Two of the Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum on the 8th day of February last, and the following is a copy of their Report upon that occasion :--

BUCKS COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM,

February 8th, 1881.

We have to-day visited all parts of this Asylum and we are able again to report favourably of its condition in most respects. The Wards, and Dormitories, are clean and comfortable, the ventilation is generally good and an adequate temperature is maintained.

We detected only in one quarter a Bath-room at present disused,

a smell indicative of the escape of sewer gas into the building. We were sorry however, to observe that the waste pipes of Baths and Sinks are arranged on the imperfect system of discharging directly into the Sewer or into Soil Pipes instead of being carried outside the Building and discharging freely on Gratings, the communications of which with the Drains are properly trapped. We recommend the adoption of this system to the Committee. The soil pipes of the Water Closets are we understand, now properly ventilated, and to-day we noticed that the Closets of No. 14 Ward have been altered and improved. In all there appeared to be a good service of Water.

Some of the Wards have been painted and repapered since the last inspection and work of this nature is now in progress.

The Patients were remarkably quiet and free from excitement during our visit, and the only subject of complaint was detention in the Asylum. We regret to say that the vast majority of the present cases appear to us, as regards the prospect of recovery, to be very unfavourable. There are very many old and feeble cases here, but the general bodily health of the Patients is fair.

Those under Special Medical Treatment are 13 Males and 27 Females, and there were to-day confined to bed 12 men and 8 women.

As regards personal condition, we have to repeat a remark made in former entries, that on the whole the dress of the men was more tidy than that of the women, many of whom were even more untidy than their degraded mental condition and personal habits could, we think, excuse. A little variety might with advantage be introduced into the Materials and Colours of the Women's dress.

Inquiring into the use of Mechanical restraint and seclusion, we find that there has been no resort to the former, since the last visit, but that 3 Males have been secluded, on 10 occasions, for a total of $105\frac{1}{2}$ hours, and that 5 women have been similarly treated on 9 occasions, and for 49 hours.

We saw the Patients at Dinner in their Wards, and were satisfied with the quality and amount of the Food supplied as well as with the variety allowed. A general dining Hall, which would serve also as a Recreation Room, is one of the desiderata of this Asylum.

The staff of attendants remains at the Actual Strength mentioned in last year's entry, but its proportionate strength has been increased by the diminution in the number of Patients presently noticed. A change has just taken place in the Office of Female Head Attendant. The wages paid are the following :—Male Attendants begin at £26 and rise by £1 a year to £30; Charge Attendants receive from £30 to £35; Female Nurses receive £15 on entering the service as beginners, and rise annually by £1 to £20; and those in charge of Wards are paid from £18 to £22 according to service, the charge Nurse of the Refractory Ward having £3 extra. Attendants of both sexes receive Uniforms. We learn that of the present number there are only six Attendants of both sexes who have been less than a year in the service of the Asylum.

The great decrease in Out County Patients is due to the return of 33 Males and 15 Females to Moulsford and Littlemore Asylums on the expiration of contracts.

The vacant beds at present are 49 in the Male, and 14 in the Female division.

Of the Patients discharged in the ordinary sense 15 Males and 21 Females had recovered.

The causes of the deaths were of an ordinary character, and the death rate has not been excessive. There has been no Contagious or Infectious Disorder, and no serious casualty, and no Inquest has been held.

The Returns of Numbers usefully employed, attending Divine Service &c., which we have called for, present no new feature calling for remark. The Patients not going beyond the Airing Courts are about one fourth of the entire number.

There are no structural improvements, beyond the alteration of closets already noticed, to report. The alterations in the Mortuary suggested by our Colleagues last year, have however been effected.

Four years ago our Colleagues who inspected this Asylum, called attention to the absence of all means of extinguishing Fire. We regret to say that beyond the three or four Garden Engines mentioned in a subsequent entry no means have yet been supplied. This is a subject which should engage the early attention of the Visitors, and in connection with it the question of Water supply appears to press. We learn to-day that further analysis has shewn the Rain Water collected from the roofs to be the least pure of that used; yet this goes into the general reservoirs, and forms, with the Water derived from the well and from a spring, one general supply for alimentary as well as other use. We think the Rain Water should be separated and reserved for Laundry purposes alone.

