### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

*Broadmoor Criminal Lunatic Asylum,*  
26th January 1870.

SIR,

IN accordance with the rules approved by the Secretary of State, I beg to submit for the consideration of the Council of Supervision the report for the year 1869.

The following table shows the admissions, discharges, deaths, and escapes :

Of the 30 male patients admitted within the year, eight had been acquitted on the ground of insanity, and 22 had been certified to be insane after conviction. Of the six female patients, three had been acquitted on the ground of insanity, and three had been certified to be insane after conviction; of the 375 male patients in the asylum on the 31st December 1869, 140 were convicts, and 235 had been acquitted on the ground of insanity, or found insane on arraignment. Of the 85 female patients, 23 were convicts



and 62 had been acquitted on the ground of insanity, or found insane on arraignment. The management of the convict class of patients, confined as insane in a lunatic asylum, is attended with many difficulties and considerable risk. They associate together and combine together for mischief, they are much given to violence, planning deliberately attacks upon officers and servants; they are often wilfully destructive, of clothing, bedding and furniture; they defy discipline, and demand with threats extra articles of diet or other indulgences; they endeavour to intimidate the attendants, and often succeed in doing so. Some occupy themselves in making other patients dissatisfied, and in inciting them to misconduct more or less serious. The greater number refuse to take medicine, and a few of the worst class smear the walls of their rooms with fæces. It is frequently impossible to allow these persons to associate with other patients. Common prudence demands their separation for lengthened periods.

The money value of bedding and clothing destroyed within the year, and of damage done to the building, is estimated at 512*l.* 14*s.* 7*d.*

This destruction has been for the most part wilful, it is an evil which I must at present confess myself quite unable to control; in a few cases the patient has been left in a bed made up of the pieces of blankets and rugs which he or she had torn into strips, the whole, when necessary, being kept together by a strong rug. Some temporary improvement has followed this treatment.

#### ACCIDENTS.

No grave accident has occurred during the year. Officers and male attendants have been struck by patients upon 74 occasions. Female attendants have been struck by patients upon three occasions.

Hugh Mulvey, a patient, was found at dinner time, on 18th October, to be suffering from recent fracture of the left clavicle. A full and careful inquiry was immediately instituted, but no light was thrown upon the manner in which the injury was received. Mulvey made a good recovery.

On the morning of 9th November, Thomas Walker, a powerful and very dangerous patient, was in a small airing court, under the care of two attendants; he attacked and for the moment disabled one man by kicking him in the most savage manner; he then turned upon the second attendant, who, upon the impulse of the moment and in self-defence,



knocked him down with a broom with which he was at the time sweeping the court. Had the attendants observed the orders given for their guidance in the management of Walker, and occupied themselves solely with him, the accident could hardly have happened.

### ESCAPES.

Alice Kaye, a female patient of the convict class, escaped from the airing court on 27th July, and has not since been heard of. The attention of the attendants was taken up by the band which was playing. The north boundary wall of this airing court has since been raised.

Two male patients who escaped in 1868 have been re-admitted. One man is still at large.

### MORTALITY.

The mortality continues low, though not quite so low as in 1868.

It is 2.93 per cent. on the daily average of males resident, and 3.44 per cent. on the daily average of females resident.

Three male patients admitted in 1869 from Millbank Prison died of phthisis within the year.

Inquests have been held in each case of death, and the following verdicts returned :—

## GENERAL HEALTH.

63 persons resident in the asylum and on the estate have suffered from simple continued fever or from febricula within the year.

The disease has continued mild in form but often tedious. No death has to be recorded. In other respects the general health of those resident in the asylum and on the asylum property has been quite satisfactory.

## AMUSEMENTS.

There is an excellent library, to which additions are made annually. Newspapers and periodicals are also provided. There is a billiard table in the central hall, and there are bagatelle boards in the different blocks. There are two pianofortes, one in the male the other in the female division. Minor games are provided throughout the asylum. The brass band has been materially improved under the management of Mr. Thomas, the schoolmaster, and has played regularly. A weekly entertainment has been given during the winter months, in both the male and female divisions. During the autumn the male patients played at cricket twice in each week.

## NEW WORKS.

The windows throughout the blocks occupied by male patients have been secured by wrought-iron bars. Since the completion of this arrangement no male patient has escaped from the asylum.

The large central airing court has been divided by a wall. Each block occupied by men has now its own airing ground.

The earth-closet system has been extended throughout the asylum buildings. The sewage tank will be shortly removed.

Some very desirable alterations and additions have been made to 12 cottages occupied by attendants and servants; they were at the same time provided with earth-closets.

Excellent lavatories have been provided in Nos. 3 and 4 blocks.



### OFFICERS AND SERVANTS.

The Rev. Dr. Crookall, Roman Catholic chaplain, resigned his appointment, and has been succeeded by Rev. J. Purcell.

Dr. Cassidy was appointed assistant medical officer in the room of Mr. Maddox, who resigned for the purpose of joining his family in Australia. Dr. Cassidy entered upon his duties early in September.

The following changes have taken place in the ranks of the attendants and servants:—

The difficulty of securing really good attendants is very great; there is, however, an improvement here, more especially in the efficiency and good conduct of the male attendants; of 72 men thus employed, 16 only have been here under 12 months. So much can hardly be said in favour of the female attendants. Of 21 women employed as attendants, seven have been here under 12 months.

