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REPORT

OF

THE VISITING JUSTICES.

The following Report of the Visitors of the Lunatic Asylum at Wotton, in and for the County of Gloucester, made in accordance with the provisions of the "Lunatic Asylums' Act, 1853," was laid before the Epiphany Court of Quarter Sessions, held at Gloucester, for the County of Gloucester :—

THE Visitors of the County Lunatic Asylum are enabled to make a favourable report of the condition of that institution, which, in respect of arrangement and management, and also of the care of its inmates, continues to be satisfactory, and they consider creditable to the county and to those officers who have the management of it. The general health of the patients has been good, and no serious accident or injury to any patient has occurred during the year. And although there has been a change of the two assistant medical officers, one of whom resigned from ill health, the other on account of promotion, their places have been supplied without any check to the regular working of the system. The attendants have been settled and attentive. All, therefore, connected with the conduct of the Lunatic Asylum may be reported to be satisfactory, except the position of pauper lunacy in the county, which has deteriorated since the last report. During the year 1867, a great struggle had been kept up, which resulted in the number of pauper lunatics which had been kept from increasing during the two previous years, being reduced by about 20 patients, the numbers in the house on the 31st of December, 1867, having been 575, as against 593 in 1866, and 590 in 1865; but the hopes of the Visitors in this respect have been disappointed by the extraordinary increase of patients brought in, and by the very unfavourable nature of the cases.

The admissions have amounted to 185, a number 39 in excess of 1867, and 28 above the highest number admitted in any previous year, so that there were on the 31st of December, 597 patients in the house. It is difficult to assign any cause for this sudden increase of pauper lunacy. It can be but slightly attributed to re-admissions, as these have not been largely increased, and are only about five per cent. in excess of the proportion of the past few years. Of course, the longer an institution is open, and the larger number of cures it sends out, the larger the proportion of re-admissions must be expected to be. The majority of the cases admitted, too, have been of the most unfavourable character, not more than one-third presenting any reasonable hope of cure. A large number has consisted, also, of aged and feeble cases, requiring much care and watching, creating thus increased labour and anxiety, without prospect of conferring any real benefit. Another unfavourable feature has been the large proportion of epileptics admitted, not less than 24 such cases having been brought to the Asylum this year, so that there are now not less than 120 epileptic patients in the house. The deaths, considering the nature of the cases, have not been numerous, amounting to 70; and the cures also comprise 70—30 males and 40 females, besides 15 discharged relieved. These numbers, though not equal to the success of last year, present a very fair proportion of cures, considering the nature of the cases, and could scarcely have been obtained from such patients if several of the older and more chronic cases had not been included, for as many as 16 patients have been discharged cured who had been in the house more than two years, of whom eight had been five years and upwards resident, one having been as long as 27 years, and another 15 years in the Asylum. The Visitors, in making this report to the Magistrates, admit that they feel disappointment and some discouragement at this unexpected large increase of pauper lunatics, threatening as it does to absorb all the available accommodation of the County Asylum. There remains now only vacant space for providing 17 male and 7 female patients, the room being principally on the male side, while the pressure is for the admission of females. Another year, therefore, such as the last, *would* completely fill the Asylum. Still, the Visitors have great confidence in the skill and unwearied exertions of their superintendent, Mr. Toller, and his staff, remembering that five years ago the Institution was in as crowded a state, having in December, 1863, 598 patients, or one more than at present; and yet, through the increased number of discharges from cures and relief, they have been enabled to go on till the present time receiving every proper case without again reaching that limit. The Visitors, however, think that under the circumstances, they may properly appeal to the Magistrates and to the Boards of Guardians to exercise increased care as to the cases they send to the Asylum, as many have been brought there this year who might,

with a little extra care, have been very well retained in the work-house, or at their own homes, and no less than four in which the medical superintendent could not, after careful watching and repeated examinations, discover any insanity, and who were accordingly discharged. No additional accommodation for patients has been built for about ten years; and all that is now proposed to be done will consist in enlarging two day-rooms, which are inconveniently crowded, and in placing a schoolroom over them, which will render the present schoolroom available for a few more patients. Some further additions also must be made to the lavatories. Some of the lavatories have been already enlarged and others added during the past year; and a wall has been built along the greater part of the boundary of the Asylum grounds towards Gloucester, which was necessary to shut out a public footpath. This wall requires to be extended for a short distance to complete the boundary on that side, and thus a good dry walk may be made for the patients within the Asylum grounds.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

Gloucester County Asylum, June 5, 1868.

