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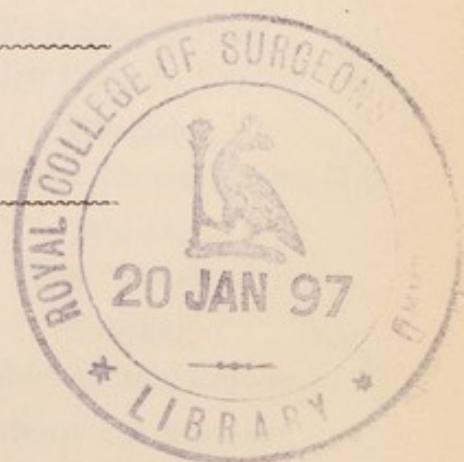

ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
Gloucestershire General Lunatic Asylum,
FOR 1850.

THE Visitors of this Asylum feel that they can present to the public as favourable a REPORT of the state and progress of the Institution, during the past year, as upon any previous occasion, except as to the number of deaths, which have considerably exceeded those of the two previous years. In making this statement, they must premise that the mortality of 1848 and 1849 was singularly small for an institution so circumstanced as a COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM, only 25 deaths having occurred in the former, and 23 in the latter year, from an average of about 400 patients treated annually. The deaths in 1850 have amounted to 36—an increase not arising from the prevalence of any epidemic or increased sickness—this establishment having been particularly healthy, and the number of sick under treatment unusually small, during the whole year. The annexed TABLES, however, will sufficiently account for the majority of the deaths, the numerical amount of which has been no doubt increased by the small mortality of the two previous years, shewing that some patients had probably outlived the usual term of persons so afflicted. Added to this, there has existed that cause which is found to operate very unfavourably, in this as well as many other County Asylums: viz. the very feeble and exhausted state in which patients are too often brought there—sometimes apparently only to

die. Among the deaths of those thus received, one died on the day of admission—two within one month—and three within two months, (and in the present year, 1851, one patient has actually died at the door of the Institution, before he could be removed from the conveyance in which he had been brought from a distance.) Such cases may occasionally happen from peculiar and unavoidable circumstances, and where the state of the patient may have made it necessary for him to be removed at all hazard to a proper Asylum ; but, with aged and feeble persons, such as have been the majority of the cases alluded to, no such necessity can be pleaded.

The Institution still labours under considerable disadvantages from the crowded state of its wards, which precludes the possibility of the classification and employment of the patients to the extent the visitors could desire ; but, in spite of the increased difficulties thus presented, a larger number of patients have been employed than heretofore, and much has been done for the promotion of the health and comfort of the patients in the improvement of the wards and day rooms. A new Wing calculated to contain 100 additional patients is in progress. The new Chapel has been completed, and opened for service during the year, and has proved a source of much comfort and satisfaction to the patients—162 of whom have, on an average, been in the habit of attending service there.

The Visitors feel that each succeeding year enables them to speak with increased confidence of the system of the entire disuse of all mechanical restraint. Not only has no such restraint been resorted to, but the number of seclusions of violent patients has materially diminished ; and it has been found that, with vigilant attendants,

they may be associated to a larger extent, and with fewer exceptions, than was heretofore thought practicable.

In the Subscribers' Division also, much has been done during the past year to promote the comfort of the patients. The apartments appropriated to the higher classes have been newly painted and refitted, and made in every way suitable to the reception of persons of superior condition. All profits arising from this class are appropriated to the maintenance of Charity patients, some of whom are received at an amount considerably less than their cost, and some quite recent cases, gratuitously, as set forth more particularly in the Report of 1849.
