The admissions have exceeded those of every previous year, and the daily average has risen from 530 last year to 568.

A large number are still received in a very feeble state.

The patients are generally quiet, and seem contented and comfortable, and this is especially remarkable in the inmates of No. 1 Ward, who were formerly the most intractable; but having been made the subject of an experiment named in our last report, of being placed in a more comfortable room, and surrounded with objects of interest, are now quite well conducted.

That part of the West Wing which has been under construction is now completed, and fully occupied, but there are still 35 men on the women's side.

The Lunacy Commissioners, who have visited the Asylum lately, appear very well satisfied with its general condition; they, however, repeat strongly their opinion as to the expediency of at once carrying out in its entirety the original design for the extension of the Asylum, the necessity for which has been rendered more urgent by the increased and

increasing number of pauper lunatics in the county requiring Asylum treatment, and their regret "that no steps have yet been taken towards the completion of the male division."

There can be no doubt that this ought not to be delayed any longer.

The female division has been somewhat overcrowded; this will be relieved by the removal of male patients to the New Wing, but, as we have already stated, 35 still remain on the female side.

The great increase in the number of patients has made it necessary to appoint a Second Medical Officer. The Commissioners express their approval of this, and notice that the case books are now properly kept—which had for some time not been the case—from the pressure of other duties on the Medical Officers.

They pass a warm general encomium on the general management of the Asylum, in which we gladly concur.

THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT
FOR THE YEAR 1871.

MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you the Thirteenth Annual Report of this Institution, together with the usual tables.

At the end of 1870, 524 patients, 292 men and 232 women, were resident in the Asylum. Since the commencement of 1871, 224 persons, viz., 114 men and 110 women, have been admitted; 36 men and 30 women have been discharged recovered; 7 men and 9 women not recovered; and 32 men and 27 women have died, leaving an increase of 83 on the population of the previous year.

On referring to Table I., at page 13, it will be seen that the number resident in the Asylum at the end of each year has steadily increased, and the year just at an end has been more prolific in admissions than any year since the opening of the Asylum. In consequence the Asylum on the men's side of the building is again overcrowded; the addition of a portion of the West Wing

just completed and affording accommodation for 50 men, having been scarcely felt as any relief; there is therefore urgent necessity for the immediate completion of the Wing.

It may here be stated that in 1852, out of a population in the County of Durham of 402,763 there were 237 insane persons, or 1 in every 1,700; this proportion increased in 1862 to 1 in every 1,118 persons, and in 1871 to 1 in every 807. It is probable that owing to the imperfect records of 1852, and the few following years, the statistics of that period cannot be relied on; but those of 1862 and the following years are accurate, and appear to bear out the statement that there is a great and lamentable increase in insanity. Such, however, is really not the case. There is a great increase in the number of insane persons cared for at the public expense; but during the last fifteen years there has been no increase, in proportion to the population, in the number of persons attacked with insanity for the first time. In 1862 one person in every 3,500 became insane; the pro-

portion which now obtains is almost the same. The cause of the increase in the number of insane persons must therefore be sought elsewhere, and that it is chiefly, if not entirely, owing to the mere accumulation of old and incurable cases in the Asylum and workhouses can admit of little doubt. Out of every hundred patients admitted into this Asylum, 37·5 have recovered, 9 have been discharged as relieved, or not improved, 26·8 have died, and 26·7 remain, together with the increased numbers derived from the enormously rapid increase in the population of this County, to swell the numbers in the Asylum.

What is to be done to meet this great and increasing evil? It appears to me that there are only two courses open—the first is to increase year by year the Asylum and workhouse accommodation; the second to reduce the numbers of insane, and to increase the proportion of cures, and so lessen the accumulation year by year going on: the latter appears to me, apart from its philanthropic aspect, to be the more economical and more readily applied remedy, but it is one which cannot be resorted to without the earnest

co-operation of the various Magistrates and Boards of Guardians with the Officers of this Asylum.

