ADJOURNED ANNUAL SESSION, HELD AT PRESTON, ON THURSDAY, THE 31st DAY OF DECEMBER, 1868.

To Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Lancaster, in Annual General Session assembled.

> County Lunatic Asylum, Prestwich, 30th December, 1868.

In accordance with the provisions of the Act 16 and 17 Vict., cap. 97, the Visitors of the County Lunatic Asylum at Prestwich, present their yearly report to the Court of Annual General Session.

The Asylum is capable of accommodating 1,000 patients, viz:—475 males, and 525 females, and on this day there are 984 on the books of the establishment.

During the year 157 males, and 151 females, have been admitted; 84 males, and 104 females, have been discharged, of whom 48 males, and 65 females, were cured, and 69 males, and 50 females have died.

The general health of the patients has been good.

The various officers have discharged their respective duties to the satisfaction of the Committee.

The Asylum is in a good state of repair, and every exertion is made to utilize the labour of the patients in maintaining the buildings in a proper condition.

The weekly charge for the maintenance of patients was 9s. 11d., from the commencement of the year until June last, when it was reduced to 9s. 4d., and, at a meeting held on the 18th instant, your Committee decided, that, from and after the expiration of the current year, the charge to the Unions should be further reduced from 9s. 4d. to 8s. 9d. a week.

The Commissioners in Lunacy, on their last visits to the Asylum, strongly recommended that a Recreation Hall of enlarged dimensions and additional Dining Room accommodation for the male patients should be provided. Various plans have been considered, and your Committee have at length concluded upon one, which they are satisfied can be carried out by the aid of a grant from the Court, of a sum not exceeding £600. A plan and an estimate of the cost are submitted to the Court

The annual report for last year referred to a contemplated arrangement with the Guardians of the Bolton Union, for the reception of a limited number of chronic and harmless patients, from this Asylum into the workhouse of that Union, so as to afford accommodation in the Asylum for more hopeful and pressing cases. This plan, which, in the first instance, received the sanction of the Commissioners in Lunacy, could not be carried out in consequence of a legal difficulty which presented itself at that time, but has since been removed by the Poor Law Amendment Act of last Session. On the passing of that Act, your Committee, anxious to carry out the proposed arrangement,-having been compelled within the space of six months, in consequence of want of accommodation, to refuse admission into the Asylum of upwards of 100 patients—at once renewed negotiations with the Guardians of the Bolton Union, who, eventually, at a Board meeting held on the 9th December, instant, unanimously passed a resolution of which the following is a copy:-

"That however desirous the Guardians may have been to assist the Committee of Visitors of the Prestwich Lunatic Asylum, by endeavouring to render available the spare room at their disposal in the Workhouse Lunatic Wards for the reception of a limited number of Chronic Lunatics from that Asylum, with a view of making immediate room therein for hopeful and urgent cases, considering the impediments and obstacles raised by the Commissioners in Lunacy, with the uncertainty what their further requirements may be, they are not disposed to proceed further with a project, which, in a

pecuniary point of view, would not be directly advantageous, while the accommodation may ultimately be required for Chronic cases of Lunacy, belonging and chargeable to this Union."

Your Committee regret that during the last year they sustained a severe loss in the death of Mr. Robert Chadwick, who, for many years, had devoted much time and rendered valuable services to this institution.

REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDENT.

County Asylum, Prestwich, February, 1869.

Gentlemen,

I beg to submit the following report, annexed to which are the usual tabular statements:—

On the 1st of January, 1868, the Asylum contained 982 patients, 461 men and 521 women. The admissions during the year amounted to 308—157 men and 151 women. Of these—

113 were discharged cured.

32 ditto relieved.

42 ditto not improved, and

119 died.

The average number resident during the year was 986.

Of the 308 patients admitted 49 were the subjects of general Paralysis, and 26 of Epilepsy.

D

The recoveries have been at the rate of 36.62 per cent upon the admissions, and the deaths, 9.22 upon the total number under treatment.

The Asylum has been throughout the year free from either contagious or infectious diseases and the general health of the patients has been good. We have not, however, quite escaped those unfortunate occurrences which the greatest care is sometimes powerless to prevent. In the early part of the year one of the male patients made a fatal attack upon another. I need not enter into the particulars of this painful circumstance; they were fully reported to you at the time, and the aggressor was removed to the Criminal Asylum at Broadmoor, after arraignment at the March Assizes.

Great difficulties have arisen with regard to the admission of urgent cases, and although an unusual number of patients were transferred to workhouses in order to make room for such persons, still a great many have been necessarily refused. It is, however, gratifying to know that measures are now being taken which will in time put an end to this undesirable state of affairs.

The favourable weather we had for building purposes during the past year enabled us to make rapid progress with the farm extensions. The extra shippons, and potato stores are now finished, the latter having been found very useful for storing our winter stock. The Farmer's cottage, to which are attached a dairy and granary, is nearly ready for use, and I hope that a few months will find all these buildings in every respect complete.

At the last visit of the Commissioners in Lunacy, they recommended an increase in the dining accommodation for the men, which had been long felt to be inadequate for the numbers. To remedy this evil various schemes were submitted to you, and after much consideration, a plan was decided upon, which will not only diminish the crowding in the men's general dining rooms, but will give extended means for recreation, and which had likewise been previously urged by the Commissioners. This addition will enable us to meet another, and very important requirement, viz., a place for assembling the patients under one roof for Morning Prayers, and also for Divine Service on such occasions when the state of the weather will not admit of their walking to Church.

