The new Corridor on the Male side is very cheerful and comfortable.

The buildings have been delayed by the failure of the first Contractor, and will not be completed till two months after the period originally named, but their cost will not be increased, nor will they suffer otherwise from it.

Dr. Smith has fitted up a Ward for the reception of a small number of the most noisy, destructive and intractable patients, and hopes that the comparative comfort and quiet will tend greatly to their improvement. This was tried last year on the female side with excellent effect.

The condition of the Asylum has improved, as is shewn by the increased proportion of recoveries, and by the diminished proportion of deaths, though 32 patients were in a dying condition when admitted, and 8 died within three weeks of their admission.

As the cost of maintenance has been re-

duced, and we do not anticipate its increase, we recommend that the charge to the Unions in future shall be 9s. 9d. per head per week instead of 10s., which has been the charge for the last two years.

THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1870.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to lay before you the Twelfth Annual Report of this Asylum.

The year 1869 closed with a population in the Asylum of 277 men, and 233 women; during the year 1870, 95 men and 84 women were admitted, making the total number under treatment 372 men and 317 women,

or 689 in all.

Of those admitted more than the usual proportion were in delicate or feeble health, and 50 per cent. were deemed and ultimately found to be incurable, 8 or 9 were so far advanced in disease that they could, with great propriety, have been treated at home or in the workhouse, and 4 died within three weeks of their admission.

I have frequently before had cause to complain of the very scanty information supplied by the Union officers on the admission of patients. The only trustworthy information is supplied by the certifying medical officers, and their statements are confined merely to the mental symptoms of the disease, which are of comparatively little value. The statements as to the cause and duration of the malady, and as to the suicidal propensities and epileptic tendencies of the

patient, are supplied by the relieving officers, who I regret to say, in many instances, take no trouble to make the proper enquiries, and give most erroneous and misleading information, so that patients, in many cases incapable of giving the necessary information as to their ailments, are sent into this Hospital to be treated for physical disease of whose nature and history we know nothing. On making reference to Table XIII., it will be found that a very large proportion indeed of the admissions appear to have been ill less than a month previous to their being sent to the Asylum, but it will be scarcely credited that rather more than half the 77 had been ill from periods varying from two months to several years, and in some of the cases the officers must knowingly have stated what was incorrect, as the patients had for months been inmates of the Workhouse.

Intemperance, as usual amongst the men, figures largely as a cause of insanity. On looking at Table XII., it will be seen that the cause of insanity is stated in 118 of the 179 admissions to have been nnknown. I regret to say that a very large proportion of these cases, and many of those assigned to other causes, as hereditary, &c., are attributable solely to intemperance, and this obtains to a very great extent among the men. Our female population I am glad to say is com-

paratively free from such a charge. Although only two women have the puerperal condition assigned as the cause of their insanity, this is by far the most frequent cause of their insanity.

Notwithstanding the unfavourable nature of the admissions, the recoveries during last year were 10 per cent. more numerous than during 1869, having been 46.4 per cent. against 36.6 per cent.; the average of the thirteen years having been 38.4 per cent.

calculated on the numbers admitted.

The average duration of residence of the recovered, excluding the 16 who had been upwards of one year inmates of the Asylum, and who must be treated exceptionally, has been six months, the males having an average shorter duration than the females of seven weeks. Including the 16 patients, some of whom had been for several years in the Asylum, the average duration was 41 weeks. No doubt the very much shorter residence of the men can be attributed to two great causes-1st, the urgent necessity for the presence at home of the head of the family; and 2nd, the great prevalence of intemperance as the cause of insanity, for, where no organic change has taken place, the form of insanity produced by the abuse of stimulants is more readily and rapidly curable than any other form.

Intimately connected with the duration of

residence and the cause of the insanity are the readmissions. Of the 20 readmissions which took place last year, 13 were men, and only 7 were women; of these, 11 men and 6 women had been previously discharged recovered, and the causes of disease which led to their return were as follows:—

The average period of convalescence between the last and previous admissions was among the men 35 months, and among the

women 44 months.

