The general state of the Asylum during the past year has been, on the whole, satisfactory. The condition of the grounds, and of the interior of the building, have been gradually improved. The Asylum has been, in some points, inconveniently crowded, notwithstanding the removal of the Newcastle Patients.

There are some great deficiencies in the condition of the establishment.

The Female Hospital Ward is incomplete, and too small for the accommodation of the Patients; deficient in regard to Baths, especially in the lavatories. The part originally designed for the Hospital has been obliged to be used for another purpose, and that which has been substituted is insufficient.

It will be necessary before long to make considerable additions to the building.

There is a property immediately beyond the grounds of the Asylum, and in front of it, containing about 30 acres, and a steam mill and a windmill, which is on sale at present, and is offered to the County, and may, we believe, be purchased for \pounds 3,000. We strongly recommend its purchase, as it would form a valuable addition to the grounds, and might be a nuisance in unfriendly hands.

Dr. McLeod left in the early part of the year, having received an appointment in Her Majesty's Indian Army. His successor is about to leave, having received an appointment in China.

We have to pay the same tribute as on former occasions to the uniform kindness and attention of Dr. Smith and his Medical Assistant.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

O^N the 31st December, 1864, 416 patients, viz., 217 men, and 199 women, were in the Asylum.

The Admissions during the year 1865, amounted to 129, 71 men and 58 women; many of these—75 per cent. were in delicate or feeble bodily health, while 27 per cent., by reason of bodily infirmity, and 25 per cent., owing to the duration of their malady and their own advanced age, were precluded from all hope of recovery.

The Recoveries during the same period, were 52 in number, 40.3 per cent. calculated on the admissions; 3 were discharged relieved, and 57 not improved. Of the 57 discharged not improved, 54 were removed to the Newcastle Asylum; the contract made with the Visiting Justices of that Borough for the reception of their patients having expired.

The Deaths were 50 in number, or 12.3 per cent. on the average number of patients resident. The total average number of deaths since the opening of the Asylum, in 1858, has been 10.3, calculated in the same manner.

The mean daily average number of patients resident during the syear was 403.5, and the greatest number of patients in the Asylum on any one day throughout the year, was 435.

The overcrowded condition of the Asylum continues to be a assource of very great anxiety to myself: it increases the duties and idifficulties of all the officers; is a fruitful cause of excitement to the patients; and by preventing proper supervision, must reduce every considerably their chance of recovery.

The usual occupations, recreations, and amusements have been incontinued during the past year. About 100 patients of either sex, onave been daily employed—the women in sewing, in household invork, or at the laundry; the men on the farm and garden, or in the joiners', shoemakers', tailors', mat-makers', or engineers' shops. Every day, during fine weather, parties, both of men and women, have taken exercise beyond the grounds immediately attached to the Asylum. The new walk through the plantations of Weterton Farm has been found of especial service.

The out-door recreations have consisted of cricket, quoits, football, and occasional pic-nics on the Weterton Grounds.

The general amusements have consisted, as usual, of weekly meetings for dancing, and for vocal music, of occasional concerts, theatrical performances, and exhibitions of the magic lantern. At Christmas, the kindness of some of our few friends enabled us to have our customary Christmas tree, from which every patient and officer received a small present. In September we held very successfully our annual harvest home. In the forenoon there was service in the chapel, the sermon being preached by our chaplain, the Rev. H. G. Hopkins; then followed the harvest dinner for the inmates; to this succeeded out-door games and dancing; in the evening there was a play, and afterwards a supper to the various Asylum Officials, and some of our neighbours.

It is a source of great regret, that the amusements and other means taken to ameliorate the sufferings of the patients in this Asylum, are still looked upon by the public with suspicion, and one frequently hears such expressions as "picking the pockets of the ratepayers," "too good for paupers who are not used to it at home," frequently used by people who ought to know better.

It is, however, a consolation to think, that most of those who visit the wards, with an honest determination to know what insanity is, and what the requirements of the insane are, approve of our endeavours, very imperfect as in truth they are, to induce healthy mental action in the curable, or to soothe the captivity of those who, in all probability, will end their days in the Asylum.

It is well known how trying to an ordinary invalid is the restraint and monotony of the sick room, and the friend or nurse who can, by her attention, cheerfulness, or by the use of other talents, so amuse the sick and suffering one, as to prevent him brooding over his ailments, is deservedly held in the highest estimation.

It is a well-known fact, that of the crews of the earlier Arctic

voyagers, a large percentage, however well-clothed and fed, succumbed to the miseries of a northern winter. Now it is very different: intelligent commanders are careful to provide, not merely fresh provisions and comfortable clothing for their men, but also the means of keeping in healthy exercise the various physical and mental faculties; indeed, all readers of Arctic narrative, must be well acquainted with the fact, that theatrical performances, musical entertainments, &c. (our ordinary amusements here), have, on more than one occasion, been the apparent means of restoring a sick crew to health. A similar fact we observed as having occurred among our soldiers in the expedition to Egypt, and has been more fully recognized in our own day.

If then, for persons so situated amusements and recreations are considered so necessary, how much more necessary must they be for persons situated as the inmates of our Asylum are. Many of the patients in this Asylum have been here for upwards of eight years. Many are every month admitted, who will never leave it except for their graves. Are these, paupers though they be, deserving of no alleviation to their misery ? Is the monotony of an Asylum ward to be theirs for life? Then as regards the curable patients : what so likely to aid the medical treatment of the physical portion of their disease, as the judicious employment of occupation and amusement? What so likely to allay the excitement of an intelligent patient, as an exhibition of magic lantern views, musical entertainments, or a popular lecture on some of the sciences ? What so likely to aid in allaying the excitement of a whole ward as neatly furnished apartments, decorated with cheap statuettes and favourite pictures.

Since the opening of the Asylum, no restraint has been employed; for years there has been no seclusion, except in the case of one woman, and that only for half an hour. Restraint and seclusion are never found in the same Asylum with amusements, occupations, classes for instruction, and cheerful wards; but the former are the result of an absence of the latter.

Recreations and amusements, however, in order to be effectual, must be varied, for the sake not merely of the patients, but also for that of the officers, who almost solely originate and conduct them. Unvaried amusements become dull and tiresome to the promoters, the flatness which they feel is communicated to the patients, and more harm than good to the latter is the result. Life in an Asylum must be more than vegetative.

The Chaplain, the Rev. H. G. Hopkins, has been most assiduous in his attentions to the spiritual welfare of his flock. He has regularly visited the sick, besides having had two services every Sunday, attended by about 200 patients, and he has had either a service or a class for religious instruction during the week.

As a body, I have to thank the officers and attendants for their attention to their duties. Some have failed to do justice either to themselves or to their patients; but the conduct of the greater portion has been all that I could wish. Many extra hours of duty have, during the past year, been imposed upon them, and have been cheerfully submitted to.

To Dr. McLeod, the Assistant Medical Officer, who, after a residence among us of nearly four years, I regret to say, left us in the beginning of 1865, on his appointment to Her Majesty's Indian Army, my thanks are especially due, not only for the energy he himself displayed, but for the excellent example he showed to all in the Asylum. His successor, Dr. Manson, who has also left for distant service, during his short residence here, won the esteem and affection of all connected with the Asylum; to myself, especially, he proved an invaluable friend, and I deeply regret his loss. To the Matron, Miss Duce, my thanks are also due, for her constant and unwearied attention to her charge, and for her unfailing cheerfulness amidst her many trying duties. I have also to acknowledge much assistance from Mr. Macklin, the Steward.