WE yesterday inspected the Asylum, and with the exception of 6 men and 9 women, absent on trial, saw all the patients.

The change in the patients since the visit of our colleagues, 7th June, last year, and their present numbers, are set forth in the following table:—

We find upon enquiry that of the patients admitted during the present year, 7 males and 14 females have been cases of re-admission; and that the total numbers of re-admissions since the last visit have been 10 in the male and 25 in the female division. The assigned causes of death since the last visit were as follows:

Inquests were held in two cases: (1) That of a man who had softening of the brain, and who died three days after admission, immediately after treatment by packing in a wet sheet; (2) That of a woman whose death was due to an injury to the spine sustained before her admission, by jumping out of a window.

The patients last registered as under medical treatment were 61 in number, viz.: 24 males and 37 females.

The instances of seclusion, since the last visit, have been 5 in the male division and 41 in the female, the former in the cases of 4, and the latter of 28 patients.

The Chapel, which will accommodate only 210 patients, is filled at the Sunday services, and on week-days attended by about 30 men and 25 women. A Chapel adequate to the wants of this large Asylum ought to accommodate at least 400 patients, and we trust that the matter will receive the serious consideration of the Visitors.

The Asylum is now estimated to afford accommodation for 618 patients—294 males and 324 females. The vacant beds in the male division are at present only 7; and in the females, 17; so that the patients on the books would, within twelve, fill the Asylum.

In these circumstances, it becomes an important question, how and where adequate future provision is to be made for the pauper lunatics of the County.

It is material here to observe that the total amount of land in the possession of the Asylum is only 80 acres, of which as many as 34 are rented by the year.

The ordinary weekly charge for maintenance is at present 8/6; and that for Out-County patients, 12/-

In reference to the observations and suggestions in the last Report, we have to state as follows:—

(1). The extension and improved arrangement of the laundry department in progress at the time of the last visit have been completed, and the body-linen of the patients is now changed twice a week.

(2). Satisfactory arrangements have been made for cleaning and drying soiled bedding near the washhouse.

(3). The means of personal washing have been increased by the construction of lavatories with ranges of fixed basins in recesses in connection with two male and four female ground-floor wards, providing therein in a proportion of one basin to four patients.

(4). As respects baths, more than one patient is not now

placed in the same water; this, however, is effected by limiting the depth of the water in the bath to three inches—a quantity manifestly insufficient for a proper weekly bath.

We have to report very favourably of the cleanliness and general good order of the several wards and rooms, beds and bedding. The aspect, however, of the galleries and day-rooms would be much improved by a better supply of flowering plants and other decorations and objects of interest.

With a few exceptions in Ward 4, in the male, and Wards 14, (Upper and Lower) in the female division, the patients, at the time of our visit, were tranquil and orderly. We may here remark as the result of our experience, that a great improvement as regards the habits and demeanour of the more excited class of patients, would, we are strongly of opinion, result from their separation from each other, and more general association with others; and by affording them the means of extended out-door exercise.

The arrangements for recreation and amusement are the same as previously reported.

During the winter months there are frequent dances and dramatic entertainments. In the summer parties of patients of both sexes are assembled to hear the practice of the band in the airing Courts, and they enjoy country walks and occasional excursions. Select numbers also attend entertainments in the city.

Upon enquiry, however, we learnt that as many as 350 patients never walk beyond their airing courts; and we again recommend the early formation around the inner boundary of the estate of a dry cinder or gravel path, available for extended exercise daily to large numbers now entirely restricted to their courts.

Circumstances which have occurred elsewhere lead us to suggest that for the better security of suicidal patients, the existence of the fatal propensity should be communicated in writing to the attendants on taking charge of the patients, in addition to the verbal instructions now given to them in such cases by the medical officers.

Since the last visit a wall has been built on the north side of the field recently purchased, and is, as we are informed by Mr. Toller, about shortly to be continued along the northern boundary of the estate, which will screen off the public path, and facilitate the formation of the walk which we have suggested for the patients. A Turkish bath has been recently constructed and brought into use.

The condition of the Asylum continues to be, upon the whole, very satisfactory; and Mr. Toller, who shows an intimate knowledge of the cases of the patients, individually appears to devote his best energies to the discharge of his onerous duties as Superintendent.
