One Inquest was held on a man, who in attempting to escape fell from a window, and fractured his skull.

The cost of maintenance as accurately made out in the annexed table is 10d. a head per week more than last year. This, however, is principally in the Farm and Garden, which is 6.01d. per head more, owing to the purchase of stock on entering the farm, which will be repaid in the course of this year. On a careful comparison being made with the maintenance accounts of other Asylums, we find, that the comparatively less cost of maintenance in them is only owing to their charging articles to capital, which we charge to maintenance, and to their not charging in the cost of provisions articles produced on the Farm and Garden.

As it was very desirable to have houses close to the Asylum for the Attendants, who have hitherto been obliged to have dear and inconvenient lodgings at the distance of a mile in Sedgefield,

we have built two Cottages, at the cost of about £127 each, the rent of which will be about £6 10s. per annum. These will contribute much to the comfort of the Attendants, and will keep them close to the Asylum; and will also be the means of securing the services of a better class of men.

Working parties have been constantly employed on the new Farm, and parties for walking and amusement have also been frequent within the limits of our own property. The number of Patients in the Asylum was for a short period so great—namely, 408—that one or two Patients were obliged to be refused admission. We hope, however, that this necessity will not recur before next June, when the termination of the Newcastle Contract will give us the space occupied by their inmates, who last year averaged 86. We shall thus apparently gain about 46 beds on the male side, and 40 on the female. The real gain however will not be so great, as the house is more crowded now than it ought to be, or than it should continue to be for any length of time. The actual amount of room gained will not be more than two thirds the number of those who leave. It is clear that the influx of patients from our own County will very soon fill up the vacancy, and that an enlargement of the building will be required. The number of patients has increased hitherto by an annual average of 26. This has been owing:—

- 1st—To the accumulation of Chronic cases in the Asylum;
- 2nd—To the increase of the population; and
- 3rd—To the transference of insane paupers from Workhouses to the Asylum.

This last cause, however, does not appear to have come, as yet, into full operation; as in January, 1859, the number of Lunatics in Workhouses, was the same as in January 1862—namely, 165. It seems probable that the Commissioners in Lunacy will exercise the power given them by the Lunacy Amendment Act of 1862, to remove these lunatics to the County Asylum; as the minute which they have issued on the subject requires Workhouses—if they are to keep pauper lunatics—to have Wards, Officers, and Rules, making each almost a little Asylum, at a cost which Unions are not likely to undergo. If this be so, a considerable addition to the number of lunatic inmates may be anticipated from this source. If the Commissioners use their power as fully as they seem inclined to do, an immediate increase to the Asylum will be needed; but at all events it can scarcely be delayed more than two or three years. This being the case, we cannot too soon deliberate on the proper mode and plan of enlarging the Asylum; and as bearing on the question, we must take into consideration the proposal made by the Newcastle Magistrates to renew their Contract. Some Gentlemen consider it a conclusive argument against this proposition, that the Contract must either result in loss or gain—if in loss, every one would be opposed to it—if in gain, no one ought to wish for it. The County, they say, ought not to speculate in lunatic paupers—or in fact, to trade in anything—

gain from such a source, indeed from any source, is beneath them. To those who take this view the statement of the alternative would of course be conclusive. On the other hand, it may be said, that there is not in fact an alternative at all, but an absolute certainty of gain. The maintenance of our lunatics cost in 1862, 9s. 1d. per head per week; 12s. a head is a certain gain of about £10 per annum—on one hundred patients, £1000 per annum. There is no speculation in this. The exact amount to a few pounds may not be certain, but the fact of gain is certain. Is there then anything sordid or unbecoming the dignity of a County to make such a gain? It will not be done by farming the lunatics, or contracting to take care of them without any other feeling than a wish to gain, and with the intention of saving as much as possible in their charge. They must and will be treated precisely in the same way, with the same care and indulgence, as our own County patients; and it is merely extending to neighbours the kind treatment which the Legislature has enforced, but which we are most anxious to bestow. That while we do this, the Ratepayers should gain £1000 a year, can scarcely be thought a serious objection. Our Asylum was originally designed for three hundred Patients. By various additions it has been made to hold nearly four hundred, but in this extension, the day rooms have not kept pace with the dormitories. Of the Plans proposed, Number 1 is by addition to the east and west wings to provide room for 95 more patients, with better Infirmary and Medical Accommodation, at a cost of £2800 to £3000. This would be about the accommodation and cost required for the Newcastle patients. The second (2) Plan, is an extension of this, and would give room for 49 more patients, or 144 in all, at a further cost of from £800 to £1000, or for both objects, £4000.

It may assist the Magistrates in coming to a decision, if a short statement is given of the cost of providing accommodation up to the present time. The cost to the County up to December 31st, 1862, was for Land, £11,486 3s. 11d.; for Building, Furnishing, Law and Agency Expenses, Interest, &c., £46,440 19s. 4d.; Total, £57,927 3s. 3d.

