RE P O R T OF THE VISITING JUSTICES.

The following Report of the Visitors of the Lunatic Asylum at Wotton, in and for the County of Gloucester, made in accordance with the provisions of the Lunatic Asylums' Act, 1853, was laid before the Epiphany Court of Quarter Sessions, held at Gloucester, for the County of Gloucester :—

The Visitors, in making their Annual Report to the Court of Quarter Sessions, have the satisfaction to state that the alterations and additions which have been in progress at the County Lunatic Asylum for nearly ten years, and have kept that institution in more or less of a transition state during almost the whole of that period, now approach completion, and it is confidently expected will be finished by the early part of next summer. It is believed, indeed, that the whole would have been fit for occupation by this time had not an unfortunate fire occurred on the 27th of June, which destroyed one of the wings in progress, and extended to a portion of the crescent, but was happily there arrested, after it had begun to threaten destruction to the whole pile. Providentially no accident or personal injury occurred to any one, and no portion of the inhabited building was materially damaged. The property was insured in the Phoenix Fire Office, which promptly paid £3000 in respect of the damage done, which it is believed will be sufficient for the restoration; so that beyond the delay and great inconvenience

created by it, no actual loss has been sustained. Sufficient additional accommodation having been rendered fit for occupation to admit of the recall of the 16 male patients belonging to this Asylum, placed out in the Warwick County Asylum in March, 1854, the Visitors have terminated their agreement with that Institution, and those patients will return at once to their own Asylum. It is expected that another portion of the building will be completed and fit for occupation by Lady-day next, which will allow of all the pauper patients belonging to the county, now confined in licensed houses, being received into the Asylum. The house for the Superintendent is progressing towards completion, and is likely to be ready for use by the early part of next summer, when that portion of the crescent now comprising his residence will become available for patients. On the 31st of December the Asylum contained—males, 176; females, 251 ; total, 427 pauper patients, being an increase of 20 above the number at the close of 1857. The number of admissions during the year have been 53 males, 76 females—129 ; by far the greater portion of whom have been of themost unpromising, indeed hopeless character, consisting of—

And there remained in the Asylum at the end of last year only 23 deemed curable. Out of these very unpromising materials 30 have been recovered—a small per centage upon the total number of inmates, but a large proportion of the more promising cases. The deaths have been unusually numerous, amounting to 67 ; but of these, 16 have occurred of patients between 70 and 80 years of age, and seven of persons who had been admitted less than 13 days, and three less than one month. The Visitors desire to draw the atten-

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tion of the Magistrates, and especially of those who take an active part in the administration of the Poor-laws, to the necessity of impressing upon Boards of Guardians the importance of sending recent cases of insanity to the Asylum with as little delay as possible, instead of attempting, as too often happens, to keep them as long as they can be managed in the Workhouse, and at last sending them in a chronic or incurable state, thus cruelly depriving the unfortunate patients of the last prospect of cure, and causing them too often to become a permanent burden upon their parishes and the county at large. It seems, however, at present to be the practice rather to send in preference cases of senile imbecility, because such are frequently found to create annoyance by a disposition to be noisy and dirty; but as such cases are neither dangerous nor curable, their removal to the County Asylum is really much less important than the former cases, who may in the first instance appear less troublesome in the Workhouse. The health of the inmates of the County Asylum has been generally very good during the year, and no epidemic of any kind prevailed among them until about the end of September the smallpox made its appearance in a mild form, and still lingered on till the end of the year. There have been 26 cases, all females, who have done well, with the exception of one feeble patient who was carried off by the attack; the male side has as yet escaped entirely. No serious accident of any kind has occurred to any patient or attendant, which, considering the quantity of building materials about, and the extent of building carried on during the year in the middle of the Institution, reflects much credit, in the opinion of Visitors, on the vigilance and care of the officers and attendants. A large proportion of the male patients has found daily employment in the cultivation of the garden and farm. The excavation of the ground under the superintendent's new house, the drainage from it, and all the labour about the Asylum, have been done by them. The females also followed during the year their regular occupations. Some novelties have been introduced into the amusements and recreations of the patients during this year; a harvest-home entertainment afforded much enjoyment to a party of between 200 and 300 of both sexes, who engaged in sports of various kinds, which were only curtailed by the limited

space of grass plot which the Asylum at present possesses for the purpose. The usual winter parties were commenced with a theatrical entertainment, which afforded great pleasure and amusement to a large assemblage of patients. The repetition of this performance or of other such meetings for amusement or instruction, has been since prevented by the prevalence of small-pox among some of the patients. Trial has been made this year of permitting patients occasionally to visit their homes, even at a distance, for a day or two, particularly on Sundays, and apparently with very favourable results. The Commissioners in Lunacy have paid one official and three private visits to this Asylum, during this year, in which they have strongly expressed their approbation of the management of the Institution and the condition of the patients. The Visitors think it only fair to Dr. Williams, who, under very difficult circumstances, from the unfinished and continually changing state of the Asylum, owing to the large building operations continually carried on within it, has succeeded in maintaining the discipline of the establishment without in any way intrenching upon the comforts or enjoyments of the patients, and to quote the concluding portion of the Official Report of the Commissioners, dated May 10th, 1858 :—“The Asylum is still in progress, but great alterations have taken place during the last 12 months. When the establishment shall be completed, it will accommodate 628 patients. Already the improvements are very obvious, and the whole presents so cheerful an appearance that we feel bound to notice it, and to express our extreme approbation of the activity and skill that has urged such amendments upon the governing authorities. We are glad to learn that the suggestion contained in the last entry, for providing a suitable residence for the able superintendent has been attended to.”