SUPPLY OF WATER AND MEANS OF EXTINGUISHING FIRE.

In pursuance of the Order of the Court, at the Michaelmas Session, 1880, your Committee ordered from Messrs Merryweather and Sons two of their "Universal" pattern manual Fire Engines, with the necessary extra fittings, at a cost of £80 12s., but upon an inspection of these Engines at the Asylum, and upon their being brought into play, your Committee found them not to answer the purpose for which they were required, inasmuch as they did not throw the water sufficiently high, and in consequence they were sent back to Messrs. Merewether and Sons, and your Committee subsequently obtained from them a "12 Man Village Fire Engine" (No. 43 in their Catalogue published in 1877) with the necessary fittings, and an extra quantity of Hose, Suctions, and, Washers, at a total cost of £129 Os. 7d. Your Committee however, have not yet had an opportunity of testing the power of the Engine, by seeing it at work. Your Committee have given directions for a proper Shed to be erected near the Painter's Shop in which the Engine will be placed. Your Committee have also directed that a Tank be made near the Farm Buildings for storing the Rain Water from those Buildings, for the service of the Fire Engine, in case of necessity, with the necessary pipes for conducting the Water to this Tank,

RAIN WATER.

With reference to the Report of your Committee to the Court at the Epiphany Session, 1880, upon the impurity of the Water as then (and now) supplied to the Patients, your Committee have directed Mr. Humphry, the Medical Superintendent, to take steps for preventing the Rain Water from the Roofs of the Main Buildings mixing with the Water obtained from the Willow Spring, and the 2 Wells in the Grounds, and to obtain a Small Engine to be placed near the Boilers in the Engine House, to be used for the purpose of pumping the Water from the Rain Water Tanks to the Laundry, for use in that portion of the Main Buildings.

LEGACY BEQUEATHED BY MRS. ANN ROADS JARVIS, LATE OF STEEPLE CLAYDON, DECEASED.

Your Committee have to inform the Court that this Lady by her will dated the 29th January, 1877, bequeathed the sum of £100 to the Treasurer of this Asylum, "in aid of that Institution," payable duty free on the death of her Sister Miss Sarah Stevens, (which event occurred on the 29th February, 1880), with interest to be added from 6 months after the death of the said Sarah Stevens. This Legacy, amounting with interest to the sum of \pounds 102, has been received by the Treasurer of the Asylum, and has been placed on a deposit account at the Bucks and Oxon Union Bank, Aylesbury, in the names of the Treasurer of the Asylum and the Clerk to the Committee of Visitors for the time being. Your Committee understand that in some other Asylums to which Legacies have been bequeathed, they have been appropriated as a fund for assisting Patients on their discharge; but your Committee, in this case, are in doubt whether the Legacy could be so applied, looking to the language of the bequest, directing it to be "*in aid of that Institution*," and your Committee request to have the opinion of the Court as to the appropriation of the Legacy.

In the Appendix No. 1 will be found an abstract of the Treasurer's accounts as to the re-payment of instalments of the principal monies borrowed, and the interest thereon.

In the Appendix No. 2 is shown the amount expended in repairs, and also the Additions, Alterations, and Improvements under sec. 38 of the statute.

In the Appendix No. 3 will be found a general statement and balance sheet of the Maintenance Account.

And in the Appendix No. 4 will be found an abstract of the Garden and Farm Account for the year 1881.

It is now the province of the Court of Quarter Session to appoint a Committee of Visitors of the Asylum for the ensuing year, pursuant to the 22nd sec. of the Statute.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Committee of Visitors of the Pauper Lunatic Asylum for the County of Buckingham.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit to you the Twenty-ninth Annual Report of this Asylum, with the usual Table of Statistics.

On the 18th December, 1880, there were 420 Patients under care, of whom 160 were Males and 260 Females. During the past year there were 96 admitted—50 Men and 46 Women—the total number under treatment being 516, comprising 210 Males and 306 Females.

The number of Patients in the Asylum on the 17th of December, 1881, was 434-179 Males and 255 Females-showing an increase at the end of the year of 14.

