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REPORT OF THE VISITING JUSTICES.

The following Report of the Visitors of the Lunatic Asylum at Wotton, in and for the County of Gloucester, made in accordance with the provisions of the Lunatic Asylums' Act, 1853, was laid before the Epiphany Court of Quarter Sessions, held at Gloucester, for the County of Gloucester:—

THE Visitors of the County Lunatic Asylum, in accordance with the Lunatic Asylums' Act, 1853, report that the County Asylum contained at the close of the year 1862, 556 patients, viz: 262 males and 294 females, being an increase in the number of patients during the year of 43—rather an alarming encroachment upon the amount of suitable accommodation still existing in the Asylum, even after the large additions which have been made to the establishment within the last few years. This increase has arisen, not so much from the number of admissions (though there has been an excess in this respect of sixteen), as from the very unfavourable nature of the cases admitted, principally chronic cases of a feeble and imbecile character, from workhouses, offering no prospect of cure. The Visitors had hoped that almost all such cases which were proper to be sent to the Asylum had been already received into it, but either the operation of the late Act of Parliament as to the chargeability of pauper lunatics, or the

pressure of the Lunacy Commissioners, has certainly had the effect of bringing an additional number of the worst and most hopeless cases into the wards of the Asylum. In no previous year have the admissions been of a more unfavourable character. The proportion of cures has consequently been smaller than usual. The establishment has, however, been particularly healthy, and the deaths only 51, being 13 less than the last year, and not more than 7.5 per cent. on the number of cases. The Visitors continue to hope that a time must come when the influx of chronic cases from workhouses will be less overwhelming, and that Boards of Guardians will consider it to be their interest as well as duty to send all cases of insanity to the Asylum at once, while they are recent and curable, and to retain in the workhouses, if any of weak and unsound mind are to be kept there, rather those who by reason of age, bodily weakness, or sheer imbecility, are incapable of doing real mischief to others, and are, moreover, incurable. No fatal accident has occurred during the year, though the unusually large proportion of cases admitted showing strong and suicidal propensities has required peculiar watchfulness and attention on the part of the officers and attendants. The new lodge, workshops, and farm buildings, which were ordered at the last Easter Quarter Sessions, are nearly completed, and the lodge is already occupied. The removal of the gardener's house and old workshops has allowed several cross walls to be taken down, and the airing courts on the female side to be squared and properly laid out. This has made a great improvement, which has been rendered more perceptible by the substitution of neat square sashes in place of the old semi-circular windows, formerly giving a confined and cheerless effect to the lower wards, which are now as sunny and agreeable as the other portions of the house. A large proportion of the patients have found employment out of doors in gardening and on the farm, and in assisting to lay out the new airing yards, as well as in preparing the foundations of the new buildings. They

have enjoyed the same sources of amusement as heretofore ; and the practice of allowing patients to visit their friends occasionally for a limited period, which has been in use for the last three or four years, has this year received the distinct approval of the Commissioners in Lunacy, and by their recommendation has been placed under fixed regulations. The Visitors append the report of the Commissioners in Lunacy made on their visit this year :—

“ Gloucester County Asylum, 6th June, 1862.

“ We have yesterday and this day visited the Asylum, inspected all its wards, offices, grounds, and premises, and seen the whole of the patients resident therein, including the male patients, twelve in number, who are during the day, and seven of whom sleep, in the detached cottage. The patients on the books are now 552 in number, viz: 251 of the male and 301 of the female sex. Of the former five and of the latter three are of the private class, but are accommodated and treated in all respects as paupers. Two of the female patients, one of the private and the other of the pauper class, have been found lunatic by inquisition. Proceedings are in progress for realizing the property to which the latter is entitled, when she will be transferred to the private list. The weekly charge for the private patients is 12s. The charge for pauper patients has, within the last six months, been raised from 9s. to 9s. 3d. weekly, its present amount. The changes in the patients since the last visit of the Commissioners, on the 18th June, 1861, have been as follows :—

Two patients, one of each sex, were absent on trial at the time of our visit. The sanitary condition of the asylum upon the whole appears to be satisfactory, the numbers registered as under medical treatment for bodily ailments or their mental malady being eleven in the male and seventeen in the female division. We observed a considerable number of patients, upwards of thirty, on the female side in bed from various causes, many, however, from disorders of a trifling nature. With some exceptions amongst the females the patients, when we visited the wards, were free from excitement and orderly in their demeanour. One patient of each sex was in seclusion during a maniacal paroxysm. According to the medical journal since the last visit twenty-two male patients and twenty-four females have been placed in seclusion altogether on sixty-nine occasions, and generally for very short periods. Fifteen patients only have been secluded more than once, and one only as many as five times. The attendance at Divine service

in the chapel is to the full extent of the accommodation, which does not much exceed 250. In these circumstances it becomes matter for consideration by what means provision can be most conveniently made for the attendance of a larger number of patients. At present, more especially in hot weather, the chapel is much crowded. The system of night attendance continues to work most beneficially. According to the latest returns, the patients who soiled or wet their beds were only six in the male and three in the female division. We saw the patients at dinner and were well satisfied with the excellent quality of the meat and vegetables, and the comfortable manner in which they were served. The beer also, of which the allowance to the patients is very liberal, was good, and in Dr. Williams's opinion is essential to the health of the patient. The several wards and rooms were found by us clean and in the best order, and the atmosphere generally was untainted. Since the last visit the dormitories in the old pauper block on each side have been papered, and the windows in these dormitories and in the corridors and rooms elsewhere, have been furnished with neat vallances, giving them a comfortable aspect. Much also has been done in decorating the walls with framed prints and otherwise. We think it would be a great improvement if the walls, now whitewashed, more especially those of the corridors and day-rooms, were papered or coloured in the upper portions, the lower part being painted. Dr. Williams has shown us a window, with ordinary sashes, which has been inserted in one of the single sleeping rooms in Female Ward No. 14, and of which we entirely approve as in substitution for the present unsightly semi-circular openings near the ceiling. Much has been done, and is in progress, towards enlarging and otherwise improving the airing grounds, and plans are under consideration for the erection of suitable farm buildings and a range of workshops in proximity thereto for carpenters, masons, &c. Hand-rails are in course of being fixed to the staircases generally. The general system and routine of the institution continue as heretofore reported, and everything practicable appears to be done with a view to occupy and amuse the patients. The practice of allowing patients to visit their friends for the day and occasionally for a few days is reported to be attended with the best results. Upwards of four hundred of such visits are stated to have been made during the past year, and in no case has the written undertaking to bring back the patient within the stipulated time been violated. We think that it would be desirable if this practice were placed on a more regular and satisfactory footing by a regulation of the Committee of Visitors under the provisions of the 124th section of the Lunatic Asylum Act, 1853. The patients, who made no complaint on the score of their treatment by the attendants or otherwise, appear to enjoy every comfort; and the condition of the Asylum generally is very creditable, as it has hitherto been, to Dr. Williams and those acting under him.—R.
