THE SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

CAMBRIDGESHIRE, ISLE OF ELY, & BOROUGH OF CAMBRIDGE

PAUPER LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Pursuant to the 62nd Sect. of the 16th and 17th Vict., cap. 97, the Committee of Visitors of the above Asylum beg to report to Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Cambridge and Isle of Ely respectively, in Quarter Sessions assembled, and to the Town Council of the Borough of Cambridge, as follows:—

In presenting this their Sixth Annual Report, your Committee have much pleasure in observing that the state and condition of the Asylum during the past year has been good, and that the Patients have been kindly and skilfully treated. Many of the Patients received into the Asylum during the year have recovered, and on being discharged have expressed their gratitude for the care bestowed on them during their confinement.

Your Committee beg to lay before you the following highly satisfactory Report of R. W. S. Lutwidge and Robert Nairne, Esquires, two of the Commissioners in Lunacy, on their annual inspection of the Asylum on the second day of November last.

Cambridgeshire County Asylum, 2nd November, 1863.

THE following Tabular Statement shews the changes in the patients since the 25th November, 1862, the date of the last Commissioners' visit, and their numbers this day.

We have much satisfaction in reporting that we found the Asylum, in its several departments, as upon previous visits, in the best order, and the patients entirely free from excitement, generally cheerful and contented, and personally, as to dress and otherwise, in a condition most creditable to the Medical and other authorities and the attendants immediately responsible for their charge.

We were especially pleased by the aspect of the patients of both sexes, in reference to the variety in material and colour of their clothing, which cannot but have a beneficial effect upon the patients. What are ordinarily known as strong dresses are unknown in the Asylum.

The sanitary state of the Asylum appears to be good, the patients last registered as under medical treatment being 13 in the male, and 15 in the female division.

Seclusion continues to be of rare occurrence, and confined, with few exceptions, to cases of epileptic mania.

We have nothing special to report as to Divine Service, occupations or amusements, the arrangements and result of which continue to be very satisfactory.

We are glad to learn that the farm and garden are now a source of considerable profit.

As respects the patients, we have to report that 7 males and 5 females are of the private class, and that of the paupers 40, viz. 11 men and 29 women belong to the Borough of Ipswich, and 69 (24 males and 45 females) are out County patients.

The ordinary weekly charge for Cambridge County and Borough patients was, at the last meeting of the Committee, reduced from 9s. 6d. to 9s. 3d.

The weekly charge for out-County pauper patients remains 13s.

The Asylum is calculated to accommodate 150 patients of each sex, from which it appears that there are only 12 vacant beds in the male division, and that the female patients are 1 in excess of their proper number.

The Visitors are bound by an agreement for five years, of which two are expired, to receive all the Ipswich pauper lunatics.

They can, if and when the wants of the Cambridge County and Borough require it, ultimately discharge the private and out-County pauper patients, who, including the 39 Ipswich patients, are now 81 in number, viz. 31 of the male, and 50 of the female sex.

The land, the property of the Asylum, is about 55 acres in extent. The site of the buildings and airing courts comprises about 5 acres, and, of the remainder, 20 acres are cultivated by the spade, and 30 as farm and otherwise. Dr. Lawrence is of opinion that, if the Committee were to rent more land, he would be able, with the increased number of patients, to cultivate more without increasing the number of paid labourers.

The painting and colouring in progress at the time of the last visit have been completed; the former, including good graining of the woodwork, having been executed by a patient.

We desire now to draw the attention of the Committee to a great desideratum, the want of which cannot but be much felt. We refer to a Recreation Hall, of adequate dimensions, for which a portion of the present bowling-green appears to offer a suitable site. Without doing more than suggesting, for the consideration of the Committee, a convenient position for the hall, we would strongly urge the expediency of providing this necessary appendage without delay, and thus assimilating this to other Asylums.

The cost might properly be defrayed by the fund arising from the extra weekly payments for private and out-County patients.

In the course of our visit Dr. Lawrence pointed out to us the difficulty which the construction and arrangement of the wards present to the separation of violent and noisy patients, who are, unavoidably at present, a source of much disturbance and annoyance to the general body of inmates. An effectual remedy can alone be

provided by the erection of detached wards in connexion, by enclosed or covered ways, with the main buildings (say for 20 patients in each division), not to be exclusively appropriated to the patients indicated or any special class, but available for the cases referred to. We recommend this matter to the consideration of the Committee.

With regard to the suggestion in the above Report of a Recreation Hall, your Committee would remark that although it might be a convenience and source of amusement to the patients, yet as the Commissioners themselves in their report speak of the cheerful appearance of the patients, and appear satisfied with the sources of amusement hitherto provided for them, they can scarcely recognise the necessity of adopting the suggestion at present; especially taking into consideration that the County, Isle, and Borough have so recently incurred the large outlay consequent on building, furnishing and fitting up the Asylum.

