TO HER MAJESTY'S JUSTICES OF THE PEACE FOR THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX IN QUARTER SESSION ASSEMBLED.

THE SECOND REPORT of the COM-MITTEE of VISITORS of THE COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM AT HANWELL.

As the period for which the Committee of Visitors were appointed terminates at the present Session, it becomes their duty to lay before the Court a statement of the present condition of the Asylum; and it affords them the utmost satisfaction, after the experience of another year, to be enabled to speak in terms of still higher praise of the humane system which has, happily, been progressing in the establishment for some years past, and they have not had the slightest cause to regret the abolition of all restraint, which they attribute to the zealous and efficient manner in which the duties of the officers and servants have been performed.

The Committee have received during the past year the cordial co-operation of all the officers of the Asylum, and have much pleasure in stating that harmony and good feeling have prevailed in the establishment.

The Committee are anxious to draw the attention of the

Court to the Report of the Visiting Physician, now presented, as containing matter of great interest and importance on the humane and successful management of the insane, without restraint, in public Asylums. The subject is so ably and convincingly brought forward by Dr. Conolly, that the Committee do not think it necessary to add more than their entire approbation and concurrence in the sentiments so well expressed by him.

The Committee regret that, notwithstanding their representations to the parishes on the importance of selecting recent cases for treatment in the County Asylum, a very large proportion of the patients received during the last year may be considered as incurable. The limited number of recent cases that has been received has been very successfully treated, and Dr. Hitchman has represented to the Committee, and it is an important fact, that every recent case admitted prior to treatment elsewhere has either recovered, or is in an advanced stage of convalescence.

The Committee have for a long period been in the habit of questioning patients when restored to society and their friends, as to their power of recollecting circumstances that have occurred during the time they have been in the Asylum, and more especially as to the treatment they have experienced, and whether they have any complaint to make. In every instance the result has been satisfactory, and their expressions are generally those of gratitude for the attention and kindness they received during their residence in the Asylum.

The Committee have the satisfaction to state that Dr. Conolly has acceded to their request to deliver, in the months of May and June in the present year, a course of Clinical

Lectures to a limited number of pupils from the public Hospitals, which the Committee have no doubt, from their past experience, will be the means of conveying valuable information to the medical profession on the disease of insanity, without prejudicially exciting or disturbing the patients.

The Chaplain of the Asylum, the Rev. John May, continues to perform his duties in a judicious and satisfactory manner, and he mentions in his Report several interesting cases in which the consolations of religion have been highly valued by patients, who have in their last illness recovered their senses in a manner which enabled them fully to receive and appreciate his religious instruction.

The Committee have also to Report, that after carefully revising the general Rules for the government of the Asylum, they submitted them to her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Home Department, agreeably to the provisions of the 8th & 9th Vic., cap. 126, sec. 40. He, however, on the recommendation of the Commissioners in Lunacy, at first declined to approve of those general Rules, on the ground, amongst others, that "they altogether omitted to specify the offices of the different persons to whom the more immediate conduct and management of the institution was to be entrusted—to define their several departments—or to prescribe and regulate their duties;" but, upon the Committee pointing out to Sir George Grey that the 40th section of the Act directs that those particulars shall be set forth, not in the general Rules requiring his sanction, but in the Regulations and Orders for the management of the Asylum to be made by the Committee, and to which his sanction was not necessary, he, on the 1st of December, was pleased to signify his approval of them, without even one verbal alteration.

The Committee have, as directed by the Act, made such Regulations and Orders for the management of the Asylum, not inconsistent with the general Rules for its government, as they have thought fit and desirable, and have also settled and prescribed a Manual of the duties of the ward attendants and servants of the establishment.

The Accounts of the Asylum have been duly examined and audited, and notwithstanding the high price of provisions, the Committee, in consequence of the favorable circumstances under which the contracts were entered into, have not at present been under the necessity of making any addition to the weekly rate of maintenance for each patient.

The whole of the repairs of the clothing. &c. is done by the patients, with the exception of the repairs of the leather shoes. The washing of the establishment, consisting, on the 31st December, 1846, of 1072 persons, is also performed by the patients, with the superintendence and assistance of 9 laundresses; and the whole of the cooking, baking, and dairy department, with the superintendence of the housekeeper and assistance of four servants.

