To Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Lancaster, in Annual General Session assembled.

County Lunatic Asylum, Prestwich,
26th December, 1877.

In accordance with the provisions of the Act 16th and 17th Vict., cap. 97, sec. 62, the Committee of Visitors of this Asylum present their report, for the past year, to the Court of Annual General Session.

During the year 429 patients were admitted, namely, 184 men and 245 women; 129 men and 171 women were discharged, of whom 82 men and 133 women were recovered; 47 men and 38 women were transferred to the workhouses of their respective Unions, or to the care of their relatives or friends; and 47 males and 46 females died.

At the commencement of the year the available accommodation consisted of 1,020 beds. The two wards referred to in the last Annual Report of the Committee, and then in the course of construction—one attached to No. 4 on the male side, the other to No. 6 on the female side—have been completed, and the Asylum now affords accommodation for 1,170 patients, namely, 525 men and 645 women.

The Asylum has been constantly full. Every bed, including those reserved for the treatment of urgent and recent cases—10 on each side—has been occupied, and on many occasions the numbers have been in excess of the stated amount of accommodation.

There are now 513 males and 649 females on the books of the establishment.

The crowded state of the Asylum has necessitated the refusal, during the year, of many applications for admission, although every effort has been made to provide accommodation, by the removal of such patients as could with propriety be confided to the care of their relatives or friends, and by the transfer to the workhouses of all quiet incurable patients. So many of the latter class have been discharged that few now remain who could with safety be so dealt with.

Pursuant to the suggestions contained in the Report of the Special Committee on Lunacy Accommodation, presented to the Court of Annual General Session in September last, plans have have been prepared, under the directions of your Committee, for an Annex to this Asylum, capable of accommodating 600 harmless and chronic patients. The plans have been submitted to the Commissioners in Lunacy for their approval, and for the sanction of the Secretary of State, and the Visitors trust they will be in a position to apply to the Court in April next for a grant of the funds necessary to enable them to erect the proposed Annex.

The Buildings are in good condition. They have undergone considerable repairs and improvements, the work having been mainly performed by the patients, under skilled attendants.

The provision against fire, existing in the other parts of the Asylum, has been extended to the new administrative block of buildings, to Nos. 1 and 2 wards, and to the detached hospital. Throughout the Asylum the inside hydrants are supplied direct from the main, and are thus independent of the ordinary distributing pipes; and stand pipes have been placed on each floor, with a coil of hose attached, ready to extinguish any local fire.

The sanitary condition of the Asylum continues to be very satisfactory. No epidemic has occurred, and mortality has been below the average rate.

Your Committee, in their frequent inspections of the various parts of the establishment, have been much gratified by noticing a greatly improved state of ventilation, and the tasteful decorations and arrangements, which, whilst contributing much to the pleasure and amusement, constitute powerful curative agencies in the treatment of the patients.

The charge for the lodging, maintenance, clothing, and care of each patient belonging to an Union or a Parish, or other place within the County, for the first half of the year was 8s. 9d., and for the latter half 9s. 11d. a week. The charge for each out-County patient has been 14s. a week throughout the year.

The following changes have taken place in the official staff:

—Mr. George Henry Murray has been appointed Second Assistant

Medical Officer, vice Mr. Hutchings, resigned; and Mr. Benjamin

Russell Baker has been appointed Third Assistant Medical

Officer.

In conclusion, your Committee have much pleasure in expressing their entire satisfaction with the management of the Asylum, and with the conduct of the present officers and attendants.

PEPORT

OF THE

COMMISSIONERS IN LUNACY.

County Lunatic Asylum, Prestwich,

23rd and 24th February, 1877.

We, the undersigned Commissioners in Lunacy have officially inspected this Asylum, and report as follows.

The number of Patients at present on the books is 1,122; of whom 507 are men, and 615 Women. They have all been personally examined by us except one of the latter, who is away on leave. We have a very good report to make of their condition, and there were abundant indications throughout of kind and judicious treatment.