With respect to another suggestion of the Commissioners contained in their Report as to the erection of detached wards at the Asylum for the reception of noisy patients, your Committee may observe that the subject is occupying their attention, but they do not feel that their views are at present sufficiently matured to enable them to report definitely thereon.

Your Committee have much pleasure in reporting that the rate of charge for maintenance during the current quarter (being 9s. 3d. per head per week) is

the lowest rate charged since the Asylum was opened in November 1858.

During the past year the charge for out-County patients has been at one uniform rate of 13s., and that for private patients, of 14s. per head per week.

The Medical Superintendent will, shortly after the close of the year, furnish a detailed statement as to the admission and discharge of patients, their employment, the number of cures, &c. during the past year: but without waiting for such statement, your Committee take the opportunity to lay before you a tabular statement shewing the numbers in the Asylum on each usual monthly meeting of your Committee.

Your Committee regret to observe by the above statement, that whilst there has been a reduction in the number of out-County and private patients in the Asylum during the past year, the patients chargeable to parishes in the County, Isle, and Borough, have increased from 179 in January last, to 204 in December instant, being an increase of 25; which, in the short period of twelve months, and in a purely agricultural district, is very large.

At a meeting of your Committee, held on the 24th February last, Dr. Lawrence, the Medical Superintendent of the Asylum, submitted a revised Dietary for patients in the Asylum. The principal alteration suggested by Dr. Lawrence refers only to dinners: one being the substitution of a second meat-pie dinner for one of the three stew dinners; and another in giving regularly once a-week to every patient a dinner of mutton.

Your Committee agreed to the New Dietary, which has since been adopted, and has given general satisfaction.

Your Committee regret that they have occasion again to report that during the past year two pauper patients have, in their opinion, been improperly and unnecessarily removed to the Asylum. One case being that of John Morley, a patient, aged 83, removed from Chesterton Union Workhouse to the Asylum on the 19th January last, in a dying state, simply worn out by old age. He died on the fourth day after his admission to the Asylum, and had not strength enough to render himself in any degree dangerous. The other

that of Susan Wake, a pauper patient, removed from Dalham, in the Newmarket Union, on the 18th Sept. last. From the statement of the Medical Superintendent of the Asylum, it appears that she was so exhausted that she could not sit up in a chaise, and had to be brought in an open cart in a recumbent posture.

Your Committee have had a long correspondence with the Poor Law Board and Parish authorities on both the above cases, and only mention the facts now in the hope that Boards of Guardians and others will see the necessity in future of not unnecessarily burdening the ratepayers with the cost of maintenance of such patients in the Asylum, without any hope of improving the mental deficiency of the patients themselves.

In April last Dr. Lawrence, the Medical Superintendent of the Asylum applied to your Committee for leave to reside certain nights within the University of Cambridge, in order to become a member of that University: the Commissioners in Lunacy on being applied to saw no objection thereto, on the understanding that Dr. Lawrence provided a well-qualified medical practitioner as his substitute. Dr. Lawrence having appointed Dr. Lindsey as his substitute, your Committee acceded to his request.

In consequence of disagreements having arisen between Mr. Frith, the late Clerk and Steward of the Asylum, and Dr. Lawrence, your Committee investigated the matter, and in May last decided on dismissing Mr. Frith from his offices, and on 30th June last Mr. William Henry Norman, late Steward of the Camberwell House Asylum, London, was appointed Clerk and Steward of the Asylum, in Mr. Frith's stead.

During the past year your Committee have, pursuant to the 38th Section of the Lunatic Asylums Act, 1853, made orders on the Treasurers of the County, Isle, and Borough, in the undermentioned proportions, for the repayment of the cost of repairing, &c. the Asylum.

THE CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

Cambridgeshire Asylum, Fulbourn, Near Cambridge, 18th Dec. 1863.

MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to inform you that, with the exceptions mentioned in my journal, I have performed Divine Service in this Asylum every Sunday morning, and read prayers daily during the year now drawing to a close.

The behaviour of the patients attending Chapel has been orderly, and the interruptions few. Many seem to take great pleasure in coming to the Chapel.

I trust their attendance is not without a beneficial influence upon them.

During the past year some fresh books have been added to the Library, now containing 92 volumes, selected by Dr. Lawrence and myself.

Also Bibles and Testaments have been placed in the library, which the patients can obtain in the same way that they obtain other books.

One large-print Bible and Prayer-book has been placed in each Ward—both male and female—for the use of aged patients.

