QUARTER SESSIONS ASSEMBLED.

---

THE Committee of Visitors of the County Asylum have to REPORT that the Admissions to the Asylum during the last year have been more numerous than in any previous year since the Asylum was opened. The physical condition of the new Patients has also been unusually unfavourable to recovery, many of them being so feeble as to die within a few weeks of Admission.

On December 31st, 1866, the Patients in the

The Recoveries in proportion to admission are 41 per cent. In 1866 they were 46·2 per cent. ; and the Deaths are 10·9 per cent., against 9 per cent. last year. The crowded state of the wards, alluded to in last year's Report, has been very much relieved by the new Temporary Dormitories since completed, and by the very cheerful Convalescent Room since built adjoining the Laundry. The Corridor now in progress, to connect the main building with the proposed new wing, and which is intended to be used as a Day Room for Females, will still further relieve the pressure which still exists in some of the Male Wards, by adding to the male side rooms now occupied by females.

The plans for the new wing, to accommodate upwards of 200 additional Patients, are now ready, and the work will be proceeded with in the Spring.

The conduct of the Officers and Attendants last year has given entire satisfaction to the Visitors.

## REPORT OF MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

---

GENTLEMEN,—I have the honour of laying before you the Ninth Annual Report of this Asylum. The number of Inmates continues to increase rapidly. During the year, the average number resident has been 446, against 399 in 1866; and the number remaining at the end of the year was 452, against 406 at the commencement.

There were 179 Admissions—92 men and 87 women; while 75 were discharged Recovered, 5 Relieved, and 4 Not Improved; 49 died.

Notwithstanding the large increase of Patients, and consequent overcrowding of the day wards, the general health of the Asylum has been good. There has been no epidemic, and we have to be thankful that no serious accident has occurred.

With the exception of the year 1859, when, in addition to the ordinary admissions, upwards of 120 were received as transfers from other Asylums, the number of admissions last year exceeded that of any previous year. 92 men and 87 women were received, 23 being re-admissions.

Fifty-seven were in delicate health, and 74 were more or less feeble; 30 were admitted labouring under general paralysis, and 5 were epileptics. Considering, therefore, the condition in which the 179 Patients were received, it is not wonderful that so few during the past year have recovered.

The Recoveries numbered 75, 38 men and 37 women, or 41·9 per cent. calculated on the admissions; but this number includes seven very doubtful cases, persons labouring under general paralysis—a hitherto incurable disease—who, when absent on leave, were certified recovered by the Union Officers, and several of whom are included among the re-admissions. The two men who were not

insane on admission are also placed among the recoveries. Were these cases deducted, the percentage of recoveries would be only 37. No doubt, the reception of only urgent cases during the latter half of the year, when there was so little room, influenced unfavourably the recoveries. Owing to the same cause, the mortality was considerably above the average. Those received were such as, from ill health or the advanced state of their disease, could not be conveniently kept either in the Workhouse or at home, or be removed temporarily to Asylums at a greater distance than our own. The number of deaths was 49, 25 men and 24 women, or 10·9 per cent., calculated on the mean numbers resident. The mortality among the women was proportionately higher than in any previous year, 11·4 having died during this last year; while in 1862, the next highest year, 9·8 died. The average percentage of deaths among the women during ten years has been only 7·3, whereas of the men 12·3 have died.

A new Ward has been built between the main building and the laundry block. This has proved of very great service. Not only has it afforded additional accommodation to twenty-two patients, but it provided a comfortable, though rather small, temporary Infirmary for the women, and has enabled the night supervision to be extended to the patients who inhabit the dormitories in connection with the laundry. A corridor, intended to connect the proposed Infirmary block with the main building, is also in course of erection, and will, it is hoped, be shortly opened, affording day space to about sixty-five patients.

The plans for the Female Infirmary block have also been approved by the Commissioners in Lunacy; and will, no doubt, at an early date, be sanctioned by the Secretary of State.

I have to thank Mrs Bramwell, of Picktree Hall, for a large supply of old Illustrated Papers; Mr Grey, of Norton, for the *Illustrated London News*; Miss Manning, of Colchester, for a continued supply of monthly Illustrated Periodicals; and the Editors of the *Durham Advertiser*, *Hartlepool Mercury*, and *South Durham Herald*, for gratis copies of their newspapers.

As this Report may fall into the hands of those who have it in their power to supply our wants, I take this opportunity of stating that old books, pictures, periodicals, illustrated papers, or newspapers, are much appreciated by the patients, and that donations of such will be most thankfully received by me.

The conduct of the Attendants and Officers has, with the exception of the few instances brought under your notice at the time, been worthy of much commendation.