From 90 to 100 patients are constantly employed on the farm and gardens.

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EIGHTH REPORT

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December 31st, 1846.

On the 21st day of September last, seven years were completed, during which no strait-waistcoat, muff, leg-lock, hand-cuff, coercion-chair, or other means of mechanical restraint have been resorted to in the Hanwell Asylum, by night or by day. In those seven years, 1,100 cases have been admitted, and treated entirely on the non-restraint system; and the number of patients in the Asylum has during a great part of the same period amounted to nearly 1,000.

There are still some Asylums in England, Ireland, and Scotland, in which such means of restraint are employed and defended; and travellers from various parts of the Continent, and from the United States of America, apparently prepossessed in favour of such ancient and forcible methods of control, continue to pay hasty visits to Hanwell, and to publish opinions condemnatory of the non-restraint system. In the Annual Reports of past years, when the experiment was but in an early stage of its progress, and when it was embar-

rassed by many difficulties, I refrained from engaging in any controversy on the subject; being satisfied that the results would furnish the best test of its being rational and judicious, as well as humane. If such results had not appeared, it would have been my duty to modify or abandon the system, as, in similar circumstances, it would have been my duty to alter or relinquish any other particular in the treatment of the patients. Now, after seven years' patient trial, during which the non-restraint system has been introduced into many other Asylums, without the occurrence of any accident against which mechanical restraint would have afforded security, I do not think it desirable more particularly to notice the opinions of writers who have sometimes appeared to visit Hanwell more prepared to argue than disposed to observe; nor should I deem it necessary to refer to this part of treatment, if it were not that I consider it still requisite to remind those who are most anxious to adopt it, that certain conditions are essential to its being successfully maintained.

One of the first of these is, a properly constructed building, in which the patients enjoy the advantages of light and air, and a cheerful prospect, and ample space for exercise, and for classification, and means of occupation and recreation. The next is the constant and watchful superintendence of humane and intelligent officers, exercising full but considerate and just control over an efficient body of attendants. Other conditions are connected with such attention to the diet, clothing, lodging, and general cleanliness of the patients, as may exclude all avoidable sources of physical and mental uneasiness. Various employments, a certain extent of instruction, judicious religious attentions, and frequent opportunities of recreation are indispensable and powerful auxiliaries. The whole treatment, management, and government of the patients

and of the Asylum, must, in short, be primarily adapted to the cure or improvement of infirm and disordered minds and bodies; and as far removed on the one hand, from the economy and organization of a workhouse, as, on the other, from the restrictions of a prison.

In any public Asylum constructed and conducted on these principles, and provided with proper resources against accidents incidental to all houses in which a number of insane persons are collected, the practicability and safety of the nonrestraint system have now been satisfactorily proved by trials made in some of the largest of such institutions, and continued for several years. Every year, in such Asylums, shows the possibility of removing more restrictions, and of dispensing with some of the precautions for which severe measures constituted the real necessity; so that in every year the comfort and freedom of the patients admits of some further augmentation, and their condition becomes more assimilated to that of the sane, except in points for which their malady intrinsically disqualifies them; and for which an eventual remedy is sought by the indirect operation of a treatment calculated to relieve the feeble from responsibilities they are unequal to bear, from duties they are unable to perform, and all the unavoidable excitements of social life, which the morbidly irritable brain cannot endure.

The wards of the Hanwell Asylum afford many illustrations of these principles. From some of them, the massive and immoveable tables and other furniture, once supposed to be necessary for safety, have been removed, and more convenient and moveable tables and seats of lighter construction put in their places; many of the window-guards have been found unnecessary; and various additional comforts, including coir-

matting on the stone floor by the side of each bed, and a better kind of pillow, have been introduced into the sleeping rooms. The over-crowded state of the larger dormitories has been remedied by lessening the number of beds in them as far as practicable; whilst the admission of light and air has been greatly increased in those apartments by removing the earth or the walls which formerly obstructed the windows, so as to form gentle slopes, covered with grass. A great addition to the winter comfort of many of the patients, and to the health of some of the older and feebler among them, has been made by the formation of open fire-places in several of the day-rooms. Lavatories, or washing-rooms, have been added to many of the wards, and contribute much to the cleanliness and personal comfort of many of the patients. The substitution of cocoa for gruel, at breakfast, has given universal satisfaction; and the occasional substitution of a currant dumpling for soup, on the only soup-day in the week, has removed almost the only cause of discontent with the general dietary. Allowing white delf plates, and nickel forks, shaped like an ordinary dinner fork, to be used instead of the iron plates and very unsightly as well as more dangerous forks formerly used, has given an air of neatness to the dinner table in several of the wards, which will in all probability be gradually extended to the rest. The tranquil and orderly patients have had the first benefit of some of these changes; and subsequently the infirm, whose hands are often nearly helpless, and to whom the former forks, especially, were very inconvenient; but the other alterations have been more general. The extreme order with which the patients sit down to dinner, particularly on the Male side of the Asylum, and even in what are called the refractory wards, leaves no room for doubting that all the patients may in time participate in the benefit of every one of these improvements.

At the season of Christmas, and at the close of the year, the male and female patients have had their usual entertainments, and the same cheerful preparation, the same activity in decorating the wards, and the same hearty enjoyment of the evenings devoted to the parties, have been observable as on former occasions. A sale of the beautiful ornamental needle-work of the female patients took place in June; but the pleasure accruing to the patients on these public occasions falls far short of that which they derive from the more enlivening and less exciting entertainments of which the spectators are less numerous and miscellaneous.

Some additions continue to be made, from time to time, to the Patients' Library on the Male side of the Asylum; and a collection of books is forming for the use of the Female Patients. Among the men there are always several who are intelligent and who have been well educated; and the poetical compositions of a few of these were collected, during the past summer, into a small volume, printed by other patients at the Asylum press, and entitled "Verses from Hanwell." Almost every printed form required in the Asylum is now accurately prepared by the patients employed in the printing office. Several of the Male Patients have also formed themselves into an evening reading class: one of them is appointed reader, and one chairman for each week; and the readings are listened to with very evident enjoyment, and the meetings conducted with perfect order.

It is a matter of the deepest regret, that at a time when numerous Asylums are about to be erected in Great Britain and Ireland, and in the Colonies, the plans adopted should occasionally be such as to create great obstacles in the way of introducing a system comprehending or permitting these and other progressive ameliorations, which are, in reality, so many remedial applications, and are approved by so many of those most experienced in the direction of Asylums and the treatment of the insane; plans including a crowding of the patients by day, and an association of numbers of them in large dormitories at night; an insufficient provision for superintendence, or for co-operation and mutual assistance among the attendants; a want of sufficient ground for cultivation or for exercise; and a severity of economy which, if necessary in making provision for mere paupers, cannot with a due regard to humanity, or even to justice, be applied to those whose poverty has in many cases been the result of mental malady, and whose affliction can only be mitigated or removed by the application of every means of restoring bodily health and mental tranquility.

The plans alluded to, and the arrangements apparently contemplated for the detention of Pauper Lunatics in wards attached to workhouses, create primary impediments to the establishment of proper curative treatment; make the establishment of the non-restraint system extremely difficult, if not impossible; and are so opposite in spirit to the practice and treatment which have characterised the larger Asylums for some years past, as to create an apprehension that the whole management of the insane poor will revert to its former disgraceful condition.

The Statistical Tables appended to my Report have this year been prepared by Mr. Aulsebrook, appointed by the Visiting Justices, since the last annual Report was made, to the duty of keeping the various registers required in the Asylum, and of deducing the Statistical results, so as to present them in a form useful to the public. The increased

attention which it has been practicable, in consequence of this appointment, to pay to the collecting and recording of such particulars, has tended to show still more strongly the difficulty of obtaining exact information concerning the cases. In many instances the particulars sent with the patients on admission have been found to be wholly incorrect; and the Report furnished of the duration of the malady is scarcely ever to be depended upon.

Several circumstances have concurred, during the past year, to direct attention in a more particular manner to this subject. The Medical Officers of the Asylum have been occasionally called upon by the Visiting Justices to give their opinions in relation to applications made by different parishes, and also by the Commissioners in Lunacy, respecting the exchange of incurable and inoffensive patients for recent and curable cases; and these applications appeared in singular contrast with the cases continually arriving at the Asylum from various parishes, not excepting those from which such applications proceeded. The gradual accumulation of incurable cases in the Asylum, as shown by the fact that at the close of the twelve months ending September, 1845, the proportion of recent cases out of 985 remaining in the Asylum was only twenty-five, reckoning all as recent cases in which the malady was not of more than a year's duration; and only nine if the term recent is restricted to cases of not more than six months duration; together with the small number of recoveries and the great number of deaths among the Patients, were all circumstances calculated to direct close observation to the condition of the cases sent to the Asylum; and the results of this observation were from time to time communicated to the Visiting Justices, until it was found that nearly three-fourths of the receptions were of chronic or incurable

cases, and that the recent and curable cases formed the rare exceptions. Of the first thirteen cases admitted in the past year it was, for instance, reported at the time, that only one offered a probable chance of cure, and that even the subject of this case had been sent from another Asylum, and was a patient in whose family insanity was hereditary. The greater number of these patients were paralytic, or epileptic, or had been long insane: some were imbecile, some helpless, one blind, deaf, and scarcely able to move without help, and one aged and almost unconscious of everything; several were bruised or otherwise injured, and some marked with restraints. The continuance of the same character of admissions throughout the entire year is most fully shown by the following registers, by which it would almost appear that all the recent cases occurring in the County are studiously kept out of the Asylum; and that any attempt to procure them, by abandoning the chronic and inoffensive cases now in the Asylum to workhouse care, would only lead to the reception of a succession of cases rendered inveterate by time or previous treatment.

By the above Register it appears, that in thirty-six cases of Female Patients admitted in the last year, twenty-four appeared to be incurable on admission. Only nineteen out of the thirty-six were cases to which the term recent could properly be applied, the malady having already existed more than six months in all the rest. Of these nineteen, one died of pulmonary consumption soon after admission; and one is sinking under the same complaint; five have improved as regards their mental condition, but in one of these the attack is the third that has occurred, and in two others the malady is hereditary. One of the rest is fast advancing to recovery, and six have entirely recovered, and left the Asylum.

The next Register shows the state of the Male Patients admitted within the same period.

Of the fifty-nine admissions of Male Patients in this Register, twenty-three were reported recent, but four of these appeared to be old cases, and incurable. Of the remaining nineteen patients, six recovered, and have left the Asylum; four have improved; one is convalescent. The remaining eight appeared to be incurable on admission, and of these, three have died. The thirty-six other cases have every appearance of being incurable.

Of the ninety-five cases, therefore, admitted during a year in which some of the parishes have expressed much anxiety to be allowed to take away old and incurable cases from the County Asylum, in order to be enabled to send recent and curable cases; and in which, also, the admissions at the Asylum were for a time suspended, in order to create vacancies for the reception of such recent cases, it appears that seventy-two were either decidedly or probably incurable on admission; that more than forty had already been in one or more Lunatic Asylums, and that of those reported as recent cases, thirty-six in number, thirteen were decidedly or probably incurable, of whom four died not long after admission.

These Registers are merely laid before the Visiting Justices as illustrating the description of cases sent to the County Asylum at Hanwell, and accounting for the small number of recoveries. So long as there are licensed private houses for the reception of pauper lunatics, and so long as lunatics are allowed to be detained in the wards attached to Workhouses, and licensed as Asylums, the transmission of recent and curable cases to the County Asylum will generally be delayed, until the Patients become evidently incurable or unmanageable, or unlikely long to survive.

Although the Medical Officers attached to County Asylums cannot but regret that so few of the cases placed under their care afford a hope of recovery, I believe few or none of them would wish to close the doors of such Asylums to those afflicted with insanity even in its most hopeless chronic forms. Whilst I entertain a hope that the populous County of Middlesex will soon have Asylums capable of holding all the pauper lunatics of the County, I still trust, that in each Asylum, there will be found both the curable and the incurable cases. The zeal of Officers attached to hospitals for mere incurables, would, I fear, languish in the absence of all hope of the recovery of any of those under their charge; and I am perfectly satisfied, that the chances of recovery in recent cases would not be increased by exclusive association with other recent and curable cases. The various means of improvement, applicable to the incurable, contribute to the actual recovery of the curable; and the spectacle of a recovered patient is beneficial even to those whose recovery is not to be hoped for. If curable patients must associate with others who are insane, the most improving of such associates will often be found among the incurable: and by their admixture in one Asylum, the hope of recoveries continually animates the minds of the Medical Officers, and does not abandon those of their patients, whom their skill and care, where cure is impossible, can still greatly improve.

I cannot refrain from observing, also, that any plan for the entire separation of the incurable from the curable, founded on the belief that incurable cases require less care, less vigilent superintendence, a less perfectly constructed building, a less efficient medical staff, a less careful classification, and fewer means of occupation, or opportunities for exercise and

recreation, will be found to disappoint every expectation, and to be as unfavourable to amendment, to recovery, to safety, and to life, as it is to the exercise of common humanity.

Notwithstanding that during the great heat of the last summer, the temperature of several of the wards was sometimes for a great part of the day as high as 75° or 80° of Fahrenheit, the Asylum appears to have been generally healthy. In the autumn, as is usually observed, there were many cases of diarrhæa among the patients, a malady at other times rare in the Asylum; and a troublesome form of influenza has prevailed since the commencement of the severe weather of the present winter. The causes of the deaths which have taken place among the patients will, however, be found to have little connection with these circumstances.

Two of the deaths among the Male Patients, were, it will be seen, the results of lamentable accidents. One was by suicide; the patient being apparently convalescent from an attack of melancholia, and having taken tea in the presence of the attendants, and conversed cheerfully with them, only a few minutes before committing the act. The other was the consequence of a fall from a high part of the building, in an attempt made by an imbecile boy to escape. A few cases of sudden death have occurred, on which the verdicts of a Coroner's Jury, invariably summoned where the death of a patient is sudden and unexpected, are inserted in the Table of the Causes of Death.

In consequence of an apprehension on my part that my altered position in relation to the Asylum, since I became a non-resident Officer, had deprived me of the requisite opportunities for the careful observation of cases on which I could

rely as the foundation of clinical instruction to Medical Students, I last year felt myself compelled to decline acceding to the wish of the Visiting Justices that I should deliver a Course of Lectures in he Asylum, as I had voluntarily done in the three preceding years. The renewed solicitations which the Visiting Justices have done me the honour to make on this subject, and my conviction of the desirableness of making every large Asylum for the Insane to some extent a school of practical observation, have, however, induced me to waive these and other personal objections to resuming such a duty; and, with the assistance of Dr. Hitchman in some parts of the course, and also of Dr. Begley in making arrangements for the visits to the Wards, by which each Lecture will be prefaced, I hope, in May and June next, to take a part in a short Clinical Course of Lectures on the symptoms and treatment, and on the appearances found on examination in fatal cases, in the forms of mental disorder most frequently met with in practice.

> THE TWENTY-EIGHTH REPORT OF Messrs. ALLEN, of Carlisle Street, Soho Square, Attorneys at Law.

MESSRS. ALLEN have to Report, that in consequence of Notices given to the Clerk of the Peace since the County Day of the last Quarter Sessions, they have attended at the Metropolitan Police Courts, at Petty Sessions, and on Parish Officers, and made numerous enquiries in eleven cases of Pauper Lunatics; and that in four of the cases the applications to charge the County with the maintenance of the Lunatics were abandoned, (settlements having been discovered) and in the remaining seven the Magistrates decided that the Paupers were chargeable to the County.

Messrs. Allen have also defended an appeal by the Parish of Walcot, in Bath, touching the settlement of Talavera Henry, in which the Order upon that Parish was quashed—they have, however, discovered the Lunatics settlement to be in the Parish of St. Martin, Salisbury, and have caused it to be adjudicated accordingly.

They have likewise corresponded with an Attorney at Bristol, with a view of discovering the settlement of Charles Perkins, a Patient in the Asylum.

The expense incurred in the whole thirteen cases, including payments to Agents at Bath, Salisbury and Bristol, amounts to £54 7s. 5d.
