To Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Lancaster, in Annual General Session assembled.

> County Lunatic Asylum, Prestwich, 26th December, 1867.

In accordance with the provisions of the Act 16th and 17th Victoria, cap. 97, the Committee of Visitors of the County Lunatic Asylum at Prestwich present their Annual Report to the Court of Annual General Session.

During the year 99 males and 161 females have been admitted; 68 males and 81 females have been discharged, of whom 23 males and 66 females were cured, and 63 males and 55 females have died.

The Asylum is capable of accommodating 1,000 patients—475 men and 525 women, and on this day there are 979 on the books of the Establishment.

The Buildings are in a satisfactory state.

The Hospital for contagious diseases—the erection of which was sanctioned by the Court on the 28th of June, 1866, has been completed. The building will accommodate 36 patients, and is wholly isolated from the other parts of the Establishment.

The general health of the patients has been very good.

There have been no changes amongst the various officers of the Establishment, to whom much praise is due for the efficient manner in which they discharge their arduous and responsible duties.

The weekly charge for the maintenance of patients has been 9s. 11d. throughout the year.

Your Committee have, unfortunately, been unable to carry out the arrangement with the Guardians of the Bolton Union, alluded to in the Annual Report of last year, for the reception, from this Asylum into the workhouse of that Union, of a limited number of chronic and harmless patients, so as to afford room in the Asylum for more hopeful and pressing cases. This arrangement was originally made with the sanction of the Commissioners

in Lunacy, but could not be acted upon in consequence of a legal difficulty as to the construction of the eighth clause of "The Lunacy Acts Amendment Act, 1862." The opinion of the Law Officers of the Crown has been taken, and it is advised that further legislation is desirable in order to define more clearly the position of Visitors, Guardians, and others with respect to chronic lunatics removed to workhouses under the provisions of that Act. The Poor Law Board attempted to meet the difficulty by introducing a clause into the Poor Law Amendment Act of last Session, but threatened opposition led to the withdrawal of the clause at the last moment, and the expected relief was not obtained—a circumstance much to be regretted, as your Committee have frequently been obliged, from want of accommodation, to refuse the application of parties seeking admission into the Asylum.

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REPORT

OF THE

MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT

County Asylum, Prestwich,
21st February, 1868.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present the following Report of the Prestwich Asylum for the year 1867:—

On the 1st of January, 1867, the Asylum contained 989 patients—497 men and 492 women. The admissions during the year amounted to 263—100 men and 163 women. Of these—

93 were discharged recovered.

35 ditto relieved.

29 ditto not improved, and

120 died.

The average number resident during the year was 985.

Of the 263 patients admitted 38 were the subjects of General Paralysis, and 14 of Epilepsy.

The recoveries have been at the rate of 36.36 per cent. upon the admissions, and the deaths 9.59 upon the total number under treatment.

By reference to the Obituary Table, General Paralysis, as in former years, will be found to be chief among the causes of death —50, or nearly half of those who died, having succumbed to that disease. In 39 instances death is ascribed to brain disease, epilepsy, and pulmonary consumption; and in the remainder to various causes specified in the above-named table.

I mention, with much regret, the occurrence of a suicide. A female patient, who had formerly been in the Asylum, and discharged therefrom recovered, was re-admitted last year. From a previous experience of her character, and in the absence of any apparent disposition to injure herself, she had been for several weeks employed, with about twenty others, in peeling potatoes. On the morning of the sad event, when the patients were being arranged for that purpose, the poor woman left the room where they were assembled, and although missed but for a few minutes, was discovered by one of the attendants in charge in an adjoining water-closet with her throat cut, life being almost extinct.

The Asylum has been free from any epidemic or contagious disease throughout the year, and the health of the patients generally has been very good.

The routine of employment and recreation has not varied

materially from that of former years. The weekly dances and theatrical representations have been regularly held, and have been, as usual, much enjoyed by the inmates.

The dry earth-closets, which had been in use for several months at the New Hospital, proved in every respect so satisfactory that I was induced to solicit your sanction to carry out the system more extensively in some of the older buildings. By your permission the water-closets in No. 6 Men's Ward (a building holding nearly 300 patients) have been converted into earth-closets, and these have now been in use for several weeks. I entertain no doubt whatever of the benefits arising from the alteration, and as the expense is so trifling, venture to express a hope that before the expiration of the present year the whole Asylum may be subjected to the same beneficial and economical change.

Two of the Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum early last year, when they left the following report:—

" Prestwich County Asylum,
" 12th March, 1867.