The average number resident during the past Twelvemonths has been 428, while in 1880 it was 456; this diminution in number is owing to the return of 48 Patients to the Oxfordshire and Berkshire Asylums.

The proportion of curable cases among the admissions was decidedly low, scarcely one-half of the Men, and only one-third of the Women offering any hope of ultimate recovery. Of the cases deemed incurable 11 suffered from Epilepsy, 3 from General Paralysis, 11 from Senile Decay, and 3 from Congenital Imbecility.

Thirty-five Patients have been discharged—16 Men and 19 Women of whom 12 Men and 16 Women left recovered, 2 Men and 3 Women as relieved, and 2 Men as not improved, one of them being transferred to another Asylum. The rate of recovery, calculated on the admissions, was 24 per cent. for Males, 34.8 per cent. for Females, or 29 for both sexes, a rate lower than usual, and was due to the more unfavourable class of cases admitted.

The number of Patients that died during the year 1881 was 47— 15 Men and 32 Women—yielding a per centage of 9.10 on the total number or 10.74 on the average daily number resident. This is nearly 3 per cent higher than in 1880, and is mainly attributable to the extremely cold weather at the beginning of the year, the mortality from diseases of the Lungs being 15, against 4 in the preceding year. Sixteen of the deaths were the result of diseases of the Cerebro-spinal system. One Patient—a young Female—died of Hœmorrhage, occurring in the course of an attack of Enteric Fever, the origin of which could not be ascertained. No other person had been ill of the disease, nor did any other case occur afterwards. The other causes of death do not call for any special remark.

The average age at death was for Males 48 years, Females 52; the age of the youngest being 16, and of the oldest 81 years.

No case requiring an Inquest has presented itself, and not any serious accident has happened.

Escapes have been more numerous than for some years past. One man slipped away from a working party in the garden, and making his way home was allowed to remain there for two days, and then brought back as he was unfit to stay there. Another man, usually employed in the garden, being left by himself for a short time, took the opportunity of running away, and after wandering about all night returned voluntarily the next morning. This same man five months afterwards again escaped and made his way to London, from whence he was returned on the eighth day after leaving the Asylum.

Throughout the year the general health of the Patients was good,

although the death-rate has been above the average. In February one of the Under-Laundresses had an attack of Scarlatina; suitable measures of isolation were adopted, and no other person suffered.

At the Monthly Meeting of the Committee of Visitors in May last, the Chaplain resigned his office, in consequence of his continued inability to perform the duties. The Reverend Charles Lowndes had held that appointment for the last 22 years, and his departure from among us is much regretted by all with whom he had been so long associated.

His successor, the Reverend Christopher Ridley, had been the Officiating Minister for several months, has already become thoroughly accustomed to his duties, and evinces much interest in the welfare of the Patients.

In concluding, I desire to tender my thanks to the Committee for the kindness and consideration so generously accorded to me during the past year.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF VISITORS OF THE BUCKS COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to lay before you my report as Chaplain of your County Lunatic Asylum.

Although this is the first occasion of my having to do so, there is nothing of any special nature to report. I have endeavoured to carry on the work on the same lines as my predecessor, with the hope that similar good results may follow.

With regard to the Services in the Chapel, I have been forcibly struck with the hearty manner in which the Patients take part, and interest in them, and it is evident that from their orderly attendance, and more or less of attention, they must thereby, in many cases, receive benefit mentally and spiritually.

The considerable numbers in which they attend seem to indicate a tolerably general appreciation of public worship amongst them.

During the Winter months the week-day service is held alternately on the Men and Women's side of the building.

Holy Communion has been administered the usual number of times in the year to about the usual number of Communicants.

At all the services the behaviour has been everything that could be expected.

Visiting the Patients in their several galleries is interesting work, and always seems acceptable to them. I generally give a short reading in most of the wards, and also find opportunity for conversation with individuals, besides visiting specially sick cases.

One is often cheered by good results manifested, and the reasonable hope there may be still further good results in other cases, though not always traceable.

I must take this opportunity to state that I have received nothing but the greatest kindness and help from the Medical Superintendent, and also every civility and attention from all the Attendants with whom I have been brought into contact in the performance of my duties.

Trusting that the Divine blessing has rested on the work in the past, and relying on it alone for good results in the future,