The wages and allowances given have been increased since 1st April last; they are now as follows:—

For the last 18 months I have been endeavouring to secure the services of an efficient person as a principal attendant in the female division, but have utterly failed.

The annexed tables afford information of considerable interest. Dr. Orange has again been kind enough to make out the nosological return and the obituary. (See Tables Nos. 16 and 17.)

The several officers of the asylum have continued to afford me much valuable assistance.

I cannot close without acknowledging the unvarying support that I have received from the Council of Supervision, under whom I have the satisfaction of working.

## CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

SIR, *Broadmoor Asylum, 26th January 1870.*

DURING the year 1869, the accustomed services of the Church have been held in the chapel of this asylum on all Sundays, on Ash Wednesday, on Good Friday, and on Christmas Day.

On Wednesdays and Fridays, the Litany with reading of Holy Scripture, and on other days of the week the Order of Morning Prayer, has been said at 8.30 a.m., the service being attended by men only; and the same service has been repeated daily in the women's asylum at 9 a.m.

The duration of these services is limited to half an hour, in compliance with the general regulations of the asylum.

On all festivals a portion of the office for the holy communion has been said.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been celebrated monthly. The number of communicants among the patients has been 15.

There has been no increase during the past year in the attendance at daily prayer. In winter there are on some mornings not more than 10 or 12 men patients present at the first service, and not more than five or six women at the second; and in summer the number is not much greater. Further observation has confirmed me in the opinion previously expressed by me, that this somewhat unsatisfactory attendance is attributable, in part, to the pre-occupation of the patients during the early morning with arrangements preparatory to the regular occupations of the day. It is therefore under consideration whether this adverse influence can in any measure be obviated.

The passing of the patients to and from the chapel late in the day having been deemed unsafe, it had been proposed at the date of my last report, that a short form of prayer prepared for the purpose should be said every evening in each of the separate blocks, of which this asylum is constructed. This measure was introduced in the month of March last, and it has proved more successful than might have been anticipated. The attendance each evening of men and women in all parts of the asylum has ranged from 130 to 190.



The demeanour of the patients has upon the whole been highly satisfactory, and even in the blocks occupied by the most refractory patients no interruption has been experienced. The several blocks being occupied for the most part by patients in a similar mental condition, the presence at these services of the less intelligent, or even some trifling irregularity, is not found to disturb the rest.

The provision made by the Council for the supply of books has been amply sufficient. It is hardly possible to estimate too highly the moral value of this provision. The books are made use of by a large number of the patients. Many of them take great interest in the information which they acquire by reading; and many find great relief in the diversion of their minds from brooding over a past without remedy, and over a future almost without hope, on which the inmates of this asylum are prone alternately and ceaselessly to dwell.

In the care and superintendence of the library I have availed myself largely of the assistance of Mr. Thomas, the Schoolmaster.

Classes of patients have also continued to receive instruction from the Schoolmaster.

With much pains, and under considerable disadvantages, the singing of a choir of patients in the services of the chapel has been brought to a fair degree of proficiency, and to the careful training of the choir is to be attributed the hearty singing and responding of the general congregation.

I am unable to report as favourably of the results of the elementary instruction of the patients in other subjects. The number attending each class has ranged from 2 or 3 in blocks occupied by refractory patients to 20 and 30 in other blocks. There are a few cases in which benefit accrues; but many of these patients are in a state of mind too enfeebled to allow of their receiving permanent impressions. In the hope, however, of rendering systematic instruction more generally useful, I propose to introduce lessons on common objects of a character intermediate between an object lesson and a very simple lecture.

The school for the children of officers was inspected on the 11th of November, and the following summary of the report of Her Majesty's Inspector has been transmitted to me by the Committee of Council on Education:—

“I am quite satisfied with the working of this school in all respects. Both in oral and other lessons the instruction is developing accuracy and intelligence.”

The grant for the year was 58*l.* 16*s.* 1*d.*, and the period of examination having been postponed from June to



November, a further sum of 11*l.* 14*s.* 8*d.* was allowed as arrears from the preceding year. The total grant was thus raised to 70*l.* 10*s.* 9*d.*, the largest grant in any previous year having been 26*l.* 17*s.* 6*d.*

In my report for 1867 I ventured to bring under the notice of the Council of Supervision, the expediency of substituting for the present chapel a building more suitably arranged and better placed. I again beg respectfully to submit to you the expediency of this measure. There are objections of a serious character to the permanent retention of the present building. Its position in the centre of the men's asylum makes it an undesirable place for the assembling in it of the women patients. The flight of stairs by which it is reached makes attendance difficult to infirm persons, and to patients who suffer from heart affections. The turnings in the stairs, also, render an efficient inspection of the patients as they pass to and from the services, almost impracticable.

If it should not be the pleasure of the Council to take into immediate consideration the proposal to which I refer, I venture to recommend an alteration in the present chapel. One change which was suggested by me in the arrangement of the seats in what may be called the transepts has been carried into effect during the present year, with great advantage. A further and important improvement might I think be effected at a trifling cost, if passages were opened through the two side rooms, situated close to the present doors. These rooms have windows which look into the chapel, and they were obviously intended to be used as part of it, but they have never been so used. By the alteration which I suggest they might be occupied conveniently by part of the congregation; and entrances would be provided for members of officers' families distinct from those made use of by the patients.