"Upon our visits yesterday and this day we have inspected the Asylum in its several departments, and, with the exception of one man who escaped on the 1st instant, and has been traced to Lancaster; and one woman absent on trial, have seen all the patients. "The following table shows the changes in the patients since the visit of our colleagues 17th February, 1866, and their present numbers:—

"Inquests were held in eight cases, including one of fracture of a rib and pleurisy, consequent upon a kick by another male patient, and one of fracture of the forearm and ensuing fever.

"Both the cases last referred to were subjects of correspondence with our Board, and were specially inquired into by the Visitors.

"The present sanitary condition of the Asylum is good.

"We found about six patients in each division in bed. The patients registered as under medical treatment for bodily ailments are only 43 in number, viz.:—22 men and 21 women.

"It appears, however, from the following return, which has been furnished to us, that there are in the Asylum large numbers of patients suffering from serious chronic disease of the brain, viz.:—

"The average attendance of patients at Divine Service in the Asylum Church is as follows:—Men, 280; Women, 280: Total, 560. "Morning prayers are also read in the Asylum by the chaplain, at which 150 men and 190 women are usually present.

"About 180 male and 190 female patients are taken out regularly for walks on the Estate, over which a good walk now extends for nearly a mile.

"We have satisfaction in reporting most favourably of the personal condition, as to dress and otherwise, of the patients of both sexes. The clothing generally is warm and suitable, and with few exceptions the patients are provided with flannel next the skin.

"The male patients were remarkably quiet and orderly. In some of the female wards, on the other hand, there was considerable noise and excitement.

"At the time of our visit one male and four females were in seclusion.

"According to the medical journal the amount of seclusion is still very large, as appears by the following statement applicable to the period since the last visit:—

With few exceptions, however, the duration of the seclusion on any one occasion appears to have been short.

"We found the Asylum throughout clean, and in excellent order.

"The dietary generally is upon a very satisfactory scale. The dinners, yesterday and to-day, were of good quality and well served. We noticed, however yesterday, that a very large number of the women wholly or partially refused the peas soup, a fact to which we desire to draw attention, with a view to the substitution, at least in the Female Division, of a more solid form of dinner.

[&]quot;As respects recreation and amusements, we have to report

that the usual in-door games are regularly in use, and that the weekly dances are continued through the summer and autumn. In fine weather the dances are in the open air, to the music of the Asylum Reed Band, which has been established by Mr. Holland, and now numbers between 40 and 50 performers. During the winter months weekly theatricals are substituted in the old workroom, at which, however, in consequence of the inadequate dimensions of the room, not more than from 150 to 200 patients of both sexes can be present.

"Having regard to the much larger number of patients who might beneficially attend these and other entertainments, we strongly recommend to the consideration of the Visitors the propriety of erecting a good Central Recreation Hall.

"The observations and recommendations of the last Visiting Commissioners have all received due attention, and in reference thereto, and to other alterations and improved arrangements since the last visit, we have satisfaction in reporting as follows:—

- "1.—The bathing of the patients is now distributed over the six days of the week. There is a change of water for every patient, and the Chief Attendant in the Male Division, and the Assistant Matron in the Female, are always present, and see that the rules for the guidance of the attendants, which are now printed and hung up in the bath-rooms, are duly observed.
- "2.—An additional night attendant has been engaged, as suggested, in each division.

- "3.—No. 5 Ward, on each side, is in progress of being entirely appropriated to the purpose of an Infirmary, with a special bath-room and other hospital comforts.
- "4.—The detached hospital for contagious and infectious diseases has been erected, and will, it is expected, be completed and ready for occupation by May next. The cubical space allowed being ample, the hospital is designed for 16 patients of each sex. As a provisional arrangement, and until the necessity arises for using it for its special object, it is proposed that 50 female patients of a quiet class shall reside in the hospital, wherein 25 male patients, pending the completion of the building, are now placed to sleep.
- "It is not intended to increase the aggregate number of patients beyond 1,000, viz.:—475 men and 525 women.
- "5.—Service is held weekly—on Mondays, for the Roman Catholics, in each Division, by a Priest, at which 50 men and 75 women are usually present.
- "6.—A good range of new piggeries have been erected, and the dairy has been improved.
- "7.—In lieu of procuring by contract beef and mutton, live stock is now purchased, and slaughtered on the premises, which has been attended with great advantage as respects both quality and price.

"8.—The supply of Books and Periodicals has been greatly increased.

"The Asylum is at present quite full, and we are informed that since the last visit as many as 95 patients (22 men and 73 women) have been rejected for want of room.

"In these circumstances, the question of providing additional accommodation for the Pauper Lunatics of the County is one of pressing importance.

"The ordinary weekly charge is now 9s. 11d.

"We have been gratified by our visit, and by the evidence afforded of the zeal and activity shown by Mr. Holland in the management of this large Institution. In the course of our inspection we received every aid and attention from the Assistant Medical and other officers.