It may be said that nowhere was there any excitement or disorderly conduct, and no one was in seclusion. The clothing was very good, judiciously varied—in pattern according to the occupations of the inmates, and kept very clean.

We have an equally favourable account to give of the bedding, and the condition of the Wards as regards cleanliness and ventilation was throughout satisfactory.

The attention given to the decoration and colouring of the rooms and galleries, and the abundant provision of means for amusement and of articles calculated to arouse and interest the patients have, in our opinion, a very material effect in producing the quiet and content prevailing here, and we cannot doubt that they have beyond this indirectly a medical influence on the patients.

The associated amusements remain as described in the last entry. Since that date seven entertainments have been given, consisting of dramatic representations, concerts, &c., and weekly dances continue to be held.

Divine service is performed as usual, the numbers attending being about the same as before reported.

The numbers reported to be usefully occupied are 308 men, and 511 women. Of the former 70 work on the farm, 142 are employed at various trades in the shops, 19 in the washhouse, 53 in the kitchen, bakehouse, and other offices, &c.

Needle work occupies as many as 224 of the women; 35 are employed in the Washhouse and Laundry, 10 in the kitchen and offices, and 139 as Ward cleaners. All the shoes and clothes are made on the premises, and there is now a large stock in store.

The interval since the last visit, on the 29th September, 1876, has been shorter than usual, and the admissions have only been 81 in the male, and 83 in the female division.

Of the 138 Patients discharged, 27 men and 56 women were "recovered." The remainder with very few exceptions were removed to Workhouses.

Considering the unfavourable character of many of the Patients received here, it is gratifying to observe the large per centage of the recoveries.

The mortality during the last five months has been remarkably low and but little over the rate of five per cent. per annum. The deaths were all due to causes usually met with among the insane, but two inquests were held; one upon a man suffering from general paralysis, where fractured ribs had also been discovered, and had tended to accelerate death; and the other upon the body of an aged woman, who also was found after death to have had a broken rib, but the death in this instance was not influenced by the fracture. Reports of these occurrences were forwarded to our Board at the time in the usual way.

The present sanitary condition of the Establishment is satisfactory.

Notwithstanding the large proportion of feeble, paralytic, and epileptic cases, we only found 6 men and 7 women in bed. These were for the most part in the excellent Infirmary Wards, where they evidently received the best attention.

We are informed that small pox is prevalent in the neighbourhood, and in some of the Unions from which patients are received, but the Asylum has, as yet, been quite free from this disorder, since the last visit. The wise precaution is however taken of vaccinating all fresh patients immediately after admission.

The patients registered as under medical treatment last week, were 29 men, and 32 women.

As regards the use of Mechanical restraint and seclusion, it also appears in the Medical Journal that no instance of the former has occurred, and that the employment of seclusion has been reduced to very small proportions, for since the last visit only 2 men and 4 women appear to have been subjected to it. The former in the aggregate on only 4 occasions for a total duration of 28 hours, and the latter on 94 occasions for a total of 385 hours. It is material to state that one of the women, who is a dangerous epileptic, and was formerly a criminal patient, is usually placed in her room during the time of dinner, and her case represents 88 of the 94 occasions, and 214 of the 385 hours forming the aggregate of the seclusions.

We had no complaints of ill-treatment or rough usage except such as were of a manifestly insane character.

The staff of Attendants and Nurses is in the proportion of about 1 to 13 Patients. The wages of the men begin at £30, and advance to £50, with an addition of £10 a year when placed in chief charge of a Ward.

The women commence at £18 10s., and advance to £25, with £5 extra when in charge of a Ward.

The Night Attendants, who are still 6 on the male and 7 on the female side, receive a somewhat higher rate of pay.

There are as heretofore, two Head Day Attendants of each sex, and one officer of the same rank in each division for the supervision of the Night Attendants.

We were present in the Dining Halls on both days of our visit, and saw every reason to be satisfied with the food and the manner of serving. It consisted yesterday of meat pies and rice, and to day of boiled cod fish with potatoes. Bread and beer was given on both days.