My visits to the Wards have all been noted in my journal. When visiting the female wards I have usually read and expounded a portion of Scripture to the aged women in the Infirmary, with which they have always expressed themselves pleased.

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

Cambridgeshire County Asylum, Dec. 31st, 1863.

MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN,

The fifth complete year during which this Asylum has been in working having now come to its close, it again becomes my duty to submit to you an annual report.

The changes which have taken place amongst the patients, and the statistics of the year generally, closely approximate to those of the preceding year.

45 male and 46 female patients have been admitted, the total number being 91 exactly the same number as were received in 1862.

16 of those admitted were over 60, and 8 were over 70 years of age.

16 males and 18 females have recovered and been removed. 4 other patients who have recovered were ordered to be discharged two days ago, but not having been removed they cannot be included in the tables for this year. These make the total number of recoveries in the year 38, two more than last year, none having been similarly left over at the close of 1862.

The per-centage of the recoveries on the admissions is 41.7, and on the average number of patients resident 13.6.

The average daily number resident has been—males, 130; females, 148: total 278. The total number under treatment, 356.

14 males and 17 females have died, making a total of 31, all from ordinary causes. An inquest was held in one case of sudden death from epilepsy, and a verdict returned of death from an epileptic fit. 7 of those who have died have been above 70 years of age.

In three cases the cause of death was internal cancer. Six men have died from general paralysis of the insane, a disease met with rather more frequently than usual among the insane of this neighbourhood. It is invariably fatal. There are 5 patients at the present time in the male infirmary, in the last stage of the disorder; and several others scattered through the house in its earlier phases—all genuine instances of Calmeils disease.

No patient has died from suicide or injury, and there has been no instance of contagious or preventible disorder. The per-centage of deaths on the total number under treatment is 8.7. Five patients chiefly of the private class have been discharged relieved, and one not improved.

These changes leave in the house this day 133 males, and 152 females—Total 285. The increase during the year has been 10 of each sex—the increase in the previous year was 21, or one more.

Of those who remain 21 only, viz. 9 males and 21 females, have a reasonable probability of recovery.

The patients belonging to the County, Isle, and Borough, have increased during the year from 179 to 201; whilst the out-County and private patients have decreased 2, their number now being 84.

It may be of interest if I add here a table showing the chargeability of all the patients in the house this day.

It will be remembered that the house was originally built to contain 125 patients of each sex. I stated

three years ago to your Board, that with a better arrangement of the beds there was space for 150 on each side. Experience has shewn this to have been true on the female side, which has for some time past been full. There are at present 152 females in the house, but the extra two are lodged with difficulty, and it will become an early question what shall be done with this class of inmates.

The amusements of the patients remain much the same, except that this year we have added theatrical entertainments, now so much in vogue in Asylums.

A school has been instituted on the male side under the care of the head attendant, and that on the female side continues in useful operation.

Nearly two-thirds of the patients are still daily employed. The manner of their employment may be stated thus as the average of the year.

No patient has met with any accident worthy of record, except a man who was admitted on the 28th of November, and who, after having been in the house a few days in a state of great excitement, suddenly

forced his way through a glass door, carrying away the glass and woodwork. This led to a general examination of his body, when I discovered that he had no less than seven broken ribs, three on one side and four on the other: but exactly corresponding with the fractures were bruises which had undergone the colour changes, rendering it certain that the injury had existed some days. It is probable that the fractures were present at the time of admission, the rather that he was said to have met with considerable violence immediately before; or they might have been caused by a fall he had in the airing court the day after reception. They were treated with plaster-of-paris supports and a pair of stays specially contrived, and have now united without a bad symptom, notwithstanding that he has continued in a state of great excitement.

There have been very few attempts at escape. No one has been away more than an hour or two, and there has been no expense whatever incurred in recapture.

There has been a considerable reduction again this year in the cost of maintenance. It has at length fallen to 9s. per head per week. The exact cost for all the inmates for the year has been 8s. $11\frac{1}{4}d$. per head weekly.

This is in accordance with what I stated to yourselves as probable in my report on maintenance two years ago, although the reduction has been brought about earlier than I expected, partly in consequence of the reduced price of provisions. I still think the maintenance cost should not be expected to fall much below this sum.

The Building has required none but ordinary repairs. The Farm and Garden have again not only afforded a salutary employment to several of the male inmates, but have been a source of profit. The balance in its favour this year slightly exceeds £200.

As usual, a great many of the certificates upon which the patients have been admitted have been defective, and have given rise to trouble in getting them amended as allowed by the Act, but two only were so faulty as to cause any delay in the reception.

With one or two exceptions only the attendants and servants have behaved uniformly well; and have considerably added by their conduct to the well-being of the inmates. The following are the statistical tables:
