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

REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF VISITORS

OF THE

County Lunatic Asylum at Prestwich,

TO THE

ADJOURNED ANNUAL SESSION HELD DECEMBER 30TH, 1862.

To Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Lancaster in Annual General Session assembled.

Prestwich, 29th December, 1862,

The Committee of Visitors of the County Lunatic Asylum. at Prestwich present their report to the Annual General Session, in accordance with the provisions of the Act, 16 and 17 Viet., cap. 97, sec. 62.

The buildings are in a satisfactory state. Alterations and a re-arrangement of rooms have secured improved accommodation as regards the Surgery, store-rooms, and workshops for the tailors, shoemakers, and painters, and have provided two new Infirmaries, one on the male, the other on the female side. An addition made to the bakehouse will also afford ample provision for the increased supply of bread required for the inmates of the

Asylum, when the buildings now in the course of construction shall have been completed. These works, in addition to the requisite internal and external painting and whitewashing, have been executed by the attendants and patients, aided occasionally by hired labour, under the directions of the superintendent.

The ornamental grounds improve yearly. The occupation of the kitchen-garden by the new buildings has necessitated the formation of another kitchen garden, which has already yielded an abundant crop of vegetables, and promises to be as useful and productive as the former.

A contract has been entered into for the purchase (which it is expected will be shortly completed) of 31a. 1r. 19p. of land, for the sum of £2750. The land already held in fee, and on which the Asylum is built, consists of 37a. 1r. 23p. The Committee of Visitors hold also 23 acres on long-lease. The total area of the land for the accommodation, recreation, and employment of the patients of the Asylum, in its enlarged state, will thus eventually be 91a. 3r. 2p.

The appointment of Mr. Mould to the office of Superintendent of the Cheadle Asylum, in April last, rendered vacant the post of Assistant Medical Officer of this establishment, to which the Visitors have appointed Dr. Manley, who is discharging his duties in a most satisfactory manner. No other change has taken place among the superior officers or servants, who, in their several departments, continue to act with their accustomed zeal.

During the year 61 males and 79 females have been admitted; 36 males and 43 females have been discharged, of whom 30 males and 36 females were cured; and 19 males and 33 females have died. From want of accommodation, the Committee have been compelled to refuse a considerable number of applications for admission.

The Asylum is at present capable of accommodating 510 patients, and there are now 503 on the books of the establishment. All are in their usual state of good-health, and no epidemic has prevailed amongst them.

The weekly charge for the maintenance of patients belonging to Unions or Townships within the County has been 7s. 7d. each; that for the maintenance of patients belonging to Unions or Townships not within the County, and which consequently did not contribute to the original cost of erecting the Asylum, 14s.

The enlargement of the Church, for which object a sum of £1200 was granted by the Court in April last, has been postponed till the early part of next year. Plans were some time since submitted to and approved by the Secretary of State, but the tenders so far exceeded the estimate, that the Committee did not feel themselves justified in proceeding with the execution of the works. The Visitors believe a modified and less expensive scheme will be devised, by which the required Church-accommodation may be obtained at the estimated cost.

The additional buildings already sanctioned by the Court and which will accommodate 420 patients, are in progress, and in anticipation of their completion the attendants and patients have been actively engaged for several months in providing a supply of clothing and of the requisite bedding and furniture.

The Asylum when completed will accommodate 930 patients.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.

Prestwich Asylum, February 13th, 1863.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit to you the twelfth Annual Report of the Prestwich Asylum, to which are annexed the usual Tabular Statements.

On the 1st of January, 1862, the Asylum contained 494 patients, of whome 242 were men, and 252 women. Since then 142 have been admitted, making a total of 636 who have been under care and treatment during the year. Of these,

66 have been discharged, recovered;
7 ditto relieved;
6 ditto not improved;
53 have died;

The number remaining in the Asylum on the 1st January, 1863, amounted to 504.

The proportion of recoveries (46 per cent. upon the admissions) has not quite equalled the average (50 per cent.) of the eight previous years.

The deaths have not exceeded 8 per cent. of those under treatment.