In the two Halls there were 330 men and 380 women, being the usual average and as many as those rooms will accommodate.

Among the improvements since the last visit we have to record the completion of a further useful addition to the Laundry department, and the commencement of extensions in Nos. 4 male and 6 female Wards. The improvement of the large rooms in connection with No. 4 Wards on both sides, and of the structural arrangements for rendering more complete the night supervision of epileptics, are, we feel assured, matters that will not be lost sight of.

The Asylum is now practically full in both divisions, but some further accommodation will be provided when the small extensions now in progress are completed.

In the course of our visit we inspected all parts of the main building, the workshops, the farm house, at which 30 male Patients reside, and the cottage, where there are six Patients of the same sex.

In all departments we observed indications of good management, and that numerous improvements continue from time to time to be introduced, which tend to promote the comfort and welfare of the Patients, and to maintain the efficiency of the Asylum for the care and treatment of the Patients.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honor to submit the 27th Annual Report of this Asylum, to which are added the usual Financial Statements and the Statistical Tables for the year 1877.

At the beginning of that year there remained under treatment 1,128 Patients; 505 males, and 623 females. During the year 432 Patients were admitted, making the total number under care and treatment 1,560, viz.: 691 males, and 869 females. The total removals by discharges and deaths were 400, consequently at the close of the year there were remaining 1,160 Patients, of whom 518 are males, and 647 females.

It is gratifying to state that the past year has been one of prosperity to the Institution, and of benefit to its inmates. The various improvements completed during that period have been important, and will add materially to the comfort and convenience of all connected with the institution. The household has been remarkably free from sickness, no epidemic has prevailed, and notwithstanding the increased number of Patients, the mortality during the year has been considerably below the average, amounting only to 6 per cent. on the total number under treatment. Excepting in one instance, that of the suicide of an escaped Patient by drowning-death was the result of natural causes. The number of Patients discharged recovered was 214, calculated upon the admissions, this gives a result of 49 per cent. Considering the hopeless character of the majority of the male admissions, this result must be considered satisfactory. Besides those Patients recovered 91 were discharged relieved, either to the care of their friends, or transferred to the Workhouses of their respective Unions.

Of the 432 cases received during the past year, 198 were Patients in whom the disease had existed previous to their being placed under treatment for a period exceeding six months, 234 were cases in which it had existed for a much shorter period. Of the former group only 48 or about 24 per cent. were deemed curable, and of these 26 have recovered, 14 are convalescing, and the others remain with little improvement. But of the latter group 178 were on their admission regarded as curable, and of these 116 have been discharged, and the remainder, with few

exceptions, are on a fair way towards recovery. These facts again testify in the most striking manner the paramount advantage of early treatment.

Throughout the year the Asylum has been filled to its utmost capacity; the accommodation provided by the additions to No. 4 male, and No. 6 female Wards, were occupied as soon as completed. Notwithstanding that every effort has been made to cope with the ever-increasing demand for admission by the transfer of chronic cases to the Workhouses, and to the care of their friends, we have been obliged to refuse admission to no less than 89 Patients during the past year. This is a matter for regret, when once the natural flow of Lunacy towards the Asylum is checked by deficiency of accommodation, the stream becomes diverted into other channels. Parish officials are furnished with an excuse to retain their cases in Workhouses, or these Patients are removed at a great distance from their friends to such other Asylums as are willing to receive them. So long as our existing Asylums are crowded with a mass of incurable Patients, there can be no effectual remedy to this state of affairs, and therefore it is hoped that the further provision for the chronic insane, embodied in the suggestions of the Lunacy Accommodation Committee, will speedily be carried out.

It gives me much pleasure to report the continued efficiency of all the officers, and their devotion to the best interests of the Asylum, and the welfare of the Patients. To the Attendants upon whom devolves the immediate and constant care of the Patients, and who perform their duties under the most trying circumstances, much praise is due. With few exceptions, the conduct of the staff has been very good.