The deaths, though 3 per cent. fewer than last year, were still high. Calculated on the mean number resident, the per centage of deaths among the men was only 10 (21 per cent. lower than the average of the 13 years), but among the women it was 16.5 (7½ per cent. higher than the yearly average). On turning to Tables v. and xIV., it will be seen that this mortality chiefly occurred among the old women who had been for a long time in the Asylum. Among the causes of death mentioned in Table xv., the most prominent is General Paralysis, which was the cause of death in 18 patients; next the various forms of Brain disease, which caused death in 14; to Phthisis 11 succumbed, and to Heart disease 8. The only

two causes of death to which particular attention need be drawn are Asphyxia and Starvation. Two patients, a man and a woman turned on their faces during epileptic attacks, and were found dead, having been asphyxiated. The woman stated to have died of starvation had been for some eight days without food prior to admission, and died shortly after, notwithstanding the attempts made to restore her.

I am thankful to state that no death from suicide has occurred during the year, though many attempts have been frustrated, and this I mainly attribute, humanly speaking, to the constant attention of the four night attendants. Coroner's inquests were held in four cases—on the two patients who died from asphyxia during epilepsy, and on two women who died suddenly from heart disease.

The general sanitary condition of the Asylum has been excellent on the women's side of the house, but the overcrowding on the men's side produced numerous instances of the lower forms of diseases usually associated with overcrowding—for instance there were 29 cases of diarrhæa, there was one of dysentery, 9 of erysipelas with abscesses, 4 of low abscesses, 8 of furunculoid disease, 2 of sloughing ulcers, throat affections 7, slight wounds taking on unhealthy action 2. These diseases were almost entirely without their analogue among the women, and to this may be

added that cases of Phthisis are much more frequent among the men than among the women.

The New West Wing which can accommodate only 50 patients will but partially relieve this, as there is that number of men now occupying at great inconvenience wards on the women's side of the house.

As in former years there has been no occasion to resort to either restraint or seclusion.

The condition generally of the Asylum has improved much. Several of the wards have received additional furniture, and much has been done by painting and papering to render them more cheerful and healthy. I may allude especially to No. I on the men's side of the house, which from being one of the most gloomy wards in the Asylum has been converted, by plastering, papering and painting, into one of the most cheerful. Into this ward, capable of holding 38 patients, five of the dirtiest and most idle and destructive patients were introduced. By degrees, by the constant vigilance of careful and attentive attendants, their bad habits were corrected, and they became clean, orderly, and almost industrious. Other patients of a similar kind, were gradually added, who have similarly improved, and the ward is now almost full of men tidy and of good habits, but who formerly in other parts of the Asylum

resisted all attempts at improvement. The saving in expense in broken articles of furniture, and in destruction of clothes, has already almost paid for the painting of the ward. This surely is sufficient encouragement to follow up the same treatment in other wards. The grounds round the Asylum, and especially the Airing Courts attached to the Female wards, have been much improved, and will tend greatly to the benefit and comfort of the Patients. nection with this general improvement in the Asylum, I am glad to be able to say that not the least feature in it is that which has taken place in the class of the Attendants now employed. The power which the Visitors so kindly some time ago placed in my hands, of increasing the pay of the Attendants, has enabled me to engage and keep in the service of the Asylum, Attendants of a higher class and more devoted to the interests of the Asylum than I could otherwise have procured, and I can assure the Visitors that, in the management of such an Institution, this is a matter of almost the first importance.

The employments and amusements of the patients have continued much the same during the past year as in former years. The men have been occupied (with profit) in the farm and garden, and as joiners, tailors, shoe-makers, upholsterers, &c.; and the women in sewing, in the kitchen, laundry,

and in general household work.

The amusements have consisted, among the men, of cricket, quoits, and football. Some of the neighbouring clubs were good enough to meet us on our own Cricket ground, where the games were closely contested, and on more than on one occasion we were fortunate enough to be victorious. From the 1st of November until the following Easter, two evenings in each week were devoted to general amusements, consisting of vocal and instrumental music, instructive and amusing readings, theatrical performances, popular lectures, magic lantern, and other entertainments. During the remainder of the year the weekly dance is continued, and is much enjoyed. The ward amusements consist of cards, dominoes, and draughts. To the old and feeble, and noisy patients, who were incapable of attending the meetings in the amusement hall, the magic lantern was exhibited in their respective wards. Further indoor amusements are still very much required both among the men and women.