Assuming 400 to be the greatest number of patients who can be accommodated, the cost per head on each would be £116. It is clear, that any further extension would be made at a much less cost, as the Drainage, Kitchen, Laundry, Chapel, Gas Works, Shops, and a variety of other works are included in the first cost, and would not require addition.

Thus it will be seen that to provide for 95 patients, at a cost of £3000, scarcely amounts to £32 a head.

The second Plan, which contemplates taking the Medical Superintendent's House, and building him a new one in the Grounds at a cost of £1000, accommodates 144 patients, at a total cost of £4000, and reduces the cost per head to £27 15s.

THE REPORT
OF THE
MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT
TO THE
COMMITTEE OF VISITING JUSTICES.

GENTLEMEN,

IN accordance with your Rules, I beg to lay before you the Fifth Annual Medical Report of the Durham County Asylum.

During the year 1863, there were admitted 68 men and 57 women, making with the number resident on the 31st December, 1862, a total of 271 men and 231 women under treatment.—34 men and 35 women were discharged “Recovered,”—3 men and 5 women left “Relieved” or “Not Improved,” and 25 men and 12 women Died. The numbers now resident are 208 men and 179 women, (total 387,) being an increase of 10 on the preceding year; but this number must not be supposed to represent the whole increase of the patients chargeable to this County; for the patients received under contract from Newcastle are considerably fewer than on the 1st of January, 1863, and there are, moreover, 6 patients in Private Asylums who, but for want of accommodation, would have been admitted into this Asylum. The increase is really greater, being in fact 20; while the increase of the pauper insane in the County, including those in Workhouses or with friends, is 24. The number of Insane has increased within the last ten years by upwards of 120. The daily average number of patients resident during 1863, was 387·25 against 377·9 the years before.

Though a large proportion of feeble persons were received, the admissions have on the whole been satisfactory; a larger proportion than usual having been sent to the Asylum within a few weeks of the commencement of their ailment. To show the advantage of early treatment, I may mention that 62 per cent. of those admitted within three months from the commencement of their complaint, have recovered; whilst only 31 per cent. of those admitted at later periods have been restored to health.

The Recoveries have been very satisfactory, 55·6 per cent. of those admitted having been discharged "Cured;" this number includes 3 patients who, while on leave, were certified to be "Recovered," but who were afterwards re-admitted.

I am thankful to be able to state, that no death from suicide has occurred during the year, though a large proportion of suicidal patients were admitted, and several attempts happily frustrated. One death resulted from accident—a man, labouring under general paralysis, in attempting to escape, fell on the back of his head, sustained fracture of the skull, and died from compression of the brain.

During the few hot and very dry weeks of spring and early summer, an epidemic of dysentery carried off many patients; and, as illustrating the great importance of, and necessity for, *post mortem* examinations, I must mention, that it is only after repeated inspections of the dead body, that the pathological conditions, peculiar to this epidemic, were discovered, and an appropriate mode of treatment adopted. Notwithstanding this epidemic, which fortunately attacked only the paralytic and feeble patients, the mortality, (9·5 per cent. calculated on the average number resident,) has been under the average of most other County Asylums; and this per centage also represents the average mortality since the opening of the Asylum in 1858. I believe I am correct in attributing the large per centage of recoveries and the proportionately small per centage of deaths, to the liberal allowance of food, wine, and beer, supplied to the sick patients in this Asylum, and I must be allowed to state that, in my opinion, it would be false economy, to reduce the expenditure on wine and beer, if by so doing, the per centage of recoveries should be reduced to about 40, the average in many English Asylums.

A large number of patients have been advantageously employed on the Farm and Garden, and in the various Workshops.

The services in the Chapel have been well attended during the past year, and continue to exercise a beneficial influence on the patients. The Chapel affords scarcely sufficient accommodation for the number of patients attending service—upwards of 200 are usually present, which entails the necessity of crowding the seats more than is desirable.

Exercise, Amusements, and Recreations have also been daily attended to: Pic-Nics to the New Farm, Cricket, Foot-ball, Quoits, various In-door Games, Dancing, Concerts, Theatricals, and Lectures, have contributed to restore minds to healthy action, and to render less tedious the existence of those who may have to spend the remainder of their days within these walls.

I beg to thank W. Scurfield Grey, Esq., for his continued kindness in supplying the Illustrated London News; Christopher Bramwell, Esq., for a large collection of the same periodical; the Rev. C. H. Ford, Thomas Wood, Esq., the Rev. W. H. Walter, and other friends, for large contributions to our Christmas Tree.

I have also to thank Miss Manning, London, who has on various occasions sent numerous collections of Magazines and otherwise manifested interest in our patients, and other kind friends who have frequently assisted us.

I beg to take the present opportunity of thanking the Officers and Attendants for the great assistance I have received from them during the past year. The changes in the Staff of Attendants have been very few, and I have much pleasure in expressing my high appreciation of their conduct and of their attention to their duties.