The substitution of earth-closets for water-closets, commenced in the year 1867, has been continued throughout the Asylum, and I can with confidence reiterate the opinion I have expressed in a former report as to the benefits arising from the change. We are no longer subject to the offensive odours arising from noxious gases which occasionally pervaded the wards when the water-closets, from one cause or another, were out of order; besides which we obtain much valuable fertilizing matter for the land.

I may add that in all the additions and alterations which have been effected during the past year, our own artizans, assisted by the patients, have been chiefly employed, very little external aid having been required.

Two of the Commissioners in Lunacy visited the Asylum in August last when they left the following report:—

Prestwich County Asylum, 29th August, 1868.

In the course of our visits to the Asylum yesterday and this day, we have inspected its several wards, offices, workshops, farm buildings, and premises, and, with the exception of two of each sex, absent on trial, have seen all the patients.

We have to record the following as the changes in the patients since the 12th of March, 1867, the date of the last visit, and their present numbers:—

Inquests were held in 15 cases, (12 in the male and 3 in the female division,) to 4 only of which special reference need here be made, viz., (1.) a man who died from maniacal exhaustion, 3 of whose ribs were found to have been fractured; (2.) a man from general Paralysis, accelerated by Pneumonia, induced by fractured ribs; (3.) a man from injuries to the Brain, caused by blows inflicted by another patient; and (4.) a woman by suicide. All the above cases were duly reported to our Board and formed the subjects of official correspondence.

The sanitary condition of the Asylum is very satisfactory, the patients last registered as under medical treatment being only 7 in the male and 12 in the female division.

According to the Medical Journal, since the last visit, 115 men and 134 women have been placed in seclusion during paroxysms of maniacal excitement, the former altogether on 482, and the latter on 586 occasions. We found at our visits 7 male patients and 5 females secluded.

The average attendance at Divine Service in the Asylum Church on Sundays is 280 on the male side and 300 on the female, and Morning daily Prayers are attended by 150 men and 180 women.

About 100 patients (45 of the male and 55 of the female sex) are present at the weekly services of the Roman Catholic Priest.

The arrangements for out-door exercise continue as here-tofore. About 180 male patients and 200 females walk out in parties daily on a gravelled road within the boundary of the Estate; the former from 11 to 1 o'clock, and the latter from 9 till 11, and again in the afternoon. The men so taken out are of the worst class, and the women of the same class, and those engaged in sedentary occupations.

The personal condition as to clothing and otherwise of the patients generally was most satisfactory. With very few exceptions their demeanour was quiet and ordinary.

We have nothing on this occasion specially to report in reference to recreation and amusement, for which good provision is made. The supply of Books and Periodicals in the wards appears to be ample.

We have to report most favourably of the state and aspect of the day-rooms and galleries, all of which are comfortably furnished with articles of a domestic character. The bedrooms also throughout the Asylum were very clean, well ventilated, and in the best order.

The detached hospital was completed and brought into use in June of last year, and is now provisionally occupied by 50 female patients of the better class. The rooms are spacious and cheerful and very well furnished, and the grounds attached to it are ornamentally laid out in walks and flower beds, and a portion of it is set apart for the game of Croquêt.

Since the last visit the dining halls have been improved and rendered more cheerful in appearance by pannelling with boards, stencilled and varnished.

We saw the patients of both sexes assembled in their respective halls at dinner.

That of the male patients was much overcrowded, and is of quite inadequate dimensions for the numbers daily dining in it. We trust that this serious defect will receive the earliest attention of the Committee of Visitors, and that means may be taken for considerably enlarging it.

The new farm buildings are nearly completed. The plans for these additions to the Asylum buildings ought to have been submitted to our Board with a view to a Report thereon for the approval of the Secretary of State.

The suggestion made at the last visit of the substitution of a solid dinner for Pea Soup has been carried out, and in lieu thereof the patients have now a dinner of baked meat and potatoes.

Dr. Rice has, since the last visit, succeeded Dr. Barker as assistant medical officer in charge of the female division.

The satisfactory state in which we have found the Asylum and patients is in our opinion most creditable to the management and superintendence of Mr. Holland, and the other officers acting under his directions.

To the Committee of Visitors,

County Asylum, Prestwich.

Since writing the foregoing Report, my attention has been drawn by the Commissioners in Lunacy to some serious misstatements, published by Dr. Kellogg in the "American Journal of Insanity," in reference to certain practices alleged by him to be in vogue in the Prestwich Asylum.

Dr. Kellogg states that "bleeding, bathing, and, in some cases, large doses of tartarised antimony are used freely with patients who are greatly disturbed; and those who persist in soiling themselves are treated to the 'Refractory Bath,' and that, too, continued longer than is absolutely necessary for mere cleanliness."

All this I most emphatically deny.

I have been upwards of six and twenty years connected with Lunatic Asylums, and in that time have but *once* resorted to venesection; the exceptional case being one of puerperal convulsions, which occurred subsequently to Dr. Kellogg's visit to this Asylum.

Tartarised antimony I but seldom give, and then only in small doses.

The "Refractory Bath," which Dr. Kellogg so graphically describes in another part of his article, I have neither seen here nor elsewhere. Indeed, until my attention was drawn to that gentleman's observations, I had never even heard of such an ingenious device for correcting dirty habits.