Those of the Visiting Justices who attend the monthly meetings at this Asylum know well that at least 75 per cent. of the men admitted into the Asylum owe their insanity to intemperance—nine out of every ten discharged recovered acknowledge this to be the case. Something like a hundred men in this County are annually permitted to damage the prosperity of their County by periods of enforced idleness, varying from four or five to ten months, or even longer ; to fill up space in the Asylum, to which they are little entitled, and which could more usefully be employed, and also to use up for their maintenance in the Asylum the rates to which they have not contributed. But this is far from all that we see of the results of intemperance. Though it is most gratifying to be able to say that a very small proportion indeed of the women admitted owe the origin of their disease to their own abuse of spirituous liquors, a large proportion attribute their illnesses to improper treatment during their confinements, or

during some period of lactation, to want of proper nutrition, to injuries, and to various other causes the result of a too free use of intoxicants on the part of their husbands. It may be calculated that at least 50 per cent. of the entire population of the Asylum owe their disease directly or indirectly to intemperance.

Another cause of the increase in the numbers of the insane under treatment is the long period which is allowed to elapse between the declaration of the disease and the admission into the Asylum. On referring to Table XIII., it will be seen that of the 224 admissions, 94 were received during the first month of their ailment; of these 40, or in other words 43 per cent. recovered; of the remaining 130 only 20 recovered. In reality the facts are much more telling. The statistics in this table are collected from the statements made by the relieving officers in the Orders for Admission, and unfortunately these officers do not take the trouble they ought to to procure accurate information; of many instances illustrative of what I say which have occurred during the past year I may mention two. One, a man, the

subject of general paralysis, was on admission discovered to have been insane for nearly two years, yet in the "statement" it appeared that he had been ill only ten days. Another, a woman, was said to labour under a third attack of insanity of a few days' duration, whereas it was discovered that she had been hopelessly insane for many years without any remission. Many patients also are found to be incurable, who, if subjected to an early treatment, would in all probability have recovered. It is calculated, making allowance for the imperfections of such statistics, that if all patients were sent to the Asylum during an early period of their ailment, an average of 60 per cent. would in all probability recover, instead of the comparatively small per centage of 37·5, which has obtained since the opening of the Asylum. No doubt one great cause of the delay in sending patients to the Asylum depends on the increased cost of their maintenance here over that at home, or in the workhouse; but it is short-sighted economy to doom to many months of treatment in the Asylum, or even to perpetual residence, those patients who, had they been sent at

an early stage of their disease, might have recovered after a few weeks' residence in the Asylum.

I would therefore strongly urge—1st, upon the Visiting Justices the propriety of taking the most stringent measures to reduce the increasing amount of intemperance which exists in this County; and 2ndly, upon Boards of Guardians the necessity of sending to the Asylum at an early date, according to the Act which is constantly being evaded, all persons mentally afflicted. Were such suggestions to be carried out, I cannot doubt that the amount of insanity in this County would be most materially lessened, and the pockets of the ratepayers saved both as regards the maintenance of insane persons, and the erecting of new Asylums.

I am thankful to be able to state that no accident of a grave character has during the past year occurred in the Asylum.

A woman admitted from the Sunderland Union Workhouse developed small pox ten days after admission, and died.

Fortunately stringent precautions were taken to prevent the spread of the disease,

and with success. During the prevalence of this disease in the County, all the Officers, attendants, and servants of the Asylum, and about 600 patients, were vaccinated. With the exception of ten cases all were successful, the successful cases including several persons who were deeply scarred by small pox.

It having become necessary, in consequence of the increased number of patients, to appoint a second Assistant Medical Officer, Dr. Lowe, of the West Riding Asylum, has been selected to fulfil the duties.

I have to thank Dr. Wallis for the energy he has displayed in the performance of his various duties; to Miss Duce, the Matron, also I am under obligation for valued assistance; the attendants in general deserve credit for the manner in which they have discharged their duties.

I regret much to say that Miss Manning, who, since the year 1863, had regularly supplied various monthly periodicals for the use of the inmates, died during the past year. We have lost in her a kind and most sympathising friend. Miss Manning left the duty of continuing the supply of the periodi-

cals as a legacy to her sister, who has most kindly attended to the request.

The editors of the *Newcastle Daily Journal*, the *Durham Advertiser*, and the *South Durham Herald* have liberally supplied gratis copies of their newspapers.

A copy of the *Illustrated London News* is also received with great regularity from, it is believed, Mr. Scurfield Gray. The Rev. W. H. Walter, of Durham, has forwarded two volumes of the *Graphic*. To these our thanks are deeply due, as also to the Rev. J. P. Eden, of this parish, for numerous instances of kindness.