The principal causes of death have been general paralysis and pulmonary consumption.

One man unfortunately contrived to terminate his existence by strangling himself. He accomplished his purpose in the night time, by means of a sheet which he tore into strips and twisted tightly round his neck.

Beyond this, nothing transpired during the year to cause any anxiety.

With a few exceptions, the patients have enjoyed their customary good health.

The amusements of the patients have been kept up with the same regularity and variety which have distinguished them since the Asylum has been in operation;—theatrical representations, concerts, and weekly dances having contributed, each in turn, to the enjoyment of the inmates.

In addition to their ordinary occupations, the attendants and patients have applied themselves with energy to make such alterations in the present buildings as were found necessary to meet the requirements of those now in course of erection. They have also been busily employed in preparing furniture and clothing for the increased number of patients which the Asylum, when completed, will receive. This I anticipate will in some measure compensate for the present high price of materials as compared with the cost of the same when the present buildings were constructed.

The following is a copy of the report left by the Commissioners in Lunacy at their last visit: —

" Prestwich County Asylum, 24th October, 1862."

"We have inspected this Asylum, and have examined all the patients, who are now 507 in number, viz:—249 men, and 258 women. The majority of the patients were quiet and comfortable but in one or two of the female wards, occupied by the more excitable patients, there was a good deal of noise and disturbance. Some of the women were crouching or lying on the floor, and several wore strong dresses.

"Some of the excitement we witnessed was probably owing to the little exercise which it has been possible to afford the patients from the stormy state of the weather, but the crouching and sitting on the floor might be corrected by more persevering efforts on the part of the attendants.

"We have given special attention to the case of a woman who for some years past has refused to leave her room, and who has taken a great dislike to the matron, displaying extreme excitement whenever she sees her.

"This woman looks very ill owing to her long confinement, and as it has been found impossible in this Asylum to induce her to leave her room, or associate with the other patients, we recommend that she should have the benefit of a trial in some other Asylum, and with that view suggest that she should be sent to Lancaster.

"Although the clothing generally was in good order, in No. 4 ward we noticed that some of the men's dresses were shabby and torn. More care should be bestowed by the attendants to the personal neatness of the patients under their charge, and we think that strong dresses for the women might be dispensed with.

"We saw the patients of both sexes at their dinner, which consisted of boiled beef and cabbage, the working men having also bread and cheese. The food was all of the best quality, and served in great abundance.

"A large amount of useful work is performed by the patients, who make all their own clothes and shoes, and who have besides provided a large stock for the use of the patients who will hereafter occupy the buildings which are now being erected.

"From the returns given to us it appears that about 80 men are regularly employed on the land, and that 30 work at various trades, whilst upwards of 60 are engaged in cleaning the wards, &c. " Of the women 44 work in the wash-house and laundry; 50 in the kitchen and wards, and 80 occupy themselves in sewing, knitting, and mending.

"The average attendance at Chapel appears to be about 145 of each sex, at both the morning and evening services.

"Prayers are also read daily in the large room, when one hundred patients of each sex are generally present.

"We inspected the bedding, which was clean, although some of the blankets struck us as somewhat worn and old.

"The ward returns give a nightly average of 12 wet or dirty beds in the male wards, and 20 on the female side of the house.

"In a few wards alterations are going on, in some measure rendered necessary by the fresh distribution of patients, which will take place when the new buildings are completed. It is expected these buildings will be roofed before Christmas, and every effort is being made to hasten the work.

"The day-rooms presented their usual cheerful and comfortable appearance, and were well supplied with books, &c. for the entertainment of the inmates. We are told that the usual meetings of the patients for music and recreation have been regularly kept up.

"We only found one man in seclusion to-day, and judging

from the register, the numbers secluded are not large. Restraint has not been employed in any form.

"Since our last visit in May, 1861, 99 male and 116 female patients have been admitted; 55 men and 74 women have been discharged, of whom 111 were recovered; and 40 men and 44 women have died.

"We were glad to notice that the patients presented a contented, comfortable appearance, and we had no complaint of harshness or ill usage: indeed we have every reason to believe that their treatment is most kind and considerate."
