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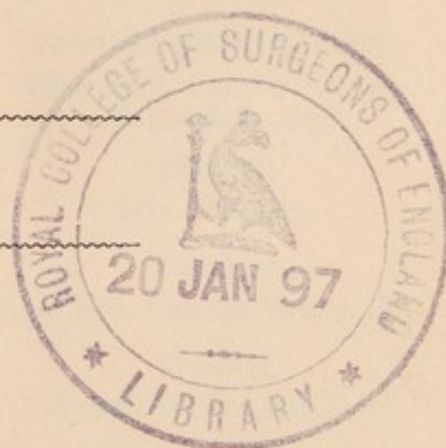

ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
Gloucestershire General Lunatic Asylum,
FOR 1852.

THE Visitors have the satisfaction of presenting a very favourable Report of the condition and progress of this Asylum during the past year.

The health of the inmates has been excellent; and the mortality which had increased during the two preceding years, from the admission and accumulation of aged and diseased patients, has again returned to its usual low ratio, the deaths having amounted to only 27 out of above 400 patients treated during the year, the weekly average being 317.

The admissions for the year have been fewer than usual, the Visitors having been compelled to close their doors in the early part of May, from the overcrowded state of the Asylum, which they could not re-open before the latter part of November, when the New Female Pauper Wing was completed, and became ready for occupation. The admissions for the year consequently amounted to only 91—of whom 25 were deemed incurable at the time—which, together with the small number of curable cases remaining in the House on the 31st December, 1851—estimated in the Tables

of the last Report at 21—may be considered as the whole amount of cases under treatment presenting any reasonable prospect of cure; nevertheless during the past year 43 patients have been discharged recovered, and 18 others materially relieved, of which last, several have since been reported as convalescent; out of such cases therefore the amount of actual cures may be considered as nearly 50 per cent., and of the two combined nearly 70 per cent.

The Institution has been greatly improved this year, by the opening of the New Female Pauper Wing, calculated to hold 98 patients. The furnishing of which afforded much additional industrial occupation, all the articles of bedding and clothing having been made by the patients. The cheerfulness of its site and sunny aspect, and the improved construction of its accommodation, have already exercised a most favorable influence upon the patients who have been removed into it; and the Visitors confidently anticipate that when the new airing ground is completed—which has been laid out almost exclusively by the patients—that this part of the establishment will form one of the most cheerful and agreeable retreats for pauper lunatics in the kingdom.

Much has been done during the past year to promote the increased comfort and enjoyment of the patients, and many evening entertainments have been given, where music, dancing, the magic lantern, and other enlivening recreations have been provided for their amusement by the indefatigable exertions of Dr. and Mrs. WILLIAMS, who have spared no pains nor personal sacrifices which could tend to promote the improvement or enjoyment of the patients. And it appears that their exertions have not failed to produce their natural influence upon the general tone of the patients, whose increased contentment and willingness to work

have been very apparent. The number desirous and fit to attend the Chapel, has also become greater, and amounts to nearly two-thirds of the whole.

An organ has been erected in the Chapel, and an able choir formed out of the inmates of the establishment; and the patients manifest an increasing interest in the services.

The beneficial effects of the system of managing violent and dangerous lunatics, without the intervention of any description of bodily restraint or coercion, have received further confirmation—if any such can now be required—by the experience of the past year in this Asylum, where, although many extremely violent patients have been admitted, watchful care, kind treatment, and the vigilance of attendants have been found quite adequate to the management of every case which has presented itself, and no serious casualty of any kind has occurred; while the general demeanour of the patients has been more than usually tranquil.

The Subscribers department has embraced a wider sphere of benevolence, 3 patients having been admitted gratuitously, and 16 others having participated in its advantages.
