as much liberty as is consistent with their safety, and several have, during the past year, enjoyed the privilege of spending from one to seven days with their relatives.

Early in the spring I had occasion to report that the drying accommodation in the Laundry was not nearly sufficient in wet weather; two extra hot closets have been added, and the whole is now in good working order.

With one or two exceptions, the Attendants have performed their duties with kindness and steadiness. The Cook, who had (during 12 years' service here) proved a trustworthy servant, died in March last, and in the autumn our head Attendant on the Men's side left, having obtained a more lucrative appointment in the Asylum at Adelaide, South Australia.

In conclusion, I desire to express my thanks to the other Officers for their co-operation and assistance, and to record my sense of gratitude to the Committee of Visitors for their kindness and liberality towards me.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE PAUPER LUNATIC ASYLUM
FOR THE COUNTY OF BUCKINGHAM.

GENTLEMEN,

During a period of eight years I have performed the duties of Chaplain to your Institution, and have much pleasure in again laying before you the report of my experiences, and the result of my labours during the time that has elapsed since your meeting in December last.

The character and disposition of the Patients varies so much as to render my ministerial duties both pleasing and difficult. I have endeavoured as far as possible to adapt suitable instruction in spiritual things to each particular patient; and I am happy to say my efforts for the moral and spiritual welfare of those committed to my trust has invariably been most kindly received. Your Medical Superintendent has with uniform kindness called my attention to every new case that has been admitted where he thought my services might be beneficially administered. These cases, I need scarcely say, I have specially visited during the week and reported on them in my Journal, which is laid before you for inspection at your Monthly Board.

The service in the Chapel on Sunday is highly appreciated by the Patients; and, while I have to report that the Chapel is always full, I regret to add that the want of accommodation prevents many from attending. Though the Asylum has been enlarged, there has been no provision made in the Chapel for the increase in the number of Patients.

In conclusion, I trust I may be allowed to express my unceasing interest in the charge committed to me, and my earnest desire to promote the well-being of your Institution.
