HER MAJESTY'S JUSTICES OF THE PEACE FOR THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX IN GENERAL QUARTER SESSION ASSEMBLED.

The SEVENTY-FIRST REPORT of the Visiting
Justices appointed to superintend the
Management of The County Lunatic
Asylum at Hanwell.

The Visiting Justices have to announce to the Court, that since date of their last Report the County has lost the valuable vices of the Chaplain of the Asylum, and of the House Surgeon the female side. The Reverend John Thomas Burt had been gaged in the labours of his ministry for three years, and during ut time he has displayed the most active zeal, and sound judgnt in the discharge of his arduous duties. Animated by the are and gentle spirit of Christianity, his course has been uniformly that to conciliate all, and to offend no one. Being convinced on principle of the excellence of the system which is pursued in

the Asylum, and with a mind singularly devoted to the task affording instruction to the ignorant and comfort to the afflicted, the Medical Officers have at all times found in him a zealous coadjutor, and the Visiting Justices an intelligent, kind, and efficient Officer.

The Visiting Justices are happy to say that the resignation this gentleman has been occasioned by his appointment to the situation of Assistant-Chaplain to the Pentonville Prison.

Dr. Davey has filled the office of House Surgeon in the Asyle for nearly four years, and the Visiting Justices have great satisfation in bearing testimony to the zeal, attention, and ability, who he has shewn in the exercise of his office. They have always four him to be that which he professed to be from the beginning, a secere supporter in the doctrine that the Insane may be best controlled without bodily coercion. Upon a conviction of the truth this he has steadily acted, and the Visiting Justices feel greating indebted to him for assisting by his exertions in removing profisional prejudices, and in proving that there is less of real dam in the vigilant supervision of the Insane, than in bodily coercies which while it produces an exasperated state of the feelings, scarcely be remitted without the greatest danger.

The Visiting Justices are happy to know that the talents conduct of Dr. Davey as House Surgeon of the Asylum have to his appointment by Her Majesty's Government to the situat of Medical Superintendant of a Lunatic Asylum about to established in the Island of Ceylon.

Since the resignation of Dr. Davey, the Visiting Justices have ected Dr. Pearce Rogers Nesbitt as his successor. The office of haplain is not yet filled up.

The Lectures of Dr. Conolly have this season been again given the Asylum to a limited number of pupils from the different ondon Hospitals. The Visiting Justices are satisfied that they ill be attended with the most useful results, as they convey much appropriate information on the subject of Insanity, and on the best nodes by which the Insane are to be governed.

TO HER MAJESTY'S JUSTICES OF THE PEACE FOR THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX IN GENERAL QUARTER SESSION ASSEMBLED.

The EIGHTEENTH REPORT of Messrs. Allen of Carlisle Street, Soho, Attornies at Law.

Since the County Day of the last Quarter Session Messrs. Allen have attended before Magistrates at the Metropolitan Police Courts and in Petty Sessions in thirteen cases. In four of them in consequence of the opposition offered by Messrs. Allen, orders upon the County Treasurer for the maintenance of the Lunatics were refused. In two others the Settlements were adjudged; and in the remaining seven cases the Paupers were found to be County Patients—but, in one of those seven cases, a Settlement has since been discovered and adjudicated—so that in six only of the thirteen cases the Lunatics remain chargeable to the County.

The Settlements of William Wilbeam, Mark Bacon, and William Brown, who were admitted to the Asylum before the County day of the last Quarter Session, have also been discovered and adjudicated. The amount directed to be repaid to the County Treasurer in those three Cases, and in the one Case before mentioned, is

£18 19s. 2d., and two of the four Lunatics belong to Parishes out of the County.

Messrs. Allen have likewise attended Parish Officers, and made enquiries and corresponded in five other Cases, with the view of protecting the interests of the County.

The expence of their attending at the Police Courts and Petty Sessions in the thirteen Cases, and tracing out evidence in most of them, amounts to £25 13s. 2d. and that of discovering and adjudicating the four Settlements, and of the other business done with reference to the five other Lunatics, including payments to Witnesses, is £44 3s. 2d.
